1. Financial Results. The compilation of the revenues and disbursements and the other costs to the City by reason of the use of its property for market purposes cover the nine-year period ending December 31, 1914. The figures compiled pertain to the following markets:

Fulton (discontinued October 12, 1914). Gansevoort. Jefferson. Washington. West Washington.

Delancey Street (8 years). Tompkins (discontinued in 1908). Wallabout.

Eighth Ward (not yet in operation). Flower Market (four years). The total revenues of these markets for the period mentioned, as per

The details supporting the above statements will be found in Statements Nos. 1, 1A, 1B, 1C, 1D, 1E, 1F, 1G, 1H, 1J and 1K hereto attached. Statement No. 2 shows the assessed valuations of the lands and buildings occupied by the above-named markets and Statement No. 3 shows the cost of the same properties.

Statement No. 4 gives the financial results of all markets mentioned for 1914, with the exception of Tompkins Market, discontinued in 1908. The following summary shows the net profit or loss of these markets as compared with the average results from 1906 to 1914 or such part of this period as it is proper to consider.

This table shows a loss to the city in 1914 of nearly \$85,000 more than the average loss for the nine year period from 1906 to 1914, inclusive. The costs to The City of New York in connection with the above named markets for the year 1914, as shown on statement No. 4 herewith, are as follows:

Of these four items it would appear that the first is unavoidable; that the second applies to all city owned property, and that the fourth is to small to require any special consideration. The third item, however, represents over fifty-four per cent. of the total cost to the city of the markets mentioned for 1914. The total cost of the land and buildings occupied by markets in 1914, as shown in Statement No. 3 herewith was \$4,243,042.02. The total assessed value in 1914 of the same lands and

buildings was \$6,501,000; lands, \$6,156,500; buildings, \$344,500. It is the four per cent on the assessed valuation of the real estate, or \$260,040, that makes the maintenance of the markets as a whole an unprofitable undertaking for the city.

This would seem to be largely due to the non-utilization of the land to its full capacity. For assessment purposes the same value is placed upon the parcels occupied by the city markets as is placed upon the neighboring parcels occupied by higher buildings and therefore possessed of a larger earning capacity. If the city is insistent upon the proposition that these markets should be self-sustaining, it would appear to be incumbent upon it to increase their rental value, either by increasing the space rentable or by increasing the value of the present rentable area.

2. The Conditions Under Which the Markets Are Being Operated. The Market Commission appointed by the late Mayor Gaynor in 1912, rendered on December 30, 1913, a very comprehensive report on the markets of New York and other cities. The following excerpts therefrom are of especial interest in connection with the financial results, as shown above.

a. As to Market Conditions in the City of New York. "The marketing system of New York City may be briefly outlined and its greatest defects indicated as follows:

(1) Food supplies are brought to the city for:

1. A resident population of 5,000,000.

2. A transient and commuting population numbering many thousands daily.

The provisions of outgoing steamships and trains. 4. Export to other cities and towns.

It is estimated that the value of the foodstuffs brought to New York City annually is \$900,000,000.

(2) Most of New York's food supplies are brought by railroad and steamship and come over great distances.

(3) The farming district around the city is not great enough or varied enough in its productivity of producing in long enough seasons to supply the needs of the city in any line. Suburban developments are all the time pushing the farm lands farther and farther away. It is impossible to alleviate conditions by establishing markets for producers to sell to consumers.

(4) New York City has no modern wholesale market. Supplies are received at many points, chiefly at the lower end of Manhattan Island, are sold sometimes at the terminals and sometimes at the stores of the dealers, and thence must be trucked all over the city and out to suburban places.

(5) The terminals in the city where food products are brought in are entirely those provided by the transportation lines and are not sufficient to handle the volume of business that passes through them, in the right way. There is a great deal of congestion of trucks and wagons, causing delay in moving the goods, and insufficient means of protecting the goods from the weather and from extremes of temperature. Proper inspection is difficult.

(6) There is no supervision of marketing on the part of the city as there is in

foreign cities and in some cities of our own country."

b. The Non-Centralization of Control. "A system cannot hold together or work for a definite purpose unless it is organized and its control vested in a competent executive body. Too many city departments now have authority over the markets. Their powers should be vested in one Department of Markets, to be created by amendment of the Charter. The control is now so split up that (1) the Board of Aldermen has charge of the selection of sites; (2) the Borough President has charge of maintenance; (3) the Department of Finance collects the rents; (4) the Department of Health has charge of the sanitary conditions of the markets and the inspection of food; (5) the Fire Department takes measures for protection from fire; (6) the Police Department | forth should be given careful consideration. Respectfully yours, makes traffic regulations, etc.; (7) the Bureau of Weights and Measures has its

authority, and (8) the Department of Docks and Ferries collects dock rents where markets are on the water front. These functions should be centered in one Department, which should exercise supervision over the entire marketing system of the

c. New Terminal Markets.

A report made to the New York Legislature by the State Department of Foods

and Markets on February 3, 1915, contains the following:

"Terminal receiving stations in New York City are the first requisite. These terminals must be distributed over the metropolitan district for the receipt and distribution of foodstuffs from everywhere, so that the food may be discharged approximately in the section of consumption so as to avoid the present great congestion and delay in distribution. * * *

"Three of these terminal markets have been offered on rental to the department without cost to the State. The department proposes to develop only one or two

"This will open a free channel for the passage of foods from the farms in the

country to the consumer in the city without obstruction of any kind, except the single wholesale expense at the terminals and the necessary cost of retail distribution. * * * "The department believes that the retail cost to consumers can be adjusted on a

fair basis through the medium of publicity and through the influence of the department to encourage, by advertising and otherwise, the trade of local distributors who maintain sanitary stores and sell the goods at a fair profit. The department has no wish to disturb present business. Some readjustments

will no doubt be necessary; otherwise there would be no reform, but the easy flow of food under the law of supply and demand will cause a larger consumption and afford new opportunities for real economic distributing service. * * *

"Railroads to Aid.

"The three terminal markets are offered to the department by the New York Central Railroad, the Pennsylvania system and the Bush terminal interests. We are only required to furnish responsible lessees for a term of years. The buildings will be erected and arranged to suit the requirements and demands of the department and there will be no expense to the city or to the State except a reasonable rental for the use of the terminals.

"The markets must be self-supporting. They can easily maintain themselves in both rental and operating expenses and produce a reasonable surplus for emergencies and new development, but to be effective they must be under the supervision and

control of the department."

d. Proposed Department of Markets in the City of New York. It appears from a pamphlet issued under date of February 26, 1915, by Mayor Mitchel's Committee on Food Supply that there has been introduced in the legislature at the instance of the said committee a bill to establish a Department of Markets in the City of New York. The pamphlet referred to states that:

The bill seeks to abolish the confusion which exists to-day in the city markets, due to a duplication of service and a duplication of supervision by the various city departments which now have a share in the supervision of city markets. It seeks to co-ordinate these various functions in one head or Market Commission. * * *

'This measure also provides for many improvements in the present marketing system, which is crude and far from economic, and which can only be improved by a careful study of the situation from all angles, and by the abolition of the present antiquated systems of delivery and distribution.'

No attempt is made to formulate a plan for the future conduct of the city markets, but it is believed that in the formulation of such a plan all of the matters herein set R. B. McINTYRE, Supervising Statistician and Examiner.


