

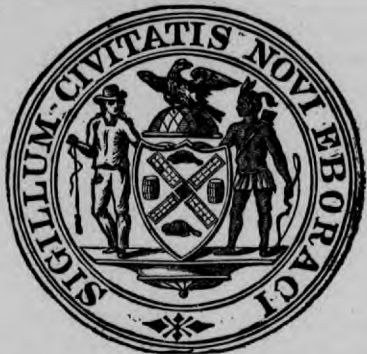

COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Public Administrator:

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

The Public Administrator, pursuant to chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, chapter 7, section 224 of said act, herewith exhibits to the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York a statement on oath of the moneys received by the Public Administrator for commissions and expenses, and of the total amount of his receipts and expenditures in each case in which the Public Administrator took charge and collected any effects, or on which he administered on any estate, during the year 1893, with the name of the deceased, his occupation, the place of his residence at the time of his death, when known, and the country or place from which he came, if he was not a resident of this State at the time of his death.

BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL.

Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Electrical Control, held at the office of the Mayor, in the City of New York, on Friday, December 29, 1893, at 12 o'clock M.

Present—Mayor Thomas F. Gilroy, President, Commissioners Jacob Hess, Theodore Moss, Walton Storm.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Electrical Expert reported as follows:

NEW YORK, December 29, 1893

Honorable Commissioners of the Board of Electrical Control:

GENTLEMEN—I have to report that the work of removing all the poles and wires mentioned in my recent list is progressing satisfactorily, with the following exceptions:

The Fire Department state that they cannot remove their wires and poles on Tenth avenue, from Fourteenth to Nineteenth street, and from Thirty-seventh to Fifty-ninth street, and on Second avenue, from Houston to Forty-second street, and from Sixty-eighth to One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, until subway provisions have been made. (See attached letter.)

The Western Union Company have not yet transferred their wires to the railroad-track pole line from the otherwise abandoned pole line of the French Cable Company on Sedgwick avenue, from Jerome avenue to Fordham Landing road, to McComb's Dam road, to Kingsbridge road, to Jerome avenue, to City line, and I recommend that they be urged to do this.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board address a letter to the Fire Department, demanding that its wires on Tenth avenue, from Fourteenth to Nineteenth street, and from Thirty-seventh to Fifty-ninth street, be transferred from the poles which they now occupy to the poles on the opposite side of the street, in order that the poles from which the wires are transferred may be removed.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board address a letter to the Fire Department, demanding that its wires on Second avenue, from Houston to Forty-second street, and from Sixty-eighth to One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, be transferred from the poles which they now occupy to the poles on the opposite side of the street, in order that the poles from which they are transferred may be removed.

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to notify the Western Union Telegraph Company to transfer its wires from the poles of the French Cable Company, as recommended in the report of the Electrical Expert, within thirty days from the date of the notice, and if they are not removed within that time that the Secretary be authorized to order the same cut down at the expense of the company.

Commissioner Moss submitted the following report, which was read and directed to be printed at length in the minutes:

NEW YORK, December 29, 1893.

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Mayor, and President of the Board of Electrical Control:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to report, for your information, that during the year 1893 there have been constructed, under the direction of the Board of Electrical Control, 100½ miles of subways for the accommodation of telephone and telegraph conductors and 49¾ miles subways for the accommodation of electric light and power conductors, making the total mileage of subways now in operation in the city—for telegraph and telephone purposes, 847 miles, and for electric light and power, 820 miles.

In these subways have been placed and are now being operated 32,600 miles of wire, for telegraph, telephone, and signaling service, and 1,300 miles for the transmission of electric light and power.

There are now in use in the city for public and commercial lighting, 6,790 arc lamps, 268,000 incandescent lamps and nearly 10,000 telephones, all of which are either wholly or in part served through the subways; and the latest reports clearly indicate that from an electrical as well as a mechanical standpoint the underground system as adopted here is exceedingly successful.

During the time that the change, great in detail as it has been, from an overhead to an underground electrical service, the convenience to the city and the uses of electricity generally have not been interfered with, and the public and private lighting as well as the other branches have been conveniently and uninterruptedly maintained.

As a consequence of this underground construction, the Board of Electrical Control has during the past year caused the removal of 1,407 poles and 960 miles of overhead wire, without any expense to the City Treasury; in addition to which the Department of Public Works has removed 104 poles and 387 miles of wire; making a total for the year of 1,511 poles and 1,346 miles of wire.

The total number of poles removed by direction of the Board of Electrical Control during its existence has been 17,272, and the mileage of wire also removed 23,320.

It is a matter of considerable gratification that the electrical business of the city, great as it is, and widely distributed as it necessarily must be, has been carried on with very slight interruption either to the public or the city, and has been unaccompanied by any accident to life or property so far as is known.

The condition of the poles and wires still remaining overhead has been very much improved, and is to-day under careful inspection and supervision of the Board, and the disposition of the various corporations to so maintain their wires has considerably changed for the better within the last few years.

To the Board of Electrical Control, Hon. THEODORE MOSS, Secretary, City:

GENTLEMEN—The eighteen applications attached are for lines which it is desired to run to replace existing iron wires now defective because of long use. Such defective wires will be taken down. The new lines do not run to the terminals nearest the several points to be connected because such terminals are now wholly in use. Upon completion of certain improvements now under way in that district these lines will be taken down and replaced by shorter lines. The applications are therefore wanted temporary. Hoping they may be granted, I am

The Electrical Expert stated his approval of the eighteen applications of the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company, whereupon the Board, on motion of his Honor the Mayor, granted the applications.

The following preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, All subway facilities necessary for the transaction of electrical business are now furnished south of Twenty-third street, on Broadway.

Resolved, That the Board of Electrical Control be and it is hereby directed to remove all electrical wires existing upon Broadway above the street within thirty days.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That all permits granted and appointments made by the Secretary since January 1, 1893, be and are hereby approved.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

TO ARCHITECTS.

A general invitation is hereby extended to architects to furnish competitive designs for an armory building for the National Guard, State of New York, on the site recently acquired on the northerly side of Fourteenth street, extending through to Fifteenth street, commencing at a point on the northerly line of Fourteenth street, distant 175 feet 3/4 inches west from the westerly line of Sixth avenue; thence northerly and parallel with Sixth avenue, distance 103 feet 2 inches; thence westerly and parallel with Fourteenth street, distance 5 feet; thence northerly and parallel with Sixth avenue, distance 103 feet 4 inches to the southerly line of Fifteenth street; thence westerly along the southerly line of Fifteenth street, distance 220 feet 2 1/2 inches; thence southerly 206 feet 6 inches to the northerly line of Fourteenth street; thence easterly along the northerly line of Fourteenth street, distance 224 feet 10 1/4 inches, to the point or place of beginning.

The building to be designed to furnish accommodations for a regiment of infantry.

The front on Fourteenth street to be of rock-faced granite, and the front on Fifteenth street to be of brick with stone trimmings.

The roof to be of slate tile or other suitable material.

So much of the space covered by the building as may be necessary to be excavated to a depth sufficient for the accommodation of the boiler-rooms, rifle-range, water-closets, kitchen and range, armorer's room, lavatory, janitor's room, storage room, etc.

The designs to provide a main drill-room on the ground floor to cover as near as practicable the entire plot, reserving only so much as may be necessary for suitable main and side entrances on Fourteenth street and staircases to administration and company rooms an galleries above and basement below. An entrance to be provided on Fifteenth street opening into the main drill-room, and to be used only for an emergency.

Galleries to be provided for accommodation of visitors. The accommodation for officers, company-rooms, lockers, janitor's quarters, etc., to be suspended on Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, in order to secure the greatest space on the ground floor for drill-room.

Consideration to be given to the necessary heating and lighting, the latter to be by combination gas and electric fixtures. Gun-racks and lockers to be provided for all the companies.

In order to secure conformity of drawings it is suggested that they be made on a scale of one-eighth of an inch to a foot.

The entire cost of the building, including all work and materials necessary to complete the same in every respect, both interior and exterior (other than fixtures for lighting, furniture for galleries, company and administration rooms, and which will be otherwise provided for), shall not exceed \$285,000, including the Architect's fees.

The Armory Board reserves the right to reject any or all plans that may be offered, if for any reason they deem it best so to do, and in case any plan is accepted as presented, or with alterations or suggestions of the Board, and it is subsequently found that contracts satisfactory to the Board can be made for the complete erection of the building, and the payment of the Architect's fees not to exceed the sum named, the Architect presenting such plans shall be engaged for the work, and his compensation for plans and superintendence shall be four per cent. of the amount of such contract.
