Resolved, That the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-third District, hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that said Board fix a date when title will vest in Lacombe avenue, from Bronx River avenue to White Plains avenue, and it hereby suggests that the date be made three months after the authorization of this improvement. Unanimously adopted.

No one appeared in opposition.

James H. Goggin appeared in favor for the property owners, and stated that the owners desired to have the street remain at a width of 50 feet, for the reason that there seems no necessity now or in the future to have the street widened. At the present time there are a number of buildings erected out on the old line. If you widen the street 10 feet, it will impose on the taxpayers unnecessary expense, especially in view of the recent ordinances passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment relating to the regulating of widths of streets. If you take off 5 feet on each side on the lots (this street is only five blocks long), if you take off 5 feet on the front of the lots you will practically destroy the entire lots and impose a burden on the property owners. The section seems to be unanimous in desiring to have this remain as a 50-foot street.

Alderman Corbett—Mr. President, I have investigated this thoroughly, and I find that the majority of taxpayers or property owners are in favor of the street being left at the present width of 50 feet, and I move it be sent forward to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Motion withdrawn, as there was no report ready as yet from the Engineer of the Borough.

On motion, seconded, this matter was laid over awaiting report.

November 6, 1907, 2.30 P. M.

Present—Hon. Desmond Dunne, presiding, and Alderman Potter.

The Secretary presented the following resolutions initiating the following improvements:

No. 927.

To regulate and grade between court yard lines, set bluestone or Medina curb on concrete foundation, or cement curb, and lay cement sidewalks on Fifty-third street, from Tenth to Fort Hamilton avenue, and from Eighteenth avenue to West street which was amended to read as follows: To regulate and grade between court yard lines, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks on Fifty-third street, from Tenth avenue to Fort Hamilton avenue, and from Eighteenth avenue to West street, and as amended was unanimously adopted.

2. A resolution was unanimously adopted to construct a sewer in Fifty-third street, between Nineteenth avenue and West street.

3. A resolution was unanimously adopted to pave Fifty-third street with asphalt on concrete foundation, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, and between Eighteenth avenue and West street.


