Record and Seniority—Colorless Record: Beginning at 80 per cent. from date of original appointment, for each four months add one-half of one per cent. or one and one-half per cent. a year, making at the end of ten years a maximum of 95 per cent.

Added Points—Honorable mention and medal (or old medal and roll of merit), add 3 per cent.; honorable mention (or roll of merit, classes "A," "B" and "C"), add 2 per cent.; commendation (or roll of merit, class "D"), add 1 per cent.; for rank of Engineer of Steamer, add 1 per cent. Necessary to pass 80 per cent. on total, and 70 per cent. on mental examination.

Deducted Points—For each day's fine between October 1, 1905, and September 30, 1908, deduct one-eighth of one per cent.; for each day's fine after October 1, 1908, deduct one-quarter of one per cent.; reprimand to count as one-half of one day's fine; fines previous to October 1, 1905, not to be considered.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name
and place of residence of the person making the
same, and names of all persons interested with
him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-
ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that
it is made without any connection with any other
person making an estimate for the same purpose,
and is in all respects fair and without collusion
or fraud, and that no member of the Board of
Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a
Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other
officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or
become interested, directly or indirectly, as con-
