Ordered, That any and all dogs loose or at large in any of the public streets, avenues, highways or other public places in the said Borough of Richmond, City of New York, unless held by a leash or chain or muzzled in such manner as to protect persons from being bitten, shall be destroyed as directed by the Commis-

sioner of Health. It is further Ordered, That this order and regula-tion shall take effect on the 1st day of August, 1912, and remain in force and ef- Department.


