Resolved, That the annexed petition of occupants of the basement of Essex Market, to have the floor caulked and made water-tight, be referred to the Commissioner of Public Works, with power to make the repairs asked for, should he find it necessary or advisable to do so.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
NEW YORK, June 24, 1879.

The Board of Health met this day.

### Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps; on application for permits; on slaughter-houses; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on application for relief, etc.; in respect to odors from Riker's Island; on Newtown creek superphosphate factories; on storage of sulphurous acid at No. 22 Union square; on contagious diseases; on street pavements, etc.; on vacant lots at southeast corner of Fourth avenue and Seventy-ninth street.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 21, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,872, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 944 tenement houses, 134 private dwellings, 82 other dwellings, 22 manufactories and workshops, 25 stores and warehouses, 49 stables, 1 garbage dump, 18 slaughter-houses, 4 public sewers, 6 fat-rendering establishments, 1 fertilizing works, 2 oil works, 7 manure dumps, 1 lime kiln, 1 wool-pulling establishment, 48 sunken and vacant lots, 2 lodging-houses, 1 pier, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 61 yards, courts, and areas, 79 cellars and basements, 55 waste-pipes and drains, 178 privies and water-closets, 27 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 7 cesspools, 8 piggeries, 29 other nuisances, and 70 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 950.

During the past week 251 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 87 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

188 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 84 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 76 houses, 76 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 520 births, 41 still-births, 162 marriages, and 473 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 21, 1879. This shows an increase of 23 births, 13 still-births, 2 marriages, and 32 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 120 births, 4 still-births, 19 marriages, and 4 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 3; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 32; bronchitis, 9; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 8; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 4; croup, 2; whooping cough, 1; malarial fevers, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 46; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 5; pneumonia, 1; heart diseases, 10; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 1; apoplexy, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 13; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; drowning, 2. The deaths from measles, diphtheria, erysipelas, premature and pretermatural births, and suicide, were the same as those reported for the preceding week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 60 were in institutions, 261 in tenement houses, 134 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 93 on the first, 125 on the second, 110 on the third, 51 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 472 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident. 51 were stated to be single, 106 married, 42 widowed, and the condition of 274 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows: City deaths, 473; still-births, 41; bodies in transitu, 21. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 61 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 520 births, 162 marriages, 41 still-births, 473 deaths, 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 37 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 1 transcript of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 23 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 21, 1879, was 66.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.906, the mean humidity was 77, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 927, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.10 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 455 deaths and still-births, or 88.52 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 13 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 8; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 200; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 53; Greenwood (undenominational), 41; Lutheran (undenominational), 69; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 11; Evergreen (undenominational), 35; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L.
