Acting Superintendent's Report.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, Acting Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, reported as follows:

The reports on tuberculosis, typhoid and malarial fevers and cerebro-spinal meningitis, furnished to the Board of Health, have not been satisfactory, the doctors having failed to notify the office of the number of cases in their wards. It was recommended to the President that a Hospital Helper be appointed at a salary of forty dollars a month to do this work. Since she has been attending to these matters there have been no complaints.

Dr. Erdwurm, Junior Assistant on the Third Medical Division, who had been suffering from diphtheria and whose illness was reported to your Board, has been discharged cured, from the diphtheria hospital.

The matter of hurry calls, injuries to the Ambulance Drivers, Surgeons, etc., has been reported to the Medical Board, in accordance with the directions of the President.

The new tent for the children will be complete in a few days, and the addition to the prison ward for men is nearly complete.

The new diet kitchen will be opened on July 1, and Miss Delano has been requested to prepare a list of articles necessary for the same.

Mr. Myles Tierney and Mr. Theodore E. Tack, Trustees, called at this institution, and directed that this Department aid the Department of Charities in caring for the dead brought to the morgue from the "General Slocum" fire. A statement is herewith submitted showing what articles were supplied by this Department.

Harlem Hospital—The Supervising Nurse of Harlem Hospital reported an insufficiency of milk for the patients at that institution, and by direction of the President twelve quarts additional have since been furnished daily.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Superintendent in engaging an additional Hospital Helper, at a salary of forty dollars a month, to report on contagious diseases to the Board of Health, be and the same is hereby approved.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the expenses incurred in caring for the dead (at the Morgue) of the wrecked steamer "General Slocum," and in supplying persons with food on that occasion, be approved and ordered paid.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, the Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:

On June 29 a notice was received from the Bureau of Highways in reference to repairing the sidewalk and curbstone at No. 123 East Twenty-seventh street. On July 5 a member of the firm of A. M. Johnson, representing Mrs. C. A. Bruce, said that the matter would receive immediate attention without charge to this Department.

On June 30, while answering a call to Seventeenth street and Third avenue, ambulance No. 6 was struck by a trolley car. The Driver was not hurt. The Doctor received some contusions and a slight cerebro concussion, but has so far recovered as to be able to be about. The ambulance was damaged to the extent of about \$100, and the company has been requested to pay for the repairs.

In a week or ten days the addition to the male prison ward will probably be ready for occupancy. A new floor has been ordered laid in this addition.

It is requested that a Senior Clerk be appointed at a salary of about seventy-five dollars a month, to assist in disposing of some of the detail work of the Department.

A letter from William A. Dibbs, Claim Agent for the New York City Railway Company, in answer to a request that the company pay the bill of \$98.70 for repairs to ambulance No. 6 is herewith presented.

The rules and regulations governing the House Staff have been received, and, in accordance with Rule 67, on page 13, each member of the House Staff has been supplied with a copy and has signed a receipt for it.

In order to permit the Department of Docks and Ferries to remove the coping stone from the old sea wall it is necessary that the brick wall on the east side of the coal bin be taken down, and also the hoisting apparatus, track, bridge, etc. This will cost about \$225, and in accordance with the direction of the President estimates on this work have been asked for.

The trial balance for the first six months of 1904 is herewith submitted, and it is recommended that a transfer of four thousand dollars to the appropriation "Clothing for the Insane," and twenty-five hundred dollars to the appropriation "New Ambulances, Horses, Harness" be made from the salary appropriation.

The minutes of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board for the meeting held on the 1st of July were received and ordered placed on file, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees approve of the nomination of Dr. Harlow Brooks as Pathologist to Gouverneur Hospital, and he is hereby appointed Pathologist to said institution.

On motion, duly seconded, it was further

Resolved, That Drs. Herbert C. deV. Cornwell and Edward L. Kellogg be appointed, respectively, Assistant Attending Physician and Assistant Attending Surgeon to Gouverneur Hospital.

The minutes of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board for the meeting held on the 1st of July were received and ordered placed on file, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the following rule, recommended for adoption by the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, be and the same is hereby approved and adopted: "It shall be the duty of the Supervising Nurse of Fordham Hospital to report immediately, in writing, to the Chairman of the Executive Committee, or, in his absence, to any member of the Committee, all delinquencies or disorderly conduct on the part of a member or members of the House Staff."
