Quarterly Report of Work Done by Paid and Unpaid Labor ending June 30, 1893.

Carpenters—Made and put up skylight in Magdalen female prison; made and put up wooden railing in Warden's office; repaired floor and closets; made and put in washtub in Magdalen female prison; made large new table for prisoners' cook house; put on wooden casing on 6 window frames Court of Special Sessions; made and put in new sash in female prison; made and put up large wooden fence in prison yard, at the west end of female prison; made and put up large fence at south wall of female prison; made one large wooden bunk for new male prison.

Plumbers—Repaired water-pipes, and placed 16 water faucets and 6 stopcocks in old and new male prisons and Magdalen female prison; put in waste-pipe hoppers, traps and valves in Matron's water-closet; made and put up 1 large-size lamp frame on western wall of prison yard.

Tinsmiths—Repaired roofs of old male prison and Magdalen; made 2 pans, 2 dippers and 1 iron box, and put in 2 new grates for range in prisoners' cook house; repaired outside railings around the prison walls.

Manured, planted, weeded and cultivated on farm, gathered and stored vegetables, cut grass and made hay, laid sods and trimmed and dressed borders, etc. Burned refuse and disinfected dump. Repaired storm damages to buildings, roads and sea wall, and kept roads, paths, walks and grounds in order. Scrubbed and cleaned cells, shops, mess halls and dormitories, fumigated and disinfected clothing and buildings, etc.

HART'S ISLAND BAKERY.

Made 26,148 pounds of bread.

CITY CEMETERY.

Excavated 8 trenches 45 by 15 by 7 feet, and finished one 70 by 30 by 8. Filled in, sodded and trimmed 21 trenches. Cleared up, trimmed and put in order 210 trenches, with the roadways, paths, flower beds, etc. Continued filling in and extending bank and roadway on sea front. Interred 423 bodies in the Catholic Cemetery and 788 in the General one. Disinterred 40 bodies for reburial elsewhere.

The carpenters have been employed in making necessary repairs throughout the wards, have laid two new floors in tents on the lawn, and have repaired locks and fitted keys where necessary.

The painters have painted Wards 7, 10, 13 and 14, 5 Nurses' sleeping-rooms, Nurses' dining-room, the Chaplain's bedroom, window screen frames throughout the building, the Keepers' rooms in Branch Penitentiary and the steam-pipes throughout the basements, and have put in 18 lights of glass.

The Engineer, Fireman and Assistants have been employed in the manufacture of gas consumed on Randall's Island, have kept in repair the machinery in the laundry and boiler and gas houses, and have also kept the steam and gas-pipes throughout the building in repair.

The Workhouse men have been employed as Laborers on the farm, Drivers at the stables, Helpers in the Boiler-room and Gas-house and in doing general laboring work.

The Workhouse women have been employed in the Laundry, Kitchen and Dining rooms and in doing general housework and scrubbing throughout the building.

QUARTERLY LABOR REPORT OF RANDALL'S ISLAND HOSPITAL AND SCHOOLS.

Carpentry Department—Replaced 7 new beams 3 x 6 to strengthen floor; put 310 square feet new partition on top floor with door in and 426 square feet of same on first floor with three doorways; laid 64 square feet yellow pine flooring in main hallway; 260 square feet spruce flooring 1 1/4 inch in two bath-rooms, closets and pantry; put in doorway leading from main hallway to bath-room and made and put up casings, trimmings and door for same; made one bread box 12 inches wide 4 feet high and 3 feet long; put in three new sashes in outside stairway and extension; made and set a new flight of stairs leading to cellar; cased up fire place and put up a new post 8 x 8, 15 feet long to balcony; encased pipes and trimmed around closet and urinals and put in four shelves. All of the above has been done in Pavilion C. In Pavilion A, put up new partition to divide the pantry from the bath-room, 234 square feet; made and put up dish drainers to sink and repaired 32 square feet wainscoting in pantry; made and put in an entrance and door set also; an extra sash and frame in rear of pantry; repaired 20 square feet flooring; erected 1,350 square feet of partition in Ward 16, for Nurses' Dormitory; 12 rooms with lock and key to each; also 250 square feet partition in Nurses' new dining-room with door to same; cut door entrance from dining-room into kitchen, framed and cased up same; made and put up dish drainers; closed up inside entrance to cellar, and made a large closet out of same. Put up a new spruce post 8 x 8 and 15 feet long to balcony Pavilion D, and put up 2 gates at head of stairway; made and put in place 4 surgical apparatuses for Pavilion K; replaced 5 door saddles; repaired 30 square feet flooring; put down 60 feet floor strips and repaired 65 feet fence at School for Feeble-minded. In Pavilion E, laid 380 square feet new yellow pine flooring; 2 beams 3 x 10 and 40 feet wainscoting; repaired 3 doors; made a new seat 8 feet long for closet. In Pavilion F, removed shed in rear 150 feet, so as to allow light and ventilation; and made and put up 40 new strips for window guards on second and third floors; removed surgical-room partition in Ward 12, 360 square feet; made small platform 2 x 4 feet for closet; made 15 feet hand-rail for balcony; enlarged bath-room 2 feet in width also in Ward 12; removed 160 square feet partition, formerly Nurses' room to enlarge Ward 6; made and put at head of staircase 2 new gates in Ward 10; made 2 large double arch doors leading from the dining-room to Ward 1, South Hospital; made 32 spruce posts for new fences 2 1/4 inches by 4 inches, 5 feet long, dressed; built a large platform at main kitchen 10 feet wide and 28 feet long, with 3 x 6 uprights 4 feet high and 1 1/4 inch spruce flooring. Two carpenters on Quarantine Building, 18 x 30, laid 15 beams, framed, sheeted and stripped outside window frames; made and put up 10 sashes, double windows, building now ready for roofing; removed 700 square feet partition in Dormitory 6 to enlarge ward; cut new doorway into pantry and put in new frame and double sash, same ward. Made and put up at Ward 12, 2 gates; repaired children's bath-house; repaired and put up 7 screen doors and window screens; renewed 135 sash cords in several wards and pavilions; repaired 39 locks; refitted 52 keys; repaired 38 chairs; 7 rockers resealed; 13 benches altered and repaired; put 3 new tops on dining tables.

Plumbers—Refitted 2 bath-rooms with 2 flushing closets, urinals and tubs in Reception Pavilion. On first and second floor changed and refitted three bath-tubs; third floor rear furnished with bath-tub, closet and cistern; run 6 lengths 4-inch waste pipe, 2 lines 3/4-inch pipe from cellar to top; put up sink and made connections to same in pantry. In Pavilion A and Dormitory 6 refitted and made 2 bath-rooms with closets and tubs and fitted up 2 pantries, made necessary connections with 60 feet 3/4-inch pipe and run 35 feet 4-inch waste-pipe to sewer; run 40 feet 1-inch pipe with fittings and put in 2 sinks in pantries, made all necessary connections for same; repaired valves and bolts of large boiler in main kitchen; cleaned out and renewed gaskets on horizontal boiler in School for Feeble-minded; cleaned out stoppage in sewerage leading from South Hospital, and run 130 feet 8-inch earthen pipe as a new sewer to main; also made connections to all leading lines leading to bath-rooms, closets, etc., in South Hospital; put up and connected with hot and cold water the four washing troughs in the bath-rooms of Pavilions J, K, L and M; put in new line of waste-pipe from 2 wash-tubs in Ward 22; also 2 new strainers; renewed 30 feet 1 1/2 inch steam return pipe leading to the Industrial School; repacked expansion joint in main steam-pipe, both underground; renewed 10 feet lead Croton supply pipe at Pavilion

E; in same pavilion also put up 1 8-foot school sink in place of a small one removed; changes made in fresh air pipes, 8 in number, from caps to goose necks, 4 inches at various pavilions; made and put up hand rails of 1-inch pipe with 4 elbows and 2 tees at basement entrances of North and South Hospital; altered gas-pipes in Ward 16, Nurse's Dormitory, and replaced bath-tub in Steward's apartments; renewed 45 feet 1/4-inch pipe to Quarantine Building; connected four leader pipes to sewers and run 16 feet 6 inches earthen pipe to receive same; reset and repaired water-closet and bath tub in Pavilion M; put up 3/8-inch pipe for double drop-lights in Ward 12; disconnected large Woodward's pump sent for repairs and made Croton and hot water connections for pump in School for Feeble-minded; put 18 Ruby globes in hallways to meet requirement of Fire Department; repaired and cleaned out waste stoppage in bath-room, Ward 9; ran a new line 90 feet 3/4-inch pipe to supply hot water to Nurses' kitchen and also several small jobs in the wards and pavilions.

Plasterers and Masons—Repaired all brick walks around Pavilion C; built 15 new piers for Quarantine Building; cut out plastering for door leading from Nurses' dining room to pantry and patched same; repaired 7 square feet concrete flooring in bath-room South Hospital; repaired 13 square feet plastering wall from which clothes closets were removed in Ward 6, North Hospital; patched up Nurses' rooms in Pavilion D for painters; made four brick gutters each about 25 feet long leading from pavilions; laid rat gutters in front and rear of two pavilion known as 21, 22, 23, 24 and J, K, L and M; reset 2 registers in Pavilion L; pointed up cracks for painters and plastered around new window frames in Pavilion A; renewed 20 square feet plaster in Assistant Nurses' dormitory; built 5 square feet stone foundation at Pavilion F; pointed up cracks and patched throughout building, Pavilion F; renewed 25 square feet plastering on ceiling in hallway, North Hospital; put up 60 square feet plaster on ceiling, top floor, Workhouse Dormitory; reset and repaired 15-foot stone at coal chute at Ward 24; built up 6 areas 18 inches higher in rear of South Hospital and set copings around same; repaired 30 square feet plaster on first floor in Pavilion E; put up 35 square feet plaster in hallway, Steward's apartments; built up 6 square feet foundation and 3 piers to support pipes in cellar of South Hospital; built large cesspool between Pavilion E and Male Hospital and laid 12 lengths 12-inch earthen pipe and 26-feet brick work to carry off surface water to cesspool; repaired and laid 1,300 square feet brick walk, various places; cut doorway leading from hallway to bath-room in Pavilion C, and repaired around frame of same; cut an opening in rear of Pavilion C to make an entrance to cellar; built 120 feet stone wall for stairway for same; repaired 15 feet plaster around window frames and door casings in Dormitory 6; pointed up cracks and renewed 18 feet plaster in Ward 11.

Painters—Painted 2 coats, grained and varnished, side walls and wainscoting and all wood work and cleaned and calcimined ceiling of Ward 14, now Nurses' dining room; calcimined and cleaned ceilings and painted with 2 coats, 12 new sleeping rooms in Nurses' Dormitory; also painted and grained stairways and hallways leading from first to third floor same building; calcimined and cleaned all the ceilings in the building known as Reception Hospital and painted the building throughout; cleaned and calcimined 3 large ceilings of wards in Pavilion F; painted all sidewalls and woodwork and varnished same throughout the building; painted sidewalls of kitchen in Ward 22; stained in cherry color 8 frames of doorways leading from Pavilion J to M; also painted and grained wainscoting in Pavilion E, room off of Ward 11 for Doctors' use, painted two coats and varnished; main kitchen painted with two coats; cleaned and calcimined ceiling in pantry and bath-room and painted all sidewalls and wainscoting with two coats, also all the other woodwork in Pavilion A; primed all outside work; 10 new sash frames and 20 sashes of Quarantine Building undergoing erection, 18x30 feet; repaired and varnished hallways and stairways of school building; cleaned and calcimined ceiling; painted sidewalls, bath-room, window sashes and all the woodwork complete in Ward 12; repainted large room formerly occupied as Nurses' dining-room, also pantry to same in two coats; painted sidewalls and calcimined ceiling; repainted sidewalls wainscoting, sashes and doors in Dormitory 6; painted 51 bedsteads; varnished 28 chairs and 13 flower stands; painted 17 benches, 14 stands, 5 tables, 8 towel racks, 2 refrigerators, 2 blackboards, 2 handcars, 5,587 feet new wire fencing and 57 posts; painted 2 hand rails leading to cellars at North and South Hospitals, and 4 rooms and hallways leading to Steward's apartments, also room adjoining library; put in the various wards and pavilions 381 lights of glass.

Tinsmiths—Cut 362 pieces of 1-inch pipe 5 feet long and drilled two holes in each for new wire fence; made large boiler for kitchen 20 inches wide 3 feet deep; put up new wire fence at entrance to Wards 21, 22, 23, 24, J, K, L and M, and along path leading from office to Pavilion K, also around laundry and North and South Hospitals, around Pavilion E, also leading from laundry to Pavilion M; in all, put up 5,580 feet twisted wire, 57 posts and 362 pipes; removed and put in rear of South Hospital 16 feet 4-inch leader pipe; made 6-inch gutter 22 feet and leader to cellar at entrance of Pavilion M; made 4 gallon coffee pot for Orderlies' dining room; made 2 large coffee pots and 2 large tea pots for Nurses' dining room; repaired 2 garbage cans for main kitchen, and made 6 large milk cans to be used in kitchen, 30 quarts; repaired 6 milk cans for kitchen; renewed new zinc in front of range and stoves, 1 sheet in Pavilion K and 1 sheet in Pavilion M; renewed 1 sheet zinc in Ward 16; put in 3 grates in main kitchen range; repaired 130 feet 4-inch galvanized iron leader at Pavilion F, Wards 1 and 14 and Pavilion D; cleaned out flues leading from Wards 14 to 16, also at Ward 12; relined with zinc large refrigerators for Nurses' dining room and large box for milk cans at kitchen; repaired 38 cans for the several wards and pavilions.

LABOR REPORT.

Of the male patients, a daily average of 77 have been engaged as follows: 16 in kitchen; 5 in laundry; 3 in engine-room; 2 in stables; 1 in store-room; 1 in office; 1 in carpenter-shop; 4 in bake-shop; 7 in pavilion; 2 as help for Acting Medical Superintendent and Staff; 35 unloading coal, working on sea-wall, removing freight from dock, repairing roads, grading, drawing coal to boiler-house and pavilions, gardening and removing fruit and vegetables from garden, white-washing, painting, pumping water to pavilions and keeping the grounds around the pavilions clean.

Of the female patients, a daily average of 525 have been engaged in the following manner: Housework, sewing and knitting, 429; in the laundry, 70; in the general dining-room, 10; as help for staff and officers, 8; at out-door scrubbing, 8.

137,337 pieces have been laundered during the quarter for the Hart's Island Asylum, and 2,360 pieces for Ward's Island Asylum.

40,200 articles of clothing and bedding have been repaired, and 4,812 articles made.

The 702 deaths represent a death-rate of 19.16 against 19.04 for the previous week, and 18.78 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The total number of deaths varied little from that of the preceding week. There was an increase of 13 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 14 from heart diseases, of 8 from congenital debility, and of 16 from violence, practically offset by a decrease of 25 in the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, of 21 from phthisis, and of 5 each from bronchitis and pneumonia.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and from scarlet fever in the Seventeenth Ward, and from small-pox in the Fourteenth Ward, while the 3 deaths from measles were distributed through the Eleventh, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
