BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Minutes of the First Meeting of the Board of Examiners, Held at the Office of the Bureau of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan.

Meeting called to order 9.30 a. m.

Present—Messrs. Francis C. Moore, William J. Fryer, Warren A. Conover, Cornelius O'Reilly, Edward F. Croker, and A. F. D'Oench (Presiding Officer) in the Chair.

Mr. Fryer—Mr. Chairman, I desire to have noted in the record that this is the first meeting of the Board of Examiners, as created by section 411, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, there being present:

Mr. A. F. D'Oench, appointed by the New York Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

Mr. Francis C. Moore, appointed by the New York Board of Fire Underwriters.

Mr. Warren A. Conover, appointed by the Mechanics and Traders' Exchange.

Mr. William J. Fryer, appointed by the Society of Architectural Iron Manufacturers.

Mr. Cornelius O'Reilly, appointed by the Real Estate Owners and Builders' Association, and

Mr. Edward F. Croker, Chief of the Fire Department, member of the Board by virtue of his office.

It should also be noted in the record that the foregoing members of the Board duly presented their certificates of appointment from their respective associations—with the exception already noted of the Chief of the Fire Department, who sits by virtue of his office—to his Honor the Mayor on the 17th instant, before whom their several oaths of office were duly taken, and the said several oaths were filed with the City Clerk, as required by law; whereupon the Mayor designated Mr. A. F. D'Oench as the Presiding Officer of the Board for the period of one year.

The Chairman—I direct that Mr. Fryer's statement be placed on the record.

Mr. Fryer—I move that the Chairman be authorized by this Board to make all necessary requisitions for stationery, books, furniture, printing and lithographing.

Mr. Moore—I move that the resolution be amended to include all equipment for office necessary for the transaction of business.

Duly seconded, as amended. Carried.

Mr. Fryer—I move that proper rules and regulations be drafted, to apply both to the transaction of business with the public and for the government of the office.

I also move that copies of minutes of each meeting be manifolded and mailed to each member of the Board, also to the City Record for publication.

Duly seconded. Carried.

Mr. Moore—I move, Mr. Chairman, that Mr. Fryer be appointed a committee of one to assist Mrs. Clark, the Stenographer, to revise her notes of this meeting.

Duly seconded. Carried.

Mr. Moore—I move that the question of preparation of blanks be referred to a committee consisting of the Chairman and Mr. Fryer.

Duly seconded. Carried.

Mr. Moore—I move, further, that the preparation and drafting of all blanks, referred to in the foregoing resolution, and all other preparations for commencing the work of this Board, be referred to a committee composed of the Chairman and Mr. Fryer.

Duly seconded. Carried.

Mr. Fryer—I move that the Chairman be authorized to take whatever steps may be necessary to secure a stenographer and messenger for the office of this Board.

Mr. O'Reilly—I second that motion.

The Chairman—It is carried, there being none opposing.

Mr. Moore—I place myself on record as voting no.

Carried.

Mr. Moore—I move that we thank the Superintendent of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan, Hon. Perez M. Stewart, for his courtesy in inviting this Board to meet in his office until suitable quarters have been secured.

The Chairman—We should thank him, too, for permitting Mrs. Clark to assist us in organizing, by taking notes of the meetings and acting as Clerk pro tem., pending the appointment by the Mayor of a Clerk to the Board.

Mr. Moore—I move the adoption of the following resolution, having just received the intelligence of the death of Mr. Edwin Dobbs:

Resolved, That we learn with profound sorrow of the death of our late associate, Mr. Edwin Dobbs, who has for so many years served the city with conscientious regard for a duty he was so well qualified by education and experience to discharge. We shall miss his kindly face and companionship in our deliberations not less than his wise counsel and helpful co-operation.

Fifty-three orders for supplies and repairs were issued, three of which were subsequently cancelled and the most conspicuous of which, respectively, called for thirty tons of egg coal for the Third District Municipal Court, awarded, after competition, to Bacon & Co., at \$5.10 per ton; the building of a case of drawers at Public Library Branch 1; the placing in position of movable shelving in the children's room at Public Library, Branch 5; the taking down of partitions, rails, etc., and moving of furniture, carpets, stationery, etc., from the office of the Special Commissioner of Jurors, Germania Building, to the Kings County Court House, Commissioner of Jurors' Office, which was awarded to P. Belford & Son, on an estimate of \$30; the making of repairs, and placing additional shelving to accommodate stationery, in the County Clerk's private office in the Hall of Records, and the furnishing of one oak file cabinet to the Chief Engineer's Office, Bureau of Highways, which was awarded to Stevenson & Marsters on an estimate of \$60.

Notice was served in writing by the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Supplies, on January 14, to Mrs. Thomas Martin, widow of the former janitor of the Kings County Court House, who has been occupying the janitor's quarters in that building since the demise of her husband, to vacate the premises on or before January 18, 1902.

Commissioner William C. Redfield was furnished, on January 15, with a full list of the employees of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Supplies, for publication in the City Record, in keeping with section 1,528 of the New York Charter.

Sheriff Guden and a number of other county and city officials, in keeping with a decision of the Corporation Counsel, a copy of which reached the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Supplies on January 16, in effect that the Bureau of Public Buildings and Supplies were not required to furnish supplies to different branches of the city or county governments other than offices under the Borough President's

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—A communication bearing date January 9 has been received from N. Taylor Phillips, Esq., Deputy Comptroller. In this letter he states, among other things: "Claims and payrolls are about to be presented for payment to this office for supplies furnished for services rendered to the former departments now consolidated under the Borough Presidents, and this office desires to be informed as to upon whom devolves the duty of certifying claims or pay-rolls to this department for payment."

"Is it necessary that the Borough Presidents should individually sign every claim or pay-roll presented for payment; or should a certificate be issued by him designating the Commissioner of Public Works or the Superintendent of Buildings to perform such duties, and giving them power and authority so to do; or, under the provisions of the Charter, is such power given to the Commissioner of Public Works and the Superintendent of Buildings without the issuance of such certificate by the Borough President?"

The powers of the Commissioner of Public Works are to be found in section 383 of the Revised Charter, and those of the Superintendent of Buildings in sections 405, 409 and 412 of that statute.

In regard to the disbursements of a similar character to be made for services rendered or supplies furnished since January 1, 1902, I think a certificate should be issued by each Borough President designating the Commissioner of Public Works or the Superintendent of Buildings, respectively, to perform the duties in question and giving them power and authority so to do.

It may be that under the broad language of the Charter the Commissioner of Public Works and the Superintendent of Buildings already have this power, but this is not clear and it will be safer for the President of each Borough to delegate the powers in question in writing.

In the absence of such a delegation of power, I think the safer course will be to have the President of the Borough approve the vouchers prepared by the Commissioner of Public Works and the Superintendent of Buildings.
