COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 12 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, April 28, 1915.

Present at roll call—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain; George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen; Henry H. Curran, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Minutes of the meeting held April 7 and 21, 1915, were approved as printed.

Dock Department—Issues of Corporate Stock for; Recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

\$400,000 for the Construction of a Pier at the Foot of 30th Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

\$222,500 for the Construction of a Pier at the Foot of 29th Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

\$638,000 for the Construction of a Pier at the Foot of 35th Street, Borough of Brooklyn (Brought up by Unanimous Consent).

His Honor the Mayor announced that the Corporate Stock Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment had just been in session and considered applications from the Commissioner of Docks for issues of corporate stock and recommended the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000), the proceeds, to the amount of the par value thereof, to be used by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the construction of a pier at the foot of Thirtieth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of the City of New York to an amount not exceeding two hundred and twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$222,500), the proceeds, to the amount of the par value thereof, to be used by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the construction of a pier at the foot of Twenty-ninth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of the City of New York to an amount not exceeding six hundred and thirty-eight thousand dollars (\$638,000), the proceeds, to the amount of the par value thereof, to be used by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the construction of a pier at the foot of Thirty-fifth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Refunds to Larry Brackerton and Others, Being Amount of Fines Refunded by the Court.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

Gentlemen—In the matter of the People of the State of New York against Larry Brackerton, Louis Fuller and George Carroll, the defendants appealed to the Court of General Sessions of the Peace in and for the County of New York from a judgment of conviction in the 5th District City Magistrates' Court, wherein they were found guilty of a violation of City Ordinance relative to public places of amuse-

ment and fined the sum of \$10 each, which was paid and later deposited in the Sinking Fund for the Payment of the Interest on the City Debt.

The appeal was argued before the Court of General Sessions, and by a decision of that Court judgment of conviction was reversed and it was ordered that the fine imposed by the said City Magistrate be and the same is remitted and ordered returned to the defendants herein.

It appears that the claimant mailed the summons with the affidavit of service to the Clerk of the Second District Municipal Court and enclosed the sum of \$1 as a calendar fee. As the summons was not received by the Clerk until 3.30 in the afternoon of the day the summons was returnable, the Clerk of the Second District Municipal Court did not place the action on the calendar as all the cases for that day had been disposed of at that time.

In view of the mistake of the Clerk in accepting the summons for filing and the \$1 calendar fee on the 15th of February, 1915, this office has come to the conclusion that this amount should be refunded.

Sale and Removal of Frame Building at No. 1 Havenwood Road, Borough of Richmond, Acquired for Silver Lake Reservoir.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—A request has been received from the Board of Water Supply for the sale and removal of the 2 1/2-story frame building No. 61 Havenwood Road, Brighton Heights, Borough of Richmond, shown as Parcel No. 203 on the map of the property acquired for the Silver Lake Reservoir, as this house is no longer needed.

I therefore request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by section 1553 of the Revised Charter, adopt a resolution authorizing the sale of the said buildings, and such a resolution is herewith transmitted. The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Sale and Removal of Frame Buildings Located Between West 78th and West 81st Street, North River, and at Sherman's Creek, Harlem River.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

April 24, 1915

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—A request has been received from the Commissioner of Docks for the sale and removal of several frame structures located between West 78th Street and West 81st Street, North River, and at Sherman's Creek, Harlem River, in the Borough of Manhattan, as these buildings are no longer required for the use of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

I therefore request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by section 1553 of the Revised Charter, adopt a resolution authorizing the sale of the said buildings, and such a resolution is herewith transmitted. Yours respectfully, ALEX. BROUGH, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Docks has requested the sale of certain buildings hereinafter described, located in the Borough of Manhattan, acquired for dock purposes.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, hereby authorize and order the sale at public auction or by sealed bids, at the highest marketable price, of the frame buildings located between West 78th Street and West 81st Street, North River, and at Sherman's Creek, Harlem River, in the Borough of Manhattan, which are more particularly described on a certain map on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 368, Municipal Building, Borough of Manhattan, upon the terms and conditions for the sale of buildings, etc., as authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held October 4, 1910.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

City Magistrates' Court—Lease for, of Premises Known as No. 1128 St. Nicholas Avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

The President of the Board of Aldermen brought up the matter of the lease of premises known as No. 1128 St. Nicholas Avenue, Borough of Manhattan, authorized at the last meeting, at which he was not present, and explained that Mr. John Whalen, the owner of the property at 154th Street and Amsterdam Avenue, a lease of which was under consideration, had employed an architect to prepare a sketch of plans of the building which he proposed to erect, and that there was an understanding that no action would be taken until the sketches had been received and considered. For this reason the President stated that he believed that some further consideration should be given to the matter and suggested that the action taken at the last meeting be reconsidered in order that Mr. Whalen's plans might be presented and considered before any final action is taken.

Mr. Louis Graves, of President McAneny's office, informed the Board that he had received word from Mr. Whalen to the effect that he did not wish the matter to be reconsidered.

In view of this, no further action was taken.

Dock Department—Amendment to the New Plan at Fresh Creek Basin, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn.

Brought up by unanimous consent.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks transmitting for approval proposed amendment to the new plan for improvement of the waterfront and harbor of The City of New York, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks No-

ember 21, 1911, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund January 31, 1912, at Fresh Creek Basin, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law April 28, 1915.

A public hearing being necessary, the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11.10 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, May 19, 1915, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the proposed amendment to the new plan for improving the waterfront and harbor of the City of New York, as adopted by the Commissioner of Docks November 21, 1911, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund January 31, 1912, at Fresh Creek Basin, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, in accordance with law, April 28, 1915, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

Dock Department—New Plan Between Mill Basin and Fresh Creek Basin, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn.

Brought up by unanimous consent.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks transmitting for approval proposed new plan for improvement of the waterfront and harbor of the City of New York between Mill Basin and Fresh Creek Basin, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn.

A public hearing being necessary, the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11-15 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, May 19, 1915, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the proposed new plan for improving the waterfront and harbor of the City of New York, between Mill Basin and Fresh Creek Basin, Jamaica Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks, in accordance with law, April 28, 1915, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

Note—At this time his Honor the Mayor withdrew from the meeting. While the discussion in the following matter was going on, the Chamberlain also withdrew from the meeting. A quorum not being present, his Honor the Mayor returned and resumed his seat in the Board.

County Officials, Borough of The Bronx—Lease for, of space in a Building to Be Erected Adjacent to the Present Bergen Building, Located at Tremont and Arthur Avenues, Borough of The Bronx.

This matter was on the calendar of the last meeting and laid over in order that Dr. J. J. McLoughlin, on behalf of J. Clarence Davies and Mrs. Agnes K. Murphy Mulligan, might have an opportunity to submit alternative propositions.

Propositions were received from both Mr. Davies and Mrs. Mulligan, which were considered.

A proposition was also submitted by Dr. McLoughlin from Mr. A. G. Hupfel, Jr., of A. Hupfel's Sons' Brewery, for a building to be erected at the southwest corner of St. Anns Avenue and 161st Street, Bronx.

Dr. McLoughlin and Mrs. Mulligan were both heard in connection with the propositions submitted by them.

Discussion followed.

It being the sense of the Board that the interests of the City would be best served by authorizing a lease of the building proposed to be erected by Mr. Wm. C. Bergen, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions:

April 19th, 1915.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On November 5, 1913, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 548 of the Laws of 1912, designated the following space in the building known as the Bronx Court House, located at 161st Street and Third Avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, for use of the officials hereinafter mentioned from January 1, 1914:

Ground Floor—Sheriff, 3,012 square feet.

First Floor—County Judge, 3,697 square feet, and District Attorney, 1,388 square feet.

Second Floor—Surrogate, 3,697 square feet, and County Clerk, 2,196 square feet.

Third Floor—Supreme Court, 3,697 square feet, and Register, 2,196 square feet.

This resolution was adopted at that time, as it was necessary to provide for these offices by January 1, 1914. Since then, however, the different officials have stated that more room was required for their offices, and a suggestion was made to lease an extension to be erected to the present Bergen Building, located at Tremont and Arthur Avenues, Borough of The Bronx.

This proposition was met with various objections, and a petition was received by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund from J. Guday and other citizens and taxpayers of the Borough of The Bronx suggesting the establishment of a civic center in the vicinity of Tremont and Third Avenues, near the present Bronx Borough Building, as a solution to the present lack of space and want of suitable offices and court rooms, and that provisions be made for either rental of quarters or the erection of a building at said civic center to provide quarters for the Supreme Court, County Court, Surrogate's Court, District Attorney's office and all County offices.

After a hearing thereon, the question was referred, on motion of the Chamberlain, to a Committee consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen. This Committee held a public hearing on March 31, 1915, in the Aldermanic Chamber, to which all of the parties interested were requested to attend. After much discussion it was conceded by all those attending that there was immediate necessity for providing additional space, so the only question remaining was the location. Arguments were presented in favor of locating the various County offices in the vicinity of the present Court House, and suggestions were made regarding properties that could be leased for such purposes.

Your Committee visited all of these premises on April 10, 1915, and decided that the same were unsuitable. In the course of their visit they inspected the jail in the Court House, and found that, although 103 prisoners were detained therein, there was only sufficient accommodation for 80, and it was decided that it would be necessary to provide for at least 60 additional cells for the future, which would take care of 120 more prisoners. The present jail could still be used to take care of prisoners remanded by the Supreme Court and the Magistrates' Court.

The owner of the Bergen Building has agreed to erect a five-story fireproof building, adjoining and adjacent to the present Bergen Building, in which are now housed the following City and County offices:

It is proposed to cancel the lease of the present Bergen Building so far as it concerns the Coroners, Commissioner of Jurors and Sheriff. This will involve no additional expense to the City, as the rental per square foot in the building to be erected is the same as that now occupied by them, and the above mentioned offices will be housed in the new building. In addition thereto, the space provided for the Coroners' Court, consisting of 4,309 square feet in the rear of the fifth floor in this building, can also be used by the Court of Special Sessions.

The space vacated by the County Clerk and Surrogate in Bronx County Court House can be utilized as a court room for the additional parts of the Supreme Court,

and the space now occupied by the District Attorney can be assigned to the County Clerk.

We are therefore of the opinion that the most advantageous proposition submitted to the City is that of Mr. Bergen's to construct an addition to the present Bergen Building, now occupied by different City and County offices, at Arthur and Tremont Avenues, Borough of The Bronx, inasmuch as it will consolidate all of the municipal and county offices in one locality.

The new building will be similar in design and architecture to the present Bergen Building, and the lessor will erect all partitions necessary and construct judges' benches, railings, etc.

We therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a lease from William C. Bergen, of 2,065 square feet in the front of the first floor for use of the Sheriff, 3,900 square feet in the rear of the first floor to be used as a jail, 1,040 square feet in the front of the second floor for the use of the District Attorney as a grand jury room, 1,660 square feet in the front of the second floor for the use of the County Clerk, 4,300 square feet in the rear of the second floor for use of the County Court, the entire third floor, containing 7,000 square feet for use of the District Attorney, the entire fourth floor, containing 7,000 square feet, for use of the Surrogate; 4,300 square feet in the rear of the fifth floor for use of the Coroner and the Court of Special Sessions, and 2,700 square feet in the front of the fifth floor for use of the Commissioner of Jurors, containing in all 33,965 square feet of space, in the modern fireproof building to be constructed by William C. Bergen adjacent and adjoining to the present building known as the Bergen Building located on the southeasterly corner of Tremont and Arthur Avenues, Borough of the Bronx, more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of Arthur Avenue, distant 134.27 feet southerly from the intersection of the easterly side of Arthur Avenue and East 177th Street; running thence easterly and parallel with East 177th Street 61.57 feet; thence northerly at right angles to East 177th Street 35 feet; thence again easterly and parallel with East 177th Street 85.22 feet; thence southerly at right angles to East 177th Street 100 feet; thence westerly and parallel to East 177th Street 139.50 feet to the easterly side of Arthur Avenue, and running thence northerly along the easterly side of Arthur Avenue 65.59 feet to the point or place of beginning.

—for a period of ten years from October 1, 1915, or as soon thereafter as the building is ready for occupancy; the rental to be at the rate of 75 cents per square foot per annum, with the exception of that portion of the first floor which is to be used as a jail, containing 3,900 square feet, the rental of which will be at the rate of \$1.47 per square foot per annum; the lease to contain a privilege of renewal for an additional term of ten years under the same terms and conditions, excepting so far as it relates to the 3,900 square feet of space in the rear of the first floor to be used as a jail, which, in the event of a renewal, shall be at the rate of \$1.25 per square foot per annum; the lease to contain a clause providing for the cancellation of the present lease with William C. Bergen, in so far as it affects the premises now occupied by the Coroner, Commissioner of Jurors and Sheriff in the present Bergen Building, located at the southeasterly corner of Tremont and Arthur Avenues, Borough of The Bronx, such cancellation not to take effect, however, until the above mentioned officers have taken possession of the space to be leased for them in the building to be erected; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, except the water used in the jail, which is to be furnished by the lessee, make inside and outside alterations and repairs, and furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service, and to construct in the rear of the first floor sixty (60) cells of the same design and construction as the cells now contained in The Bronx County Court House, and to equip a kitchen and also to furnish and erect all partitions, railings, etc., required by the different Departments, and in addition thereto to construct Judges' benches, railings and partitions where required. The lease to contain a clause whereby upon the expiration of the original term thereof, the City may at its option, purchase the cells above mentioned for the sum of \$11,670. In the event of a renewal of this lease upon the expiration of such renewal, the cells shall become the property of The City of New York without payment therefor. The lease not to be executed until the plans and specifications of the building have been approved by the Comptroller; and that a further resolution be adopted assigning to the County Clerk the space now occupied by the District Attorney in the Bronx County Court House, and to the Supreme Court the space now occupied by the Surrogate and County Court in the Bronx County Court House, such assignments not to take effect however, until the District Attorney, Surrogate and County Court have taken possession of the premises to be leased for them in the building to be erected adjacent to the present Bergen Building. Bergen in so far as it affects the premises now occupied by the Coroner, Commissioner of Jurors and Sheriff in the present Bergen Building, located at the southeasterly corner of Tremont and Arthur Avenues, Borough of The Bronx, such cancellation not to take effect, however, until the above-mentioned officers have taken possession of the space to be leased for them in the building to be erected; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, except the water used in the jail which is to be furnished by the lessee, make inside and outside alterations and repairs, and furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service, and to construct in the rear of the first floor sixty (60) cells of the same design and construction as the cells now contained in The Bronx County Court House; and to equip a kitchen and laundry in connection therewith; also to furnish and erect all partitions, railings, etc., required by the different departments, and, in addition thereto, to construct judges' benches, railings and partitions where required; the lease to contain a clause whereby, upon the expiration of the original term thereof, the City may at its option purchase the cells above mentioned for the sum of \$11,670. In the event of a renewal of this lease, upon the expiration of such renewal, the cells shall become the property of The City of New York without any payment therefor; the lease not to be executed

until the plans and specifications of the building have been approved by the Comptroller.
—and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by Sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign to the County Clerk, Bronx County, the space now occupied by the District Attorney in the Bronx County Court House, and to the Supreme Court the space now occupied by the Surrogate and County Court in the Bronx County Court House,
—such assignments not to take effect, however, until the District Attorney, Surrogate and County Court have taken possession of the premises to be leased for them in the building to be erected adjacent to the present Bergen Building in the Borough of The Bronx.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

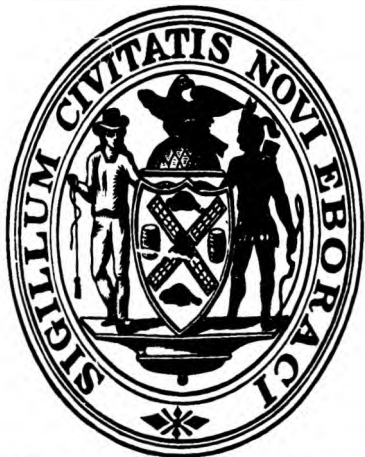
Claims for Damages Under Special Statutes.

During the past quarter the Board has taken testimony and make awards for damages caused by changes of grade of streets under Special Statutes, as follows: Chapter 207 of the Laws of 1890, one award of \$10,000; for damages to property occasioned by a change in the grade of streets by reason of the location and construction of the Harlem River Bridge at Seventh Avenue, Manhattan, and Jerome Avenue, The Bronx; chapter 423 of the Laws of 1903, as amended by chapter 634 of the Laws of 1905, one award of \$15,000; for damages to property occasioned by a change in the grade of Fordham Road by reason of the elimination of grade crossing over the New York Central Railroad.

Claims for Damages Under the Charter.

During the past quarter, under section 951 of the Charter, as amended, 160 claims, aggregating \$165,575 88, in 20 proceedings, were filed. The Board made and transmitted 122 awards, in 15 proceedings, the awards aggregating \$80,458, which amount was added to the cost of the work and apportioned among the several assessment lists affected.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in

the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, protecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
