Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1911.

October 4, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, City of New York:

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Charter, I submit report showing the operations of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for the quarter ending June 30, 1911.

The expense of General Administration and the various bureaus for the quarter were as follows:

The total mileage of pavements in the Borough on June 30 was 731,329, of which 409,148 were asphalt, 138,765 granite block, 24,265 belgian block, 28,034 asphalt block, 108,805 macadam, 7,700 cobbles, and in addition wood, iron slag, etc., etc.

Granite pavement to the amount of 4,954 miles was removed, 1,705 miles cobbles, 1,348 miles macadam, and other pavements at a total of 10,209 miles. The total mileage laid was 14,806, making a net increase of 4,597 miles.

Considerable work was done in the way of repairs to existing pavements by the street repair gangs and connection gangs. The former repaired 5,339 square yards of granite, laid on concrete; 119,722 square yards granite on sand; 4,228 square yards belgian block; 3,506 square yards of special belgian block and other class of pavements. 231,157 square feet of bluestone walk was relaid; 16,880 square feet of cement walk; 2,372 square feet brick walk, and work of setting and resetting curb, etc., work of which was performed by the sidewalk gangs.

The country gangs performed considerable work in repairing unimproved roadway and in sprinkling same with oil and water. 18,675 square yards of repairs were made to macadam pavements; 1,549 cubic yards stone crushed; 203,157 square yards dirt roads repaired (hand); 461,496 square yards dirt roads repaired (machine); 785,245 square yards street sprinkled with oil; 3,144 miles street sprinkled with water, and other miscellaneous work.

This Bureau entered into 92 contracts during the quarter, chargeable to Street Improvement Fund, amounting to \$409,925.91, and 32 contracts chargeable to the Repaving Bond Fund, amounting to \$479,031.90, of which number 22 were for asphalt pavements, amounting to \$218,730.40. Receipts on security deposits amounted to 6,750 with refunds totaling \$5,400. On April 1 there was a credit balance of \$38,250, and with refunds made brought credit balance to July 1, 1911, at \$39,600. This Bureau received \$10,573.92 from the railroad companies for work of paving on railroad streets where the City performed the work and submitted bills to the corporations for payment. For restoring and repaving the amount of \$61,089.20 was received and credited. Receipts for vault permits to the amount of \$2,640.11 were credited to the Sinking Fund.

In addition to 124 contracts registered and entered into for street improvements there were 15 contracts for materials for repairs, etc., amounting to \$115,195.63, and one for fuel at an amount of \$5,536.61. There were 55 contracts for regulating, grading, curbing and laying walks, at a total of \$232,835.80. Assessment lists to the number of 47 for regulating, grading sidewalks and paving were made, involving an amount of \$203,838.96, and in addition there were 10 assessment lists for other highway work.

Ninety-three preliminary estimates for original improvements for local board action were prepared for regulating, grading, curbing, walks, paving, fencing, flagging and grading lots, at a total of \$625,800. The connection gangs repaired 19,534 square yards of various kinds of pavements, of which amount 6,872 square yards were granite on concrete foundation, 6,910 granite laid on sand foundation, 3,486 square yards macadam, etc.

During the quarter the Asphalt Plant laid 100,030.85 cubic feet wearing surface and 28,764.87 cubic feet of binder. The total product of the plant for the quarter was 128,857 boxes of wearing surface mixture and 3,634 boxes of binder mixture. The Chemical Laboratory examined as follows:

Permits not requiring opening of streets for stringing wires, drawing cables, etc., numbered about 2,100, and 3,416 permits were issued to the various corporations to open streets for the purpose of laying and repairing electric conduits, gas mains, railroad work, etc.

BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

Violations of the Building Law were: 528 were for defective plumbing and drainage; 2,189 for defective construction and materials; 102 for 77 unsafe buildings, etc., etc.

Complaints to the number of 151 were received and upon investigation were remedied, except in some instances where complaints were unfounded. Passenger elevators to the number of 3,887 were inspected and 77 were found not in compliance with the law. During the quarter 1,358 plans were filed, affecting 2,816 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$17,921,165.

Of the number 68 applications were for 94 buildings at a total estimated cost of \$2,572,500, costing between \$20,000 and \$50,000. 317 applications were for 1,329 dwelling houses, estimated cost less than \$20,000, at a total estimated cost of \$5,005,400. 84 were for 182 tenement houses, estimated cost less than \$20,000, at a total estimated cost of \$1,629,100; 95 were for 195 stores and two-family houses, at a total estimated cost of \$1,084,200; 253 applications were for 424 frame buildings, at a total estimated cost of \$1,338,775, in addition to various others.

There were applications filed for alterations to buildings to the number of 1,853 for 2,066. There were 256 applications affecting 258 buildings (tenements), estimated cost \$194,300; 1,164 frame buildings, at a cost of \$709,740, and various others.

The total number of buildings inspected as to plumbing and drainage amounted to 7,168; of this number 432 were for tenements and 6,736 for miscellaneous drainage. Unsafe buildings were made safe or taken down, to the number of 79.

BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

The report of this Bureau sets forth in detail the work done by it during the second quarter, showing the number of orders drawn for the various Bureaus, the statement of moneys expended for supplies and repairs, statement of contracts completed and work done in caring for the various public buildings, court houses, baths, etc., under its jurisdiction.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 25, 1911, adopted a resolution for the preliminary foundation work on site of building to be known as the Central Library building, Eastern Parkway and Flatbush avenue. Bids were received on June 14, 1911. There was but one bidder, Sprague & Henwood, Inc., who agreed to do this work at the rate of 90 per cent. of the Engineer's estimate or \$3,163,500, and the contract was duly awarded to this bidder. Vouchers to the amount of \$9,780.31 were sent to the Comptroller for payment on contract for fuel, \$83,541.92 was expended during the quarter for the construction and equipment of Municipal Bath House at Coney Island, and \$1,662 for the construction and completion of bulkheads Eighth Ward Market.

At the various public comfort stations and baths \$6,157.72 was received in payment for the use of towels, soap and private accommodations.

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

This Bureau makes surveys, prepares plans and profiles for all original work undertaken by the Bureau of Highways, determines for all contracts let by that Bureau the amount of excavation, fill, linear feet of curbing, square feet of sidewalks, number of cubic yards of concrete, number of square yards of asphalt, and to furnish contractors with line and grade stakes and monthly estimates. Also performs work for the use of the Local Board, Board of Estimate, Corporation Counsel and various other Departments of the City.

The work of the Topographical Bureau consists of matters relating to the determination, preservation and changes in lines and elevations of public streets, parks, etc.; the preparation of maps for legal opening of streets, maintenance of lines, monuments, records, etc., etc.

In addition to the field work a considerable number of maps were prepared and forwarded by office force, showing changing street lines, closing and laying out streets, maps for filing, maps affecting changes in the established elevations of streets, general sketches for special reports, copies of maps previously prepared and forwarded and maps showing encroachments on streets, prepared for the Bureau of Encumbrances, for the Sinking Fund Commission.

There were plans and profiles, affecting 62 streets having a total length of 97,120 feet, or 16.5 miles, prepared for regulating, grading, etc., in addition to an extensive amount of work accomplished by the field force. There were seven maps prepared for filing in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, County Clerk, on proceedings already adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and 22 miscellaneous maps or general sketches for special reports and copies of maps previously prepared and forwarded.

The Bureau has also prepared and forwarded a number of maps for the use of the Comptroller and Incumbrance Bureau so that encroachments existing on the lines of streets legally opened and under way for improvement may be disposed of. Twenty-three rule maps in quadruplicate were prepared in street opening proceedings covering a distance of 44,903 feet, or 8.504 miles of streets. There were also 23 draft damage maps prepared for use of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment to determine amounts of awards for lands and buildings in street opening proceedings. The total was 23 streets, comprising 27 maps covering 1,178 plots, 2,819,972 square feet in area, or 1,393,211 city lots and a total length of 8,504 miles.

Ninety-eight diagrams showing curb stakes for original improvements were made for use of the Bureau of Highways. During the quarter 787 reports and letters were sent, of which 364 were reports on condition of streets in relation to street opening proceedings or improvements; 175 miscellaneous reports, 214 reports on change of lines, laying out, closing, change of grade, etc., etc. In addition to other work in the field 1,392,325 feet of precise and approximate chaining, 95,300 feet or precise line work, 126 precise angles, etc., were made.

BUREAU OF SEWERS.

During the quarter 68,057.64 linear feet of sewers of all sizes were laid, or an equivalent of 12.889 miles. Of this amount, 318.53 linear feet, or 0.06 miles, were reconstructed; the mileage of the Borough was increased by 12.889 miles, which, added to the mileage of the sewerage on June 30, 1911, made the total at 871,710 miles. 58,512.52 linear feet of 6-inch house connections, or an equivalent of 11,082 miles were built. The amount of 6-inch house connections built under the jurisdiction of this Department since this system was inaugurated to the close of the quarter is 68.50 miles. The number of basins built during the quarter was 161 and the total number now connected with the sewerage system is 10,875.

There were 20 improvements, aggregating an estimated cost of \$393,800 authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be prepared under preliminary authorization.

164 reports were made, to precede paving, in addition to reports in response to petitions for sewers. 75 were to precede paving, amounting to \$1,539,000 and the remainder for sewers petitioned for at a total of \$2,527,860. 23 contracts, amounting to \$302,389.59 were completed and assessment lists were prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors. 52 contracts, amounting to \$449,519.62 have been completed and lists for same will be transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

Permits were issued to make new connections with 1,439 houses, and 271 permits for repairs to house connections. 15,832 basins were examined and 8,458 basins cleaned. The amount of deposit removed was 8,915.7 cubic yards. The number of feet of lateral sewers examined was 1,409,411, and 644,045 linear feet were cleaned. The linear feet of large brick sewers cleaned were 2,378 and 99 cubic yards of deposit removed.

At Caisson No. 2, Sewage Disposal Works, there were pumped: 200,070,330 gallons. Caisson No. 3, 74,714,047 gallons; Caisson No. 4, 153,557,455 gallons, and 26th Ward Disposal Works, 927,568,400 gallons. The Maintenance Division is responsible for the proper care of the sewage system and has charge of repairs to sewers where complaints are received that same is not in proper working order.

DIVISION OF SUBSTRUCTURES.

The operations of this Bureau were confined to a section at 12th street and 6th avenue, where the Division worked in co-operation with the Board of Water Supply, in locating a 42-inch gas main of the Brooklyn Union Gas Company to pass under the proposed location of the Board's 60-inch water main. Such co-operation will result in a material saving in time and expense to the City and companies maintaining structures in the Borough's streets.

Considerable time has been devoted to connecting finished record sheets and information has been obtained from the several companies operating in the Borough relative to change and addition to their service, made necessary by extensive enlargement. Accurate field measurements have been taken of new structures, and changes in existing structures recorded, all of which have been plotted on the finished streets. Report, with map accompanying, of the abandoned cable ways and wheel pits on Montague street surface road has been finished and furnished by this Division. An extensive amount of information has been furnished applicants seeking revocable consents from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the installation of conduits and tunnels for private use. Supplies ordered by this Bureau during the quarter for prints, supplies for Draftsmen, etc., amounted to \$84.99.

Bureau for the Recovery of Penalties.

Statement and return of moneys received by the Bureau for the Recovery of Penalties for the month of September, 1911, rendered to the Comptroller:

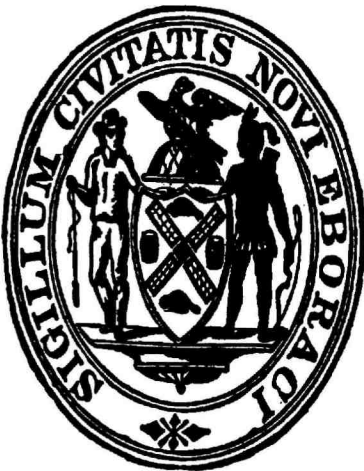

Whereas, In further pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on March 2, 1911, entering on the minutes of the Board the proposed form of contract for the grant of the franchise or right applied for, ordering said contract advertised and fixed April 13, 1911, as the date for the final public hearing thereon; and

Whereas, This Board on April 13, 1911, at the request of the Company, adopted a resolution rescinding the resolutions adopted March 2, 1911, and

Whereas, The counsel for the Company has in a communication dated September 11, 1911, stated the terms and conditions on which the Company will accept the grant; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Union Railway Company of New York City, and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1911, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Union Railway Company of New York City (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in Boscobel avenue, at or near its intersection with Aqueduct avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx; thence upon and along Boscobel avenue to Aqueduct avenue; thence westerly upon and over the easterly approach to the Washington Bridge and upon and over the said bridge and its westerly approach to the intersection thereof with 181st street, Borough of Manhattan; and thence upon and along 181st street to the easterly side of Broadway, and to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

The said route, with turnouts, switches and crossovers, hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

"Map showing proposed extension of the Union Railway Co. of New York City, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition dated October 27, 1910, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver; Edward A. Maher, General Manager, and T. F. Mullaney, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Nothing in this contract shall be construed as permitting the construction of more than one double-track street surface railway upon the route hereinabove described.

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until March 1, 1924, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may

base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. (b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven hundred dollars (\$700) and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700).

During the remaining term expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than nine hundred dollars (\$900), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(c) For the use of the Washington Bridge and its approaches during the term expiring March 1, 1914, an annual sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000); during the succeeding term of five (5) years expiring March 1, 1919, an annual sum of one thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,250); and during the remaining term of five (5) years expiring March 1, 1924, an annual sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500). The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended, and such charges as are required under chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 to be paid by the Company for this extension if said act applies to or controls the Company in relation to the right and privilege hereby granted.

The City does not and shall not demand or require the payment by the Company of a percentage of gross receipts under the provisions of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892 on the gross receipts earned on the extension constructed pursuant to this contract.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company, shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the right or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim any exemption from each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege, upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the route hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues hereinbefore described, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the

operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose but shall upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company, pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed, pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues and upon the bridge shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues and the bridge shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law, confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, and the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided further that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any Court, or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the Court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such Court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City. No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues and upon the bridge, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues, or upon the bridge and its approaches, or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of the route herein authorized to be constructed, except upon the Washington Bridge structure, by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or upon the whole or any portion of said route by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues and upon the bridge and its approaches, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, avenues and bridge of the City upon said route.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two

(2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride, from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues or bridge in or upon which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets, avenues and bridge, except when the width of such streets, avenues and bridge shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets, avenues and bridge in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues and bridge, upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

And provided further, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Bridges, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of roadway upon the bridge and its approaches.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, or upon the bridge, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or bridge in or upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

In case of the neglect of the Company to pave or repair the pavement on the streets after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough having jurisdiction, or in case of the neglect of the Company to pave or repair the pavement on the bridge after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the Commissioner of Bridges, said President or said Commissioner, as the case may be, may pave or repair the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, or upon the bridge, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—Upon one (1) year's notice from the Board the Company shall, if the Board shall so determine by resolution, cease the operation of the sub-end terminal at East 181st street and Broadway, and shall within sixty (60) days from the date of such notice make application to the Board for the right to construct, maintain and operate a loop terminal upon streets to be designated by the Board and shall on or before the expiration of said one (1) year enter into a contract for such loop terminal in substitution for the sub-end terminal hereby authorized.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall keep and maintain the tracks and the electrical equipment upon the bridge and its approaches necessary for the operation of cars thereon in good order and repair and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall furnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges for the operation of its cars. If deemed necessary by the Commissioner of Bridges, the Company shall install and operate a system of signals to insure the safe and efficient operation of cars, such system to be approved by the Commissioner of Bridges. In the event of any necessity for changing the layout of tracks, curves, switches, sidings or platforms on the bridge in order to facilitate operation of cars by the Company, said Company must do all the work and furnish all the labor and tools necessary for effecting such changes, which shall all be made

under the control and direction of the Commissioner of Bridges, and no such changes or construction connected therewith, or relating thereto, shall be made unless the plan or plans for the same have been first submitted to the Commissioner of Bridges and approved by him.

Twenty-seventh—Before beginning the operation of cars, the Company shall file with the Commissioner of Bridges a statement for his approval and assent as to the type of car which it proposes to operate and a sketch showing clearance dimensions, weight on axles and wheel spacing or such other information as may be required by said Commissioner. All cars operated over the bridge by the Company and all equipment and appliances relating to such operation shall be subject at all times to the inspection of the Commissioner of Bridges or his authorized representatives, who shall have power to forbid the entrance to the bridge of cars which may for any reason be unsatisfactory, and who shall have power to direct the removal of any old or inadequate appliance and the substitution thereof of appliances of approved character.

Said Commissioner may adopt rules and regulations in regard to the number of cars to be operated over the bridge, the rate of speed of said cars, the movement and headway thereof, the type and weight of cars to be used and the condition thereof, the switching of cars and the use of platforms and the control of the electrical current used by the Company, and the said Commissioner may alter and amend any such rules and regulations so as to secure the safety and comfort of persons using the bridge and preserve the purposes for which the bridge was constructed, and upon serving notice upon the Company that such rules and regulations have been made, amended or altered, the Company shall comply with all the requirements thereof.

Twenty-eighth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the Commissioner of Bridges to make alterations or changes in the construction, operation or management of the bridge or to affect in any way the control of such Commissioner over such bridge, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Thirtieth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Thirty-first—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or of the Commissioner of Bridges acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirty-second—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may effect the surface of the streets or of the bridge shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Thirty-third—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-fourth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which sum together with any and all sums of money or any securities heretofore deposited with the Comptroller by the Company under and pursuant to franchises heretofore granted to it by the City for the faithful performance

ance by the Company of the several franchises so granted, shall form a fund for the performance of the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board or of the Commissioner of Bridges acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street and bridge pavement, the repair and maintenance of tracks and equipment upon the bridge and its approaches, and the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board hereunder, relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of a violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount, and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-fifth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-sixth—The words "streets or avenues," and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," encountered in the route hereinabove described, and upon or in which authority is hereby given the Company to construct a railway.

Thirty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the recognition or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 48 of the Greater New York Charter.
