The following communication has been transmitted by the Clerk of the Common Council to the Board of Supervisors :

OFFICE OF THE CLERK OF THE COMMON COUNCIL, No. 8 City Hall, New York, October 22, 1873.

To the Honorable the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York : GENTLEMEN :—On the 12th day of May last you conferred upon me the high honor of electing me Clerk to your Honorable Body, pursuant to the provisions of section 25, chapter 335, laws of 1873, which imposed upon me the onerous and responsible duties of that office, in addition to those devolved on me as Clerk of the Common Council.

Subsequently however, and by the provisions of chap. 763, laws of 1873, which authorizes your Honorable Body to appoint your own officers, it became evident to me that the obligations imposed, as Clerk of the Common Council, to perform the duties of Clerk of the Board of Supervisors ceased to exist.

As your Honorable Body has not yet exercised the power thus conferred by the subsequent act above quoted, I have continued to perform the duties of Clerk. I have however regarded my retention of the office as being of uncertain tenure, and perhaps of doubtful propriety without the further action of the Board.

Entertaining these views I deem it my duty to make this statement to your Honorable Body.

I shall however, continue, cheerfully to perform the duties entrusted to me as your clerk, until the Board exercises the prerogative of choosing its own officers as provided by said chap. 763, laws of 1873.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, October 21, 1873.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

STR.—In the week that ended on Saturday, the 18th inst., there were 543 deaths reported in this city. There was an increase of mortality by measles, scarlatina, diphtheria, croup, pneumonia, bronchitis and phthisis pulmonalis, amounting to 54 deaths more than were caused by the same diseases the preceding week.

The death rate last week was equivalent to 28.18 yearly in the 1,000 inhabitants. The death rate reported for London in the week ending on the 4th inst. was equal to 22 per 1,000; in Edinburgh, 19; in Bristol, 17; in Portsmouth and Norwich, 17; Liverpool, 22; Dublin, 21; in Glasgow, 23, and in the 21 chief cities of Great Britain the average rate was equal to 23 per 1,000 yearly.

The subsidence of two most dreaded kinds of pestilence in the Southwestern States, without extending their ravages very fatally to cities larger than Memphis and Shreveport, is mentioned with gratitude by sanitary officers in numerous other cities and large towns.

It will be noticed that after more than two months cessation of small-pox two fatal cases are now reported. They occurred in adult Germans, who had neglected to be properly protected.

NEW YORK, October 21, 1873. The following is a record of the work performed

in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 18th, 1873.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors, was 2,364 as follows:

8 public buildings, 890 tenement houses, 158 private dwellings, 389 other dwellings, 40 manufactories and work shops, 28 stores and warehouses, 118 stables, 12 slaughter houses, 5 fat rendering establishments, 2 markets, 3 gut cleaning establishments, 1 brewery, 3 public sewers and drains, 45 sunken and vacant lots, 55 yards, courts and areas, 221 cellars and basements, 51 waste pipes and drains, 116 privies and water closets, 183 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 4 cisterns and cesspools, 17 other nuisances, 1 piggery and 8 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 633. During the past week 54 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 68 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 64 houses, 64 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

Permits have been granted consignees of 64 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

98 permits have been granted to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.
