The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,653, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 591 tenement-houses, 75 private dwellings, 46 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 7 stores and warehouses, 32 stables, 44 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 1 brewery, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 102 yards, courts, and areas, 133 cellars and basements, 218 waste-pipes and drains, 289 privies and water-closets, 58 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, 13 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 428.

During the past week 128 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 68 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

SIR—There were 846 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 1, 1882, which is an increase of 83, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 149 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending March 25, 1882, was 766, which is 187.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.37 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,269,614.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 498 births, 63 still-births, 254 marriages, and 846 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 1, 1882; this shows a decrease of 10 births, and an increase of 27 still-births, 114 marriages, and 83 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was a increase of 41 births, 36 still-births, 91 marriages, and 149 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased, 2; scarlatina, 8; typhus fever, 3; diarrhœal diseases, 2; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 7; pneumonia, 6; heart diseases, 9; convulsions, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; suicide, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 20; diphtheria, 11; croup, 3; whooping cough, 5; crysipelas, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 6; inanition, 8; alcoholism, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 22; bronchitis, 9; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes-mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 5; premature and preternatural births, 3. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, and cyanosis and atelectasis was the same in the two successive weeks.

As to all assessments confirmed subsequent to
June 9, 1880, for local improvements theretofore completed, and as to any assessment for local improvements
known as Morningside avenues, notices must be filed
within two months after the dates upon which such
assessments may be respectively confirmed.
The notice must specify the particular assessment complained of, the date of the confirmation of the same, the
property affected thereby, and in a brief and concisemanner the objections thereto, showing, or tending to
show, that the assessment was unfair or unjust in respect to said real estate.
