## DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 2, 1893—SPECIAL MEETING, 11 A. M.

Pursuant to the following :

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, }

SIR—You will please issue notices for a meeting of the Board to be held Wednesday, 2d proximo, at eleven o'clock A. M., for the purpose of transacting miscellaneous business.

Present—Commissioners Tappen (President), Dana, Clausen.

Charles H. Luscomb, Esq., representing the League of American Wheelmen, was heard in relation to the regulations of the Department affecting bicycles and was informed that the legal rights of bicyclists would be respected.

The following communications were received :

From the Counsel to the Corporation, advising the Department of the confirmation, on the 17th ult., of the proceeding for acquiring title to Corlear's Hook Park. Filed.

From Luke F. Cozans, attorney for Adolph Horbecker, offering to pay rental for all the buildings, etc., included within the limits of Corlear's Park or to collect rentals from other tenants for the Department for a commission to be agreed upon. Filed.

Commissioner Tappen offered the following :

Whereas, This Department has been advised of the confirmation by the Supreme Court of the proceeding for acquiring property for Corlear's Hook Park, and that the title to the same is now vested in the City ; and

Whereas, There is no provision in the law creating said park by which an appropriation for its improvement and maintenance is authorized, and nothing can be done in the way of such improvement at this time ; therefore

Resolved, That the buildings, etc., now occupying the land embraced in said Corlear's Hook Park, being the properties on the blocks bounded by South, Cherry, Corlear's and Jackson streets, be turned over to the Comptroller, with the request that he will take such action as may by him be deemed necessary and proper to collect rentals and revenues therefrom, until such time as this Department may require the same for purposes of improvement as a public park.

Which were adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

From the Deputy Commissioner of Public Works, stating that Assistant Engineer Martin Gay, employed on the work of constructing the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street Viaduct, etc., will be paid at the rate of \$2,700 per annum, commencing August 1, 1893. Filed.

From the President of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, asking permission to erect a drinking fountain on the south side of the Cooper Union Park. Referred to the Landscape Architect and the Superintendent of Parks for report.

From Thomas J. Brown, licensee of the Central Park Carriage Service, in relation to injury to his business caused by the intrusion of hackmen at the Fifty-ninth street entrance to Central Park. Referred to the Captain of Police, with instructions to remedy the evil complained of.

From the Landscape Architect, reporting in relation to modifying the lines of Riverside avenue, as shown on accompanying drawings.

On motion of Commissioner Dana, the plans were referred back to the Landscape Architect for reconsideration and for the purpose of showing thereon the proposed viaduct.

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting the unsafe condition of the structure for lighting the plaza at the north end of Union Square.

On motion, the Superintendent was directed to place the structure in a safe condition at once, and to report what changes would be required to substitute electric light for gas.

From the Captain of Police, reporting in relation to the proposed use of bicycles by the park police. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, reporting upon an offer of James B. Smith to furnish a quantity of filling, free of charge, on Riverside Park.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, permission was given Mr. Smith to dump earth filling on Riverside Park, between Ninety-first and Ninety-third streets, the same to be graded as required without expense to the Department and subject to be discontinued at any time on notice from the Department.

From the Assistant Engineer in charge of the New Parks, reporting upon a communication from L. C. Bacon respecting the condition of the roads in Pelham Bay Park. Filed.

From the Surgeon of Police, respecting the physical condition of Officer James Mackey and recommending that an examination be ordered in his case, with a view to his retirement.

Commissioner Tappen offered the following :

Resolved, That the Police Surgeon be and is hereby directed to examine Officer James Mackey and report as to his physical condition, with a view to his retirement.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

From John D. Crimmins, recommending the employment of Frederick Wegner to exterminate moles and noxious animals in the parks.

On motion of Commissioner Dana, the employment of Frederick Wegner for three months, at a compensation of \$250 for that period, was authorized by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

Commissioner Dana offered the following :

Resolved, That the bill of S. F. Hayward &amp; Co., for repairs to fire extinguishers at the Arsenal and Police-Station, amounting to the sum of forty-five dollars, chargeable as follows, viz.: "Labor, Maintenance, etc.," 1892, ten dollars ; "Police—Supplies and Repairs," 1892, thirty-five dollars, be and the same is hereby audited and approved, and that the same be transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

Commissioner Tappen offered the following :

Whereas, M. J. Kane, to whom was awarded, on 28th June last, a contract to construct an outlet sewer connecting the sewer near Ninety-ninth street in Central Park with sewer in Fifth avenue at One Hundredth street, and who was duly notified thereof on the eleventh ultimo, has failed to execute said contract within the time specified and has thereby forfeited the amount of his security deposit ;

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to insert an advertisement in the CITY RECORD inviting new proposals for doing the work.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

Commissioner Tappen offered the following :

Resolved, That the map and technical description of the land required for the Sedgwick avenue and Ogden avenue approach to the new McComb's Dam Bridge be and the same hereby are approved and ordered forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval as required by the provisions of chapter 319 of the Laws of 1893, and when approved by said Board that the same be forwarded to the Counsel to the Corporation with the request that he initiate a proceeding for acquiring title to the lands shown and described on said map, and description, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

From the Counsel to the Corporation, advising the Department in relation to canceling the contract for erecting a tool-house and sheds in Central Park and submitting a form of general release.

Commissioner Dana offered the following :

Whereas, This Department entered into a contract with John E. McGuire, under date of December 28, 1892, for the erection of a tool-house and sheds in the Central Park ; and

Whereas, The said John E. McGuire departed this life on April 11, 1893, insolvent, and Agnes T. McGuire, sole executrix under his will, has applied for the cancellation of said contract and the bond given for the faithful performance of the same ; and

Whereas, No work has as yet been done or commenced under said contract ; and

Whereas, It is proposed to change the plan of the work covered by said contract, and funds providing for the additional cost which will be incurred by such change have been made available ; therefore,

Resolved, That this Board deems it for the best interest of the City that the said contract should be canceled, and that the President be and hereby is authorized to execute an instrument for the cancellation of said contract.

Which were adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

Commissioner Dana offered the following :

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to have an analytical index to the minutes of Board for the year ending April 30, 1893, prepared at an expense not to exceed \$75.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioner Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

From the Pelham Bay Park Electric Light, Power and Storage Company, renewing their application for permission to erect poles and wires in Pelham Bay Park.

Commissioner Dana offered the following :

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Pelham Bay Park Electric Light, Power and Storage Company to erect poles and wires in Pelham Bay Park, the poles to be used to be of ornamental design, to be approved by the Department and to be so placed as not to encumber the public highways, all the work to be done under this permission shall be without expense to the Department, and the privilege shall be revocable at any time upon notice to the said company.

Which was adopted by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, the pay of Assistant Foreman James McGuire and Skilled Laborer Ben. Hirsch, was fixed at \$80 per month each, to date from the 1st instant, by the following vote :

Ayes—Commissioners Tappen, Dana, Clausen—3.

On motion of Commissioner Tappen, the Engineer of Construction was directed to report as to the advisability and cost of laying one block of Turin pavement on Fifth avenue, north of Ninetieth street.

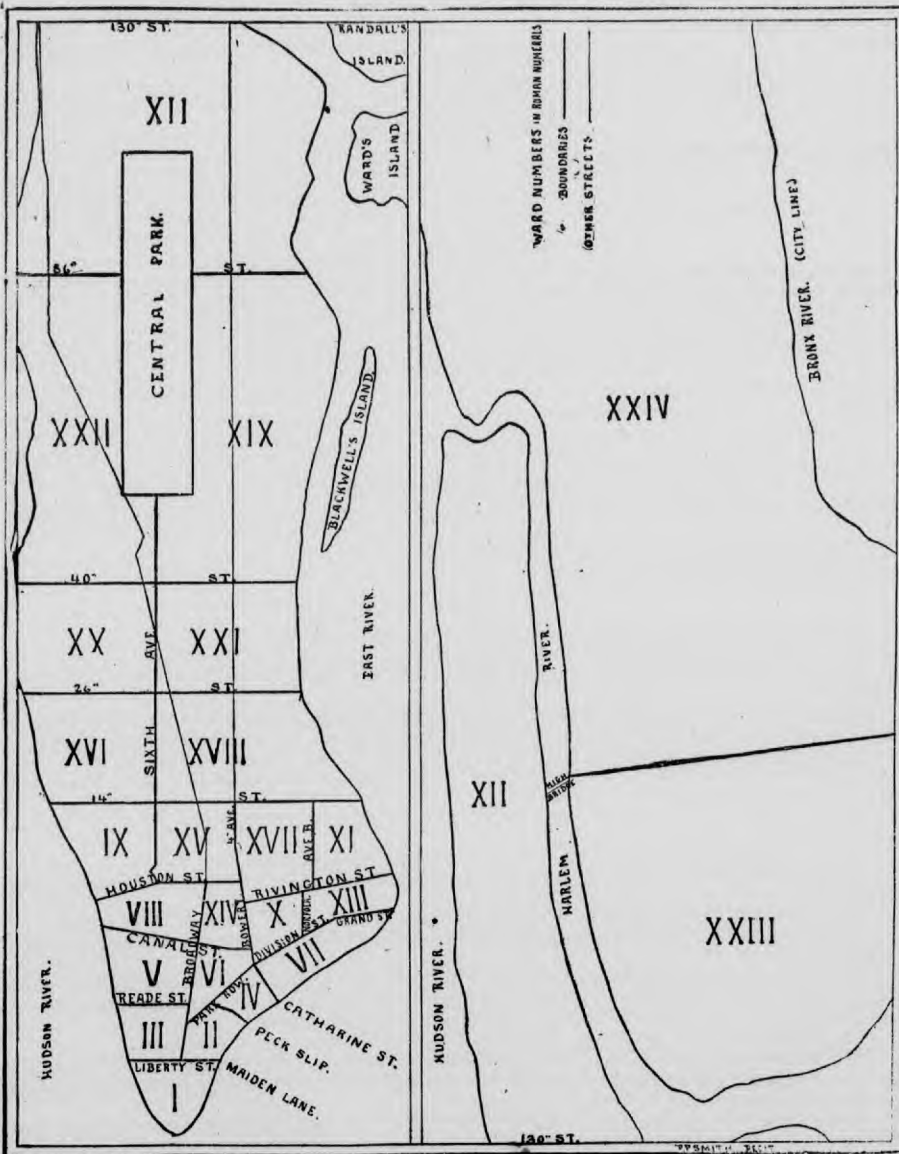

The 697 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.09 against 20.77 for the previous week, and 21.48 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases show an increase, chiefly in diphtheria and scarlet-fever, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 98, 48, 36, 28 and 8, against 75, 57, 22, 26 and 12 for the previous week, a total of 218 against 192. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh, Tenth, Twelfth, Seventeenth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Eleventh Ward. The increase of measles was chiefly in the Twenty-second Ward, the decrease being most marked in the Ninth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was most noticeable in the Eleventh Ward, and the only decreases were in the Seventh, Sixteenth and Twenty-fourth Wards. Eighteen of the 28 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 5 of the remaining 10 were below Fourteenth street. Three of the 8 cases of small-pox were in the Twenty-second Ward, and the remaining 5 were below Canal street, east of Broadway.

Peter Wooley, Peters & Hines, Masterson & Neary and McGrath & Ryan were present in response to the order to show cause dated September 8, 1893, why a penalty should not be imposed upon them for dumping between Eightieth and Eighty-fourth streets, East river, in accordance with report of the Dock Master, and having been heard in their own behalf,

On motion, the matter was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The communication from John U. Brookman, requesting permission to rebuild the bulkhead from the foot of Eighteenth street to the centre line of the block between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, East river, and also permission to dredge in front of said bulkhead, was referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York and Baltimore Transportation Company—To dredge in front of the bulkhead between Piers 5 and 6, North river.

Long Island Railroad Company—To repair the pavement in front of Pier 32, East river.

Daniel McCabe—To place a portable house on the bulkhead between Piers 23 and 24, East river, to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

The communication from the Mayor's office, inclosing a complaint from Van Orden Brothers respecting the storing of trucks on the bulkhead foot of Perry street, North river, together with the report of the Dock Master in relation thereto, was ordered on file and the Secretary directed to advise his Honor the Mayor that the matter will be investigated and the nuisance abated.

On motion, the Dock Master was directed to appear before the Board, Monday, September 18, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M., and explain why he failed to enforce Rule 18 of the Rules and Regulations of the Board respecting the storing of trucks on wharf-property under the control of this Department.

The State Board of Health, at a meeting held in the City of New York on the 25th day of August, 1893, a quorum being present, did then and there, after having heard the report of a committee of the Board, duly appointed for the purpose of examination into the subject, which committee was appointed at a meeting of the Board, held in the City of Albany, the 27th day of July, 1893, at which meeting a quorum was present, amend and alter the rules made by it for the sanitary protection of the Croton river and its tributaries in the Counties of Westchester, Putnam and Dutchess, and of so much of the Bronx and Byram rivers and their tributaries as are now used for the supply of water for the City of New York, in accordance with and under the provisions of article V, of chapter 661 of the Laws of 1893, in the following particulars, to wit:

That, taking into consideration the character of the soil, and of the substrata of the soil and the angle of the slopes, the distances at which privy vaults, slaughter houses, hog pens, barn yards, or any and all places or things which tend to pollute and render impure and dangerous water taken from the several sources enumerated and set forth in said rules, may be maintained, is increased to three hundred feet, horizontal measurements, of the high-water mark in any lake, pond or reservoir in said water-shed, and to two hundred and fifty feet, horizontal measurement, of the high water mark or precipitous bank of any spring, stream or water-course tributary to said lakes, ponds or reservoirs.

**TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.**

**ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT** act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
