### ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 27 CHAMBERS STREET, FRIDAY, January 22, 1886—2 o'clock, p. m.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met, pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners Daniel Lord, Jr. (Chairman), Allan Campbell, Joseph Garry and John W. Marshall.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register," of January 21 and 22, 1886, showing the publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meetings held January 15 and 19, 1886, were read and approved.

The Clerk reported that he had filed in the Finance Department on January 21, 1886, certificates of award in favor of the persons named, and for the amounts specified in resolution adopted on January, 19, 1886.

No. 4783, Matter of Daniel M. Edgar.—Assessment for Worth street regulating, grading, etc., from Broadway to Chatham street; confirmed July 12, 1878.

John C. Shaw, Esq., counsel for the petitioner, presented additional evidence, after which the further hearing of the case was adjourned.
