# MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting held May 18 were approved. Serger it Eugene C. Casey appeared before the Commission relative to his appeal of Pelice. Alfred J. Talley, Esq., counsel for Sergeant Casey, also appeared.

At the conclusion of the hearing, the matter was laid over pending the receipt through official channels of certain information as to the Rules and Regulations of the Police Department.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transiers, the following transfers were approved: Frank M. Sherman, from the position of Topographical Draftsman at \$1,200 per annum in the Board of Water Supply to a similar position at \$1,350 per annum in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond. Miss Julia E. King, from the position of Cataloguer in the Board of Water Supply at \$900 per annum to that of Librarian at the same salary in the office of the Supervisor of Lectures, Department of Education.

It appearing that Mr. Lowenberg had failed in the examination, the papers were ordered filed for future reference.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to summon Edgar M. North, of No. 52 Eay Ridge ave., Borough of Brooklyn, before the Commission at the meeting to be held on Wednesday, May 25, to show cause why his application for the positions of Rodman and Transitman should not be rejected under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII., for unsatisfactory character.

The Commission then considered the application of William J. Bourgeois, of No. 246 W. 24th st., New York City, for the position of Teacher in the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School for Boys. It appearing that Mr. Bourgeois had failed to pass the examination, the application was ordered filed for future reference.

The application of Francis M. Gorman, of No. 442 E. 77th st., for the position

of Rodman was accepted. A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated May 18, requesting instructions of the Commission in regard to the experience paper of a candidate for Female Attendant who had revealed her identity in answer to Questions 5 and 9. After consideration of the matter, the Commission directed that the paper be rated.

The Secretary requested a ruling as to the right of the head of a Departwere already employed in his Department under the same title. After consideration of the matter, the Commission ruled that the head of a Department might properly refuse to consider such names.

A letter was presented from E. V. Frothingham, Esq., Commissioner of Public Works, Manhattan, dated May 12, requesting approval of a supplementary payroll for the salary of a number of employees of the Department of Parks who had been loaned to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, for a temporary period to perform emergency work, consisting of the planting of trees and shrubs on Riverside drive and on Delancey st., between the Bowery and the entrance to the Williamsburg Bridge. On motion, the Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the payroll.

A letter was presented from the Curator of the College of the City of New York, dated May 18, requesting an amendment of the classification, by including in the exempt class two Laboratory Mechanicians for the College of the City of New York. The request was denied.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated May 18, requesting approval of the employment of Forster J. Maynard as Lab oratory Assistant for the first fifteen days of the month of April. The Secretary stated that Mr. Maynard had been appointed on March 4, 1910, for a period of fifteen days, under the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII., and that he had been notified to appear for a non-competitive examination on March 11, but that he had failed to appear. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was authorized to certify the payroll, when presented, in view of the fact that there was no eligible list in existence for the position.

The reassignment of John P. Hayes, Inspector of Sewers in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, was approved as of March 1, 1910, in view of the explanation contained in the Borough President's letter under date of May 11.

The Secretary presented the following communication from George L. Sterling, Esq., Acting Corporation Counsel, dated May 18:

"Mr. F. A. Spencer, Secretary of the Municipal Civil Service Commission: Sir— I received your letter dated May 7th, 1910, in which you quote an excerpt from an opinion of the Attorney General wherein he states that in his judgment the employees of the Board of Education of The City of New York are subject to the State Civil Service Commission, and not to the Civil Service Commission of New York City. You ask my opinion as to whether or not the same ruling applies to the Normal College and the College of the City of New York.

"The leading authority for the contention frequently made that the Board of Education is a corporation distinct from The City of New York is the case of Gunnison vs. the Board of Education, 176 N. Y., 11, in which a sweeping opinion was written by the Court of Appeals containing many statements not strictly necessary for the determination of the solitary question presented for solution. The point to be decided was whether The City of New York or the Board of Education was the proper party to be sued by a school teacher who claimed arrears of salary. In holding that the Board of Education was the proper entity to be made the defendant, the late Justice O'Brien comprehensively discussed the general subject of education and his opinion contains many dicta which at first blush would seem to indicate that there is an absolute cleavage between The City of New York and the Board of Edu-

"Since the decision of the Gunnison case, the status of the employees of the Board of Education has been passed upon by the courts and they have uniformly held that in the Gunnison case the only point decided was that, when the affairs of the Board of Education are litigated, the proper party to sue or be sued is the Board of Education and not The City of New York. It has been uniformly held that the Board of Education is only a department of The City of New York, and that hence the salaries of its employees must be fixed by the Board of Aldermen in accordance with section 56 of the New York Charter, except, of course, those who are expressly exempted. If that is so, I do not understand how it can be successfully maintained that the employees of the Board are State employees. In my opinion they are employees of The City of New York, of which the Board of Education is specifically enumerated as a department. (Sec. 108.)

"In the recent case of Hogan vs. Board of Education it was decided in March, 1910, by the Appellate Division, First Department, that notwithstanding the Gunnison case the employees of the Board of Education are municipal employees and that their compensation, excepting, as I have said, teachers, principals, examiners and the supervising force, is fixable by the Board of Aldermen according to the provisions for a rerating of his report paper in the examination for promotion to Lieutenant of section 56. That case is the latest utterance of a court of authoritative jurisdiction upon this mooted question and until it is overruled or reversed I think it must be regarded as having declared the law contrary to the views entertained by the

"I have seen a copy of the Attorney General's opinion and have noted the cases upon which he relies to sustain his position. However, almost every case which he cites was presented to the Appellate Division in the Hogan case in support of the very contention which he now makes and the court decided, as I have above pointed ent, that, no withstanding, the employees of the Board are municipal employees.

"I know of no reason why a different ruling should be made in the case of the Normal College and in the case of the College of the City of New York, and I beg so to advise you.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the Rules and Regulations of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York as follows:

1. By inserting at the head of the table of minimum relative measurements for the positions of Patrolman and Fireman the following line: 36 inches, 3 inches,

5 feet 7½ inches, 138 pounds, 33½ inches, 2½ inches. 2. By striking from Rule XI., clause 2, the words "except in the Police or the Pire Service, where such period shall be one month," and substituting therefor the following: "except for the positions of Patrolman and Fireman, where such period shall be six months."

3. By amending Regulation VII. (age limitation) so far as the same applies to

the position of Patrolman, to read as follows: 1. The limits of age at the time of application for the following positions in he competitive class shall be as follows: Position, Patrolman; minimum, 21; maximum, 30.





A T A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held June 28, 1910, the following resolution was

Resolved, That section 132 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 132. Every animal which shows symptoms of rabies and every animal that has been exposed to such disease shall, by the person owning the same or having possession thereof, be at once confined in some secure place for such length of time as to determine whether such disease exists or to show that such ex-crete. posure has not given such animal said disease, and so as to avoid all danger to life or health. And such person shall also forthwith notify the Department of Health thereof, and of the place where such animal is confined. Every animal which is mad or has rabies shall at once be killed by the owner or person having possession thereof, or by the Department of Health, and the body of any animal that has died of such disease, or being suspected of such disease, has been killed, shall be at once surrendered to the Department of Health to be by it disposed of.

Should a dog bite any person it shall be the duty of the owner or person having the same in his possession or under his control, to at once notify said Department thereof, and surrender said dog to said Department for inspection and observation; and such dog shall be returned to the person from whom the same shall have been received if found not rabid or vicious, and if found to be rabid or vicious to such an extent as to be unsafe to be at large, it shall be de-

stroyed by said Department.

When the police or other person or authorities destroy a dog for any of the causes herein menumed, it shall be his or their duty to immediately notify the said Department thereof and of the location of its body, so that the same may be obtained by the said Department; and it shall be unlawful to remove any such dog or the of any such animal heretofore mentioned except as herein provided.

pant of any stall, stable or apartment in the built up portions of The City of New York, in which any horse, cattle or other animal shall be kent, or of any place in which manure stable refuse or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, shall cause such manure, stable refuse or liquid to be promptly and properly removed therefrom, and shall at all times keep or cause to be kept such stalls, stables or apartments, and the drains, yards and appurtenances thereof, in a clean and sanitary condition, so that no offensive odors shall be allowed to escape therefrom. Every such stable, and the yards and appurtenances thereof, shall be connected with the sewer in the street in front thereof. It shall be the duty of every such owner, lessee, tenant or occupant to cause all manure and stable refuse to be removed daily from such stable or stable premises, unless the same are pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, and

adequately screened or otherwise protected or covered so that flies cannot have access thereto, as hereinafter provided. It shall not be lawful to remove manure and stable refuse in carts or wagons, or to cart the same within the City without a permit from the Board of Health, and such carts and wagons shall be of a construction approved by said Board and every such cart or wagon must have a permit from the Board, and be used in accordance with the terms of such permit, and not otherwise. Manure carts and wagons shall be loaded within the stable premises and not upon the street or sidewalk, and the manure and stable refuse shall be removed from such premises in a manner not in any way offensive or so as to cause any nuisance. All manure and stable refuse, when transported through the streets, must be covered and secured so that no part of the same will fall upon the

street, and so as to prevent the escape of offensive odors, and the same shall not be unloaded or deposited within the City limits, except upon the conditions of a permit from the Board of Health, and at such docks and places as shall be approved by the Board, and to which a permit in writing for such use shall have previously been granted by said Board. No manure or stable refuse shall be thrown upon or allowed to fall or remain upon any street or sidewalk, or upon any ground near any stable. No manure vault shall be built or used on any premises within the built up portions of The City of New
