Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 184 were in institutions, 425 in tenement-houses, 195 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 11 were on the basement floor, 146 on the first, 216 on the second, 132 on the third, 85 on the fourth, 33 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 804 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 18 non-residents; 112 were stated to be single, 180 married, 78 widowed, and the condition of 452 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

CHAPTER 288.

An Act to provide for recording releases executed pursuant to chapter five hundred and fifty-one, laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, and the approval thereof, and for making the records and the certified copies thereof evidence.

Passed May 14, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. All releases heretofore executed and all releases which hereafter may be executed to the state of New York under chapter five hundred and fifty-one, laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, and approved by the superintendent of public works, if proved or acknowledged in the manner in which conveyances of real estate are required to be for the purpose of record, may, with the approval thereon, be recorded by the clerk of the county in which the lands referred to in the release are situated, in the books in which deeds are recorded, and indexed in the name of the state of New York as grantor and in the name of the releasor as grantee, for which service clerks of counties shall be entitled to the compensation now allowed by law for recording conveyances of real

Sec. 2. The record of any such release and approval thereof, or a certified copy of the record thereof, shall at all times and in all places be evidence, and of the same force and effect as though the original was produced and proven.

Sec. 3. Whenever the clerk of any county shall require any such release or releases, for record, the superintendent of public works shall transmit them to such clerk, who shall record and return the same within sixty days to said superintendent of public works without expense to such superintendent.

Sec. 4. This act shall apply to releases executed by villages or towns under said act. Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 280.

An Act to improve and regulate the use of Fourth avenue, at Ninety-seventh and Ninety-eighth streets, in the city of New York.

Passed May 17, 1881; three-fifths being present

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section I. Upon the New York and Harlem Railroad Company filing with the comptroller of the city of New York a bond to pay one-half of the cost thereof, when the same shall be completed, it shall be the duty of the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city of New York to construct an iron bridge for foot passengers and carriages over Fourth appears and carriages over the carriages over the carriages over the carriages over the carriages over it shall be the duty of the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city of New York to construct an iron bridge for foot passengers and carriages over Fourth avenue, at Ninety-seventh street, in the city of New York, at an elevation above the railroad at least equal to that of the bridge now spanning said avenue at Forty-fifth and Forty-eighth streets; such bridge to be constructed upon plans and specifications to be approved by the commissioner of public works, and it shall be the duty of said commissioner to cause such bridge to be constructed as soon as practicable after the passage of this act and the filing of said bond. The grade of Ninety-seventh street shall be conformed to the elevation required for said bridge.

Sec. 2. The board of apportionment shall include one-half the eost of the work to be certified to them by the comptroller in the next annual tax levy, and the same shall be raised by tax upon the real and personal property subject to taxation in the city and county of New York.

Sec. 3. Fourth avenue, at Ninety-eighth street, shall not be crossed by foot passengers or carriages on the level of the railroad, but Ninety-eighth street shall be closed for that purpose at the easterly and westerly lines of said avenue.
