Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M., on Tuesday, July 30, 1912.

Present-Ardolph L. Kline, Acting President, Board of Aldermen; Edmund D. Fisher, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Robert R. Moore, Chamberlain, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Minutes of the meeting held July 17, 1912, were approved as printed.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease of premises No. 368 East 148th street, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Board of Elections:

July 29, 1912. To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen-The Board of Elections at a meeting held July 2, 1912, adopted a resolution requesting that a lease be secured of the third floor and the rear third of the basement in the Markey Building, No. 368 East 148th street, south side of street, 120 feet west of 3d avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of said Board for a period from August 1, 1912, to October 1, 1914, at a rental of \$1,000 a year, payable quarterly, the owner to pay taxes and water rates, supply heat, light and janitor service, and elevator service at all times up to 12o'clock midnight, and also to make all repairs.

These premises are to take the place of the premises now occupied by the Board of Elections at 138th street and Mott avenue, Borough of The Bronx, part of which

building is to be torn down for the subway improvement.

The Markey Building is a new 7-story and basement, fireproof loft building, 25 by 108 feet, on a lot 25 by 113 feet. It has electric light, steam heat, toilets and water. The third floor has a net floor space of 2,100 square feet, and the owner also gives 844 square feet of storage space in the rear part of basement, rent free.

The rental is therefore 48 cents per square foot for the third floor, with the free use of 844 square feet for storage in the rear part of basement. For comparison, other floors in this building rent for \$900 a year each, without

light or janitor service or any basement space.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the third floor, with 844 square feet in the rear part of the basement for storage purposes, in the Markey Building, No. 368 East 148th street, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Board of Elections, for a term of twenty-six months from August 1, 1912, to October 1, 1914, at a rental of \$1,000 a year, payable quarterly, the lessor to complete said premises by finishing the walls in sand finish and painting them, the woodwork to be the same as now installed on the first floor of said building. The lessor also to place electric light fixtures as required; to erect a partition across the said floor at a point to be determined; to have all the work completed within two weeks after occupancy; to pay taxes and water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service and elevator service at all times up to 12 o'clock midnight, and to make all inside and outside repairs. Lessor, George W. Markey, Jr., No. 368 East 148th street, Borough of The Bronx. Respectfully, WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from George W. Markey, Jr., of the third floor, with 844 square feet of space, in the rear part of the basement, for storage purposes, in the Markey Building, No. 368 East 148th street, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Board of Elections, for a term of twenty-six months from August 1, 1912, to October 1, 1914, at a rental of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) a year, payable quarterly; the lessor to complete said premises by finishing the walls in sand finish and painting them, the woodwork to be the same as now installed on the first floor of said building; the lessor also to place electric light fixtures as required, to erect a partition across the said floor at a point to be determined, to have all the work completed within two weeks after occupancy, to pay taxes and water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service, and elevator service at all times up to 12 o'clock midnight, and to make all inside and outside repairs, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises used as a corporation yard on West 123d street, between Morningside and Amsterdam avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, for use of the President of the Borough of Manhattan: July 30, 1912.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: Gentlemen-I am in receipt of a communication from W. R. Patterson, Esq., Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, under date of July 29, 1912, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises situated on the northerly side of 123d street, between Morningside avenue and Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of one year from August 31, 1912, the date of the expiration of the present tenancy.

A request for a renewal of this lease for one year from July 1, 1911, at the same rental as now asked, \$9,000 a year, was reported upon favorably by the Comptroller after an examination in a communication addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of March 28, 1911, and said report was approved and renewal of lease authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held

March 29, 1911. It will be noted that while the lease called for a renewal from July 1, 1911, for a period of one year, the request of the Assistant Commissioner of Public Works is for a period of one year from August 31, 1912. This difference of two months is occasioned by the fact that under date of June 12, 1912, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution at the request of the Department of Public Works for a continuance of said lease for a period two months without the necessity of en-

tering into a lease, making the expiration of the lease as of August 31, 1912. Under date of June 26, 1912, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution assigning to the President of the Borough of Manhattan, for use as a corporation yard, certain property owned by the City and located on the westerly side of Lexington avenue, between East 131st and East 132d streets, Borough of Manhattan. This plot, it would appear from the letter herewith, will be required for the temporary use of the contractor for the construction of the Harlem River Tunnel of the Lexington Avenue Subway, and which will necessarily deprive the Department of Public Works of the use of the premises so assigned. In this contingency it will be necessary to provide for a continuance of the lease of the present quarters as a corporation yard for a term of one year. Statement is made in said communication that the attorneys for the owners are willing to renew the lease on the same terms and conditions as existing in the present lease.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease to the City of the plot of ground with the buildings and sheds erected thereon, in the Borough of

Manhattan, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly line of West 123d street, distant 100 feet westerly from the corner formed by the intersection of said northerly line of West 123d street with the westerly line of Columbus or 9th avenue, now known as Morningside avenue; from thence running northerly and parallel with said Columbus or Morningside avenue 75 feet more or less to land formerly belonging to Clinton Molanaor; thence north 32 degrees, 35 minutes west along said land of Molanaor to the centre line of the block between West 123d and West 124th streets; thence westerly along said centre line of the block 369 feet more or less to a point on said centre line distant 275 feet easterly from the

easterly line of Amsterdam avenue (formerly 10th avenue); thence southerly and parallel with Amsterdam avenue 100 feet 11 inches to the northerly line of West 123d street; thence easterly along said last mentioned line 425 feet to the point

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present

voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to an assignment of the old Town Hall on 86th street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, to the Department of Street Cleaning:

July 30, 1912.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication to your honorable Board under date of July 22, 1912, requests that the premises owned by the City on the north side of 86th street, 169 feet east of Fort Hamilton avenue, and known as the old Town Hall of New Utrecht, Borough of Brooklyn, be turned over to his Department for the purpose of constructing a stable thereon. He says that the building on this plot is at present in an untenantable condition, but that the foundations are in good condition, and with the strengthening of the foundations and constructing a second floor after demolishing the present build-

ing, it would serve his purpose temporarily, as the location is central, and a stable at this point would mean a great saving in haul to the Department carts.

The premises known on the tax books as Lot 99 in Block 6037, Section 18, consist of a plot of land 100 feet front on 86th street by 136 feet 9 inches by 102 feet 7 inches

by 161 feet. The present building is in an untenantable condition.

The Committee on Vacant Lands reported regarding this property, recommending that it be leased for five years, but up to the present time the Bureau of City Revenue and Markets has been unable to find a tenant. That Bureau is now advertising a lease for five years from August 1, at an upset price of \$400 a year, bids to be opened at 11 a. m. Tuesday, July 30, 1912.

The nearest present street cleaning stable is stable "F" in 67th street, near 18th avenue. The City pays \$1,200 a year for the land only, the lease expiring August 15, 1916. Most of the buildings were erected by the City. This stable has sixty-nine horses and covers Bay Ridge, Dyker Heights, Bensonhurst, Fort Hamilton and Coney Island. It is located a hauling distance about three miles from the proposed stable in 86th street. At stable F the carts now average only three and three-eighths loads daily, because of the necessary long hauls.

It is the intention, if the property in 86th street is turned over to the Street Cleaning Department, to erect a 1-story stable to accommodate forty horses. That stable would cover the Bay Ridge, Dyker Heights, Bensonhurst and Fort Hamilton Districts, and stable F, with twenty-nine horses, would cover Bath Beach and Coney Island until the expiration of the lease in 1916, and both stables would then be able to average five loads a day for each cart. This, Deputy Commissioner Scott of Brooklyn states, would mean a saving to the City of \$25 a day. Under these circumstances it would seem inadvisable for the City to lease the property at 86th street at a low rental, if it can be leased at all, when it can be used to advantage by the Department of Street

I therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution of your Board adopted March 13, 1912, authorizing the leasing of the property in 86th street above mentioned be rescinded, and that the property be turned over to the Department of Street Cleaning for the purpose of erecting a stable thereon. Respectfully,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign the property known as the old Town Hall of New Utrecht, situated on the north side of 86th street, 169 feet east of Fort Hamilton avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and described on the tax books as Lot 99 in Block 6037, Section 18, to the Department of Street Cleaning.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to the payment of rent of rooms in the Stewart Damage Commission:

July 29, 1912. To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund dated July 11, 1912, from the Clerk to the Change of Grade Damage Commission, requesting that an appropriate resolution be passed authorizing the payment of rent of offices occupied by them in the Stewart Building, for the period from May 1, 1911, to May 1, 1912.

The Commission is now occupying Rooms 223 and 224 on the fifth floor of this building, the rent of which is \$1,300 per annum. Prior to May 1, 1911, they occupied Rooms 217 and 219 on the same floor, and on May 1, 1912, they changed to Rooms 223 and 224 in order to allow the Finance Department to take possession of Rooms 217

and 219. On March 8, 1911, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized the payment of \$975, being the amount of rent due for Rooms 217 and 219 for the period from May 1, 1910, to February 1, 1911; and on June 28, 1911, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized the payment of \$325, being the amount of rent due for

the same rooms from February 1, 1911, to May 1, 1911. Rooms 223 and 224 contain an area of 1,093 square feet, and the rate per square

foot is \$1.19.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the payment to Edward D. Harris, as receiver for Felix Isman, Incorporated, without the necessity of entering into a lease, of the sum of \$1,300, the amount due for the occupation of Rooms 223 and 224 on the fifth floor of the Stewart Building, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, by the Change of Grade Damage Commission, for the period from May 1, 1911, to May 1, 1912. Respectfully, WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay to Edward D. Harris, as receiver for Felix Isman, Incorporated, without the necessity of entering into a lease, the sum of thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300), being the amount of rent due for occupation by the Change of Grade Damage Commission, of Rooms 223 and 224, on the fifth floor of the Stewart Building, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for a period from May 1, 1911, to May 1, 1912.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

A petition signed by F. T. Mitt, Jr., 149 Willow street, Brooklyn, and others, objecting to the closing of the Wall Street Ferry on July 27, and requesting that action be taken to keep the line in commission, was received and referred to a select committee, consisting of the Comptroller, Chamberlain and President of the Board of Aldermen.
