MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The Temporary Chairman laid before the Board the following from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, February 18, 1881. To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

In compliance with an appropriate and time-honored custom, it is my sad duty to announce to you the death, on the 13th instant, at Hot Springs, Arkansas, of the Hon. Fernando Wood. He was three times elected Mayor of the City of New York, and at the time of his death was a Repre-sentative from this City in Congress, and Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means. During nearly forty years of public service Mr. Wood proved himself to be a man of large executive ability, who was always prompt in the performance of his public duties, to which he brought the ripe experience of a man perfectly versed in business affairs, both private and public. As a private citizen, as a business man, as Mayor, and as Representative in Congress, he played a distinguished part in our Municipal and National life. In his death we lose a most able public servant, and an eminent citizen. I recommend that the Common Council take such action as may be appropriate. be appropriate.

for the reception of the remains, and that another special committee of five be appointed to perfect the above, and after consultation with his Honor the Mayor, and heads of departments, make such other and further arrangements as to them may appear better calculated more clearly and impres-sively to manifest sorrow for the death and reverence for the memory of the deceased. Alderman Sauer, by unanimous consent, moved the adoption of the preamble and resolution by relieve to the set.

Alderman Sauer, by unanimous consent, moved the adoption of the product of the product of a rising vote. In seconding the motion of Alderman Sauer, Aldermen Slevin and McClave paid glowing tributes to the public services and private virtues of the deceased. Previous to putting the question on the motion of Alderman Sauer, Alderman Hawes suggested that, in view of the decision of the Board on the question of the transaction of business other than the election of a Permanent President, and adverse to the power of the Board to perform any other business, it should be understood that the action taken to-day, on the preamble and resolution, should be regarded as the act of each individual member, which would necessarily require the formal approval of the Board when duly organized. The suggestion, evidently, was accepted by the Board, no objection being made. The Temporary Chairman then put the question whether the Board would agree with said

preamble and resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative unanimously by a rising vote. And the Temporary Chairman appointed as the Special Committee to proceed to Washington, D. C., to represent this municipality at the obsequies in that city : Aldermen McAvoy, Finck, Murphy, B. Kenney, and Hillard. As the Committee to perfect the arrangements in this city, after consultation with his Honor the Mayor, and the Heads of Departments : Aldermen Sauer, Perley, Keenan, Waite, and Sheils. A telegraphic message, received by his Honor the Mayor from the Sergeant-at-Arms, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., dated to-day, was here read to the Board, informing the members that "the funeral services of the late Hon. Fernando Wood would take place at the residence here, to-morrow, at 3 P. M. The remains will leave for New York to-morrow evening, at Io o'clock."

Alderman Wells moved that when the Board adjourns it do so to meet again on Wednesday next, the 23d instant, at 12 o'clock, M. The Temporary Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative. It was suggested by Alderman McClave, and accepted by the members present, that in the event of the funeral ceremonies being solemnized in this city on Wednesday next, that there be no meeting of the Board, and that a subsequent meeting be held upon a call therefor being signed by a majority of the members of the Board.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, 31 CHAMBERS STREET, NEW YORK, February 15, 1881. In accordance with section 110, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Department of Public Works makes the following report of its transactions for the week ending February 12, 1881:

Public Moneys Received and Deposited in the City Treasury.

W. R. GRACE, Mayor. Whereupon Alderman McAvoy presented the following preamble and resolution : Whereas, The sad intelligence of the death of the Hon. Fernando Wood, officially announced in this Board in a message from his Honor the Mayor, calls from us, the representatives of the people of this city, an expression of their profound sorrow, and imposes upon us the mournful duty of testifying in a marked manner to the general sorrow occasioned by the demise of our illustrious fellow citizen. The deceased statesman was, in his lifetime, well-known, honored, and beloved by the people of this city. He was a representative in Congress during the years 1841 and 1842; was chosen Mayor in 1854, and held that exalted office during the years 1855, 1856, 1857, 1860, and 1861. In 1865 he was again chosen a Representative in Congress, and was re-elected at each successive election for that once, up to and including the year 1880, when he was chosen for a full term, commencing December, 1881. He was pre-emmently a self-made man, having commenced active life in this city as an apprentice when but twelve years of age, where by untiring industry, patient application, per-sistent energy, and indomitable perseverance he secured for himself high public honors at the hands of a grateful and admiring constituency, and the world-wide reputation certain to result from the intelligent exercise of the unusual ability he possessed. His life was an eloquent commentary on the blessings and advantages of our popular system of republican government, which not only admits of, but assists in, the elevation of its citizens from the humblest walks in life, as it did him, to the highest honors and dignities in the State, and a prominent place in the affections of its people. His death is a public loss, as we look in vain for one so well qualified, either in ability or experience, to fill the place thus made vacant ; be it therefore, mesolved, That out of sorrow for the death and respect for the memory of Hon. Fernando Wood, it is hereby recommen

Wood, it is hereby recommended that our citizens close their respective places of business, and refrain from any secular employment on the afternoon of the day to be set apart for solemnizing the funeral from any secular employment on the alternoon of the day to be set apart for solemnizing the funeral rites and ceremonies; that the members of the Common Council will attend his funeral in a body, with their staves of office draped in mourning, and that his Honor the Mayor, and the heads of the several departments of the city government, be requested to unite with the Common Council on the sad occasion; that the usual badge of mourning be worn for a period of thirty days; that the flags on the City Hall, and the other public buildings, be displayed at half-staff from sunrise until sunset of the same day; and the owners or masters of vessels in the harbor, and the owners or occupants of buildings in the city be requested to display their flags in like manner; that a special committee of fine he composited to measure due to Washington D. C. of five be appointed to proceed to the City of Washington, D. C., to represent this municipality at the obsequies in that city, and to accompany the remains to the City of New York; that the Gov-ernor's room in the City Hall be placed at the disposal of the committee, prepared appropriately
