February 27, 1875: Typhoid fever, 5; typhus fever, 1; scarlet fever, 54; measles, 7; diplitheria, 93; small-pox, 75; and cerebro spinal meningitis — During the week ending February 27, 1875, 90 loads of night-soil were removed by the scaven-gers from the privy-vaults of the City The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending February 27, 1875; Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 32 carcases; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 5 carcases; hogs, 14 carcases : mutton, 30 pounds; poultry, 132 pounds; sausage, 56 pounds; and fish, 350 pounds. pounds.

### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending February 27, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 605 burial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies *in transitu*, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 605 deaths, 110 marriages, 503 births, 48 still-births, 21 applications for transit permits, and 62 returns from Coroners. There were 27 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth-record, 1 of marriage, and 26 of death were issued from this Bureau; 4 cases were referred to the Coroners. to the Coroners. ### HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, March 2, 1875.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health .

SIR—In the week ending on Saturday, February 27, there were 605 deaths reported in this city against 622 verified deaths during the previous week. The mean temperature rose to 38.8 degrees Fahr. last week, and for two days was 25 degrees above the mean of the preceding six weeks. There was a marked decrease in mortality chiefly in the lists of phthists and other chronic diseases.

diseases. Pneumonia and other inflammatory diseases of the organs of respiration continue to be the most fre-quent and obstinate causes of death. During the eleven weeks since the unusually cold weather began there have been 867 deaths charged to pneumonia, and 330 to bronchitis, in a total mortality amounting to 6,712. The record for the successive weeks is as follows :

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work per-formed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week end-ing February 27, 1875. The number of inspec-tions made by the Inspectors was 1,083, as follows : I public building, 522 tenement houses, 96 private dwellings, 21 other dwellings, 10 manu-lactories and workshops, 5 stores and warehouses,

19 stables, 65 slaughter-houses, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 1 head-cleaning establishment, 1 uninhabitable tenement, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 45 yards, courts, and areas, 21 cellars and basements, 55 waste-pipes and drains, 71 privies and water-closets, 9 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 13 other nuisances, together with 109 visits to cases of con-tarjous diseases. tagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from

the inspectors was 413. During the past week 78 complaints were re-ceived from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report. 41 Permits were issued to consignees of vessels to displayer converting the Marthu

to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

6 Permits were granted scavengers to empty. clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 65 dwel-lings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 57 premises, 57 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 39 Cases of small-pox were removed to the hos-

The continued cold weather which has been attended by these fatal results in New York, has extended by these tatal results in flew roles, has extended across the two hemispheres, and is charged with similar results in most of the great cities north of the 40th latitude. Even in Paris there were 131 deaths charged to bronchitis and pneumonia the first week in February, in a total morthelity of 657 and in London, the same week pneumonia the first week in February, in a total mortality of 957, and in London, the same week, there were 366 deaths from those two causes in a total of 1,552. The most populous and crowded cities report far the greatest ratios of mortality by these acute inflammations of the lungs, thus indi-cating the fact that other causes contribute to the fatality of the excessive cold. # Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor, etc.

The opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation concludes as follows: "My opinion upon the whole, is, that the power to incense scavengers, and to make rules and regulations which they may be revoked, is still vested in the Mayor is but that the power to make rules and regulations for the government of scavengers so licensed, and in reference to the removal of night-soil, is vested in the Board of Health." Acting under the opion of the Counsel to the Corpora-ion, this Board adopted on the rath day of January, rules and regulations for the government of scavengers, and the same were published in the CTV RECORD. The Board also caused an inspection to be made by the Sanitary Superin-rendent to issue no permits to empty prives to any scaven-ger who was not prepared to compary with the provisions of section roo of the Sanitary Code above quoted. The old process of scavenging is described as follows: The contents or privies and sinks are taken out in buckets and poured into open tubs. When filled, these tabs, often meovered or imperfectly covered, are carried through halls or alley-ways to the street, and emptaed into open carts. During this operation the contents of the privies are thoroughly agtated and exposed to the air, and the most offensive does hill the neighborhood, and enter the adjacent dwellings. The offensive matter is also frequently scattered in the yards and halls, rendering them fool and offensive. When the carts are filled the covers are fastened down, and they are drawn to the receiving-boat. But as the carts are rarey air tight, the foul gase, and sometimes the semiliguid material, escape into the streets during transportion, and citizens often protest to the Hoard of Health against the scavengers' carts being allowed to pass through the streets in which they reside. Even the empty carts, as they pass through the streets are offensive, and the subject of complaint.

At meetings of the Board governing this Depart-ment, held during the two weeks ending February 14, 1875 (present all the Commissioners—except that on the 4th instant, and the meeting held 11th instant, for opening proposals, Commissioner Budd was absent), the following action was had :

#### Rules and Orders Adopted.

February 4.-No purchases for any material or supplies to be made for the use of the Department, until a requisition therefor is made by the proper officer in charge.

#### Applications for Leases, etc.

February 4—Application from Jacob Lorillard to sublet to the Philadelphia and New York Navi-gation Company Piers Nos. 33 and 33½, East river, and also that lease of Pier No. 33, East river, be extended for one year from May 1, 1875, granted.

#### Repairs Ordered, elc.

February 4. -Engineer-in-Chief directed to cause the necessary repairs to be made to the follow-ing-named piers on the East river: Nos. 6, 7, 8, 38, 39, 40, 41, 48, and Pier foot of Twenty-eighth street.

#### Miscellaneous.

February 1.—Three proposals for furnishing the Department with 5,000 barrels of fresh burnt English Portland Cement were received, and publicly opened in the presence of the Comp troller, and the award of contract deferred for further consideration.

February 4.—Counsel to the Corporation requested to take the necessary legal steps to acquire for the benefit of the Mayor, etc., the upper half of Pier No. 12, East river, said premises being required by this Department in the work of construction under the new plans adopted.

February 4.—Statement of material and labor furnished to the Pacific Mail Steamship Com-pany at new Pier No. 34, North river, amounting to \$724.18, transmitted to said Company for payment.

- February 4.—Draft of an "Act" to regulate the use of slips, wharves, etc., in the City of New York, transmitted to his Honor the Mayor, with the opinion of the Board that the Com-mercial interests of the City will be materially benefited by its becoming a law.
