The 744 deaths represent a death-rate of 23.42, against 24.06 for the previous week, and 46.54 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The decrease of 20 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 14 in the deaths from diphtheria, 7

from measles, 5 from scarlet fever, 21 from bronchitis, and 11 from pneumonia, while there was an increase of 21 in the deaths from heart diseases, and of 14 from Bright's disease and nephritis.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twenty-first Ward, from scarlet fever in the Twelfth Ward, and from measles in the Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-second Wards.
