

For the half month, from the time the Department was organized (June 16) to June 30, there were swept and cleaned three hundred and fifty-six (356) miles of streets and thirty-two thousand five hundred and two (32,502) loads of ashes, and garbage, and twenty-three thousand five hundred and thirty-nine (23,539) loads of street sweepings were gathered and removed. There were also received from private carts fifteen hundred and ninety-one (1,591) loads of ashes; from the market carts, lour hundred and thirty-six (436) loads of garbage and sweepings, and from the Department of Public Works, four hundred and eight (408) loads of refuse—making the total number of loads for June, 58,476.
