Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to Messrs. Thomas R. A. Hall and William H. Hall, lessees from Morris Tuska, alleged owner of land under water between One Hundred and Fifth and One Hundred and Sixth streets, East or Harlem river, and of the upland adjacent thereto, to construct and maintain, provided the same is commenced and completed within the next twelve months, a retaining structure of solid pile work, with a platform about twenty feet wide, supported on piles in front thereof, on the west side of Harlem river, from the north side of One Hundred and Fifth street to the south side of One Hundred and Sixth street, the outer or river face of said platform to be located on the bulkhead line as at present established for said river, and to fill in behind the said retaining structure with good stone and clean earth or other suitable material up to the established grade of the said bulkhead, the entire structure to be built under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with the specifications submitted therefor, as amended by the Engineer-in-Chief, and which are hereby approved; also, provided that the said lessees and owner file in this Department, within ten days after adoption hereof, an agreement in writing that they or he will change or remove the said structure whenever the bulkhead line for Harlem river shall be changed by the proper authorities so as to require the same

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to Robinson Gill, alleged owner of land under water, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets, East or Harlem river, and of the upland adjacent thereto, to construct and maintain, provided the same is commenced and completed within the next twelve months, a retaining structure of solid pile work with a platform about twenty feet wide, supported on piles in front thereof, on the west side of Harlem river, from the north side of One Hundred and Sixth street to the south side of One Hundred and Seventh street, the outer or river face of said platform to be located on the bulkhead line as at present established for said river, and to fill in behind the said retaining structure with good stone and clean earth and other suitable material up to the established grade of the said bulkhead, the entire structure to be built under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with specifications therefor to be submitted to this Board for its approval of the same; also provided the said owner file in this Department, within ten days after adoption hereof, an agreement in writing, that he will change or remove the said structure whenever the bulkhead line for Harlem river, shall be changed by the proper authorities so as to require the same to be done, and that if required by the terms and con dered to and become the property of the city on the expiration of the permit hereby granted, by its

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had proviously occurred.

from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 P. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five eet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon
the Health Department, the following amendments of the
Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and
the same are hereby adopted, and declared to form a
portion of the Sanitary Code:
Resolved, That section 201 of the Sanitary Code be
and is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 201. That for all lodging-houses in which beds
are let for lodgers containing four or more beds in any
apartment therein for the use of lodgers, a permit in
writing from this Department shall be required, and no
person in the City of New York shall have, lease, let, or
keep any such lodging-house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire, or assist in hiring, or conduct
the business of any such lodging-house, or the lodgings
therein, except pursuant to the terms and condition of a
permit in writing previously obtained therefor from this
Department, an application for which shall be made in
accordance with the rules and regulations of the Board of
Health by the person or persons who propose to use the
same. The beds in all lodging-houses and in every room
in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a
passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all
the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the
air shall freely circulate, and there the adequate ventilation. Four hundred (400) cubic feet of air space shall be
provided and allowed for each bed or lodger, and no more
beds shall be permitted than those provided in this way,
unless free and adequate means of ventilation exist,
approved by the Board of Health, and a special permit in
writing be granted therefor, specifying the number of
beds or the cubic air space which shall under specia

A PPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper make any false statement, and every case will be prosecuted.
