To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors:

We herewith transmit the assessment rolls of the real and personal estates of the City and County of New York, for the year 1881, as revised and corrected in this Department.

The tax and assessment rolls having been finally submitted to the Board of Supervisors on the first Monday in July, being July 4, 1881, the undersigned, in the name of the Board of Supervisors and as one of its acts, and by due virtue of law, authorizes and directs the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments, by themselves, and such clerical assistance at their disposal, but without expense to the city or county, to cause to be properly estimated and computed, the taxes under and by virtue of said rolls, and to cause the said estimation and computation to be prepared, set down and extended in the tax books, as required by section 25 of chapter 120 of the Laws of 1850, and to cause the items

of said taxes to be carefully added, and to set down the amount of the same in the said books. This order to take effect after the expiration of the fifteen days mentioned in section 9 of chapter 269, Laws of 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I herewith transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 31st day of December, 1880, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, to wit: the sum of twenty-nine million eight hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and twenty-two dollars and fifty-nine cents; which amount, so estimated and certified as aforesaid, the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is "empowered and directed to cause to be raised, according to law, and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, within the said City and County of New York."

I, Allan Campbell, Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the provision of law contained in section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, do hereby certify to the Supervisors of the County of New York that the aggregate amount required to pay the expense of conducting the public business of the said City and County, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the financial year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, is twenty-nine million eight hundred and fifty-four thousand three hundred and twenty-two dollars and fifty-nine cents (\$29,854,322.59), being the amount of the Final Estimate for the year 1881, as made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the said City of New York on the 31st day of December, 1880, a copy of which Final Estimate is hereunto annexed.

FINAL ESTIMATE FOR THE YEAR 1881.

Made, pursuant to Section 112 of Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York, on December 31, 1880.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 30th day of October, 1880, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one (1881); in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 23, 1880, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 8, 1880; and therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one (1881), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

Commissioner Vanderpoel, to whom was referred with power the application of L. S. Wandell, to remove the dirt and refuse from surface of piers at Fortieth and Fifty-seventh streets, North river, reported he had conferred with the applicant, and had arranged with him to have the work performed for the price of \$65 for each pier.

On motion, the action as had, was approved.

N. L. McCready, President of the Old Dominion Steamship Company, appeared in reference to the rent to be charged for the partial use by said company of Pier, new 26, North river, and being heard at length in reference thereto,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Old Dominion Steamship Company be and hereby are notified and informed that consequent upon the partial occupation and use of Pier, new 26, North river, by said company, awaiting its entire completion, a charge, as for rent, is hereby made from January 1, 1881, to May 1, 1881, at the rate of \$15,000 per annum.

A. T. Decker, of Decker & Rapp, appeared and stated that it would be impossible to continue his business, if he was obliged to remove his lumber from piers and bulkheads as soon as discharged, and, being heard at length,

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify said firm, that no final action was had upon the subject of the immediate removal of the lumber owned by them, now incumbering several bulkheads on the North river, and that action has been suspended, to allow a further consideration on the subject by the Board.

On motion of Commissioner Laimbeer, it was,

Resolved, That the resolution of this Board, adopted the 18th instant, whereby certain fines were imposed upon Decker & Rapp, for non-compliance with the notice of the Corporation Wharfinger of the district, for the removal of lumber owned by them, from bulkheads on the North river, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to take down and remove, with the force of the Department, the old shed on the bulkhead between Piers 30 and 32, North river, lately occupied by the New York Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company.

On motion, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

Whereas, A claim of \$1,927.50 against David Whipple, assignee, lessee of the west half of Pier 12, East river, for rent due to May 1, 1881, was directed by this Board on the 18th instant to be transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection; and;

Whereas, The said pier is being thoroughly repaired, and has been in the possession of the contractor since about February 15, 1881, therefore,

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to advise the Counsel to the Corporation of all the facts connected with the breaking down of said pier, and its occupation by the contractor, and to state that in the judgment of this Board, a fair allowance should be made, if it may legally be done, from the said claim, consequent upon the said lessee not enjoying possession of the premises during the full term of his lease.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

CHAPTER 89.

AN ACT to authorize the commissioners of the sinking fund of the City of New York to sell lands no longer required for school purposes in said city.

Passed April 8, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: SECTION 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York are hereby authorized, upon the application of the board of education duly authorized and certified, to sell at public auction at such times and on such terms as they may deem most advantageous for the public interest, any land or lands and the buildings thereon, owned by the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city of New York, occupied or reserved for school purposes, and no longer required therefor; provided, however, that no property shall be disposed of for a less sum than the same may be appraised at by the commissioners of the sinking fund, or a majority of them, at a meeting to be held and on an appraisal made within one month prior to the date of the sale; and at least thirty days' notice of such sale, including a description of the property to be sold, shall be published in the City Record.

§ 2. The money received in payment for the said lands and buildings shall be paid into the treasury of said city, and shall be at once appropriated by the board of estimate and apportionment of said city to the said board of education for the purpose of purchasing other property or erecting other school buildings for new schools, the establishment of which shall have been authorized according to law.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 134.

AN ACT extending the time within which the commissioners of taxes and assessments for the city and county of New York, may act upon certain assessments.

Passed April 22, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of taxes and assessments for the city and county of New York, may during the month of May in any year act upon applications for the reduction of assessments upon real or personal property filed in their office on or before the thirtieth day of April preceding; and cause the corrected amount of any assessment reduced by them to be entered upon the assessment rolls for the year in which such correction may be made.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 135.

AN ACT to amend the Code of Civil Procedure.

Passed April 22, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section thirteen hundred and forty-two of the Code of Civil Procedure is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1342. An appeal may also be taken to the supreme court, from an order affecting a substantial right, made by the court or a judge, in an action brought in, or taken by appeal to, a court specified in the last section but one.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge or require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.
