The Committee on Street Pavements, to whom was referred the annexed resolution in favor of laying a crosswalk across West street, opposite Pier No. 6, respectfully

#### REPORT :

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary for the convenience of the public. They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That a crosswalk of two courses of blue stone be laid across West street, from a point between Morris and Rector streets, to Pier No. 6, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, the expense to be paid from the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewals of Pavements and Regrading."

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By the President—

Resolved, That permission and authority are hereby given and granted to the electric lighting companies not now holding any such permission, and whose bids for lighting the streets of this city, or any part of the same, for the ensuing year, shall be accepted by the Board of Street Lighting, to locate and erect poles, hang wires and fixtures thereon, and to place, construct and use wires, conduits and conductors for electrical purposes, in the City of New York, in, over and under the streets, avenues, wharves, piers and parks therein, or adjacent thereto, according to such plans as may be directed, approved or allowed by and subject to the powers of the Electrical Subway Commissioners, and to the provisions of chapter 499 of the Laws of 1885, and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works and of the Department of Public Parks, within their respective territorial jurisdictions, and subject also to all existing ordinances applicable thereto, and to all reasonable regulations of the privilege hereby conferred, which the Common Council may hereafter impose by ordinance or otherwise.

Resolved, That, as compensation for the privilege hereby granted, each of the said companies shall furnish, maintain and light in the streets or avenues occupied by the said company, free of any charge to the City, for maintenance or otherwise, and at such place or places as may be determined by the Board of Street Lighting, at least one full arc light, of power equal to the average required at the time in contracts with the City for such electric lights, for every fifty arc lights furnished by said companies to other consumers, and shall make return under oath of the number of such private arc lights whenever required by said Board of Street Lighting; but for any permit to open the streets, pavements or sidewalks for the purpose of laying conductors for the operation of incandescent or other than arc electric lights, said companies shall pay to the City a sum equal to one cent per lineal foot of streets occupied under such permit.

Alderman Mooney moved that the resolutions be referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

The President here called Alderman Quinn to the chair, and having addressed the Board in advocacy of the resolutions resumed the chair.

Alderman Walker offered the following as an amendment :

Resolved, That the Committees, to whom were referred the petitions of the different electric light companies, be requested to ascertain if said companies will furnish electric lights to private individuals at the same price they propose to furnish the City, and that said Committees report at an adjourned meeting of this Board, to be held on Friday, at 1 P. M.

Alderman Farrell moved to amend by striking out the words "electric lighting companies not now holding any such permission, and whose bids for lighting the streets of this city, or any part of the same, for the ensuing year, shall be accepted by the Board of Street Lighting," and inserting in lieu thereof the following :

"The Waterhouse Electric Manufacturing Company; The American Electric Manufacturing Company; The Ball Electric Illuminating Company; The Mount Morris Electric Light Company; The Harlem Electric Light Company."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said amendment.

Which was decided in the negative, on a division called by Alderman Fitzgerald, as follows :

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Conkling, Farrell, Goetz, John Murray, Quinn, Sanford, and Van Rensselaer—8.

Negative—Aldermen Bennett, Cowie, Dowling, Ficke, Fitzgerald, Flynn, Holland, Long, Mooney, Joseph Murray, Oakley, Smith, Tait, and Walker—14.

Alderman Farrell moved that the Committees be directed to report at an adjourned meeting of this Board, to be held on Friday, May 20, at 1 o'clock P. M.

Which was accepted by Alderman Walker.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with the amendment of Alderman Walker.

Which was decided in the affirmative, on a division called by Alderman Van Rensselaer, as follows :

Alderman Mooney then moved that the whole subject be referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative on a division called by Alderman Mooney, as follows :

Alderman Sanford moved that the Committee on Railroads be discharged from the further consideration of a message from his Honor the Mayor, with resolution regulating the sprinkling of sand on the tracks of railroad companies, and that the subject be made the special order of business for the next meeting.

By the President—

The Aldermen of the City of New York, in council assembled, appreciate and unite in the profound sorrow felt by a large number of our citizens, at the recent demise of the Right Reverend Monsignor Quinn, late Vicar-General of the Diocese of New York. When an eminent citizen passes away in death, it is but proper that the sad event should be made the occasion for a mournful testimonial to his virtues and services by the Public Authorities, as well as for a personal tribute to his memory by the community in which he had lived and labored.

It is more than forty years since Monsignor Quinn first entered upon his sacerdotal career. That Napoleon of the Catholic Church of this country, the great Archbishop of New York, Archbishop Hughes, at an early day discovered in his young priest the germs of the qualities and power which, being developed, enabled him by his devoted services, executive ability and pious life, to perform and discharge, with equal assiduity and success, the simple duties of a curate in a village church and the administrative functions under the Archbishop of the great Diocese of New York. Monsignor Quinn was selected by him to put an end to the strife and dissensions, which existed in the principal parish in the city, and to manage and liquidate an immense debt which had accumulated and lay, like a heavy burden, upon the pastor and congregation of St. Peter's Church.

Father Quinn was then but a young man and younger priest and unfamiliar with the strifes and business of mankind and without experience in financial affairs. He was appalled by the task before him, but girding up his loins and with the enthusiasm of youth and the courage of his nature, unwilling, yet yielding to the direction and assurance of support from his spiritual superior, he undertook the grave labor and carried it to success. Many a poor family in the lower wards, who had entrusted their all to St. Peter's, and despaired of its return, were made happy by receiving from the new priest every dollar of their credit and the Congregation became a unit bound together by the sacred tie of devotion and love for their young pastor.

When in 1849 the cholera swept over the city, no portion of it was so greatly afflicted as the parish of St. Peter's, but Father Quinn, disdaining all considerations of personal danger, threw himself into the midst of his afflicted flock. He was everywhere; encouraging the timid, ministering to the sick and consoling the dying.

In this parish he labored for many years, and in the calls and confinements and exposures of his position were laid the seeds of the disease, which eventually and recently has taken him from amongst us. In 1874 he was elevated to the position of Vicar-General, where he displayed the same signal ability and wonderful executive power which had distinguished him in the administration of his extensive parish. Under his careful and constant attention arose the magnificent structure, the Cathedral on Fifth avenue, and its internal economy and discipline were the results of his practical good sense combined with his knowledge of human nature and its peculiarities.

He was a trusted friend and adviser of the great Archbishop, of his late Eminence Cardinal Archbishop McCloskey and of Archbishop Corrigan. He had the confidence of them all, and, in return, was devoted to them, and rather than leave his Eminence and this metropolis, which had grown up under his eye, and its people whom he loved and labored for, he put aside an archbishopric which was proffered him, and preferred to remain a simple priest, the rector of the Cathedral and Vicar-General of the diocese. He will long be remembered in this community, and the fruits of his labors will be enjoyed by its citizens for generations.

Resolved, That the Aldermen will attend in a body the solemn obsequies of Monsignor Quinn, to be held at the Cathedral on next Wednesday, the 18th of May, 1887, at 10 A. M.

Which was adopted unanimously by a rising vote.

Resolved, That the resolution and ordinance heretofore adopted for regulating, grading, setting curb, gutter and flag stones and crosswalks, and resetting old curb, gutter and flag stones, in One Hundred and Sixty-first street, from the easterly curb-line of North Third avenue to Gerard avenue, approved September 26, 1885, be amended so as to read as follows :

Resolved, That One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between the westerly curb-line of Third avenue and the easterly curb-line of Gerard avenue, be regulated and graded, and culverts built; that curb-stones be set; that flag-stones four feet in width be laid along and on each sidewalk, and that crosswalks be laid where not already laid across the roadway of each intersection of said street with each avenue and at the intersection of each avenue with said street, except where the said street crosses the New York and Harlem Railroad, at which point approaches shall be made to the existing bridge across said railroad, under the direction of the Commissioners of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance thereto be adopted.

The Board then, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, proceeded to reconsider the same, and, upon a vote being taken thereon, was finally lost, as follows :

Affirmative—Aldermen Bennett, Cowie, Dowling, Farrell, Ficke, Fitzgerald, Flynn, Holland, Long, Mooney, Joseph Murray, Oakley, Quinn, Smith, Tait, and Walker—16.

Negative—The President, Aldermen Conkling, Sanford, and Van Rensselaer—4.

Resolved, That the sidewalks in Gansevoort street, between Fourth street and Thirteenth avenue, be and they are hereby declared to be sixteen feet wide, and also that the area and stoop lines are to be of the width established by the ordinance of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Dowling called up veto message of his Honor the Mayor (No. 91) of resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to John Murphy to place and keep a stand for the sale of soda water in the public square at the junction of Hamilton, Monroe and Market streets, said stand to be about four feet wide and four feet long, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The Board then, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, proceeded to reconsider the same, and, upon a vote being taken thereon, was adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen Bennett, Cowie, Dowling, Farrell, Ficke, Fitzgerald, Flynn, Goetz, Holland, Long, Mooney, Joseph Murray, Oakley, Quinn, Smith, Tait, and Walker—17.

Negative—The President, Aldermen Sanford and Van Rensselaer—3.

Alderman Flynn called up veto message of his Honor the Mayor (No. 93) of resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to David J. Connell to retain the stand for the sale of cigars and tobacco, now on the sidewalk inside the stoop-line, in front of No. 39½ South street, provided such stand shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the street by the public, nor exceed seven feet long, three wide and six feet high; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The Board then, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, proceeded to reconsider the same, and, upon a vote being taken thereon, was adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen Bennett, Cowie, Dowling, Farrell, Ficke, Fitzgerald, Flynn, Goetz, Holland, Long, Mooney, Joseph Murray, Oakley, Quinn, Smith, Tait, and Walker—17.

Negative—The President, Aldermen Conkling, Sanford, and Van Rensselaer—4.

## MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS AGAIN RESUMED.

By Alderman Long—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to lay water-mains in One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Cowie—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby directed to remove the fire-hydrant now in front of No. 337 West Thirty-first street to a point about seventy-five feet westerly.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to F. E. Bean & Co. to place and keep a platform scale, not to exceed seven by nine feet, on the north side of the carriageway of East Forty-second street, about one hundred feet west of the bulkhead, with a weigh-house not to exceed ten feet long by eight feet wide and ten feet high, provided such scale be built flush with the surface of the street so as not to be an impediment to public travel, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Flynn—

Resolved, That a crosswalk of two (2) courses of blue stone be laid across South street, from the northeast corner of South and Whitehall streets to the passenger entrance, and across front of passenger entrance of the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry Company, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; the expense to be paid from the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewals of Pavements and Regrading."

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By the same—

Resolved, That an improved iron drinking-fountain, for man and beast, be erected in front of No. 30 Peck Slip, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was laid over.

By Alderman Long—

Resolved, That the roadway of One Hundred and Fifteenth street, from Seventh to Eighth avenue, be paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the terminating avenues, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By Alderman Flynn—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Superintendent of the United States Mail delivery wagons to place a water tap on the south side of Mail street, near Broadway, for the purpose of supplying water to nearly three hundred horses used in their business, the work to be done at the expense of the company, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Farrell—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Trustees of the Berachah Mission to place a transparency over the street-lamp on the corner of Ninth avenue and Twenty-ninth street, also over the lamp in front of their mission, No. 405 West Twenty-ninth street, advertising their fair and church services; such permission to continue only during the period of six weeks.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

Subsequently, on motion of Alderman Farrell, the above reference was reconsidered, and the resolution was adopted.

By Alderman Flynn—

Resolved, That a crosswalk of two courses of bridge-stone be laid across the carriageway of Bowling Green, from a point near the starter's box of the Broadway Railroad Company, near the southeast corner of the Bowling Green Park, diagonally to No. 1 Bowling Green, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, the expense to be charged to the appropriation for "Repairs and Renewals of Pavements and Regrading."

Which was laid over.

By Alderman Goetz—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James McGrady to erect an iron hitching-post, about three and one-half feet high, in front of his premises, No. 108 Norfolk street, the work done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Long—

Resolved, That the carriageway of Ninety-seventh street, from Third to Fourth avenue, be paved with trap-block pavement, except that crosswalks be laid at each terminating and intersecting avenue, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By the same—

Resolved, That lamp-posts be erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted on the west side of Fourth avenue, from One Hundred and Twenty-third to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

By the same—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to have the sidewalk in One Hundred and Twenty-first street, south side, from Sylvan place to Third avenue, flagged full width, the expense to be paid from the appropriation for "Flagging Sidewalks and Fencing Vacant Lots in Front of City Property."

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Peter Flanagan to place and keep a watering-trough in front of his premises, One Hundred and Twentieth street and Lexington avenue, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Mooney—

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 321 of the New York City Consolidated Act of 1882, the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to pave with asphalt pavement the roadway of Madison avenue, from Twenty-third to Thirty-second street, the work to be done without public advertisement and letting as provided by section 64 of said act.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By the same—

Resolved, That the carriageway of Boston avenue, from the Third avenue to Jefferson street, be paved with granite-block pavement, except that crosswalks of two courses of blue stone be laid across said avenue at or near each intersection of each street and avenue, and also that crosswalks of three courses of blue stone be laid across each intersecting street and avenue within the lines of the sidewalks on both sides of said Boston avenue, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lands, Places and Park Department.

By the same—

Resolved, That James K. Price be and he is hereby permitted to flag the sidewalk in front of his property, at the southeast corner of Monroe avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-third street, being fifty feet front on said street and one hundred feet front on said avenue, a space four feet in width through or near the centre thereof, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lands, Places and Park Department.

By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Christie Brothers to lay a small pipe under the sidewalk in front of their premises, No. 390 North Third avenue, for the purpose of connecting their ice-box with the awning post and there supplying, by a faucet, free ice-water to the public during the heated season, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By the same—

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected and street-lamps lighted in Webster avenue, from Bedford Park Station to Olin avenue, and in Olin avenue, from Bronx river to the New Reservoir, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

(G. O. 225.)

By the same—

Resolved, That water-mains be laid in Walton avenue, from One Hundred and Forty-ninth to One Hundred and Fiftieth street, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

Which was laid over.

By Alderman John Murray—

Resolved, That the roadway of Seventy-seventh street, from Ninth avenue to the east side of the Boulevard, be paved with trap-block pavement, and that crosswalks be laid at the intersecting and terminating avenues, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By the same—

Resolved, That the curb-stones be set on the westerly side of Twelfth avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By the same—

Resolved, That two lamp-posts be erected and lamps placed thereon and lighted in front of the German Gospel Tabernacle, No. 446 West Thirty-sixth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lamps and Gas.

By Alderman Quinn—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Teutonic Club, Jr., to place and retain a transparency in front of No. 57 Second avenue over the gas-jet, from June 15 to July 28, 1887, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Smith—

Resolved, That water-mains be laid in Sixty-seventh street, between Second avenue and Avenue A, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Knickerbocker Ice Company to drive their wagons across the sidewalk on Avenue A, east side, to and from the bulkhead near Sixty-first street, East river, the said company agreeing to keep the sidewalk in repair, and the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By the same—

# NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water resulting from defective service pipes, or from plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
