

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to 'Thoesen & Uhl to place side curtains on their awning in front of premises Nos. 708 and 710 Third avenue, the work done at their own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held January 4, 1882. Present—The full. Board.

The minutes of the meetings held December 28, 29, and 30 were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,
On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:
From C. H. Eldridge and another—In reference to Pier 53, East river, and claiming the ownership thereof. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to report thereon as to water grants, etc.

From Benjamin D. Silliman, Attorney for Union Ferry Company—In reference to hability of company to make repairs to Pier 15, East river, under the lease given to them by Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. Referred to the President to confer with the Comptroller in relation thereto. thereto.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Supplementary report respecting the bulkhead at Twenty-third street, East river, used by the Greenpoint Ferry Company for ferry-house, etc.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting repairs necessary to platform in front of bulkhead south

of Pier, old 54, North river.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting quantity of dredging necessary at slip westerly side of

Pier 12, East river.

From T. & A. Walsh—In reference to claim for compensation for extra work at Ninety-sixth street, North river. Referred to the President.

The following communications were received, read, and,
On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:
From William F. Morgan—Application for leave to place for temporary use a steam-hoisting engine on Pier 55, North river. Permission granted for same temporarily, under direction of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Inclosing amount—\$45—collected from John W. Manning for rent of bulkhead at Thirty-second street, East river. Secretary directed to acknowledge receipt of communication, and to advise that the amount received would be duly credited to the Law Department.

From R. Richardson—In reference to building a dock at foot of One Hundred and Twenty third street, East river.

From C. H. Mallory & Co .- In reference to approach to Pier 21, East river. Secretary to

advise that the matter will be examined by the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Mayor Grace—Referring communications from C. H. Mallory & Co. and Department of Public Works in reference to approach to Pier 21, East river, to this Department. Secretary directed to acknowledge receipt of communications, and to reply thereto, that the pavement in question is entirely within the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works, which Department question is entirely within the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works, which Department states in their letter of December 12, that the repairs would be made if the appropriation was available. As the appropriation for 1882 is now available, there is no reason why the repairs necessary should not be at once done by that Department. When this pier was rebuilt, it was raised some two feet higher than the adjoining pier, in compliance with the suggestions and wishes of the mercantile community in that vicinity, the Messrs, Mallory, among others, having been heard in the matter. It being stated, in case of high tides, the old pier was often overflowed, and the merchandise and freight thereon was often greatly damaged, and the interests of commerce thereby injured, for these reasons the pier was so raised, and as it is stated that South street has settled somewhat below the proper grade, the cause of the abrupt approach to the pier is explained, and the effect caused thereby can be easily remedied if the Department of Public Works will take the proper action in the matter. action in the matter.

From Department of Street Cleaning—As to piers and bulkheads to be used for dumping clean snow and ice from during the present season. Secretary stating that he had by direction of the President forwarded to the Department copies of notice designating piers and bulkheads for this

purpose, the action of Secretary was approved.

From Funch, Edye & Co.—In reference to approach to Pier, new 54, North river, and as to

the lease of said pier. From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting that the slips in front of Bellevue Hospital and around Deadhouse, foot of Twenty-sixth street, East river, be cleaned. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to have soundings taken, and report quantity of dredging required to give proper depth.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction-In reference to condition of dock branch Workhouse, at Hart's Island, East river. Secretary to advise that plans and specifications have been prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, and that proposals for estimates to do the work under contract will soon be advertised for.

From Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Reporting repairs necessary to bulkhead at Harrison street, North river, and the estimate of cost thereof at \$370. Secretary directed to notify lessees and owners to repair same in ten days, under supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work and charge the cost thereof to them.

2d. Report of work done during the week ending December 24, ultimo
3d. Report of work done during the week ending December 3t. ultimo.
4th. Reporting repairs necessary to deck of Pier, old 54, North river, to make same safe for the present, and estimate of cost thereof at \$140. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair same at cost of about \$140.

5th. Reporting as to condition of Pier 61, East river, and recommending three several plans for remedying the defect caused by the crib-work protending beyond the lines of the pier and dangerous to vessels laying alongside said pier. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to drive oak fender piles as stated in his third recommendation, and to do the work substantially pursuant to such

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate 11 this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

## CHAPTER 33.

An Act relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:
Section: If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the City Record, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:
Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of the sact.

Section 2. All existing provisions of law which impose a

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection o. interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assess ents and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretotore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice by advertisen:

It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice by advertisement for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Assessment and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings,

and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT

Second—The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureaux shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
