Mr. M. J. Rickard, Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:

Presenting proposal of the Ducker Company to furnish four portable buildings, with a capacity of 30 beds each, equipped with necessary conveniences for lavatory purposes, including toilets, at a cost of \$3,500 for each building.

Recommending that an additional \$1,000 be asked for in requesting appropriation for the installation of these buildings, to cover the cost of the necessary heating, lighting and sewer connections in these buildings.

Reporting the overcrowded condition of the Metropolitan and City Hospitals, where patients in large numbers occupy springs upon the floor.

Reporting that for some time past Dr. Bauer, Examining Physician of the Department of Public Charities, has been sending to this institution for accommodation suspected cases of contagious diseases, and recommending that the Department of Public Charities be requested to make some other disposition of these cases on account of the inability of Bellevue to properly provide for its own suspected cases.

Reporting that Dr. Bauer later stated that if Bellevue would care for these suspected cases for one week longer, other arrangements would be made in behalf of the Charities Department.

Calling attention to three unpaid tax bills against the Fordham Hospital account for the years 1902, 1903 and 1904, properly chargeable to the appropriation entitled "Rents," and reporting that sufficient surplus remains over from the years 1902 and 1903 to properly discharge this obligation for those years; reporting also that this bill for the year 1904 was overlooked until the estimate for 1905 had been made and passed upon and that consequently no allowance was made for this item; and, finally, suggesting that the same be charged to the appropriation for "Rents," and that due provision be made for this item in the appropriation for "Rents, 1906."

Communication under date of December 1, 1904, was received from Miss Sarah A. Gainsforth, enclosing report of attendance of Visiting Physicians and Surgeons at Harlem Hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, the same was ordered placed on file.

Communication under date of December 15 was received from Dr. M. S. Gregory, inclosing a certificate from Dr. Charles H. Holmes, announcing that he had passed the non-competitive examination for the position of Alienist in the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Dr. Gregory requests the temporary appointment of Dr. Holmes.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That Dr. Charles H. Holmes be and he hereby is appointed Assistant Alienist in the Psychopathic Ward of Bellevue Hospital, such appointment to be temporary and in accordance with the rules of the Civil Service Commission.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
