

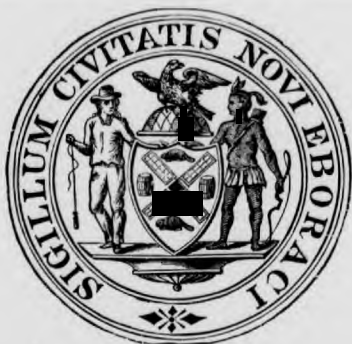

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

*Abstract of proceedings for the week ending December 16, 1876.*

MEETING, DECEMBER 13, 1876.

The following communication was received from his Honor the Mayor :

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT—CITY HALL, }  
NEW YORK, December 12, 1876. }

To the Honorable the Board of Commissioners governing the Department of Public Parks :

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to notify you that I have to-day appointed James F. Wenman to be a member of the Board of Commissioners governing the Department of Public Parks, in place of Joseph J. O'Donohue, who has vacated his office by accepting, holding, and retaining the office of an Elector of President and Vice-President of the United States, and for the unexpired term of said Joseph J. O'Donohue, which expires on the 30th day of April, 1880.

Commissioner James F. Wenman presented his certificate of appointment, which was ordered to be entered at length on the minutes.

MEETING, DECEMBER 15, 1876.

The sale of old material at Tompkins square, consisting of old granite blocks, iron railing, etc., was ordered.

The following resolution was adopted, viz. :

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, by chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874, and chapter 436 of the Laws of 1876, the said Commissioners do hereby lay out and designate as streets of the first class, the streets, roads, and avenues shown by red lines and color on three similar plans and profiles, entitled "Plan and profile, with field notes and explanatory remarks showing the location, width, course, windings, and grades of Mott avenue and streets connecting therewith, from the Spuyten Duyvil & Port Morris Railroad to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, within that part of the City of New York lying north and east of a line commencing at the termination of the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, at or in the Hudson river; running thence easterly along said southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and a prolongation of said line to the middle of Harlem river; and running thence southerly along the middle of said Harlem river to the Sound, north of Randall's Island; as laid out and established by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874, passed respectively May 29 and June 5, 1874 (which said avenue is designated as a street of the first class, in accordance with chapter 436 of the Laws of 1876, passed June 2, 1876), and showing also the portions of streets discontinued and closed by the said Commissioners. Dated New York, December 11, 1876," and signed "J. J. R. Croes, Civil and Topographical Engineer, Department of Public Parks;" the same being such as to the said Commissioners, or a majority of them, seem most conducive to the public good, and such as, in the judgment of said Commissioners, are or may be needed for the convenience of the general public, either as main routes of travel or for drainage; and do hereby discontinue and close such portions of streets, roads, and avenues heretofore laid out as are shown on said plan by India ink shading, and do hereby designate William R. Martin, the President, and one of the Commissioners of said Board, to certify and file said three similar plans and profiles as provided by law.

The employment of the following-named persons upon the steam roller borrowed of the Department of Public Works, was authorized, viz. :

H. R. Searing, steam engineer, at \$3.50 per day; Henry Riley, steersman and watchman, at \$2.25 per day, when the engine is at work, and \$2 per day at other times.

John Meehan, night-watchman, was allowed twenty hours' pay, at twenty-three cents per hour. The Director of the Menagerie was allowed the sum of \$13 for express charges paid on a Sand Bill crane, sent from Minnesota to the Menagerie.

Thomas Hayden was authorized to remove from Central bridge all unused iron belonging to him.

Mr. T. W. Rollins, contractor for the iron work of the Museum of Natural History, was allowed payment of \$8,000 on account.

The purchase of four stoves and coal for the Museum of Natural History was ordered.

The action of the President in directing that the pay of Foremen be reduced \$1.50 per day, from November 27 to the end of the year, was approved.

The subject of providing offices for the Superintendent of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards for 1877, was referred to Commissioner Wetmore, with power.

The bill of Mr. J. Weidenmann of \$99, for work upon the map of the Riverdale district of the Twenty-fourth Ward, was approved, and payment authorized.
