Great activity has been shown in the various Bureaus in the surveys, mapping and monumenting and in the work of preliminary surveys and estimates in preparation of contracts for public improvements, as well as the supervision and care of these works when under contract.

Prompt response has been generally rendered to requests from the Local Boards for estimates and reports.

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

The topographical survey for the territory east of the Bronx river has been completed. This survey has been plotted on a scale of 80 feet to an inch, the sheets numbering 87. This map is also reduced to a smaller scale for general use.

On petition to the Local Board of Morrisania for changes in the laying out twelve maps have been prepared.

On petition of property owners and suggestions from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the street system east of the Bronx river has received careful consideration, with a view to greater economy in the area of land to be taken for streets and public places, and also with a view of retaining as much as possible the streets and roads now in use by the public. Much progress has been made in the matter.

Careful surveys have been made to determine and fix the northern boundary line of the City east of the Bronx river.

Monumenting.

In making the transverse surveys for the monumenting of new streets there appeared to be discrepancies in the triangulation coordinates at certain points and a difference in standard of measurement between the work east and west of the Bronx river. In view of these it was deemed necessary to remeasure the two bases and investigate the triangulation system generally. The determination of a standard of measurement, which should have been done before the triangulation work was commenced, is found to be necessary now. This is still in progress, and we hope shortly to be able to determine the question so that the monumenting may be pushed ahead with as much speed and accuracy as possible.

The testing, setting, resetting and referencing of monuments on 81 streets west of the Bronx river where local improvements were in progress has been attended to during the quarter.

Sewerage and Grades.

The work on the plans for Sewerage District No. 43 has been pushed as much as possible and a preliminary scheme has been prepared.

Brook and Webster Avenue Outlet Sewer.

In view of the numerous complaints of overflow, said to be due to insufficient outlet facilities, received from residents along the line of the Brook avenue and Webster avenue outlet sewer and some of its branches during the past two years, investigations and studies of the conditions existing in the watershed of which this sewer is the outlet have been conducted with a view of determining whether some scheme of relief of this outlet is not necessary at this time. Considerable progress has been made, and we are led to believe from the facts already obtained that the sewer is insufficient to properly carry off the drainage in extremely heavy storms such as the two heavy storms of the summer of 1901. This work is being progressed as rapidly as possible, and I trust that in a few months I may be able to present the facts with suggestions for the necessary relief measures.

Plans and profiles have been furnished in 5 matters of proposed grade changes, and in 3 matters information was furnished as to relation of the established grade to the present surface west of Bronx river. Profiles were prepared showing the relation of the established grade to the present surface in 5 proceedings for street openings east of the Bronx river.

The leveling necessary for the above profiles amounted to 24,920 linear feet.

Street Opening Proceedings.

Rule maps in triplicate and technical descriptions were furnished in 2 proceedings, making 1,609 linear feet of street.

Draft damage maps were prepared and forwarded in 6 proceedings and preliminary draft damage maps were made for 2 proceedings, covering in all 416 plots representing 1,197.3 City lots in area.

Draft benefit maps have been furnished in 8 proceedings covering 7,142 plots, in addition to this benefit maps have been prepared in 17 other proceedings. Final copies of damage and benefit maps have been furnished in 7 proceedings, with 351 maps. Damage map surveys have been completed in 4 proceedings. In addition to above, much of the time of the Assistant Engineer in charge of street openings has been taken up in testifying before the various Commissioners; for other details see Bureau report.

SEWER BUREAU.

The work of construction and maintenance has received the usual care, and gratifying results have been secured.

The contracts in force at the beginning of the quarter numbered 48, and 14 were executed during the quarter, while 10 were completed, 8 of which are still under six months' repairs, leaving on September 30, 1902, sewer contracts in force to the number of 52.

At the beginning of the quarter there were 186,663 miles of sewer in the borough, to which 3,719 miles have been added, making a total of 190,381 miles September 30, 1902.

At the beginning of the quarter the receiving basins numbered 2,187, and 27 have since been added, making a total of 2,214 on September 30, 1902.

The supervision of the sewers under contract involved a large amount of engineering and clerical work.

Preliminary surveys have been made for 22 sewer improvements, with a total length of 58,294 linear feet.

The preliminary survey is in progress for the Unionport and Westchester system and is well advanced.

Estimates of cost have been made in 15 proceedings. The amount certified for payment during the quarter was \$235,901.08.

HIGHWAY BUREAU.

The Engineering and Construction Branch of this Bureau has been taxed to its utmost to keep up with great amount of contract work in force and the preliminary work called for by resolution of the Local Boards.

The contracts in force on July 1, 1902, numbered 50, while during the quarter 28 were executed, 10 being completed, left a total of 68 contracts in force at the end of quarter.

Preliminary surveys and estimates of cost and assessed valuations were made to the number 33. The addition to the mileage of paved streets has been slight, being 0.168 miles, making a total of paved streets in the borough at the end of quarter of 57,642 miles.

The total amount of payments certified during the quarter was \$158,044.84.

Other details appear in the detailed report of the Engineer of Highways.

For details of Maintenance Department work see the report of the Superintendent of Highways and the Superintendent of Incumbrances.

The public buildings and offices have had the usual care, and such repairs have been made as the small appropriation would allow. The Municipal Building is in need of thorough repairs, and something should be done to secure the necessary funds.

The details of this Bureau are given in the Superintendent's report.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of July, August and September, 1902:

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

- I. To make the topographical surveys.
- II. To prepare the design for the street system and to make the maps for adoption and filing.
- III. To define on the ground by stones and bolts the lines of the adopted street system, and to protect the said monuments when improvements are being made in the streets.
- IV. To prepare the design for the drainage and sewerage system and determine the grades of streets and sewers.
- V. To make surveys, searches, technical descriptions and maps for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the matter of acquiring title to avenues and streets.
- VI. To keep in custody the records and maps of all matters pertaining to the above-mentioned five (5) items.
- VII. To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I. To Make the Topographical Survey.

The topographical survey of the territory west of the Bronx river was completed about 1876, and the topographical survey east of the Bronx river, which was begun after annexation of the territory in 1895, can be considered completed also.

The field notes of the survey of the territory east of the Bronx river have been plotted on a scale of 80 feet to 1 inch for the use of the office, and the second set is under way, to be placed on file in the office of the President.

There will be eighty-seven maps covering the area east of the Bronx river. Surveying, which is done in connection with street opening matters, with setting monuments, establishing grades, will be specially mentioned under the proper heads.

II. To Prepare the Design for the Street System and to Make the Maps for Adoption and Filing.

District West of the Bronx River.

A number of petitions were received by the Local Board of Morrisania for amendments to the filed maps; on some of these action was taken and maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption.

They were as follows:

5. Map or plan showing modification of street system between Palisade ave. and Hudson river, from Spuyten Duyvil creek to West 240th st.
6. Plan and profile showing the locating and laying out and the grades of Cottage place, from East 170th st. to Crotona Park South.
7. Map or plan showing change of lines of East 162d st., from River ave. to the intersection of Walton ave. and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse approach.
8. Map or plan amending sections 2 and 3 of the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, now Borough of The Bronx, by widening Wales ave., from Kelly st. to East 149th st.; Robbins ave., from Westchester ave. to East 149th st.; Beck st., from Robbins ave. to Beach ave., and Fox st., from Robbins ave., in order to include strips of land which have been part of former streets, in accordance with chapter 651 of the Laws of 1897.
9. Map or plan showing an amendment of section 17 of the final maps of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards by discontinuing and closing an unnamed street, between Decatur ave. and Marion ave., extending from East 193d st. to East 194th st.
10. Map or plan showing change of grade of Westchester ave., between Southern Boulevard and Bryant st.; Bancroft st., between Westchester ave. and Whitlock ave.; Hoe st., between Aldus st. and Westchester ave.; Faile st., between Aldus st. and Westchester ave.; Bryant st., between Aldus st. and Westchester ave.; Longfellow st., between Aldus st. and Westchester ave., and Whitlock ave., between Aldus st. and Westchester ave.
11. Map or plan showing the locating, laying out and the grades of Palisade place, from Popham ave. to Sedgwick ave.
12. Profile of Hoe st. showing change of grades between Home st. and Freeman st.

Section 22 of the final maps has been amended as to Palisade ave. and its contiguous streets at Spuyten Duyvil.

District East of the Bronx River.

The tentative plan of the street system having been adopted by the Board of Public Improvements August 31, 1898, fourteen sections were filed prior to January 1, 1902, which sections show all the necessary dimensions and grades required to stake out the avenues and streets and to proceed with the legal opening of the same.

Petitions were, however, received by the Local Board for alterations and amendments of the filed and unfilled sections.

It was resolved, therefore, to prepare a new tentative plan, in which attention was called to the petitions, as well as to the suggestions made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in regard to reducing the width of a number of 100-foot streets and in relation to retaining existing avenues and streets as far as possible.

This plan is well advanced, and will probably be before the Local Board during the next quarter.

Calculations are under way for amending section 29 of the final maps in accordance with the new revised tentative plan.

The northern boundary line of the City, from the Bronx river to Long Island Sound, was established as required by legislative action.

An exhaustive triangulation of Hog Island, or "Pass Rocks," and its connection with Hunter's and Glen Islands was made and the boundary line located in the centre line of the channel between Hog Island and Glen Island.

During the past quarter no requests were made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to prepare maps for filing.

III. To Define on the Ground by Stones and Bolts the Lines of the Adopted Street System, and to Protect the Said Monuments When Improvements Are Being Made in the Streets.

During this quarter sixty-two orders were received for setting, resetting, testing and accurately referencing sixty-two monuments. Fifty of these orders were completed during the quarter, and thirty-one orders which had been received prior to this quarter were attended to, making a total number of attended to orders eighty-one.

In July the remeasurement of the Unionport base line was begun with a 300-foot tape standardized by the Department of Public Parks standard of fifty feet length. A 300-foot length was laid out on the eastern edge of the ball ground in Crotona Park and fixed by stakes 4 inches by 4 inches. These were held by reference stakes on either side. All measurements were made at a temperature of nearly 70 degrees Fahrenheit, and were done in the shade at early sunrise or toward sunset.

The 300-foot stakes in the ball ground were extended 50 feet at either end, making a line 400 feet in length, and the bars used in triangulation were referred to it.

The bars were used without electrical contact, as they had been tested at Washington without it.

The chaining of Unionport base line was done under similar conditions, the staking out being done in midday hours.

The Eastchester base was then taken up and work is in progress there.

The numerous creeks along this base line necessitate bridging, which delays the work considerably.

The traverses of Tremont and Westchester aves. have been rebalanced consistent with the latest results of investigation and agree very well with themselves.

During the quarter at least about nine days were spent by the Assistant Engineer in charge of street opening work at the Bureau of Street Openings, giving testimony concerning various matters in connection with street openings.

VI. To Keep in Custody the Records and Maps of All Matters Pertaining to the Above-Mentioned Five (5) Items.

The assorting and classifying of maps has been continued. No maps were ordered filed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment during this quarter, and therefore none were deposited in the vault of the Topographical Bureau.

VII. To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

During the quarter 182 communications were referred for report to the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and 126 reports and letters were written on these subjects.

Draughting.

The reduction of the Topographical survey, east of the Bronx river, on a scale of 150 feet to the inch, which was commenced during the last quarter, has been continued, and the map on a scale of 300 feet to the inch is nearly completed.

Work on amending and correcting 80 feet scale topographical sheets has been kept up during the quarter.

The finished maps made during the quarter are reported under the different heads above, and numerous auxiliary maps, studies, copies, which were necessary for the preparation of the finished maps, were made.

No special record can be given of them.

The force of the Topographical Bureau consisted on September 30, 1902, as follows:

One Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer, nine Assistant Engineers, one Assistant, four Transmitters, one Computer and Draughtsman, seven Computers, twenty-two Draughtsmen, three Levelers, four Rodmen, twelve Chainmen, seven Axemen, one Typewriter, one Junior Clerk, one Assistant Foreman, one Sounder, six Laborers, one Driver and two Watchmen.

Coleman, Jules Breuchaud and B. F. Coleman, contractors, for building the New Croton Dam, on Croton river, at Cornell site, in the Town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, N. Y., as provided by the said agreement, which is hereto annexed and made a part thereof.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, Comptroller, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

This agreement made and entered into the 26th day of December, in the year 1902, by and between the Aqueduct Commissioners of The City of New York, party of the first part, acting under the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, by direction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and the firm of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, all of The City of New York, party of the second part.

1. Whereas, On or about the 31st day of August, 1902, a contract was made and executed for building a new Croton Dam at Cornell site, on Croton river, in the town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, New York, by James S. Coleman, upon which contract the American Surety Company of New York is surety.

2. Whereas, The said contract was subsequently assigned by James S. Coleman to Coleman, Ryan & Brown, which said assignment was subsequently agreed to and concurred in by the said American Surety Company of New York.

3. Whereas, Said contract was subsequently assigned by Coleman, Ryan & Brown to Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, which said assignment was agreed to and concurred in by the said American Surety Company.

4. Whereas, Pursuant to the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, entitled "An act relative to the powers of the Aqueduct Commissioners provided for and holding

office under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 and its amendments," the said act amending an act to provide new reservoirs, dams, and a new aqueduct with the appurtenances thereto for the purpose of supplying The City of New York with an increased supply of pure and wholesome water, the said Aqueduct Commissioners were "authorized and empowered to agree with any person, firm or corporation with whom they have contracted or may hereafter contract, upon such terms and conditions as shall in their judgment and discretion be for the best interests of The City of New York; that eight hours shall constitute a day's work for laborers employed by said person, firm or corporation in the performance of his or its contract, and no laborer employed in the performance of any such contract shall be required, permitted or allowed to work more than eight hours," and it is further provided that "no agreement made under the provisions of this act shall be valid or binding until the same has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York"; and

5. Whereas, A resolution was passed by the Board of Aqueduct Commissioners on the 16th day of December, 1902, as follows:

(a) Whereas, The contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam on the Croton river, at Cornell site, in the town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, N. Y., was entered into by The City of New York in 1892, before the eight hour working day now in force by statute in all new contracts had been adopted by legislation as the policy of the State in all public work; and

(b) Whereas, Chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902, a copy of which is hereto attached, authorizes and empowers the Aqueduct Commissioners, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to agree with any of their contractors, upon such terms and conditions as shall in their judgment and discretion be for the best interests of The City of New York that eight hours shall constitute a day's work for all laborers employed by any person, firm or corporation in the performance of his or its contract, and that no laborer employed in the performance of any contract shall be required, permitted or allowed to work more than eight hours; and

(c) Whereas, The contractors for the New Croton Dam have applied to said Commissioners to exercise said authority and modify their said contract accordingly, claiming that this legislation has caused strikes and delays and hindered them in the prosecution of their work, and asking that the time for the completion of said work be extended on account of the change from a composite to a masonry construction of a portion of the said dam; and

(d) Whereas, Under these circumstances and by reason of strikes and the failure to procure a sufficient force of employees, delays in the construction of the New Croton Dam have already occurred and will continue, so that under present conditions, assuming that there should be no strikes, it will take nearly three years to complete the work, while if the said authority, conferred by said statute upon the Aqueduct Commissioners is exercised, the contractors state that through the working of several shifts of men and in other ways many difficulties can be obviated and the work completed many months prior to that date; and

(e) Whereas, A joint public hearing has been given upon this application by the Aqueduct Commissioners and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment without calling out any public protest to such modification of said contract, and said application having been referred back to the Aqueduct Commissioners for further action by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and it being the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners that the exercise of this authority will importantly hasten the completion of said dam, which is of vital consequence to the water supply system of the Manhattan and The Bronx; and

(f) Whereas, The contractors have agreed with the Aqueduct Commissioners to a schedule of prices which represents the additional cost to them of the work when prosecuted on an eight hour basis, which prices were fixed after careful examination by the Aqueduct Commissioners and their Chief Engineer, a schedule of which is hereto attached and constitutes a part of these resolutions; therefore

Resolved, That, in the opinion of the Aqueduct Commissioners, the authority and power conferred upon them by chapter 588 of the Laws of 1902 should be exercised in the case of the contract for the construction of the New Croton Dam, and that in their judgment and discretion for the best interests of The City of New York the contractors should agree to the following conditions, which they have already informally accepted, namely:

To observe the requirements of said act as to the eight hour working day; to complete the New Croton Dam and have the same ready for use not later than the first day of October, 1904, to which date the time for completion shall be extended; and that prior to the first day of December, 1903, such portion of the work shall be completed as may be necessary, in the judgment of the Aqueduct Commissioners, to allow the commencement of the filling of the New Croton Reservoir with water on said date; that the prices to be paid to said contractors shall be those incorporated in the schedule hereto annexed and go into effect as soon as the Chief Engineer has completed the necessary measurements; and that the sureties on said contract agree, in writing, thereto; and further

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners submit the foregoing preambles and resolutions to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its consideration and approval, and that, in the event of such approval, the Corporation Counsel be requested by the Aqueduct Commissioners to prepare the necessary papers to amend or modify the said New Croton Dam contract in accordance therewith.

(C) That for all laborers employed by the parties of the second part in the performance of their contract for said construction of New Croton Dam on the Croton river, at Cornell site, in the town of Cortlandt, Westchester county, New York, eight hours shall constitute a day's work, and no laborer employed in the performance of said contract shall be required, permitted or allowed to work more than eight hours in any one calendar day, except in cases of extraordinary emergency caused by fire, flood or danger to life or property.

(D) That the time for the completion of the work be and the same hereby is extended to the first day of October, 1904, and that prior to the first day of December, 1903, such portion of the work shall be completed as may be necessary in the judgment of the Aqueduct Commissioners to allow the commencement of the filling of the new Croton Reservoir with waters on said date. The penalties to be as set forth in the original contract.

(E) That except as herein specifically provided, the original contract is to continue in full force and effect.

(F) That this agreement is to be of no effect whatever until the sureties to the original contract shall have agreed in writing to the changes.

(G) That this contract shall not be valid or binding until the same has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as in chapter 588 of the laws of 1902 is provided.

That this contract shall not be binding or of any force unless the Comptroller of The City of New York shall endorse thereon his certificate that there remains unexpended and unapplied, as provided in the Greater New York Charter, a balance of the appropriation or fund applicable thereto sufficient to pay the estimated expense of executing this contract as certified by the officers making the same.

SIR—Regarding the premises No. 62 Monroe street, to be taken for Bridge No. 3, Manhattan Bridge, I would report that the same falls within plot required for the anchorage on the Manhattan side. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held December 5, 1902, upon request of Bridge Commissioner Lindenthal, authorized the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the sites required for the Manhattan and Brooklyn anchorage of the Manhattan Bridge.

I have had the premises No. 62 Monroe street examined, and find that it is Lot 4, of Block 254, south side of Monroe street, 266 feet 11 inches west of Pike street and 121 feet 10½ inches west of Mechanics alley, lot 25 feet by 92 feet 10 inches, with five-story and cellar, cold water tenement, with stores 25 feet by 72 feet. The building is old, but is in fair repair, gas and stationary tubs, but no ranges or hot water; toilet in rear yard. There are four families on a floor. The property is assessed at \$14,000 in the name of Susan K. E. Moffit, and is owned and controlled by Gordon Levy & Co., of No. 230 Grand street. The asking price of \$30,000 is not greatly excessive when the rental value (\$3,000 per annum) is taken into account.

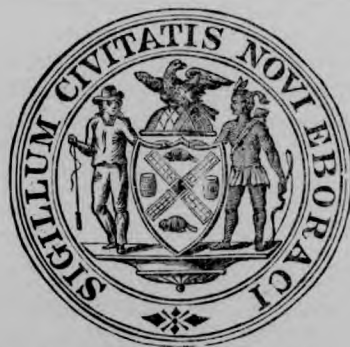

Section 26. For all lodging houses in The City of New York, containing rooms in which there are three or more beds for the use of lodgers, a permit from the Board of Health shall be required, and no person shall have, lease, let or keep any such lodging house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of such permit. The beds in all lodging houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Four hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to cause the above ordinance as amended to be published in the "City Record" once a week for two weeks.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE NEW York City Inter-Borough Railway Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a street surface railroad in, upon and along certain streets, avenues, parkways, highways and bridges of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches, crossovers, and suitable status necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by the overhead system of electricity, or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, in, upon and along the following-named streets, avenues, parkways, highways, public places, bridges and viaducts, all situated in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, namely:

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets, avenues, highways, parkways and public places to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the grantee, or in the event that such consent cannot be obtained, the grantee shall obtain the favorable determination, confirmed by the Court, of three Commissioners, appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, in the manner provided by the Railroad Law, before said railroad is built or operated.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successor or assigns. It shall be in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority. One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder. The three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the streets, avenues, roads, highways, public places, bridges and viaduct, including power house, equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York on the termination of such grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise, and such value shall be determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority.

Fourth—The New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$15,000, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$15,000; during the remaining twenty years on term, an annual sum which shall not be less than \$30,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$30,000; for the use of the four bridges described above, during the first term of five years the annual sum of \$4,000 for each bridge; during the second term of five years the annual sum of \$4,500 for each bridge; during the third term of five years the annual sum of \$5,000 for each bridge; during the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$5,500 for each bridge; and during the last term of five years the annual sum of \$6,000 for each bridge.

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railroad, provided, however, that the first payment shall only be for that portion of the above sums as the time of the commencement of operation of any portion of the road, before September 30th next preceding, shall bear to the whole of one year. The fiscal year shall end on September 30th next preceding said date of payment, and the provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies shall be strictly followed. The intention of this paragraph is to fix an annual charge to be paid by the grantee, its successors or assigns to The City of New York for the rights and franchise hereby granted, and it shall not be construed as providing for the payment by the grantee, its successor or assigns of a percentage of gross receipts within the meaning of any general or special statute, referring particularly to chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute of the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property

therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the Union Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, and by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law. Provided, however, that as to such portions of the route of the said railroad which are within the limits of the Borough of Manhattan such railroad shall be operated as soon as practicable by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison avenues in the Borough of Manhattan. And, provided further, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, upon giving to the grantee, its successor or assigns, one year's notice in writing, may require it or them to operate its railroad upon the whole or upon any portion of its route by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system now in use on the railroads in the Borough of Manhattan above referred to, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, highways, bridges and public places of the City of New York.

Eighth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Tenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall be five cents, and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or a line or branch operated in connection therewith to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City of New York. The rates for the carrying of property upon the cars of the grantee shall in all cases be reasonable in amount and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Eleventh—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the City ordinance.

Twelfth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway proper fender and wheelguard in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fourteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Fifteenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said street, avenues, highways, parkways, public places, bridges or viaducts, shall have and keep said streets, avenues, highways, parkways, bridge and viaducts, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, highway, parkway and public place and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Sixteenth—The said railway company so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues, highways, bridges and viaduct shall cause to be watered the entire roadway of each of the above streets, avenues, highways, bridges and viaduct, except when the width shall exceed 60 feet shall be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit.

Seventeenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Eighteenth—If any of the streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets, avenues, highways, public places or bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York, in respect to the opening of such streets, avenues, highways, public places and bridges.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article 4 of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted affecting the surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grant of this franchise shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar franchise upon the same or other terms and conditions over the same bridges and their approaches, and the viaduct and over the streets and highways within a distance of 1,000 feet from the end of such approaches to said bridges and viaduct, to any

other person or corporation, and in such case the use of the street railway, including tracks, wires and other equipment constructed thereon by the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, aforesaid, shall be granted by such company to any person or corporation which The City of New York may hereafter grant the right of franchise to use any portion of such viaduct, such bridges and their approaches for the street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum which shall not exceed the legal interest on one-half the cost of the construction of such portion of such street railway, and the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars of such company thereon and one-half the cost of maintenance of the tracks, wires and other equipment of the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company used by the said grantee, including the watering, paving and cleaning of streets from ice and snow and all the other duties imposed upon the New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company in connection with the maintenance of the portion of its road used by said grantee. And such persons and companies shall have the right to make all track and necessary connections which may be requisite and necessary to connect with the tracks of the grantee, its successors or assigns, it being intended by this provision to restrict to two the number of tracks upon the bridges above described and the approaches thereto, including the viaduct in West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street.

Sec. 5. The portion of the route above described which passes over the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct and the Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and its approaches shall be operated by the grantee, its successors and assigns, solely upon the street railway, erected in such streets, bridge, approaches and viaduct by the Union Railway Company of The City of New York, and not otherwise, and upon such terms of payment as may be agreed upon in the manner fixed by the provisions of a certain grant of a street railway franchise to such Union Railway Company of The City of New York, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 1903, provided that such grant is accepted by said Union Railway Company and in case such grant shall not be accepted by such company then the operation of the Inter-Borough Railway Company over such bridge and viaduct shall be carried on in such manner as may be provided for by subsequent legislation.

Sec. 6. Said railway company shall commence construction within six months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the City officials and departments, and shall complete the construction of at least twenty-four miles of double-track railway on or before July 1, 1905, otherwise this grant shall be forfeited. Provided that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may extend such time for period or periods not exceeding one year if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the City officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said avenues, streets, roads, highways, bridges and viaducts may extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the City officials.

Sec. 7. This grant is upon the express condition that The New York City Inter-Borough Railway Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of fifty thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railroad and in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the street pavement, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any default so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of fifty thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

Sec. 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Office of the City Clerk, City Hall, New York, February 6, 1903. The foregoing proposed ordinance and grant of franchise was approved by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted January 30, 1903. It was received by the Board of Aldermen February 3, 1903, and on that day a resolution was adopted by the Board of Aldermen appointing the 17th day of February, 1903, for the consideration of the subject matter of such ordinance.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contracts must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
