

BUDGET FOR 1902.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by the affirmative vote of all the members thereof, makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and two, being: First, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said city for the said year, including State taxes; and, secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year; amounting in the aggregate to the sum of ninety-seven million nine hundred and seventy-four thousand five hundred and forty-one dollars and eighty-three cents (\$97,974,541.83).
