### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT

#### (PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York was held in Room 16, City Hall, on Friday, February 5, 1904, at 11:30 o'clock in the forenoon.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. George B. McClellan, presided.

After completing the Financial Calendar, the Board took up the consideration of the Public Improvement Calendar.

The minutes of January 8, 15, 22, and 29, 1904, were approved as printed, by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON NARROWS AVENUE, BROOKLYN.

The following petition and report of the Chief Engineer were presented:

In the Matter

of

The Opening of Narrows Avenue from Seventy-first  
Street to the Shore Road, Brooklyn.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned owners of property taken in the opening of Narrows avenue, from Seventy-first street to the Shore road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and also of land assessed for benefit, hereby petition your Honorable Board to pass a resolution authorizing the placing of one-half of the assessments for benefit, by reason of said opening, upon The City of New York under the terms of the resolution of your Board, adopted on or about the day of May, 1903.

Narrows avenue is an avenue eighty feet in width, running parallel with and seven hundred feet westerly of First avenue, Bay Ridge, and approximately midway between First avenue and the Shore Drive. That by reason of the windings and curvature of said Shore Drive, the said Narrows avenue intersects said Shore Drive at or about Eighty-ninth street. That by reason of the intersection of these streets at an acute angle much valuable Shore Drive property is taken and large consequential damage results to remaining property.

That the opening of this avenue is upon the request of the City authorities for sewer purposes, and not because said avenue is required for travel.

That the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have fixed the limit of assessment for benefit at the middle of the block on the easterly side of Narrows avenue, and the Shore Drive on the westerly side of Narrows avenue. That by reason of the windings of such road the assessment district varies from nothing to a depth or width of six or seven hundred feet.

That said Commissioners have attempted to levy the assessments block by block, but this is inequitable owing to the varying depth of the assessment district.

That said Commissioners have stated at their meetings that they have been

unable to adopt any rule of assessment that would not work unfairly to some property owner, and that in their opinion it was a proper case for your Board to exercise its discretion and place a portion of this assessment upon the City.

The assessments for benefit are very heavy and onerous to the property owners.

The Commissioners have made their preliminary report, and are about to make their final report.

It is asked that your Board act speedily upon this petition, so that said Street Commissioners may levy their assessments in accordance with the decision of your Honorable Board.

And your petitioners will ever pray, etc.

REPORT NO. 1729.

January 29, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Herewith is submitted a petition signed by the Estate of J. Holmes Van Brunt by Magdalene Van Brunt, Executrix, and C. H. Van Brunt, asking that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment assume for The City of New York one-half of the cost of opening Narrows avenue from Seventy-first street to the Shore road in the Borough of Brooklyn.

This action is asked for on the following grounds: That Narrows avenue is 80 feet in width and is the first street east of the Shore road, which latter street is tortuous in its line, leaving in some cases quite short blocks between the Shore road and Narrows avenue, and as the district of assessment is fixed at one-half block on each side of the street, the limit of the district is quite irregular; and, further, that the opening of this street was not asked for, but was undertaken by the City in order to permit of the construction of a sewer; that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have attempted to levy the assessment block by block, and that this levy is not equitable.

Proceedings to open Narrows avenue between Seventy-first street and the Shore road were authorized by the Board of Public Improvements on May 16, 1900, by means of a resolution which also provided that the entire cost should be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited. There immediately arises the question as to the power of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to review this action of the Board of Public Improvements in view of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel which was presented to the former Board on December 29, 1903, in connection with a petition for relief from the assessment for opening Oak Tree place, Borough of The Bronx.

The facts in the proceeding now under consideration are herewith submitted to the Board:

Under the resolution of May 16, 1900, the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment filed their oaths on November 12, 1900, and title to the land within the lines of the street was vested in the City on October 30, 1901. On December 19, 1902, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution excluding the portion of this street between Eighty-third and Eighty-fifth streets from the proceedings then under way. This action was taken more than a year after title had been vested in the City and was held by the Corporation Counsel to be invalid, as the City could not divest itself of title which it had once obtained in a regular manner. I am not sure that any formal opinion to this effect was ever addressed to the Board, but I am advised that the Commissioners are carrying out the proceedings as between the limits named in the original resolution of the Board of Public Improvements.

The proceedings affect a length of about 4,893 feet of street, the area to be taken being divided into 62 parcels, of which 2 parcels with an area of 12,800 square feet are within the lines of Seventy-first and Eighty-sixth streets, which had already been acquired. Of the total area, 9 parcels having an aggregate area of 114,953 square feet, had evidently been partially dedicated, this being indicated upon the draft damage map and confirmed by the action of the Commissioners who awarded for these 9 parcels a total of \$1,135, which is equal to about \$20 for each city lot 20 x 100 feet, which is the standard size of a lot in the Borough of Brooklyn. For the remaining 51 parcels, having an area of 264,028.3 square feet, the awards for land amount to \$115,764, indicating a value of about \$877 for each city lot. This difference in the amount of awards indicates clearly that the Commissioners considered the 9 parcels above referred to as dedicated to public use, and felt that the owners were entitled to only a nominal award.

Excluding the land within the lines of Seventy-first and Eighty-sixth streets, the length of street opened through the proceeding now under consideration is 4,733 feet. The area at least partially dedicated, if it extended over this entire length, would have a width of 24.20 feet. If, therefore, this proceeding were treated as the widening of a street from a width of 24.20 feet to 80 feet, the City would assume, under the rule of the former Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted on July 25, 1902, 17.92 per cent. of the expense of the proceeding. If, however, the case be treated as the opening of a new street having a width of 80 feet, the City would assume, under the same rule, 8.33 per cent. of the expense. In view of the fact that the dedication is only partial, and that it affected only portions of the street, it would seem equitable for the City to assume approximately the mean between these two percentages, or say 13 1-3 per cent., which is the proportion which would be assumed by the City under the rule referred to for the opening of a street 100 feet in width.

The preliminary awards of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment amount to \$131,399. Under section 980 of the Charter they have determined to place one-third of the awards for buildings upon the City at large, the total of such awards being \$45,000.

The reference in the petition to the fact that Narrows avenue is near the Shore road is scarcely a proper ground for relief from the assessment, for it is a reminder that the Shore road, one of the most beautiful driveways in Greater New York, has been acquired and partially improved at the expense of the City at large, while the plans of the Park Department for its further improvement contemplate the expenditure of a very large amount, and the result will be to increase enormously the value of property in the vicinity without any expense to its owners.

In recommending that the City assume 13 1-3 per cent. of the cost of the opening proceedings, it is intended that this percentage shall not include the one-third of the cost of buildings which has already been assumed for the City by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment.

SIR—I transmit to you two recommendations adopted by the Local Board of the Heights District at a meeting held on February 1, 1904, a recommendation to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the map or plan of The City of New York be altered by the laying out as a public park of the property bounded by Remsen street, Joralemon street and Furman street and the proposed extension of Columbia place, in the First Ward, Borough of Brooklyn; and a recommendation to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the map or plan of The City of New York be altered by locating and laying out an extension of Columbia place from Joralemon street to Remsen street, in the First Ward, Borough of Brooklyn.

These resolutions are transmitted you without the approval of the President of the Borough, it being the opinion of the President that, as resolutions of this class are not authorized by the Charter, but are made part of the change of map procedure simply for the convenience of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, his signature is not necessary.

You will notice from the resolution itself that President Littleton did not vote upon the resolution, and he stated at the meeting, in explaining his refusal to vote, that it was not his purpose to commit himself at that time to any measure upon which he would have to act effectively afterward as a member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

REPORT No. 1730.

January 30, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Under date of January 20, 1904, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn has transmitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Heights District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on December 21, 1903, recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the map or plan of the City be altered by laying out thereon an extension of Columbia place between Remsen and Joralemon streets. The Borough President states in his letter that this resolution is transmitted to the Board not as a recommendation by him, but for such action as the Board may see fit to take in the premises.

The laying out of Columbia place was asked for by three petitions containing respectively 18, 6 and 7 signatures, a total of 31, but at least two of these names are found on all three petitions. There is also a protest against the laying out of this street included in a protest, bearing 28 signatures, against the laying out of a park between the new street and Furman street.

Columbia place is a street 50 feet in width and now extends from Atlantic avenue to Joralemon street, one short block and one long one. Its extension would cut through the block between Joralemon and Remsen streets, which to the east is divided by a short street known as Grace court, while to the west there is no subdivision of the block. The extension would be on a direct line not only with Columbia place but with Montague terrace and Pierrepont place, there being thus one continuous street four blocks of which would have one name, while the remaining two blocks would each have a different name.

Except that portion forming the end of Grace court, the property is almost solidly built up. Practically the whole of seven plots would be taken, which plots have at the present time an assessed value of \$81,300. There would also be taken substantial parts of four other plots which have an aggregate assessed value of \$89,100 while the City maps indicate that a small portion of one other lot, having an assessed value of \$18,500, will also be taken.

It must be admitted that the plan of this part of the Borough of Brooklyn is confused and might be improved. The principal object of this street, however, appears to be to furnish a bounding street for a park which it is proposed to lay out between the extension of Columbia place and Furman street. This park is covered by a second resolution, upon which a report is submitted under this date.

Owing to the character of the improvements on Brooklyn Heights and to the fact that the traffic is confined almost wholly to streets running to the water front, there would be little public use of this street if it were laid out and improved. If

the park were to be laid out, the street might be considered a necessity, but if the plan were to stand upon its own merits, it is difficult to present a good reason for the adoption of the resolution. It is suggested, however, that a public hearing be given.

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Brooklyn cause to be prepared for submission to this Board three similar maps or plans for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible the nature and extent of the proposed change and the location of the immediate adjacent or of intersecting open or established streets, roads, squares, or places, sufficient for the identification and location thereof.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of this Board to be held in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 11th day of March, 1904, at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

Thence northerly along the easterly line of Furman street 460 feet to its intersection with the southerly line of Remsen street;

Thence easterly along the southerly line of Remsen street 250 feet.

Thence southerly along a line parallel with Furman street and 250 feet distant therefrom, 430.47 feet, to its intersection with the northerly line of Joralemon street.

Thence westerly along the northerly line of Joralemon street 251.74 feet to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

REPORT NO. 1731.

January 30, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The President of the Borough of Brooklyn has, under date of January 20, 1904, transmitted a resolution adopted by the Local Board of the Heights District, Borough of Brooklyn, on December 21, 1903, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out thereon as a public park the property bounded by Remsen street, Joralemon street, Furman street and a proposed extension of Columbia place. The Borough President states in his letter that the resolution is forwarded without any recommendation, for such disposition as the Board may think best.

The resolution providing for the laying out of the extension to Columbia place is reported upon under this date.

The project for the laying out of a public park in this neighborhood has been agitated at various times for a number of years. The present resolution is based upon four petitions containing 43 signatures, although some of the names appear on all of the petitions. There is also a protest against the laying out of the park, bearing 28 signatures, and this protest also applies to the laying out of Columbia place, on the ground that the grade between Grace court and Joralemon street would be so steep as to make the street almost useless; and that the property to be taken as a park would necessitate the building of a new retaining wall along Furman street, adding enormously to the cost of the improvement after the acquisition of the property. The petitioners estimate that to acquire the property would cost \$600,000, and would take from the Assessors' books over \$350,000 of assessable property, while it would add nothing to the value of adjacent property.

The proposed park would include two large detached residences, occupying spacious grounds, the entrance to which is secured through Grace court, while the frontage on Remsen and Joralemon streets and a portion of that on Furman street is solidly built up. The present assessed value of the property which would be taken by the park and the proposed street is \$349,000. Inasmuch as some of the parcels taken would lie partly within the park and partly within the street, it is difficult to apportion them, but it is assumed that of this amount \$120,000 would represent the assessed value of land taken for the street and \$229,000 the corresponding value of land taken for the park.

The site is a commanding one, but the foreground between Furman street and the water is occupied by the large warehouses of the New York Dock Company, and if a park be needed as a breathing space for the people of this part of Brooklyn, there is no doubt but that these advantages could be secured much more cheaply on a site south of Atlantic avenue, where it would also be in the centre of a more dense population, whose need of such breathing space is vastly greater than that of residents in the immediate neighborhood of the proposed park.

While the approval of the resolution of the Local Board cannot be recommended, it is suggested that a public hearing might be given.

REPORT NO. 1732.

January 30, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on December 17, 1903, has been transmitted to the Board by the President of the Borough, with the statement that it is not forwarded as his recommendation, but is laid before the Board for such action as it may deem best. It provides for changing the map of The City of New York by laying out thereon a public park, bounded by Newkirk, Bedford, Foster and Ocean avenues, comprising four full-sized city blocks and two smaller blocks.

This action is asked for by a petition said to have been signed by Stephen W. Giles and 237 others, although only five of these 237 names appear upon the copy attached to the resolution. The petitioners base their request upon the following grounds: That there is no public park in the vicinity; that this tract lying between Prospect Park and the ocean forms a proper link in the City's park system; that it will extend from Bedford avenue to Ocean avenue, two important driveways; that it contains a fine specimen of colonial architecture, which can be readily adapted to library or museum purposes; that the tract contains but four private residences and a chapel; that but one of the intersecting streets has been cut through, and that with the exception of a few small parcels the entire tract is held by one owner.

The statements contained in this petition are unquestionably true. Whether they furnish good and valid reasons for laying out a public park about a quarter of a mile long and some 420 feet wide is another question.

The principal building on the tract which it is proposed to take is the Benjamin F. Stephens homestead, occupying Block 295, which has an assessed value of \$36,000, although the block contains one small real estate office and a barn in addition to the Stephens home. There are three other residences and a stone church which would be taken. The residences are modern frame dwellings, worth probably \$7,000 or \$8,000 each. The total assessed value of the property, according to the tax-rolls for 1904, is \$164,300, including the stone church, which is exempt from taxation, but which is estimated to be worth \$3,500. Of this amount, \$28,500 is the estimated value of buildings, the remainder that of the land.

A petition bearing 238 signatures may be considered as indicative of a decided public sentiment in favor of the laying out of such a park, but it has already been demonstrated that an indefinite number of signatures can be obtained to petitions for almost any purpose.

This entire neighborhood is built up in detached houses, and there is, in my judgment, no necessity for a park in this vicinity at the present time, nor any prospect of there being a necessity in the future.

A technical description accompanies the resolution should the Board determine to give a public hearing.

GENTLEMEN—Herewith I send you print of map, approved by the Commissioner of Bridges January 20, 1904, showing lands in the Borough of Manhattan which I have selected, pursuant to section 1436 of the Greater New York Charter, and determined to take proceedings for the acquisition thereof for the construction of the new Fordham Heights Bridge, from Two Hundred and Seventh street, Manhattan, to One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, in The Bronx. Said map has this day been filed, one copy in the office of the Department of Bridges and one copy in the office of the Register of the County of New York.

Said lands are described as follows:

#### Parcel A.

REPORT NO. 1734.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—Under date of January 28, 1904, the Commissioner of Bridges has submitted a plan showing an amendment to the map of the City by widening West Two Hundred and Seventh street, between Ninth avenue and River street, in the Borough of Manhattan, by adding ten feet to each side of the street, making it 120 instead of 100 feet in width.

The necessity for this change is due to the proposed construction of a bridge across the Harlem river, from West Two Hundred and Seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, to West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx. The centre line of this bridge will be coincident with the centre line of West Two Hundred and Seventh street. The approach will begin at the present grade of Ninth avenue, and will rise sufficiently to pass over River street. This involves the obstruction of the central portion of the street so that sufficient room will not be left for side roadways, giving access to the property fronting on West Two Hundred and Seventh street.

It will also be necessary to purchase land for the purpose of construction on the Bronx side of the river, but in that case there will be no widening of existing streets. On the Manhattan side, however, there is clearly a change in the map of the City, which will require a public hearing to be given by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Commissioner of Bridges states in his letter that he has already filed copies of the map in the office of the Register of the County and in the office of the Department of Bridges. While this procedure, under section 1436 of the Charter, may be sufficient at the Bronx end of the bridge, where there is simply the purchase of land necessary for construction, at the Manhattan end the Commissioner himself, in the closing paragraph of his letter, recognizes the necessity for action in the case of West Two Hundred and Seventh street, under section 442 of the Charter, and requests this Board to proceed to change the map in accordance with that section.

The addition to the width of the street is unquestionably necessary, and it is recommended that a public hearing be given. A technical description of the land which is required is included in the letter of the Commissioner of Bridges.

In 1897 a lease was made for five years, and later, when some additions were necessary to be made to this hospital, it was extended for five years longer. The Board of Trustees considered this added lease invalid and the opinion of the Corporation Counsel was sought. He gave the opinion that the hospital was simply holding over and the City was not bound by this extension.

I should have included this information in my communication to you on the 25th asking that the Board allow the buildings now used as a stable and outhouses on the grounds of Fordham Hospital to remain standing until the expiration of this lease.

SIR—Under date of January 25, 1904, the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, through their Secretary, James K. Paulding, addressed a letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, stating that the report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for the opening of Tee Taw avenue, between One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street and Kingsbridge road, has been confirmed; that the hospital is now using a stable and several other outhouses standing within the lines of the street, and requesting that, in accordance with the provisions of section 971 of the Greater New York Charter, this Board adopt a resolution permitting the buildings above referred to to remain unremoved until the expiration of the lease under which The City of New York holds these premises.

The communication does not give the date of the expiration of the lease referred to, and upon inquiry I am told that in 1897 a lease was made for a period of five years, and later, when some additions to the hospital were made, the lease was supposed to have been extended for five years longer. It appears that the Corporation Counsel has advised the Trustees that the added lease was invalid, and that the hospital was simply holding over under its original lease, and that the City was not bound by the supposed extension.

Upon inquiry at the Bureau of Street Openings, I find that the report of the Commissioners has not yet been confirmed, but that it is ready for confirmation, which will probably take place within a short time.

The report of the Commissioners shows that a strip of land about 13½ feet in width, which belonged to the owner of the property now leased by the City for hospital purposes, was taken under the street opening proceeding, and that on this strip were located several small buildings, all but one of which lies wholly within the limits of the said strip. For the buildings the owner was awarded a total of \$3,450, while the land, amounting to very nearly the area of two city lots, is to be paid for at the rate of about \$2,500 per lot.

The question naturally suggests itself, if the owner is to receive such substantial awards, why should the City continue to pay other than a nominal rent for continued occupation of the premises. I find, however, that the entire plot, having a width of over 280 feet and an average length of over 400 feet, is leased by the City for about \$5,100 per annum, so that the proportion of the rental which would be charged against the narrow strip and the outbuildings which have been taken in the opening of Tee Taw avenue would be very slight.

Upon the confirmation of the opening proceedings the land and the buildings, or that portion of them lying within the lines of Tee Taw avenue, will become the property of the City, and it is not improbable that an improvement of the street will soon be asked for. It is the practice of the City, after the confirmation of a street opening proceeding, to sell at public auction such buildings or parts of buildings as are within the lines of the street, and all that seems necessary in this case is that this Board should resolve, in accordance with the provisions of section 971 of the Charter, that the buildings or portions of buildings now occupied by the Fordham Hospital which lie within the limits of Tee Taw avenue, between West One Hundred and Ninetieth street and Kingsbridge road, remain unremoved until such time as the improvement of the said avenue is authorized, or until such time as the removal be sanctioned by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I am advised by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees that such action will be entirely acceptable to them, and the adoption of such a resolution is hereby recommended.
