

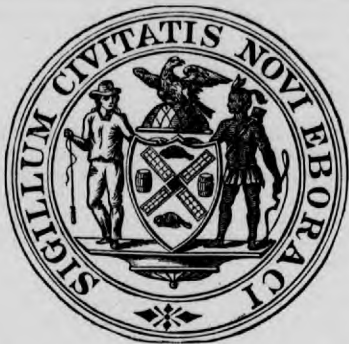

HOMOEOPATHIC HOSPITAL.

Labor Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1878.

Have fitted up new room with shelves, water, gas, etc., for laboratory. Made 4 large double wardrobes, 1 large closet, 1 drip-box, 1 rack, 18 frames for ward pictures, 1 key-rack, 1 ice-box, 2 tables, 6 drop shelves, 2 slat doors, 3 clothes-racks, 5 towel-racks, 2 trays; also new floor in purifying room, gas-house.

Have repaired 27 windows, 2 water-closets, 5 doors, 1 bureau, 1 sofa, 3 washstands, 6 benches, 1 ice-box (new bottom), 22 stools, 28 chairs, 3 tables, 9 bed-rests, 20 cords in windows, 30 lights glass put in; also floor on 2 halls partly laid.

Painted 3 bath-rooms, 3 closets, 12 bedsteads, 4 wardrobes, 15 windows, 5 pairs blinds, and iron railings around 6 stoops.

Kitchen thoroughly painted and new vapor pipe put in for boilers.

Kalsomined 16 rooms and whitewashed cellar.

In gas-house 516,000 feet gas was manufactured for use of Insane Asylum and this Hospital.

HART'S ISLAND HOSPITAL.

Hon. TOWNSEND COX,

President Public Charities and Correction, City:

SIR—I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Board the quarterly improvement and labor report for this institution ending June 30, 1878.

Carpenters—Made 9 doors, 14 coffins, 2 rooms for nurses, 2 washstands, 2 tables, 1 screen 16 feet long. Repaired—stoops, roofs, bed springs, and various flooring. Raised—3 pavilions and office building.

Coopers—Made 1 bath-tub, 2 water tanks.

Tinsmiths—Roofing Pavilion "A," covering a surface of 4,600 square feet.

Painters—Painted Resident and Assistant Physician's rooms, blinds, chairs, wash-tubs, card racks, stoops, doors, dust-pans, bedsteads. Tarring roofs of pavilions and water casks.

Farming and Gardening—Manured, ploughed, and harrowed 3 acres of land. Planted—evergreens and tomato plants. Sowed—onions, peas, beans, cucumbers, melons, oyster plant, parsley, sorrel, radishes, salsify and garlic. Made—parterre with sods and grass seeds. Grass-plots, roads, and grounds, kept in good order.

Sewing—Made 327 articles, repaired 1,025 articles. Knitted—52 pairs stockings, 35 pairs socks.

SIR—I respectfully inclose report of the operations of the Almshouse for the quarter ending June 30, 1878.

Carpenters—Making 97 adults' coffins, bodies and wheels for 6 carts, new one-horse truck, 4 commodes, 2 medicine stands, gang plank for steamer, new work boards, tailors' shop, 2 tables, bread board, washstand, 2 trays, urinal for blind, 5 spittoons, wooden leg, 4 boiler sticks; 44 days' work of wheelwrights on carts, wagons, drays, etc.; 278 days' work of carpenters on new water closet and wash rooms, repairing fences, buildings, etc.; 18 days' work of carpenters on Maternity Hospital, and 16 days at Central Office. Bottoming and repairing 86 chairs, handling masons hammer, 2 whitewash brushes; altering 4 doors to open out; repairing 8 chairs, 4 stools, 7 spring beds, 11 wash boards, door and closet; putting in 48 sash cords, blocks on 20 scrubs.

Blacksmiths—Putting on 299 horseshoes, ironing hand truck, making 15 fan-light openers, 4 bolts 29 feet 6 inches long, 8 plates, 3 pairs gate hinges, hooks, plates, and bolts, 113 leader hooks, 83 large pipe hooks, 100 staples, 12 tub handles, 50 bracelet fastenings, plumbers knife, fastenings for two man-holes, 3 box wrenches, 2 pairs strap hinges, new reamer and crank for steam pump, 205 handles and 410 ears for pails, 14 holdfasts and 4 brackets for shelving, new boiler covers for cook house, 21 pipe hooks, 3 large plates for cellar doors, 2 bolts and straps for engine room, 6 anchor irons, retort rake, fire hoe, 2 plates for hatchway, hinges and bolts for gangway, 5 braces, 5 plates, 4 oven shovels, dough scraper, 2 staples and hook, 2 bolts and nuts for awning, 12 S. hooks, irons for rack, stepladder and rung, 14 chair bolts, 25 brackets, 3 staples, 2 braces, 10 hooks, plate, 12 spikes, 12 angle irons, 52 bolts and nuts, 18 pail handles, 12 ears for tubs, skimmer, poker and door latch; putting in new set of knives and turning rawhide roller of hay cutter; repairing irons of carts, wagons, drays, etc.; irons of 25 bread barrels, fire irons of Gas-house and Lunatic Asylum, Blackwell's Island, 8 sets window bars, window railing, wire netting, 7 pairs shackles, 2 pairs pipe tongs, 10 chisels, reamer, piston rings of pump, 4 scaling hammers, 7 hand-trucks, sewing machine, mowing machine, plough, hay-cutter, 4 pairs ice tongs, ice pick, 11 pairs hames, 1 saddle, 24 locks, 21 iron bedsteads, 2 cellar gratings, hand rail, stove guard, 2 steamboat chains; sharpening 9 pairs cutter's shears, 18 pairs scissors; cleaning and repairing 9 clocks.

Tinsmiths—Making 100 dust-pans, 250 pint cups, 250 tin dippers, 188 wash basins, 114 baking pans, 4 two-gallon dippers, 2 one-quart dippers, 12 feet 4 1/2 inch stove-pipe, 7 feet 5 inch leader, 2 five-gallon boilers, 2 ventilators, 2 coffee pots. Repairing 195 pieces of tinware.

Coopers—Making 150 new pails, 50 washing kidds, 5 new bread barrels, 1 tub. Coopering 3,930 flour barrels, 791 barrels. Repairing 53 bread barrels, 75 pails, 8 tubs.

Painters—Painting 16 wards, male wing, east and west gate-house, boat-house, foreman's house, water closet, fence. Glazing where necessary.

Plasterers—Patching ceilings in 15 wards.

Shoemakers—Making 6 pairs new and repairing 487 pairs old shoes.

Tailors—Making 112 summer jackets, 222 pairs summer pants, 2 suits of clothes. Repairing 574 winter jackets, 885 pairs winter pants, 57 vests, 27 summer jackets, 50 pairs summer pants.

Sewing Room—Making 100 women's dresses, 150 petticoats, 200 chemises, 300 hoods, 100 night-gowns, 138 aprons, 100 men's shirts, 300 sheets, 150 pillow-cases, 216 roller towels, 447 hand towels, 100 adult shrouds, 50 shroud caps, 4 table cloths, 1 bed tick, knitting 672 pairs men's socks. Repairing 604 dresses, 382 petticoats, 440 chemises, 1,118 shirts, 778 sheets, 60 pillow-cases, 47 blankets, 352 bed ticks, 20 spreads, 1,335 pairs socks, 479 undershirts.

Wash House—88,160 pieces of clothing.

The average number of males employed as clerks, orderlies, mechanics, etc., was 318, and of females, as nurses, laundresses, seamstresses, etc., was 210.



## LUNATIC ASYLUM, B. I.

**Engineer**—Disconnected hot and cold water tanks in halls 4 and 8, also reconnected same tanks after alterations in these halls. Put in gas-pipes in new halls and extensions. Kept in repair bath-tubs, water closets, gas and water pipes, stoves, etc., etc.

**Painter**—Painting bedsteads, dressing tables, nurses' rooms lodge, hearths in cook-house, also tubs same place, two rooms middle house, gate house, pavilions, Dr. Franklin's rooms, and new halls main building, glazing new library book-case, lights in amusement hall, middle house, church, engine room, Dr. Franklin's rooms, matron's kitchen, retreat, two halls, 1 and 7, pavilions A, B, C, F, H, etc.

**Carpenter**—Raising pavilion H, putting up bath house, closets, wash house, new lamp closet, new fence at lodge, making picture frames, wardrobes, wash-stands, bread closets, coffins, etc. Repairing at cottage, Dr. Franklin's rooms, cook-house, doctor's rooms, lodge 2 and 6, retreat 1, 2 and 3, halls 1, 2, 3, 5, 6 and 7, and at pavilions C, D, F, H, K, also repairs lodge and retreat yard, repairing bureaus, benches, chairs, settees, etc., etc.

**Knitting**—Making for store-house, 720 pairs men's knitted socks, 60 pairs of women's knitted stockings. Total, 780 pairs.

NEW YORK CITY ASYLUM FOR THE INSANE, }  
WARD'S ISLAND, July 2, 1878. }

Hon. TOWNSEND COX, President, etc.:

SIR—I have the honor to report amount of labor performed in this Institution for the quarter ending June 30, 1878:

**Out-door Improvement**—Unloading and carting coal for both Institutions; digging, carting and loading sand barge for Blackwell's Island; unloading, carting and storing ice; filling up excavations, repairing roads and walks, ploughing, preparing ground for crops, planting, digging for reservoir pipe, mowing, housing and stacking hay, gathering, barrelling and shipping vegetables to Blackwell's Island; completing new pipe sewer at Annex; filling, regulating and grading about new fence on east side of building.

**Carpenter's Department**—Building new fence east side, renovating wards, making 6 tables, 8 coffins, 1 desk for telegraph instrument, repairing 3 tables, 7 wheelbarrows, 38 benches, 9 carts, 173 windows, 64 doors, 19 bath tubs, 14 water closets, putting in 473 panes of glass, white washing, plastering, painting, taking off, repairing and putting on locks, and general repairs throughout building.

**Blacksmith and Engineer**—Making 17 drills, 15 staples, 15 hasps, 3 hoes, 6 slice bars, 5 rakes, 26 hoops for pails, 28 braces, 41 window bars; repairing 2 pairs tongs, 16 bath tubs, 11 carts, 3 wagons, 1,300 drills (dressed), 31 bedsteads, 27 steam tables, 21 water closets, 20 urinals; putting 122 shoes on horses, overhauling steam and gas pipes, and general repairs throughout building.

**Sewing-room**—Repairing 4,926 cotton, and 2,717 woolen articles.

CITY PRISON, New York, July 1, 1878.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at City Prison from April 1 to June 30, 1878, by prison labor, and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of material.

Resetting stone-work for railing around City Prison, 339 feet long.

Painting iron railing around City Prison, 949 feet long.

Plastered ceiling, Male Prison, 145 feet long by 28 feet wide, and painted the same, three coats white paint.

Reset flagging in prison yard, 84 feet long by 8 feet wide.

Enlarged the entrance to prison yard from office, and painted it.

Painted walls and wood-work of four tiers, Male Prison, each 315 feet long by 11 feet high.

Covered with boards the brick-work in Ten-Day House, 132 feet long by 20 inches wide.

Built a bath-room in same, and placed a bath-tub, wash-basin, etc., in it.

Resetting Russ pavement in prison yard, 104 feet long by 28 feet wide.

Covered with boards the brick-work in 74 cells (on second and third tiers), each 4½ feet long by 20 inches wide.

Plastered 101 cells (first, second, and third tiers), each 11 feet high, 11 feet deep, and 5½ feet wide.

Built a fence at Boys' Prison, 18 feet long by 9 feet high.

Painted 5 windows (on Centre street), each 10 feet high by 6 feet wide.

**Fifth District Prison**—Ventilated soil-pipe with 84 feet tin pipe, 6 bands, 18 pounds lead, etc.

NEW YORK PENITENTIARY, BLACKWELL'S ISLAND, July 5, 1878.

Hon. TOWNSEND COX, President, Department of Public Charities and Correction:

SIR—Annexed, I beg to submit to your Honorable Board my reports for the quarter ending June 30, 1878; the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the results accomplished by such labor during the quarter.

**Blacksmiths' and Tinsmiths' Shops**—Made 13 new and repaired and altered 130 iron bedsteads; made 174 plugs, 221 feathers, 119 hand-drills, 78 points, 38 chisels, 4 pinch-bars, 4 wedges, 2 sledge-hammers, 1 striking hammer, 6 stone-hammers, 2 bevel-clamps, 250 spikes, 12 hasps, 24 staples, 49 strap-hinges, 6 keys, for Fourth District Court-House, 2 locks, 2 iron doors and frames for Jefferson Market Prison, 2 large gate-hinges, 2 pairs shears, 1 spade, 6 carving-knives, 20 tires, 62 hub-bands, 50 bucket-handles, 97 bucket-straps, 91 bucket-ears, 74 tub-handles, 48 spindles, 24 spindle eyes, 232 rivets, 6 cross-plates, 58 handles, 92 iron leader-brackets, 3 flights of stairs, 3 platform-frames, 3 iron hand-railings for Ward's Island Insane Asylum, 1 grating for cess-pool, weight 185 pounds. Repaired—Broom sewing and corn cutting machines, also steam-launch, ferry and guard-boats, and boat-houses.

**Repairs on Wagons, Ambulances, Carts, etc.**—Ambulances Nos. 8 and 10, dead wagon, van No. 3 repaired; also tires, bolts, clips, shafts, nuts, rivets, axle arms made, repaired, and reset; new poles, cross-bars, braces, etc., etc.; 6 new carts, and repairs on carts and wagons.

**Tinsmiths**—1,100 new tin mess pans, 795 water cups, 200 saucers, 302 basins, 106 dinner kettles—6 to 15 gallons, 7 10-gallon boilers, 36 irrigators, 24 pails, 12 refuse boxes, 5 cans, 12 traps, 4 coffee strainers, 472 feet galvanized iron gutter for Maternity Hospital, 110 feet leader for Homoeopathic Hospital, 132 square feet of roof for Warden's house, 18 galvanized ventilators, 18 tubes, 17 registers, 108 lengths—295 feet iron stove pipe for registers, 18 tubes for ventilators—30 inches high, 210 feet iron ridging, all for Hart's Island new Pavilion; all necessary repairs to cell doors, locks, keys, and all iron work around the Prison have been made, and all tinware and utensils kept in proper order for use; all tools used on the island have been repaired and sharpened, and many repairs have been done for steamboats.

**At the Carpenters' and Painters' Shop**—634 coffins, 89 pulley frames, 12 strips, 6 table tops, 20 table rails, 22 braces, 99 door frames, 55 linings for door frames for Insane Asylum, Ward's Island, 2 refrigerators for Maternity Hospital, 1 clothes press and table for Ward's Island, 52 pine step planks for Lunatic Asylum, Blackwell's Island, 36 head racks for Charity Hospital, 175 stone breakers' handles, 274 cutters' handles, 48 axes, 10 shears, 44 straight edges, 50 window and 25 cot sticks, 10 mallets, 975 bed blocks, 115 new buckets, 18 tubs, 10 barrels, 8 dark cell boards, 37 wheelbarrows, 20 whitewash brush handles, 12 dozen brush tops, 103 jambs for doors, 123 window frames for Insane Asylum, Ward's Island, 1 large table, 6 small tables, 8 bedsteads made and painted for Maternity Hospital, ambulances, wagons, vans, buggies, carts repaired and painted; also boats, chairs, bedsteads, wheelbarrows, window-blinds, buckets, tubs, and barrels repaired and painted; all needful repairs and alterations, varnishing, etc., throughout the Prison, and adjacent buildings; also all necessary glazing attended to.

**At Tailors' and Coat Makers' Shops**—There have been made 177 woolen jackets, 49 pairs woolen pants, 30 woolen vests, 78 new coats, and 4 awnings for guard boats, and repaired 821 woolen jackets, 2,351 pairs of pants, 991 vests, 5 caps, 56 coats.

**The Broom and Brush Makers** have made 176 dozen brooms, 323 dozen scrubs, 2 dozen whitewash brushes, 79 rope mats.

**At the Shoemakers' Shop** have been made 1,369 pairs men's shoes, 1,250 pairs women's shoes, 29 pairs women's slippers, 140 pairs boys' shoes, 60 pairs girls' shoes. And repaired 929 pairs men's shoes, 61 pairs women's shoes.

**At the Sewing-room** female prisoners have made 100 women's skirts, 316 pairs socks, 729 pairs men's pants, 354 men's shirts, 1,607 pairs shoes bound, 2 bed ticks, 2 carpets, 50 towels bound, 50 suits of infants' clothes. And repaired 3,340 men's shirts, 204 skirts, 799 pairs socks, 200 women's dresses, 501 chemises, 384 pairs of stockings, 45 bed ticks, 546 pillow ticks, 32 sheets, 15 spreads, 14 towels.

**There has been cut and dressed at the Stone Shed** 3,097 feet 4 inches building stone, 56 window jambs for Lunatic Asylum; 201 feet 3 inches to 45 feet of fine axed window jambs, lintels, light holes, hearth stones, bases, newel caps, rail; 236 building stone bedded and jointed, different sizes; jambs, spandrels and keystone for mantel Charity Hospital, also base courses, newel bases, and water tables. By the prisoners employed at out-door labor 5,000 cubic feet of sea wall has been built, and the stone quarried and cut for same at Randall's Island, 30 barges of dirt discharged at the north end of the island and the same graded. The sea wall around Blackwell's Island repaired and strengthened. All the stone used has been quarried by the prisoners.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 836.

SIR—I have the honor to submit herewith the Male and Female Labor Reports of this institution for the quarter ending June 30, 1878:

There have been 28,157 days' labor performed by the male inmates, as follows, viz.:

A daily average of 33 on steamboats; 50 at bakery; 18 at stables; 16 at storehouse; 10 at Alms House shops; 13 in engine room and gas-house; 16 in kitchen; 24 in garden gang; 2 at harness making; 2 at upholstering; 2 in barber shop; 2 in paint shop; 40 in hall at whitewashing, scrubbing, as messengers, etc., and 5 mechanics and 75 laborers at work on repairs and alterations to Lunatic Asylum.

16 shoemakers have made 14 pairs shoes and 396 pairs slippers, and repaired 1,537 pairs shoes. 6 tailors have made 1,436 pairs pants, 775 jackets, 2 jumpers, 2 pairs overalls, 24 restraining suits, and 7 men's suits.

1 weaver, employed 36 days, made 144 yards rag carpet.

The female inmates have performed 21,584 days' labor, with the following result, viz.: with a daily average of 123 at work in sewing room there has been made 10,713 new garments, 625 pairs men's socks knit, 191 pairs slippers bound, and 4,035 articles repaired.

There have been 46 employed daily in laundry at washing and ironing, and an average of 9,000 pieces have been turned out weekly.

12 female help were detailed each day on steamboats as cooks and scrubbers, and there has been a daily average of 83 employed in female hall as scrubbers, whitewashers, doorkeepers, waiters in dining rooms, messengers, etc.

SIR—I have the honor to submit herewith a statement of the workings of Branch Work-house, Branch Lunatic Asylum and City Cemetery for the quarter ending June 30, 1878:

The average number of male help at Branch Work-house for the quarter has been 108, of which 52 have been working in the various gangs in charge of five keepers, and 56 were employed variously, i. e., in bakery, kitchen, shoemakers', tailors', carpenters', blacksmiths', and painters' shops, etc.

Subjoined will be found a detailed statement of the work performed by mechanics, etc.:

**Carpenters**—Erected hog-pen, placed battens on tool-house, iron window gratings on Dormitory No. 1, sill-plates on kitchen, made 2 tables, 2 head-boards, 32 tree-stays, 1 stand for solder-pot; handles in 11 stone-hammers, 3 sledge-hammers, 2 ice-picks, 6 screw-drivers, 1 mallet; dressed 11 fence-stakes; repaired 55 window-blinds, 13 wheelbarrows, 2 cart-boxes, 1 cell-door; flooring in bakery and stable, hooks on windows in stable; filed 3 buck-saws, 1 cross-cut saw.

**Tinsmiths**—Folded 800 sheets of tin; repaired 22 tin-boilers, 38 coffee-kettles, 10 coffee-cans, 18 wash-basins, 60 tin cups, 2 coal-sieves, 6 dust-pans, 16 water-pails, 2 meat-boxes, 1 refrigerator, 2 tin roofs.

**Blacksmiths**—Made 3 window-guards, 4 ventilator gratings, 2 sewer-gratings, 3 key-tags, 2 pairs compasses, 1 brace, 7 chain-links, 4 hook-links, 4 ring-links, 10 hinges, 10 gudgeon-pots, 10 nuts, 10 staples, 5 hooks and hasps, 4 strap-hoops, 40 shackle-rivets, 6 screw-drivers, 1 bridle-iron, 1 mandrel, 1 tinsmith-furnace, 1 flat-hammer, 1 hand-hammer, 6 bolt-plates, 4 bolts, 1 pair pliers, 1 pair tongs, 2 door-buttons, 148 feathers, 77 wedges, 16 drills, 6 picks, 212 hooks (various), 104 staples, 2 fire-guards for stoves for Branch Lunatic Asylum; repaired 13 masons' hammers, 25 picks, 24 crowbars, 1 stone-boat, 8 bedsteads, 5 pumps, 9 tin-boilers, 6 coffee-kettles, 3 cauldron-grates, 2 cauldron-doors, 2 cauldron bars, 1 lawn-mower, 1 ox-cart and yoke, 1 coffee-mill, 37 shovels, 2 pairs pipe-tongs, 7 wheelbarrows, 2 ploughs, 1 buggy, dressed and steeled 1,300 points and chisels, 285 drills, 22 picks, 32 plugs.

**Blacksmiths**—Repaired 2 pitching tools, 2 crowbars, 10 knives, 3 hatchets, 9 pairs scissors, shod 7 horses. Made for New Pavilions 156 iron spikes, 28 straps, 4 brackets, 4 rings, 4 hangers, 1 grooving tool repaired, 1 sand sieve, 1 grind stone frame, straightened 112 spikes.

**Painters**—Painted office building, bakery, receiving vault, City Cemetery, pump-house, doors, chimneys, skylight, gratings, window sashes of Dormitory No. 1, 24 bedsteads, 12 clothes posts, 52 window blinds, 3 tin signs, 3 chains, 6 head boards. Tared 8 water tubs, 17 water casks, roof of Dock building, Dormitory No. 2, gasoline-house, receiving vault. Whitewashed stable, hog pen and Dormitory No. 2. Varnished 1 table, glazed 44 lights glass.

**Farm**—Put ground in order and sowed 2 quarts O'Rourke peas, 2 quarts alpha peas, 1 pound beets, 4 pounds onions, 1¼ pounds spinach, 6 ounces radish, 2 ounces celery, 2 ounces parsley, 2 ounces tomato, 4 ounces leek, 4 quarts sweet corn, 2 bushels field corn, 2 quarts lima beans, 8 pounds carrot, 4 pounds parsnip, 11 ounces cabbage, 1 quart string beans, 20 bushels potatoes, 2 ounces lettuce, 1 ounce musk, and 1 ounce watermelon seeds. Taken out of the ground up to date, 36 bushels spinach, 80 bushels shallots, 10 bushels radish, 12 bushels beets, 10 bushels onions, 5 bushels peas.

**Masons**—Laid 3,565 feet rubble masonry, cut 45 feet dressed stone, 10 stone steps, 1 platform step, 3 guard posts. Built 14 brick piers.

**Other work**—50 lineal feet roadway, 21 feet wide, made, 9 yards broken stone laid, 13 yards stone broken, planted 2 dozen elms, 2½ dozen maples, 1 dozen horse chestnuts, 1 dozen lindens, 1 dozen weeping willows, 1½ dozen Norway spruce evergreens, and collected 33 loads seaweed.

**Tailor Shop**—Repaired 799 jackets, and 963 pairs pants.

**Sewing Room**—Repaired 111 dresses, 106 chemises, 801 shirts, 519 undershirts, 730 pairs socks, 187 pairs stockings, 49 sheets.

By inmates of Branch Lunatic Asylum—**Made**—For Hart's Island Hospital, 50 dresses, 20 chemises, 50 shirts, 50 petticoats. For Manufactory Bureau, Blackwell's Island, 108 pairs stockings knitted, and for their own use 137 dresses, and 100 sheets, and repaired 214 dresses, 233 chemises, 143 pairs drawers, 13 bed gowns, 784 pairs stockings.
