

SANITARY BUREAU.

Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases. The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 19,655, the number of causes of complaint was 9,433, as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 3,085, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 1,086 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 1,856 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by the officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 54 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 33 permits to transport manure; and 11 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

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Work of the Summer Tenement-house Corps.

The Summer Tenement-house Corps inspected tenement-houses and other dwellings occupied by the poor with a view to the discovery and treatment of such cases of sickness as might be without medical aid. The special instructions governing them in their work have been to inspect from house to house all dwellings of the poor, to prescribe for all who were in need of their services, and to give such advice and instructions as to them seem necessary for the preservation of health, always keeping in view the fact that their mission was not only the treatment, but also the prevention of disease. To further the latter object, circulars giving to mothers a few plain directions for the care and feeding of infants were freely distributed, also circulars containing instructions on the subject of sunstroke or prostration by heat.

Infants were interly distributed, also circulars containing instactions on the subject of minimum of prostration by heat. Although the principal object of this service is the care and preservation of infant life, the inspectors were instructed to treat all cases of sickness needing their aid without reference to age, at the same time to observe the rules of professional etiquette by which they are governed in private practice.

The better class of tenement-houses, occupied by thrifty, well-to-do people, were generally omitted for obvious reasons, the entire service being devoted to the needy poor, whether in tenements, smaller dwellings, or shanties. The entire number of visits to these several classes of dwellings, as will be seen, is nearly equivalent to two visits to each tenement-house in the city :

SIR—There were 572 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 8, 1883, which is an increase of 32, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 6 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1882. The actual mortality for the week ending December 1, 1883, was 537, which is 72.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.93 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,334, 166.



A T 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak th t could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred. The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was agen turned on by 4 p. M. on Saturday, the 17th instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservor was drawn down five feet.

This loss of supply in the central rark reservoirs was drawn down five feet. This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
