

# COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 12 o'clock M., on Wednesday, April 10, 1901.

Present-Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain; Randolph Guggenheimer, President of the Council, and Robert Muh, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held March 8, 1901, were approved as printed.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to bonds sold March 25, 1901:

NEW YORK, March 27, 1901.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Sealed proposals were received by the Comptroller, at his office, on March 25, 1901, after due advertisement, in pursuance of law, for \$2,500,000 of three and one-half per cent. Registered Corporate Stock of The City of New York (as hereinafter more particularly described), "exempt from taxation," principal and interest payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness.

The following communication was received from the Department of Street Cleaning relative to a renewal of the lease of premises Nos. 1897 and 1899 Park avenue, Borough of Manhattan :

NEW YORK, March 9, 1901.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners:

SIR—I desire the consent and approval of your Board, pursuant to section 541 of the Greater New York Charter, for a renewal of the lease from John Dobbins, of the premises and buildings known as Nos. 1897 and 1899 Park avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for the use of the Department, for a term of one year from May 1, 1901, at an annual rental of \$838.50, payable quarterly; otherwise on the same terms and conditions as the existing lease.

In connection therewith the Comptroller offered the following resolution:

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution relative to a renewal of the lease of premises Nos. 606 to 612 West Fifty-second street, Borough of Manhattan for the Department of Street Cleaning :

Sir—Hon. P. E. Nagle, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication under date of March 16, 1901, requests the consent and approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a renewal of the lease from Gustavus W. Rader and Michael Schmidtt, composing the firm of G. W. Rader & Co., of the Lots Nos. 606, 608, 610 and 612 West Fifty-second street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a term of three years, from May I, 1901, at an annual rental of \$1,300, payable quarterly, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as the existing lease.

This property, which consists of a plot of land 90 feet on the south side of West Fifty-second street by 55 feet deep, 160 feet West of Eleventh avenue, and adjoining Stable B, has been leased by the City for the Department of Street Cleaning since July I, 1895, at an annual rental of \$1,200 and Croton water tax, and an increase of \$100 per annum is now demanded, for a term of three years from May I, 1901.

The assessed valuation of the four lots, of which this property now leased forms a part, was \$13,000 in the year 1895, and was increased to \$14,000 in the year 1899.

At the time of the original lease the rental was fixed upon a valuation of \$27,000 for the full four lots, it being estimated that the front part of the same, being 90 feet by 55 feet, was worth three-quarters of the total plot, or about \$20,000 for the land leased, and the rental allowed was six per cent. on the same, being \$1,200.

I am of the opinion that this is a full rental, and that the renewal should be authorized upon the original terms.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises corner of East avenue and Sixth street, Long Island City, for the Queens Borough Library:

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Trustees of the Queens Borough Library, at a meeting held March I, 1901, passed resolutions requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Comptroller to execute a lease of the premises corner of East avenue and Sixth street, Long Island City, for a term of three years from May I, 1901, with the privilege of renewal, at an annual rental of \$900 for the first year and \$1,000 per annum thereatter. Owner, Peter Boyle, when we were to install a heating conventus and put the building both outside and inside in who agrees to install a heating apparatus, and put the building, both outside and inside, in

The premises consist of a two-story and cellar frame building on a plot of land 25 by 100, located on the northwest corner of East avenue and Sixth street, and at the time of annexation was under lease to the former Long Island City as a Magistrate's Court, at \$780 per annum, and the City continued to keep the corner will Amiliar

was under lease to the former Long Island City as a Magistrate's Court, at \$750 per annum, and the City continued to keep the same until April 15, 1900.

The building was in a most deplorable condition, the owner having done absolutely nothing to keep the same in repair, and although it was shown the Court had vacated the premises prior to April 15, 1900, the owner declined to accept surrender of the keys and brought suit against the City for a year's rent on account of holding over. I have no knowledge as to the

outcome of this suit. In connection with the present application President Frederick Bowley, of the Borough of Queens, addresses a communication to the Comptroller, under date of February 4, 1901, which

reads as follows: "It has been said to me that the trustees of the late Long Island City Library, now "Queens Borough Library, located at No. 24 Jackson avenue, L. I. City, are desirous of chang"ing their quarters to the premises located on the northwest corner of East avenue and Sixth

"street, same place.

"In regard thereto beg to say, that the building is the same which was condemned by the Grand Jury of Queens County as being unsanitary, unfit for City purposes, the upper part of which was occupied at the time as Magistrate's Court and the lower part thereof continued

" vacant, and has so remained.

"My object in calling your attention thereto is that the owner be obliged to first put his premises in proper condition, at his own expense, to meet requirements, and not have the City burdened in addition to fancy rental with cost of expensive alterations and additions to private "property which, when commenced, seems never to end, as is the case here in the temporary Borough Hall."

It is my opinion that if these premises are put in first-class condition, with heating apparatus, good and sufficient plumbing, replastered and painted both interior and exterior, a fair rental, for a term of three years, with the privilege of renewal, would be \$720 per annum, the owner to pay water tax, and I would therefore recommend that the matter be referred back to the trustees of the Queens Borough Library, with the request to confer with the owner and secure reduced terms, as above, or secure other quarters at a reasonable rental.

P. S.—Since writing the above I have had an interview with Mr. Boyle, and have received the communication addressed to you by Walter G. Frey, President, Queens Borough Library, under date of April 2, 1901.

This letter in full is as follows:

"In making the application for a lease of the property of Mr. Perer Boyle on the corner of East avenue and Sixth street, Long Island City, for the Nelson Branch of the Queens Borough "Library, which was presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund about a month ago, the trustees have been invested by the following considerations:

"the trustees have been impelled by the following considerations:

"The present quarters have been far too small for the past two years, and are daily becoming more crowded, seriously interfering with the work and usefulness of the library.

"The lease expires on the 1st of May, and it is therefore absolutely imperative that much more commodious quarters be obtained without delay.

"The premises offered by Mr. Boyle contain 4,000 square feet of floor space, 2,500 on the

"The premises offered by Mr. Boyle contain 4,000 square feet of floor space, 2,500 on the first floor and 1,500 on the second. The space now occupied by the library is 1,305 square feet, for which \$780 per annum is paid. Mr. Boyle offers his building, containing more than three times the amount of room, for \$900 for the first and \$1,000 per year for the next two years. Add to this the cost of heating, which is included in the present rent, and it gives an annual expenditure of about \$980 and \$1,080 as compared with \$780 in the past, which to the trustees seems a very small increase in consideration of the extra space gained.

"Annexed to the application of the trustees to the Commissioners is a letter from Mr. Boyle, in which he proposes to put the building in first-class condition and make any and all changes, trepairs and improvements the trustees may desire.

"repairs and improvements the trustees may desire.

"The building is conveniently located, well lighted on two sides, together with skylights, is on a corner, and if properly repaired by the owner is in every respect worth the rental he asks.

"In selecting this building the trustees have been fully aware of the circumstances which led to its abandoment when occupied by the City Magistrate's Court, but, after due deliberation, were careful and repeated inspections, and thorough consideration of all the circumstances, they " have arrived at the following conclusions:

"That the success of the library is paramount and should be the first consideration in decid-

"ing upon a location.
"That the rent is very reasonable.

"That the proposed building itself is perfectly sanitary, and that any unsanitary conditions which formerly existed were due to the accumulation of refuse, which through
friction and a want of thorough understanding between landlord and tenant was not removed

"by either.

"That a lease must be so constructed as to avoid a possible misunderstanding of this kind.

"That this is at present the only suitable and available location to be obtained, and that to remain longer in the present quarters will very seriously impair the usefulness and growth of the library, which up to the present has far exceeded the most sanguine hopes of the trustees.

"Finally, it is to be hoped that the Commissioners will give as much consideration, and no "more, than is its due, to the communication of Borough President Bowley upon this subject, which was written a month before the trustees had made application to your Board for a lease, by one who has never taken the trouble to enter the doors of the library, knows nothing of the necessities or exigencies of the occasion, who did not consult the trustees concerning their motives in deciding upon this location, and who was evidently actuated by some personal feeling which impelled him to write a letter to your Board, which if permitted to influence the latter could not do otherwise than seriously hamper and cripple the library for the next three years."

In my original report I considered the corner building alone, but it now appears

In my original report I considered the corner building alone, but it now appears that the one-story and cellar frame building, 40 feet by 25 feet, is to be included in the

lease.

Under these circumstances, and in view of the urgent needs of the library, as expressed in the letter above quoted, I am of the opinion that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly authorize a lease of these premises for a term of three years, at an annual rental of \$800 per annum, the owner to install a heating plant, lay a new floor in the first story of the main building, paint the outside of the buildings two coats, and make such alterations and repairs as may be required by the officials of the Queens Borough Library; the lease to date from the day of occupation, when all improvements are completed.

The officials of the library should be notified to make such arrangements for the temporary occupation of their present quarters until such alterations are completed, in order that the City will not be obliged to pay rental for two places during the coming year.

Resolved, That in the event of the owner refusing to accept these terms and conditions the Queens Borough Library is hereby requested to find other quarters.

The Comptroller presented the following statement and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of premises No. 161 Worth street and No. 34 Baxter street, Borough of Manhattan, for the Department of Street Cleaning:

SIR—Hon. P. E. Nagle, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in a communication under date of March 20, 1901, requests the consent and approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 541 of the Greater New York Charter, for a lease from Thomas Hammill of pursuant to section 541 of the Greater New York Charter, for a lease from Thomas Hammill of the store in the premises No. 161 Worth street and No. 34 Baxter street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a term of three years, from May 1, 1901, the said lease to be terminated, however, by the condemnation and taking of the said property by the City for the purpose of a park, at an annual rental of six hundred dollars (\$600), payable monthly, the owner to put and keep the place in good repair, the lessor to pay for the Croton water used on the premises.

This request is made pursuant to a communication received from the owner, through her agent, that "it is utterly impossible to accept anything less than \$40 per month or \$480 per "annum."

In my opinion, the rental value of this store, for a term of three years, with the conditions as named, will not exceed \$420 per annum, or \$35 per month, and I am unwilling to recommend \$480 as requested.

# First-No. 200 West One Hundred and First Street.

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises, which consist of a one-story brick structure, with a cemented cellar, 8 feet in height, having an area of 658 square feet on the ground floor.

The building is not finished on the inside, and has been used as a carpenter shop. The rental is at the rate of 73 cents per square foot, exclusive of the cellar, and is, in my opinion, excessive, unless it is impossible to secure other quarters in this vicinity.

I am informed that this section station is to take the place of the one now located at No. 842 Western Boulevard, the owner of which has given notice, under the terms of his lease, that he will cancel the same.

Second-No. 272 West Ninety-sixth street.

These premises have now been rented, and, in consequence, the offer to the Department of

These premises have now been rented, and, in consequence, the offer to the Department of Street Cleaning is withdrawn.

In this connection, I beg to call your attention to a former application, made by the Department of Street Cleaning, for a section station at No. 207 West Ninety-eighth street (see Minutes of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, March 8, 1901), in which I reported

1st. That it did not appear that the owner had any power to make a lease; and
2d. That the price asked, namely \$35 per month, was excessive.

It was proposed, when this application was made, to combine two section stations in one house, namely the one at No. 842 Western Boulevard and that at No. 641 Amsterdam avenue.

The application was denied by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and since that time the owner of the house, Mrs. Margaret Ryan, has presented evidence to this Department that she is now in position to make the lease for one year, with the privilege of renewal, provided she remains in possession of the property; and has also offered terms at \$25 per month, instead of \$35, as originally proposed.

I would therefore suggest that this matter be referred back to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning for further consideration, for it will doubtless be a benefit to the City to secure one building at \$300 per annum, rather than two, at a cost of three times the above amount.

M. Gibson, Deputy Commissioner of Street Cleaning, under date of April 3, 1901, I beg to advise you that I do not consider that it would be for the best interests of the City for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a lease of No. 200 West One Hundred and First street at \$480 per annum when quarters can be secured for \$300 per annum at No. 207 West Ninety-eighth street, and were originally applied for by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, which quarters it was stated would be adequate to accommodate two section stations.

In reference to this matter the Deputy Commissioner states:

"In regard to the premises offered to this Department by Mrs. Margaret Ryan, No. 207" West Ninety-eighth street, I desire to say that every effort was made to persuade Mrs. Ryan to take a lower rental than \$35 per month for her premises, and she positively refused. Later it seems that her son, who occupies a minor position in this Department, interested a city official in one of the departments, and we are informed that the two visited the Finance Department and to some one there offered these premises at a rental of \$300 per annum.

"In connection with this matter, the Commissioner bids me to say that in future, whenever the owner of premises should offer to the Finance Department, or any representative thereof, the content of the premises and the proper premises are a lease of the premise premises and the proper premises and the proper premises and the proper premises are premised to the premise premise premise premise premises that the proper premises are premised to the premise premise premise premises

"In connection with this matter, the Commissioner bids me to say that in future, whenever the owner of premises should offer to the Finance Department, or any representative thereof, premises for the use of this Department at a lower rental than they offer the same premises to this Department, that he will under no circumstances enter into a lease with them, as he does not propose to be placed in such a position by people with whom he is trying to do business on a purely business basis.

"Therefore, he will enter into no lease with Mrs. Ryan at any rental whatever, and in view of this fact it would be hardly necessary to give the premises of Mrs. Ryan any further consideration."

records for the past will show that owners have in many cases accepted less sums than recommended by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, and which original amounts have been considered reasonable and just to him, but were found in the opinion of the Engineer to be excessive.

Sir—The question of quarters for the Department of Buildings in the Borough of The Bronx subsequent to May 1, 1901, when the lease of the present quarters expires, has been the subject of two communications from Hon. T. J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, dated respectively March 9 and March 28, 1901, and an offer from Forbes J. Hennessy, as attorney for Robert C. Wood, the owner of the building on the southeast corner of Third and Wendover avenues.

The present quarters of the Department located at No. 2775 Third avenue, comprise the second and third floors of the building, for which the City pays an annual rental of \$1,500, the lease of which expires May 1, 1901. At present the upper floor is not used for the purposes of the Department, as the Commissioner has caused all records, maps and plans to be moved to the Manhattan office, and the second floor is used solely for a place of meeting for the Building Inspectors, where each morning they attend and make out their reports for the previous day, which are then forwarded to the main office in Manhattan. It will thus be seen that under the present system desk room for the number of Inspectors employed in the borough is all that is required.

The Commissioner in his communications states:

The Commissioner in his communications states:

"I beg leave to state that the quarters now occupied by this Department in that borough are located in a building constructed of wood and brick. I have not, therefore, deemed it wise to keep the records of the Department in that borough. A fireproof or even a semi-fire-proof building would of course be preferable, and Mr. Hennessy's letter states that the building offered meets those conditions."

"I would respectfully state that the premises mentioned are preferable to those new years."

"I would respectfully state that the premises mentioned are preferable to those now occupied, both by reason of better location and construction of the building.

"I would therefore recommend that that building be hired, provided that such changes and

"alterations as may be required by this Department for its convenient use shall be made at the

expense of the lessor."

I have caused an examination to be made of the building on the southeast corner of Third avenue and Wendover avenue, which consists of a five-story and cellar brick structure, about 30 feet by 90 feet, occupied by a liquor saloon on the larger part of the ground floor, and arranged for living apartments above. Each floor is divided into four flats of four or five rooms and bath, for living apartments above. Each floor is divided into four flats of four or five rooms and bath, and the gross rental value of the second floor as now arranged, I am informed, is \$768 per annum,

or \$16 per month each for the flats. This building is not, in my opinion, of fireproof construction, other than the main hallway and staircase.

The offer of Mr. Hennessy, on behalf of the owner, is to lease this floor to the City at an annual rental of \$1,500, for a five-year term, making such alterations to the interior as may be

annual rental of \$1,500, for a five-year term, making such alterations to the interior as may be necessary.

The Commissioner does not state in his communications what alterations will be necessary, so that it is impossible to form an estimate of the expense to which the owner will be put.

Should, however, the alterations consist in merely removing certain partitions and the erection of others, I am of the opinion that such changes would not involve the owner in any considerable expense, and that for a five-year term the rental to be paid by the City should not exceed the gross rental value of the premises at present, viz., \$768 per annum; and if the Commissioner of Buildings desires to change his quarters, he should enter into negotiations with the owner to secure such a reduction in the rental asked, and also have it definitely stated what alterations are to be made to make the premises suitable for the use of the borough office.

It would appear to me, however, that before a lease for a five-year term for this office should be consummated, the matter of the proposed changes in the Charter should be considered. This change proposes to abolish the Department of Buildings as such, and to create in each borough a

bureau under the President of the Borough, the said bureau to have custody of all plans, maps and papers, and unless a building were secured at this time, particularly adapted for the safe custody of the same, I do not consider that it would be for the best interests of the City to make such a change at this time.

I would therefore recommend that the Commissioner of Buildings be requested to enter into negotiations at once with the owner of the present quarters, and secure from him an offer of renewal for one year from May I, of the second floor alone, at a proportional reduction in the rental.

"The City is now in possession of said premises, claiming under a tax deed made in 1890 by "the Register of Arrears of the City of Brooklyn of lots known as 8 and 9, Block 13, Ward 22 "on the Assessors' Map of the City of Brooklyn.

"I am satisfied that the tax deed is void and that I will be successful in my action; but for the "purpose of avoiding the delay of a trial I am willing to pay the City the sum of two hundred "and fifty dollars for a release of said premises."

"purpose of avoiding the delay of a trial I am willing to pay the City the sum of two numbers and fifty dollars for a release of said premises."

On August 23, 1900, a claim was filed in this Department by the said Grace E. McTernan, for possession of the above-described premises, which claim was forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to its legality, and I am informed that no reply has as yet been received.

The facts in the case, so far as I have been enabled to investigate, appear to be:

That the property consists of a plot of land, as above described, with a building thereon.

That up to July 1, 1882, the property was in arrears of taxes and assessments, and under the provisions of the "Arrears Act," chapter 114 of the Laws of 1883, the same was sold and bought in by the City of Brooklyn for \$1,155.01, which sum was the amount fixed upon by the Board of Assessors as a just and equitable amount in lieu of all arrears of taxes and assessments to the said date.

The taxes and assessments levied against the property from 1882 to 1896, amounting to \$1,126.56, were paid by the City of Brooklyn, and are, in consequence, no further lien on the

Under the provisions of the "Arrears Act," the City of Brooklyn completed its title to the said property, and a deed was delivered to the City of Brooklyn by the Register of Arrears on November 20, 1800.

A statement published by the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn, on November 24, 1894 (Document 59), gives the amount due the said city on that date as \$3,790.59.

On December 8, 1897, the property was offered for sale by George W. Palmer, Comptroller, and Thomas S. Martin bid the sum of \$2,650 for the same, but no part of the purchase money was paid, and the City remained in possession of the property.

Prior to January 1, 1898, the City of Brooklyn collected the sum of \$165 in rentals from the property, and since that date The City of New York, through this Department, has collected the sum of \$1.065.

The claim is made that the tax deed is void, for the reason that the lots known as 8 and 9 were assessed together, contrary to the statute, and, in consequence, that The City of New York has been, and is, in illegal possession of the property, and is, in addition, liable for the revenue collected therefrom.

The offer of \$250 is made for a quit-claim deed of the property, the claimant waiving all rights to the return of the revenue collected.

I know of no power of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to compromise this claim, and would advise that it be sent to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion and advice.

It would appear to me that the claim should be resisted in every possible way, for it will effect numerous other properties sold under the "Arrears Act," now held by the City, how many, I am mable to state

effect numerous other properties sold and the II am unable to state.

In conclusion, I beg to call your attention to the fact that if the tax deed as above is illegal for the reason that the tax is void upon the grounds that each lot was not assessed separately, it would appear to me that the tax on hundreds of properties as assessed by the Department of Taxes and Assessments to-day is void, and, in consequence, any rulings and decisions should be assembly considered before action is taken.





I have caused an examination to be made of the premises, which consist of a new two-story and cemented cellar frame building, about 60 feet front by 60 feet deep, on a lot 60 feet front, 43 feet rear, by 100 feet in depth, situated on the northerly side of Myrtle avenue, about 300 feet west of Fresh Pond road, near Glendale, Borough of Queens.

The ground floor is divided into three stores, with living apartments in the rear, and an entrance, hallway and staircase to the living apartments above.

Ehlers, which expired on the first of the present year, but was renewed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for an additional term of one year, at an annual rental of \$600 per annum. These upset prices are, as explained to me at the Department, made by adding fifty per cent. to the amount received for each of the ferries for the year 1900. The rate is 11.65 per cent. of the gross receipts.

the gross receipts.

Referring to the report of Comptroller Myers and the resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in 1893, when the terms of the present lease were under consideration (see Minutes of the Sinking Fund, 1893, pages 173, 191, 192, 193), it will be seen that the price was fixed at 734 per cent. of the gross receipts.

At that time the matter of ferry leases was under the control of the Sinking Fund Commissioners. By the Charter it is now placed under the control of the Board of Docks (see sec. 826) "but said board shall make no lease authorized by this section unless the terms of "said lease are approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund."

The Board of Docks apparently have, under this section, the right to make the appraisals of these upset prices; in my opinion they have made them too high, the receipts from at least three of these ferries having been considerably decreased between 1896 and 1900, as follows:

The Wall Street Ferry, from \$90,479 to \$84,280.

The Fulton Ferry, from \$137,509 to \$133,014.

The Catharine Street Ferry, from \$133,521 to \$125,903.

The Hamilton Ferry has increased about \$1,500 and the Atlantic Ferry about \$6,000.

I do not understand that any negotiations have been made with the Company by the Dock Board

With the alterations necessary to be made to conform to the ideas as given above, as to the appraised valuation, the bids to be received for all the ferries together, and the upset prices, I see no objections to approving the forms submitted, except that in the fifth paragraph, page 3, the words "at a fair appraised valuation" should be changed to read "at the valuation of \$3,229,401," and that the sixth and seventh paragraphs should be stricken out; instead of which I would insert: The lease shall contain, in addition to the requirements of the existing laws relative to ferries belonging to The City of New York, a covenant that any person or corporation that may acquire said ferry franchise after the expiration of the term of the lease hereby granted, other than the present lessee, shall be required to purchase, at a fair appraised valuation, the boats, buildings and other property of the former lessees or grantees actually necessary for the purpose of such ferry or franchise.

Provided, however, that The City of New York shall not be deemed thereby to covenant to purchase said property in any event, but the obligation resting upon it shall be deemed to be fully satisfied and fulfilled by making such purchase by the grantee a condition of said ferry franchise.

franchise.

The appraisement of the boats, buildings and other property owned by the lessee or lessees of the said franchise shall be made within four months prior to the expiration of the lease, and shall be made in the following manner:

"The Comptroller of The City of New York shall nominate, and the present lessee, each, a disinterested person to act as appraiser, and such persons shall together value and appraise such boats, buildings and other property owned by the present lessee, and report their conclusion thereon, in writing, with their signatures thereto, and in case such appraisers are unable to agree thereon within thirty days after their appointment, then and in that case they shall have power to choose a disinterested person as umpire; or in case of their failure within ten days after the expiration of said thirty days to agree upon an umpire, then the selection of said umpire shall be made by the then Presiding Justice of the Supreme Court, in the First Judicial Department, upon application of either party hereto, to be made upon two days' notice to the other, and said umpire shall in like manner value and appraise the said boats, buildings and other property owned by the present lessee, in use or used by the present lessee, and the conclusion of a majority of said three persons when committed to writing and signed by them, shall be taken and accepted as the fair and appraised valuation."

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if net the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.
