BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MINUTES OF MEETING OF THE BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, HELD IN ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 3, 1905.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Charles V. Fornes, President, Board of Aldermen; William Dalton, Commissioner of Public Works and Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan; Martin W. Littleton, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Cassidy, President of the Borough of Queens, and Louis L. Tribus, Commissioner of Public Works and Acting President of the Borough of Richmond.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, presided.

After disposing of the public improvements calendar the following financial matters were considered:

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Bridges relative to an appropriation of \$1,000,000, to be placed to the credit of the fund created for use in the construction of a bridge over the East river, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn:

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES,
NOS. 13 TO 21 PARK ROW, MANHATTAN, N. Y.,
October 6, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—By an order of the Supreme Court, issued on the 26th of September, 1905, the report of the Commissioners of Estimate appointed to appraise property acquired for the use of the Manhattan Bridge was confirmed. The amount of the awards thus ordered, together with the interest accruing thereon, will be about \$625,000, and I am informed that the Comptroller desires, in the interests of the City, to purchase other parcels of land required for use in the construction of this bridge, the condemnation of which has been authorized by your Honorable Board.

As no provision has heretofore been made to meet the foregoing obligations, I therefore request that your Honorable Board authorize the issue of \$1,000,000 in Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to be placed to the credit of the fund created for use in the construction of a bridge over the East river, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), for the purpose of providing means for the acquisition of lands required for the bridge over the East river, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, known as Manhattan Bridge No. 3, and for the necessary expenses connected with the construction of said bridge, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

ing sewers and appurtenances in Broadway, from the City line to Riverdale avenue, etc., The Bronx:

REPORT No. 3362.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER,
November 3, 1905.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on October 20, 1905, a communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx submitting for approval a modification of the contract made between The City of New York and Bart Dunn on December 13, 1899, for constructing the sewers and appurtenances in Broadway, from the city line to Riverdale avenue, etc., and the communication was referred to your Engineer for a report.

On September 30, 1904, there was submitted to the Board a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, accompanied by plans indicating a modification of the Broadway sewer where it passed under the tracks of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, with the request that the Board authorize such modification of plan. In the report upon this communication the changes which it was desired to make were described and the occasion therefor. It was further stated that there was no apparent reason why the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should pass upon this detail. It was recommended, however, that the Board approve of the plan proposed by the Borough President, leaving details to be arranged by himself, and this action was taken. The President now submits an agreement modifying the contract of December 13, 1899, which he asks the Board to approve. Under this agreement the contractor is to omit the special section of the sewer which was designed to pass under the railroad tracks, to build the temporary connections and maintain them until the railroad tracks shall have been removed to their new position on the northerly bank of the Harlem River Ship Canal, and to then construct the sewer in accordance with the permanent plan. The agreement further modifies the contract of December 13, 1899, by the omission on page 5, under Class I. of work described, of the words "including 140 linear feet of special section under railroad," and substituting therefor the following: "including temporary and permanent connections between the northerly and southerly portions of the sewer in Broadway at the crossing of the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, as shown on plan of modification dated July 28, 1904, and including excavation of any and all kinds thereof, the construction of required foundations therefor, and the performing of all the work incidental to the building of said temporary and permanent connections as required." The agreement also provides for the elimination from Sheet 3 of the Contract Plans of certain details showing this special section, substituting therefor the plan for the temporary connection dated July 28, 1904, this modification of plans being the one which was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 30, 1904. It is further agreed that the contractor shall be paid for the building of the temporary connection, its subsequent removal, and the construction of the permanent connection at the rate of \$60.23 for the 180 feet covering the modification which it is desired to make, this unit price being the same as that provided in the contract for the double sewer in Broadway. The agreement also provides that no portion of this amount shall be due or payable until he shall have satisfactorily and completely constructed the permanent connection.

Sections 71 to 75 of the original contract are also to be amended to provide that in the retention of certain moneys as security for repairs for six months after the completion of the work, such six months shall be reckoned from the date of the completion of the temporary connection, and not from the date of completion of the permanent connection. These provisions seem to me to be equitable, and I see no reason why the proposed modification of the contract should not meet with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

In the case of a modification of the contract for building a sewer in Briggs avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, by the omission of a part of the work, the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 12, 1903, approved of the omission, and on the advice of the Corporation Counsel the modification was transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its concurrence. I think it not unlikely that the same action will be advised in this case, and it is recommended that the Board approve of the proposed modification of the contract, and that the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise it whether the consent of the Board of Aldermen is necessary, and, if he so advises, that the matter be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for such concurrence.

Modification of contract for "sewers and appurtenances in Broadway, from the city line to Riverdale avenue; thence through Exterior street to East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, and through East One Hundred and Ninety-second street to the Harlem river," executed on the 13th day of December, 1899, by The City of New York, party of the first part, by the Commissioner of Sewers and Bart Dunn, contractor, party of the second part.

This agreement, made and entered into this day of , in the year one thousand nine hundred and , by and between The City of New York, party of the first part, by the President of the Borough of The Bronx and Bart Dunn, of said City, contractor, party of the second part, witnesseth:

That in consideration of the omission of the construction of the special section of sewer in Broadway under the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, as provided by the contract of which this agreement is a modification, and in further consideration of the building of temporary and permanent connections in lieu of said special section between the northerly and southerly portions of the sewer in Broadway at and near said railroad tracks, the said parties hereto have agreed, and by these presents do hereby agree, to the hereinafter expressed covenants and stipulations modifying a certain contract executed on the 13th day of December, 1899, by The City of New York, party of the first part, by the Commissioner of Sewers and the said Bart Dunn, contractor, as party of the second part, for sewers and appurtenances in Broadway, from the city line to Riverdale avenue; thence through Exterior street to East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, and through East One Hundred and Ninety-second street to the Harlem river.

A. It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto that the preliminary estimate of quantities of work to be performed as set forth on page 5 of the contract, of which this agreement is a modification, shall be amended by striking therefrom under the item of Class I. the words "including 140 linear feet of special section under railroad," and substituting in lieu thereof the following: "Including temporary and permanent connections between the northerly and southerly portions of the sewer in Broadway at the crossing of the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, all as shown on plan of modification dated July 28, 1904, and including excavation of any and all kinds thereof, the construction of required foundations therefor, and the performing of all the work incidental to the building of said temporary and permanent connections as required."

B. It is also further agreed by and between the parties hereto that the plan of the work dated October 19, 1899, shall be changed by eliminating from sheet No. 3 of said plan the following detail:

1. "Double sewer at the crossing of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, general plan—Scale, 20 feet equals 1 inch."
2. "Cross section at C-D."
3. "Double sewer at crossing of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, plan showing details."
4. "Cross section at A-B."
5. "Longitudinal section at E-F."
6. "Cross section of roof covering, showing details."
7. "Cross section of double I-beam, showing separator."

C. It is also further agreed by and between the parties hereto that in place of the details of work eliminated from sheet 3 of the plan of the work as provided by Covenant "B" hereof, there shall be substituted the plan dated July 28, 1904, copy of which accompanies and forms part of this agreement, entitled:

"In the matter of contract executed December 13, 1899, for constructing sewers and appurtenances in Broadway, from the city line to Riverdale avenue; thence through Exterior street to East One Hundred and Ninety-second street, and through East One Hundred and Ninety-second street to the Harlem river. Plan showing proposed modification of the Broadway sewer at the crossing of the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, providing for temporary and permanent connections between the northerly and southerly portions of said sewer. The temporary connections to remain until the railroad tracks are removed, under provision of chapter 423, Laws of 1903, whereupon the permanent connections shall be built," which said plan was approved by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting held on the 30th day of September, 1904.

D. It is also further agreed by and between the parties hereto that the contractor shall and will perform the work shown on the plan dated July 28, 1904, title of which said plan is set forth in Covenant "C" hereof, and that he shall and will execute such work strictly in accordance with the specifications of the contract, of which this agreement is a modification, and as directed by the President of the Bronx, by his duly authorized representatives.

The contractor shall and will excavate for and lay the two lines of 36-inch vitrified pipe, shown on said plan, as the temporary connections; and he shall and will build the brick bulkheads, through which said temporary connections pass, as shown on said plan; and he shall and will refill the trenches over the line of the temporary connections, and form embankments over the completed work to such lines and slopes as are shown on said plan. When the railroad tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad shall have been removed, under the provision of chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, the contractor shall and will take up and remove the temporary connections and the brick bulkheads; and he shall and will make the required excavation of earth, rock or other material necessary for the construction of the permanent connection and its foundation; and he shall and will construct such foundations as are required; and he shall and will build thereon the permanent connection as shown on said plan, which said permanent connection is shown in detail on sheet No. 2 of the contract plan, dated October 19, 1899, as "section of double sewer equal to 15 feet in diameter"; and he shall and will refill the trenches and restore the roadway over the same and remove all surplus material.

E. It is also further agreed by and between the parties hereto that the contractor shall be paid and will accept as full compensation for performing all of the work set forth in Covenant "D" of this agreement ten thousand eight hundred and forty-one dollars and forty cents (\$10,841.40), which said amount is determined by applying the price bid by the contractor and stipulated in the contract, of which this agreement is a modification, "For sewer, Class I., per linear foot, the sum of sixty dollars and twenty-three cents (\$60.23)," to the length of the permanent connection as shown on plan dated July 28, 1904, i. e., one hundred and eighty (180) linear feet.

F. It is also further agreed by and between the parties hereto that no portion of the said sum of ten thousand eight hundred and forty-one dollars and forty cents (\$10,841.40) shall be due or payable to the contractor until he shall have finally and satisfactorily completed the construction of the permanent connection under the terms of this agreement, whereupon the City will pay the aforesaid sum of money to said contractor as full compensation for the performance on his part of all of the work hereinbefore set forth.

G. It is also further agreed by and between the parties hereto that upon the completion of all of the work required to be done under the provisions of the contract, of which this agreement is a modification, the length of the omitted special section, with its connections (i. e., 180 linear feet) in Broadway under and near the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, and including the construction of the temporary connections under and near said tracks, all as provided by this agreement, there shall then be due and payable to the contractor all of the unpaid balance of the moneys due on account of the contract of which this agreement is a modification, except as otherwise stipulated by this agreement.

H. It is also further agreed by and between the parties hereto that the provisions of the contract, of which this agreement is a modification (sections 71, 72, 73, 74 and 75, pages 26 and 27 thereof), relative to retention by the City of certain moneys as security for repairs for a period of six months after the date of the final completion and acceptance of the sewers, are hereby modified to the extent that the said period of six months shall be computed as beginning on the date of the completion and acceptance of the sewers, including the temporary connection between the northerly and southerly portions of the sewer in Broadway at the crossing of the tracks of the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Branch of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad.

I. It is hereby further agreed by and between the parties hereto that anything contained in the contract, of which this agreement is a modification, which is not specifically stricken out or amended by this agreement, and which would conflict with the intent of this agreement and the plan dated July 28, 1904, hereinbefore referred to, is hereby rescinded.

In witness whereof the President of the Borough of The Bronx has hereunto set his hand and seal on behalf of the party of the first part, and the party of the second part has also hereunto set his hand and seal, and the said President and the party of the second part have executed this agreement in triplicate, one part of which is to remain with said President, one other to be filed with the Comptroller of The City of New York, and the third to be delivered to the said party hereto of the second part.


