Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16. City Hall, at 11.30 o'Clock A. M., on Wednesday, March 18, 1914.

Present-John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller: Henry Bruere, Chamberlain, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held March 11, 1914, were approved as printed. except as to the time of convening. The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, moved that the minutes of the meeting held March 11, 1914, be amended by substituting 11.40 as the hour of convening in place of 11 o'clock. Motion carried.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up for consideration the communication from the Commissioner of Docks recommending the approval of a lease to P. F. & W. A. Kane, of the northerly half of the pier at the foot of East 46th street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, laid over at the last meeting. Which was again laid over.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up for consideration applications of the Department of Street Cleaning for rental of the following dumping boards,

which were laid over at the last meeting: Dumping board extending from 107th to 108th street, rental \$40 a day.

Dumping board at the foot of Stanton street, at a rental of \$40 a day.

Dumping board at the foot of West 133d street, at a rental of \$40 a day. Dumping board at the foot of West 96th street, at a rental of \$50 a day.

Dumping board at the foot of West 79th street, at a rental of \$50 a day. The Commissioner of Street Cleaning urged that immediate action be taken on the rental of dumping board at the foot of Stanton street.

The Commissioner of Docks suggested that it lay over until the Committee now considering the rental of dumping boards were ready to report. Discussion followed. On motion of the Chamberlain, the applications were again laid over.

The premises consist of a store 14 feet average by 30 feet, with two light rooms

Resolved, That section 137 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to take effect on and after April 1, 1914:

April 1, '1914:

Section 137. It shall be the duty of every person having knowledge of the existence of any person afflicted with any one of the following infectious diseases: typhoid fever, measles, diphtheria (croup), scarlet fever, small-pox, chicken-pox, epidemic cholera, typhus fever, rubella (rotheln), plague, tuberculosis and whooping cough, who he has reason to think requires the attention of the Department of Health, to at once report to the Department all facts in regard to the disease; and no person shall interfere with or obstruct the entrance, inspection or examination of any building or house, or the occupants thereof, by the inspectors and officers of this Department, when any case of one of the infectious diseases above specified has been reported as existing in such house or dwelling; nor shall any person interfere with or obstruct, mutilate or tear down any notices of this Department posted in or on any premises in The City of New York.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collingion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
