Hon. J. Edward Swanstrom, President, Borough of Brooklyn:

Dear Sir—I beg that you kindly recall from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that one of the three petitions recently passed by the Prospect Heights Board relating to Eighth street, between Eighth avenue and Prospect Park West, which calls, in one resolution, for the regulating, grading and paving, with asphalt, of said street. Mr. Lewis calls my attention to the fact, which I should myself have noted earlier, that in this particular part of the work, the regulating and grading is a very large matter, and that it should not be lumped together in the contract with the asphalt pavement, but that separate resolutions should be made for the regulating and grading on the one hand, and the asphalt on the other, in order that small contractors may have the opportunity to compete for the regulating and grading, which will be impossible if that is combined in one resolution with the asphalt pavement.

The suggestion of Mr. Lewis is in line with the policy of the Borough President's and with economy generally, and has the further merit that it will greatly decrease the amount of each individual assessment for work and prevent any one of said assessments exceeding the 50 per cent. limit, as may be possible otherwise. Kindly, therefore, recall the said petition, and at the next meeting of the Prospect Heights District have a rescinding resolution passed, and then two separate ones, one authorizing the regulating and grading and the other the paving. This will not delay the work upon the street, for meanwhile the street opening petition and the sewer petition will go forward, and long before it would be possible to commence work under the street opening proceedings, the new resolutions now suggested can be prepared and passed.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
