

# THE CITY RECORD.

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### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, April 26, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held April 19, 1901, were approved.

The communication from the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, requesting that the time for the cancellation of the lease of the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street, North river, and land under water thereat, be fixed at a later date than May 1, 1901, was taken from the table and referred to the President.

The recommendation of the Engineer-in-Chief that the Board proceed with the improvement of the water front between the centre line of Pier, old 20, and the easterly line of Pier, new 18, East river, was taken from the table and, together with the communication from the Engineer-in-Chief submitting plans, specifications and form of contract for the reconstruction of Pier, new 16, East river, were placed on file and the following resolutions unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to proceed with the construction of the bulkhead or river wall, and the improvement of the water front and removal of old structures between the centre line of Pier, old No. 20, East river, at the westerly side of Burling slip and the easterly line of Pier, new No. 18, East river, at the easterly side of Berkman street, in accordance with the plan for the improvement of the water front amended and adopted by the Board of Docks, October 26, 1900, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, November 14, 1900; and that all the work hereby ordered, excepting the building and construction of Pier, new 16, at the easterly side of Burling slip, East river, be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 821 of the Greater New York Charter, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor, material and dredging as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, dredging, tools and implements necessary for the above work not heretofore contracted for and which may not be heretofore contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract submitted this day by the Engineer-in-Chief for the construction of Pier, new 16, East river, be and hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

The matter of the purchase of the property owned by James G. Wallace, between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river, was referred to the Treasurer.

The communication from the President, stating that under the provisions of the lease of Pier, new 36, North river, to the Providence & Stonington Steamship Company, now controlled by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, which lease expires June 1, 1901, the title to the shed on said pier will vest in the City on that date, and that said pier, being in the steamship district, will be suitable for one of the numerous steamship companies desiring wharf accommodations on the North river, was referred to Commissioner Meyer.

The communication from Martin H. Vogel, attorney, submitting a diagram of a drinking-fountain and requesting that the Department place same on the recreation piers, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief; all work of repairs to be kept within existing lines:

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to repair Pier, new 36, North river.

New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steamship Transportation Company, to place about ten fender-piles at Pier 3, East river.

Booker Contracting Company, to dredge under the dumping-boards, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, and at the foot of Fourteenth street, East river.

G. Rohitsek & Brother, Henry Meyer, Tinsley Brothers, Olin J. Stephens and Marco Brothers, to repair their water-front properties, between One Hundred and Thirty-sixth and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets, Mott Haven canal.

C. J. Goldmark, to repair the canal basin at the foot of First street, Gowanus canal, Brooklyn.

American Dock and Trust Company, to dredge between their Piers 3 and 4, at the American Docks, Tompkinsville, Staten Island.

Port Richmond and Bergen Point Ferry Company, to repair its ferry rack at Port Richmond, Staten Island.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Requa & Duell, to place a sign at the entrance to Pier, old 42, North river, and to cut a gangway on the north side of said pier.

American Ice Company, to extend the ice platform south of Rivington street, East river, for a distance of fifty feet further south, the consent of the owner of said property having been obtained, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications to be first approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

August Braun, to berth two floating baths at the bulkhead between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-sixth streets, East river, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Ocean Yacht Club, to place a boat-house at the foot of Water street, Stapleton, Staten Island.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—In relation to the proposed sale of the franchises of the South, Hamilton, Wall, Fulton and Catharine ferries.

From the Comptroller—Approving sureties on Contracts Nos. 703 and 704.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of bond submitted by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company for the maintenance of the asphalt pavement between West Eleventh and Bank streets, North river.

2d. Transmitting bill of the Title Guaranty and Trust Company for the cost of searching the title to the forty-eight feet of bulkhead, near the foot of Clinton street, East river, formerly owned by James Reese, and bills of cost in the proceeding for the acquisition of the eighty-eight feet of bulkhead next north of Clinton street, East river, together with certified copy of the order of the Court granting extra allowance to the Commissioners in said proceeding. Chief Clerk directed to draw requisitions therefor.

3d. Stating that title to the Pier at the foot of East Ninety-second street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, is vested in the City, and that an action will be brought compelling the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railway Company to execute a deed of the premises in favor of the City.

4th. Advising that jurisdiction over the water front, between One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Fourteenth streets, Harlem river, and over the water front along Riverside Park, with the exception of the two parcels at the foot of West Seventy-ninth and West Ninety-sixth streets, is vested in the Department of Parks, and that such portions of said bulkheads, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, cannot be used for commercial purposes. Secretary directed to notify the Corporation Counsel that the premises are being used for commercial purposes, and to request him to advise the Board as to what action should be taken to prevent such use thereof.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office—Transmitting notice of application of Edward Hett for a grant of land under water in the Borough of Richmond.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify the Land Office that this Department has examined into the application of Edward Hett, dated February 21, 1901, for a grant of land under water at the Town of Sea Ward of the Borough of Richmond, and finds that the granting of same rights of the City under the provisions of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1895 is injurious to the public interests of The City of New York, and the protests against the granting of the application.

From the Commander of the First Battalion Naval Militia, United States Hampshire—Advising that he no longer requires the use of the upper Pier at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street. Permit revoked as of April which the premises were vacated.

From Bernard Rott—

1st. Transmitting consent of sureties to the extension of time to May for the completion of the work of building a freight-shed on Pier, new 4 Contract No. 688.

2d. Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 686.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building a freight-shed on Pier, new 4, Contract No. 686, Bernard Rott, contractor, be and hereby is extended to May 1, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the New York House of Refuge—Requesting that dredging be ordered at Randall's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to other dredging at the pier at Randall's Island opposite East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, to a depth of ten feet at mean low water.

From Charles S. Hirsch & Company—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 683.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of furnishing and delivering sawed yellow pine timber under contract No. 683, Charles S. Hirsch and Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including April 30, 1901, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From Walter Delmour—Requesting that the permit granted him April 28, 1899, to maintain a boat-house and float north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, North river, be transferred to John McCormick, Jr.

On motion, said permit was transferred as requested upon the same terms and conditions as heretofore, namely, that said boat-house and float are to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$2 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master.

From Patrick F. Kelleher—Requesting permission to maintain an ice bridge, scales and office on the bulkhead between Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets, North river.

On motion, the permit granted Thomas Castello, Jr., to maintain an ice bridge, scales and office thereat, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Board.

From Timothy J. McLaughlin—Stating that he has paid all arrears of rental and requesting a renewal permit to maintain a boat-house and float at the foot of Willow avenue, Bronx Kill, Borough of The Bronx.

On motion, permission was granted Timothy J. McLaughlin to place and maintain the boat-house and float thereat, during the pleasure of the Board, compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of \$75 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Dock Master.

From William A. Hall—Requesting that this Department replace three piles at the southwest corner of the Battery Wall and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the piles and to report the cost of the work for collection from said Hall.

From the International Navigation Company—Requesting that dredging be ordered in the slip on the north side of Pier, new 14, North river, together with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief stating that no dredging is required thereat at present. Secretary directed to transmit a copy of the report of the Engineer-in-Chief to said company.

From the Central Vermont Railway Company—Requesting permission to erect a temporary platform and shed between Piers, new 29 and 30, East river. Application denied.

From the Maine Steamship Company—Requesting permission to lease Pier, new 32, East river, during the progress of the construction of the shed on said pier. Application denied.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company for the privilege of landing its yacht at the Battery Wharf, will be fixed at the rate of \$3 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged William A. Hall for the privilege of berthing a bath in front of the Battery Wall, be fixed at the rate of \$50 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Requa & Duell for the berth occupied by the steamer "Armitage Broadley" at Pier, old 42, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

4th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Matawan Propeller Company for the berth occupied by the steamer "Wyckoff" at Pier, old 42, North river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged E. F. McGirr for the privilege of loading manure on scow at Pier, old 42, North river, and for a similar privilege at the pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day for each location, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendations adopted.

6th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Joseph May for the privilege of maintaining two floats on the north side of the pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street be fixed at the rate of \$35 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged Willis A. Winne for the eighty-eight feet of bulkhead north of Clinton street, East river, with the privilege of maintaining an ice bridge, scales and tally-house thereat, be fixed at the rate of \$1,200 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Treasurer. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that the compensation to be charged H. L. Emerson for the berth occupied by bath on the north side of the pier foot of Fifth street, East river, be fixed at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Recommending that permit be granted the Carroll Box and Lumber Company to run a salt-water pipe through the bulkhead and under the pier foot of Eighteenth street, East river, the pipe to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board, and the compensation for the privilege to be hereafter fixed. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Recommending that permission be granted the Charles C. Larabee Ice Company to place an ice bridge, scales and tally-house, during the pleasure of the Board, on the bulkhead platform foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river, the consent of the owners of said property having been obtained. Recommendation adopted.

11th. Recommending that a renewal lease of the pier foot of West Fifty-eighth street be granted the Union Stock Yard and Market Company for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$3,300.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board by law, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let unto the Union Stock Yard and Market Company all and singular the wharfage and trackage which may arise, accrue or become due, at the northerly side and outer end of the pier at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, North river, together with the surface of said pier; the lease to be for a term of five years from May 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$3,300, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Union Stock Yard and Market Company shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

From the Dock Superintendent—

1st. Report for the week ending April 26, 1901.

2d. Stating that the Booker Contracting Company vacated the berth at the foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river, on April 30, 1901, and recommending that the permit granted for such berth be revoked as of date named. Recommendation adopted.



## From the Engineer-in-Chief—

- 1st. Report for the week ending April 20, 1901.
- 2d. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of the Department to the platform at the foot of One Hundred and Twentieth street, Harlem river, where damaged by Transfer Boat No. 5, the cost of the work to be reported for collection from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company. Recommendation adopted.
- 3d. Recommending that the lessee be directed to make repairs to Pier, new 54, North river, where damaged by ferry-boat "New Brunswick." Recommendation adopted.
- 4th. Recommending that the Atlantic Transport Company be directed to repave the pavement adjoining the tracks leading to Pier, new 40, North River. Recommendation adopted.
- 5th. Recommending that a renewal order be issued for repairs to the pavement between Pier "A" and West Eleventh street, North river, at an aggregate cost not to exceed \$900. Recommendation adopted.
- 6th. Reporting the expiring of a scow-load of cellar dirt on the north side of the Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, and recommending that M. B. Martin, the occupant of dump thereat, be directed to remove the material at once. Recommendation adopted.
- 7th. Recommending that repairs be made by the force of the Department to water-pipe leading to Pier, new 43, North river; to the Pier foot of West Eleventh and West One Hundred and Thirtieth streets; to Pier 48, East river, and to the Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street, East Sixtieth and East Sixty-second streets. Recommendations adopted.
- 8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 20898 in relation to the complaint of the Hoboken Ferry Company and stating that if the express office is moved to a point on the new-made land about 30 feet easterly of its present location it will be satisfactory to said company. Secretary directed to notify William J. McGovern to move the express office accordingly.

On motion, the action of the Board of April 4, 1901, in changing the compensation to be charged the Saggerties and New York Steamboat Company and the Catskill and New York Steamboat Company for the berths on the southerly side of Pier, new 43, North river, was rescinded.

On motion, the permit granted M. B. Martin to maintain a dumping board on the north half of the pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, was revoked, to take effect May 1, 1901, and the Secretary was directed to notify said Martin to remove the dumping board on that date, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted, and the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the construction of a new pier at the foot of Fifth street, East river:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to proceed with the removal of the old pier at the foot of East Fifth street by the force of this Department, and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, and that all the tools and implements necessary for the prosecution of said work not now contracted for and which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Old Dominion Steamship Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, Pier, new 26, North river, together with the bulkhead extending from a point 125 feet southerly from the southerly side of Pier, new 26 to the southerly side of Pier, new 27, North river, together with the sheds on said pier and bulkheads, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$46,359.07 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing May 1, 1901; it being understood and agreed that the above resolution is subject to all the covenants and conditions of the present lease of said pier.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the New York and Texas Steamship Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the easterly half of Pier 20, westerly half of Pier 21, and the bulkhead between Piers 20 and 21, East river, and platform in front of same, together with the sheds on said wharf property, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$17,380 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing May 1, 1901; it being understood and agreed that the above resolution is subject to all the covenants and conditions of the lease of said wharf property.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Hartford and New York Transportation Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the easterly half of Pier 24, East river, and bulkhead adjoining, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$7,250 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing May 1, 1901; it being understood and agreed that the above resolution is subject to all the covenants and conditions of the lease of said pier.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted J. W. Sullivan to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the easterly half of Pier 53, westerly half of Pier 54, and the bulkhead between Piers 53 and 54, East river, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$250 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing May 1, 1901; it being understood and agreed that the above resolution is subject to all the covenants and conditions of the lease of said piers.

Resolved, That this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm let to the Farmers' Feed Company of New Jersey, the filled-in land easterly of original high-water mark in front of the southerly half of the block between Sixty-second and Sixty-third streets, East river, a distance of about one hundred feet, together with the land under water for platform in front of same, about two thousand square feet, and the land under water for extension to said platform, with the privilege of maintaining the present approach to said platform, being the property owned by the City and now occupied by said company, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1901, at an annual rental of six hundred dollars, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department; it being understood that the above resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the said Farmers' Feed Company of New Jersey shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this Department its written acceptance of the terms and conditions of this resolution, and agree to execute a lease containing the usual covenants and conditions as at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department, except that this Department agrees to put the premises in good repair and condition upon the commencement of the lease, but that all subsequent repairs are to be made by the lessee.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the General Repairs and Construction Force for the week ending April 19, 1901, amounting to \$17,307.54, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

The Board went into executive session at 2.50 P. M.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief in relation to the employment of Daniel Troy, Laborer, and Augustus Luenson, Roundman, veterans, now receiving city pensions, was tabled until January 1, 1902.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Corporation Counsel—Stating that Charles E. Alsberge, Leonard Becker, George K. Copelan, William J. Cox, Abraham Hiller, Henry Nabe, Jr., Thomas J. Percival, Edward A. Stauffer and John Wallace have commenced actions to recover salary for services performed by them as Dock Masters for the month of August, 1899, and requesting information in relation thereto. Secretary directed to state that said persons are entitled to such salary, and that pay-roll for same was audited at that time.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment as Dock Builder.

ON MAY 27 AT 2 P. M. A MEETING was called at the Department of Buildings, No. 220 Fourth avenue, Borough of Manhattan, of the various concerns manufacturing thin partitions, blocks and plaster and metal combined thin partitions proposed for use in fireproof buildings and vent and elevator shafts in this city.

**THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXTRACT FROM** the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held Tuesday, February 19, 1901.

The Comptroller presented the following report and accompanying resolution relative to the redemption of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, maturing July 1, 1901:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 278 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1895, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.



It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand and five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

JULY 1, 1917,  
JULY 1, 1918,  
JULY 1, 1919,  
JULY 1, 1920, and  
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and three-tenths (3 3/10) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to apportion the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned.
