AN ORDINANCE selecting a site for an additional County Court House in the County of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

1. The Board of Aldermen hereby selects the following described lands and premises located north of the Borough Hall in the block bounded by Stuyvesant place, De Kalb st., Jay st. and South st., in the 1st Ward (New Brighton), Borough of Richmond, as a site for an additional County Court House, in the County of Richmond, to wit:

"All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land, with the buildings and improvements thereon erected, situate, lying and being in the 1st Ward (New Brighton), Borough of Richmond, City of New York, bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at the point of intersection of the westerly line of Jay st. with

the southerly line of De Kalb st., running thence westerly along said southerly line of De Kalb st. 216 feet 9 inches to the easterly line of Stuyvesant place; thence southerly along said easterly line of Stuyvesant place 223 feet 10 inches to the northerly line of property belonging to The City of New York; thence easterly along said northerly line of the property of The City of New York 216 feet 9 inches to the above mentioned westerly line of Jay st.; thence northerly along said westerly line of Jay st. 224 feet to the point or place of beginning."

2. The Corporation Counsel is hereby authorized and directed to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of said lands and premises.

3. This ordinance shall not preclude the acquisition of the above described lands and premises, or any part thereof, by purchase from the owner or the respective owners thereof, at a price authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

4. The Clerk of this Board is hereby directed to prepare two similar surveys, maps or plans of said lands and premises and file the same—one in the office of this Board and the other in the office of the Clerk of the County of Richmond.

#### Department of Health.

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held July 16, 1912, the following order was made:

Whereas, Many dogs are at large and unmuzzled in the Borough of Richmond and cases of rabies have been and are of frequent occurrence and a number of persons in said Borough have been bitten by dogs; and

Whereas, The Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York has taken and filed among its records what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that these conditions constitute a nuisance dangerous to life and detrimental to health, the said Board, under its general authority to preserve the public health and abate nuisances, does hereby enter in its records that the being or running loose or at large of dogs in the streets, avenues, highways or other public places in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, is dangerous to life and detrimental to health and a public nuisance, and the said Board hereby orders the abatement of the aforesaid nuisance. It is hereby further

Ordered, That any and all dogs loose or at large in any of the public streets, avenues, highways or other public places in the said Borough of Richmond, City of New York, unless held by a leash or chain or muzzled in such manner as to protect persons from being bitten, shall be destroyed as directed by the Commissioner of Health. It is further

Ordered, That this order and regulation shall take effect on the 1st day of August, 1912, and remain in force and ef-

fect until the 1st day of November, 1912, and that this order be printed in the City Record for five days in succession beginning July 22, 1912. A true copy.

The deposit of the successful bidder will be returned when the contract is executed and its provisions in respect of the bond or deposit are complied with. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved.

**THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES** thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
