

Whereas, It was then supposed that the bill was objectionable, simply because it would practically legalize the watering of milk; and
Whereas, This Board has since learned that the real object of said bill is to legalize swill-milk

Whereas, This Board has since realized that the Stables; and
Whereas, The Board of Health of the City of Brooklyn, fully concurs in the view expressed by
this Board, as to the dangerous tendency of this bill; therefore
Resolved, That in the opinion of this Board, the milk of cows fed upon distillery swill is not
healthful, and that its use will seriously increase the rate of mortality of the children using it.
Resolved, That as the only effect of this bill (should it become a law), will be to legalize the
adulteration of milk by the addition of water in the form of ice, and to legalize the swill-milk
nuisance, the Governor be respectfully requested to withhold his signature therefrom.

Whereas, The condition of Mill Brook and the adjacent district is such as to call for immediate relief: therefore Resolved, That the Department of Parks be requested to inform this Board what progress has been made towards the construction of a trunk sewer on the line of the above-mentioned brook.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 12, 1875. The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,632, as follows: I public buildings, I,313 tenement houses, 270 private dwellings, 84 other dwellings, 36 manufactories and workshops, 8 stores and ware-houses, 81 stables, 67 slaughter-houses, 5 markets, I gas work, 10 fat-rendering establishments, 7 dumping grounds, 10 lands and public drains, 59 sunken and vacant lots, 9 uninhabitable dwellings, I dangerous building, 107 yards, courts, and areas, 85 cellars and basements, 74 waste-pipes and drains, 233 privies and water-closets, 77 street gutters and sidewalks, 21 dangerous stairways, 13 cisterns and cesspools, 3 violations of code, 23 other nuisances, together with 84 visits of Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 808.

During the past week 118 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

264 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.
68 permits were granted consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health
Officer of the Port.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 108 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 97 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 2,397 privies and water closets, 137 yards, courts, and areas, 51 cellars and basements, and 84½ miles of street gutters.

62 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 6 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending June 12, 1875: Typhoid fever, 4; scarlet fever, 38; measles, 14; diphtheria, 81; small-pox, 98, and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1.

19 tanks and 5,840 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city, during the week ending June 12, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending June 12, 1875: cattle, I carcass; veal, "bob," 4 carcasses; veal, "case," 1 carcass; beef, 70 pounds; poultry 416 pounds; and 2,300 pounds of fish.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending June 12, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 497 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transitu, and 47 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 497 deaths, 145 marriages, 475 births, 47 still-births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 77 returns from Coroners. There were 27 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth-record, 4 of marriage, and 25 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.
