



The Board met this day.

#### Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

Resolved, That the following plans, for light and ventilation of tenement-houses, be and are hereby approved upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 1352, for four four-story tenements, one 20 feet by 60 feet, and three 25 feet by 65 feet each, on lots of the same width respectively, and 100 feet deep, on the south side of Lawrence street, feet west of Ninth avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1364, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 42 feet 6 inches, on the front of a lot 25 feet by 110 feet 6 inches, at No. 52 Spring street, to be occupied by seven families.

Plan No. 1366, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 75 feet 6 inches, with an extension 5 feet by 9 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, at No. 25 West Forty-fourth street, to be occupied by ten families.

Plan No. 1367, for three four-story tenements, each 25 feet by 60 feet, on lots 25 feet by 75 feet 4 inches, on the west side of First avenue, 27 feet south of Eighty-sixth street, each to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 1369, for four four-story tenements, each 28 feet by 62 feet, with an extension 23 feet 6 inches by 15 feet 6 inches, on lots each 28 feet by 102 feet, on the south side of Seventieth street, 212 feet east of Third avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1370, for one five-story tenement, 25 feet by 67 feet 6 inches, with an extension 18 feet by 18 feet 6 inches, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet 5 inches, at No. 435 West Forty-third street, to be occupied by ten families.

#### Disapproved.

#### Plumbing and Drainage of New Houses.

Resolved, That the plans for the plumbing and drainage of new houses be and are hereby approved, as follows:

Plan No. 162, one warehouse, west side of Greenwich street, 50 feet south of North Moore street.

Plan No. 168, six dwellings, south side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, 100 feet east of Sixth avenue, conditionally.

Plan No. 169, two dwellings, south side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, 125 feet west of Sixth avenue, conditionally.

Plan No. 174, one tenement, north side of One Hundred and Fourth street, 255 feet west of Fourth avenue, conditionally.

Plan No. 175, one dwelling, south side of One Hundred and Seventh street, between First and Second avenues, conditionally.

Plan No. 176, six dwellings, three on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, and three on the south side of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, respectively, 275 feet east of Eighth avenue.

Plan No. 177, one tenement, on the north side of Fifty-seventh street, 100 feet west of Lexington avenue.

Plan No. 178, one dwelling, east side of Bremer avenue, 350 feet north of Kemp street.

Plan No. 179, one tenement, south side Forty-second street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues (St. Louis College), conditionally.

Resolved, That the application of M. A. McCormack to this Board, to modify the conditions on which Plumbing Plan No. 17 was approved, be and is hereby denied.

The weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of houses in course of construction were received and ordered on file.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 25, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,295, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 447 tenement-houses, 70 private dwellings, 44 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 28 stores and warehouses, 37 stables, 44 slaughter-houses, 4 lodging-houses, 1 market, 1 glycerine works, 9 sunken and vacant lots, 44 yards, courts, and areas, 90 cellars and basements, 187 waste-pipes and drains, 205 privies and water-closets, 57 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 2 smoky chimneys, 1 piggery, 7 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 334.

During the past week 130 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 52 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

75 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 363 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 316 houses, 316 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

41 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 570 births, 59 still-births, 246 marriages, and 766 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 25, 1882; this shows an increase of 58 births and 5 still-births, and a decrease of 30 marriages and 126 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 90 births, 14 still-births, 78 marriages, and 72 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 5; measles, 9; scarlatina, 35; whooping cough, 3; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 20; pneumonia, 19; heart diseases, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 17; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and preterm births, 11; surgical operations, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 2; croup, 6; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 6; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 11; bronchitis, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from typhus fever, malarial fevers, alcoholism, and marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 154 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 250 under two years, 355 under five years, and 38 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 66 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 46.34 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Deaths reported from Small-pox, Measles, Scarlatina, Diphtheria, Membranous Croup, Whooping Cough, Typhus, Typhoid, Cerebro-Spinal, and Malarial Fevers, in Institutions, Tenement and other Dwellings, with Average Age, Floor, and Ward where the Death occurred, and the Hour of Death, for the week ending February 25, 1882.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 137 were in institutions, 421 in tenement-houses, 194 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 135 on the first, 208 on the second, 153 on the third, 88 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 764 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents; 99 were stated to be single, 156 married, 87 widowed, and the condition of 424 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 766; still-births, 59; bodies in transit, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 65 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 570 births; 246 marriages; 59 still-births; 766 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 98 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 11 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 52 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Feb. 25, 1882, was 31.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.921, the mean humidity was 90, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,491, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.21 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 708 deaths and still-births, or 85.82 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 19; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 333; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 82; Greenwood (undenominational), 49; Lutheran, (undenominational), 101; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 12; Evergreen (undenominational), 44; Woodlawn (undenominational), 29; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 7; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 8.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending Feb. 18, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 13; Second, 0; Third, 6; Fourth, 18; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 22; Seventh, 30; Eighth, 18; Ninth, 32; Tenth, 33; Eleventh, 48; Twelfth, 87; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 33; Fifteenth, 13; Sixteenth, 31; Seventeenth, 55; Eighteenth, 35; Nineteenth, 158; Twentieth, 54; Twenty-first, 56; Twenty-second, 62; Twenty-third, 13; Twenty-fourth, 7.

The actual mortality for the week ending Feb. 18, 1882, was 851; this is 165 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 315 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 34.95 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,266,064.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 27.50; Brooklyn, 25.38; Baltimore, 18.12; San Francisco, 30.65; Buffalo, 26.2; Charleston, 22.88; Savannah, 28.32; Lowell, 23.60; Worcester, 23.40; Cambridge, 21.69; Fall River, 21.22; Lynn, 23.09; Springfield, 15.60. Monthly returns—Hudson County, N. J., 33.8; Oakland, 16.8; Keokuk, 20.78. SIR—There were 766 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 25, 1882, which is a decrease of 126, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 72 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending February 18, 1882, was 851, which is 315.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 34.95 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,266,064.

The application of the Greenpoint Ferry Company for leave to rebuild, enlarge, and improve their ferry-houses, platform, bridges, and ferry-racks, between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East River, the communication from the Comptroller of the city in reference to the same, and the several reports of the Engineer-in-Chief in relation thereto, were,

On motion, taken from the table and ordered on file, and the following resolution relative to the matter offered by the President was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Greenpoint Ferry Company be and hereby are granted permission to remove the existing platform and to remove or repair the bridges and ferry-racks outside the bulkhead between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, East River, and to build and erect in place thereof a new platform, to be laid on piles, and to be not higher than at about low-water mark, and to be filled in on top of same with suitable solid filling, the outer edge of which platform is to be and extend not more than 155 feet easterly from the westerly line or side of Avenue A and parallel thereto, and outside of the said above described platform to build and erect an A pier and a new ferry-rack near the southerly line of Twenty-fourth street pier; and the said ferry company are also granted permission to remove the present ferry-house, and to erect and build a new one in the place thereof, on said platform, and within the lines and upon such new and revised plans, to be submitted by the said company in place of those heretofore presented, as will be approved of by this Board; provided, however, that the said ferry company file in this Department, within five days after notice hereof, an agreement in writing that the said platform, bridges, racks, and ferry-houses shall not be used for any other purposes than as and for ferry purposes, and that the same shall revert to and become the property of the Corporation of the City of New York, on the expiration or sooner termination of the lease made or which may next hereafter be agreed to be made by the city to the said ferry company of the said premises, free of all cost and expense whatsoever; and also provided that all of the work done on said premises under and pursuant to this permit be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

Resolved, That the Cunard Steamship Company be and are hereby notified and directed to remove the shed adjoining the bulkhead north of Pier, new 40, North river, within thirty (30) days from this date, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and that in default of the same being removed, within such specified time, that the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department be and he hereby is directed to proceed at once and remove the same.

Captain Wright appeared on behalf of the Union Ferry Company, before the Board, and was heard in reference to the subject of repairing Pier 15, East river, the Union Ferry Company being desirous of having their slip enlarged, and to accomplish this purpose, they desired to have the pier moved south for a distance of 6 feet; or in place thereof, to have the pier narrowed on the northerly or easterly side thereof so as to give them width enough to have two boats in the slip at the same time. The ferry company not having given any reply to the many communications sent to them by the Board in reference to the subject of repairs to the pier in question, and the Board having by its action heretofore taken, directed the advertisement for estimates to make the repairs thereto, under the specifications prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief and approved by this Board, it was determined that no action would be taken in the premises to defer or change the action of the Board so taken, unless the ferry company communicate in writing what it proposes to do in the premises, and also obtain the consent and approval of John F. Doyle, as the agent and representative of the owners of westerly half of said pier to the same.
