## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

### Report of the Bureau of Weights and Measures for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1910.

Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures,  
City Hall,

Hon. WM. J. GAYNOR, Mayor, City of New York, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to report herewith the work of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures, for the quarter ending March 31, 1910.

The following tabulation consists of the number of inspections and investigations made, the number and kind of instruments tested, the kinds of business carried on where inspections were made and violations reported, the amount of

penalties involved in the complaints, the number of criminal actions forwarded to the District Attorney's office for prosecution, the number of requests by merchants and others for special tests, the number of complaints received at this office, the number of days spent in court by Inspectors prosecuting violators of the short weight laws, and a summary of the time records of the force.

A synopsis of the work performed and in contemplation, recommendations for the betterment of the Bureau and safeguarding the public in their purchases of coal, together with the location of official coal scales, follows the tabulation.

In the above number violations eight hundred and eighty-seven (887) were reported as infractions of the Ordinance; three (3) for the violations of State Coal Law; seven (7) for violating the Penal Law.

The penalties involved in the above violations amount to a total of twenty-five thousand and seventy-five dollars (\$25,075).

The time spent at court by Inspectors prosecuting the cases in the interest of the Bureau equalled 88¼ days.

A noteworthy case of short measure, it being the first prosecution for delivering short measure in milk, was tried in Special Sessions Court, First District. The complaint made by the Sealer in this action was of 4½ quarts short in 30 quarts of milk delivered to a grocer in the Borough of The Bronx at 4 o'clock a. m. The Bureau was sustained in this case.



Three peddlers were prosecuted in the Criminal Courts of Manhattan, two for selling short weight, and one for using sawed-off weights four ounces light to the pound.

A coal dealer delivering 1,800 for 2,000 pounds was fined \$25 or five days in jail. Another coal dealer has been reported for delivering 1,910 pounds for 4,000 pounds, a shortage of 2,090 pounds; still another dealer has had four violations lodged against him in one month's time. He was found delivering a ton of coal on January 13 which was 230 pounds short weight, and on January 18 one ton was 180 pounds short, and one ton 60 pounds short; on February 14, he was found delivering a ton 40 pounds short. Since then, no shortage has been reported against him.

Late in the month of March, peddlers and hucksters using scales and measures on carts were given attention by this Bureau. Many of them were found using false bottom measures, pails with false bottom or side; weights drilled out or sawed off, leaving them one-quarter pound or more light weight. Some weights that were drilled had the holes filled with cork or wax and blackened over to deceive the eye; many old dilapidated scales being more than four ounces out of balance were condemned.

Practically the same ground was gone over several days in succession. In this work, lasting one week, there were condemned 338 instruments of various kinds; 64 violations of the City ordinance were lodged against peddlers in this crusade. The regular and constant visits to peddler markets, which will be made in the future, will do much to control this worst of all abuses.

Generally when peddlers are found violating the law, action is taken for the recovery of a penalty under the ordinances. In the past, this method has proven quite ineffective, for the reason that the service of legal papers on the defendants could not be consummated, as removals between the time the Inspectors reported the violations and the date of service took place. Seventy-five out of the one hundred and twenty complaints lodged against peddlers last year were returned to this office by the Bureau for the Recovery of Penalties, for the reason above stated.

A regular and systematic inspection of all the large scales owned by the city, in use by the various departments, has been undertaken; this work will result in the proper checking of the receipt of supplies. Many of the scales have been condemned for repairs.

A new method of sealing was instituted at the beginning of this quarter, which it is believed will cause traders to keep their scales up to the standard and, in great part, help to eliminate the use of incorrect or unsealed instruments.

Condemnation tags are now placed upon incorrect scales, which serve as a check in the use of any scale not conforming to the standard. When a scale is tagged for repairs the owner within a reasonable time, has the necessary repairs made.

The Bureau caused a test of milk bottles used in the large dairies in the city. Numerous violations lodged with the Corporation Counsel, for using bottles not conforming strictly to the standard, were returned by the Bureau of Penalties, for the reason that bottles were held to be not measures as defined by the ordinance.

#### Recommendations.

There is urgent need of at least ten additional Inspectors in this Bureau. It is impossible to properly inspect the weights and measures used in this city, with a force of less than thirty men. In the City of Boston, with a population of about one-seventh of this city, there are employed ten Sealers of Weights and Measures, while but nineteen are engaged here at present to protect our large population, which nearly equals the population of the rest of this State, wherein over 125 Sealers are employed.

At least six Inspectors should be assigned to the weighing of coal; two more should look after the travelling markets, peddlers and hucksters, junkmen and ice men, and all who do business with the use of wagons or carts.

Two Inspectors should be detailed at the city markets; two more should be engaged on special investigations, and one other Inspector could give his undivided attention to City departments and public institutions.

Three Inspectors should be assigned to supervise the work in the field, while two should be assigned to act directly under the Chief, one as Deputy and one as Chief Inspector.

Twelve Inspectors, working with conveyances, would take care of the primary test in regularly assigned districts. With this force properly assigned and fully equipped, the Weights and Measures inspection of this city, could be carried out in a manner to sufficiently protect the public property as represented in purchases.

There should be established in various parts of the Greater City weighing stations equipped with scales of at least ten ton capacity, where the purchasing public could have the weight or measure of a load or quantity of goods officially weighed and verified; and until such scales be established, it is suggested that the large scales used in City departments be used as "Public Weighing Scales." This use of City scales would partly supply a long felt and very necessary want. In certain localities there are at present no official coal scales.

In Queens Borough there is but one officially designated coal scale, and that is located at Flushing Creek.

In Richmond Borough no official coal scales have been designated, and various parts of Manhattan have no such scales.

There are many so called licensed City Weighers or Public Weighers doing business in this city.

These Weighers are principally engaged in weighing goods for importers and exporters along the water front. Such Weighers do not serve the general purchasing public in any manner; they operate under no known law; their so-called licenses to weigh goods are issued by the various commercial exchanges.

The previous recommendations made regarding the amendments to the ordinance, licensing such Weighers, should be made effective as speedily as possible, in order to bring them under the supervision of this Bureau.

There should be provided at least five specially constructed test wagons, capable of carrying ten tons of test standards. These wagons are necessary for the testing of large scales throughout the city; they could also be used in regular district work.

It is impossible to fulfill the duties which this Bureau should perform without the proper means of transportation and equipment in testing every instrument in use. Most of the large scales used in commercial houses have never been fully tested, owing to the lack of funds to procure necessary equipments.

Through the co-operation of the Bureau of Markets, suitable testing booths have been allotted to this Bureau in the various markets throughout the city. It is proposed to establish substations in markets where practicable, so that the marketmen can have their scales, etc., readily tested by this arrangement, and in a measure the public will be furnished more protection in their purchases.

It is recommended that the proposed ordinance submitted as part of the annual report of this Bureau be adopted; the reforms proposed therein will, it is believed, remedy the many defects and omissions in the present ordinance, and serve to give the public adequate laws for their protection in trade transactions of all kinds.

Larger quarters should be provided for this Bureau, the room now occupied being too small for present needs. Anticipation of increased functions warrant the asking of more room; there should be a regular and fully equipped laboratory, for the purpose of testing all instruments used for weighing or measuring, and the standardizing for manufacturers and others of patterns of measures of all kinds. This would bring about uniformity in the manufacture of measuring instruments, scales, weights, etc.

In conclusion, I would recommend that the public make use of the official coal weighing scales, to verify the weight of their purchases of coal. The location of all the officially designated scales is given below by Boroughs.

Section 154 of the general City law provides "That weighings can be made on such scales, if the place of loading or delivery is not more than one-half mile distant from such scale." Any person having coal reweighed is entitled to a certificate, as provided for in said section. The cost of verifying the weight of each ton is 15 cents.

Section 155 of the same law prescribes a penalty of \$50 for any seller of coal refusing to permit the coal purchased from him to be reweighed at the request of the purchaser. All that is necessary to have the coal weighed officially is to pay the driver the regular 15 cents per ton and order him to return with the weighmaster's certificate.

It is hoped that the public will avail itself of this protection offered and have an occasional load of coal reweighed.

Whereas, It is desirable that these methods shall be officially declared by the Board of Education to be the proper safeguards for the furtherance of this work; be it

Resolved, That folk-dancing should be used for recreative, social and physical training purposes only, and that, while such dances may be used for exhibition purposes before assemblies of parents, they should not under any circumstances be used at exhibitions where pay is required or the general public may attend, with the exception that field days and festivals outside the schools to which the children belong (which are not primarily for exhibition purposes and which are conducted under the proper auspices) should be allowed after permission has been obtained from the Committee on Athletics.

Resolved, That exhibitions of less than six girls should not be given under any circumstances.

Resolved, That all special costumes should be prohibited unless they be of a simple nature, such as a wash or hair-ribbon of the most inexpensive material.

Resolved, That dances used during or after school shall be those of the syllabus of physical training such as have been previously approved by the officers of the Girls' Branch of the Public Schools Athletic League.

Resolved, That after-school competitions in folk-dancing, basketball, hockey or any other form of games or athletics for girls shall be prohibited.

Resolved, That boys and girls shall not compete with each other in folk-dancing or athletics.

Whereas, The Local School Board of District No. 46 has requested that the site acquired for school purposes on Gordon and Targee streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, be used for playground purposes during the coming summer, without cost to the City; and

Whereas, Said site has not been turned over to the Board of Education and remains in the care and custody of the Comptroller; be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby respectfully requested to permit the use of the above mentioned site for playground purposes during the summer of 1910.

Whereas, The resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 14, 1910, directing the heads of Departments to refrain from executing any further contracts chargeable to corporate stock without the express authorization of said Board, prevents the Board of Education from awarding a contract for the construction of a grandstand upon the Brooklyn Athletic Field, to contain the dressing and toilet accommodations which are indispensable to the use of this important athletic field; and

Whereas, There is an unexpended balance of upwards of \$130,000 remaining of the issues of corporate stock to the amount of \$500,000 heretofore authorized for the acquisition, construction and improvement of sites for four athletic fields in The City of New York; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be, and it is hereby, urgently requested to authorize the Board of Education to enter into a contract for the construction and fitting up of a grandstand upon the Brooklyn Athletic Field in an amount not to exceed \$45,000, the same to be chargeable to the unexpended balance of the issues of corporate stock hereinbefore mentioned.

## DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

### Report of Transactions, April 11 to April 17, 1910.

#### Communications Received.

From the Mayor—Enclosing report from the State Commission of Prisons requesting that the matter of quarters of Sheriff's prisoners at the City Prison, Brooklyn, be thoroughly looked into and report thereon made, in writing, to the Mayor. Letter acknowledged.

Matter of other quarters for Civil prisoners in Brooklyn should receive attention at once. Copies of letters from ex-Commissioner Barry and from the present Commissioner sent to the Mayor, which letters show the efforts which have been made to have the Sheriff's prisoners removed from the Raymond street prison.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Transmitting eligible list for position of Resident Physician, at \$1,200 per annum. All notified to call. All declined. Municipal Civil Service Commission asked to send a longer list.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Transmitting eligible list for the position of Keeper, at \$800 per annum. All notified to call. Three appointments made from list.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Secretary states that the Commission has approved of the designation of Mr. Francis J. O'Connor, Private Secretary to the Commissioner of Correction, as a member of the Departmental Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class; also as a member of the Board of Promotions, vice Joseph Liebertz, Private Secretary, resigned. Letter acknowledged.

From the Comptroller—Returning the following proposals for supplies for manufacturing purposes, with approval of the sureties thereon: Proposals of J. F. Herbert, E. B. Wright, E. G. Shepard, George Josephie, P. J. Constant, J. E. Ogden and Manhattan Supply Company. Awards to be made and contracts drawn.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Inquiry regarding the necessity for printing 250 copies of form of contract for portion of new penitentiary on Rikers Island. Deputy Comptroller asks why so many copies (at a cost of \$2,083.93) were printed. Comptroller informed that the Department usually has 100 copies of contracts and specifications printed. In this case, the work being of such magnitude (to cost about \$2,250,000) it was deemed wise to have at least 250 copies printed.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Referring to voucher filed by General Book-keeper and Auditor of Department of Correction for "Contingencies," Central Office, January and February, 1910. Sums of \$9.45 and \$26.50 were expended on "Inspections," care fare, etc., by Captain Parkinson. Detailed information asked for. Notify the Comptroller that items for expenditures by Captain Parkinson were authorized by the Commissioner. The Captain is detailed to watch the construction of three (3) steamboats now being built for the Department (one at Noank, Conn., and two at West New Brighton, Staten Island), which necessitates his going to and from these places. The work he is doing is of considerable value to the Department, and the expenses thereby incurred are reasonable and just. They should be paid.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Stating that bill and voucher for \$35.15, in favor of W. R. Ostrander & Co., has been mislaid. Duplicate asked for.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Stating that voucher for \$3,450 has been filed in favor of the Griscom-Spencer Company, for repairs to ice plant, Harts Island. No certificate regarding extension of time was attached to papers, etc. Notify the Comptroller that time on contract was extended to March 7, 1910. Copies of letters granting extensions sent to Finance Department.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Transmitting report of Inspector in connection with claim of Troy Laundry Machinery Company for repairs to plant on Harts Island. Send to Comptroller, in answer to Inspector's report, copies of letters from Purchasing Agent, and Warden; also from the Curran Manufacturing Company, declining to undertake the work.

From the Comptroller (Inspection)—Enclosing report made by an Inspector regarding the poor quality of beef delivered by contractor at the City Prison, Brooklyn. Copy of specifications for beef contract sent to Warden. These specifications must be complied with by contractor.

From Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—From Chief Engineer of Light and Power, in regard to use of electric current at City Prison, Manhattan, since lighting of the institution has been undertaken by the Edison Company. Report on above by John H. Schroeder, Department Electrician. In answer, state to Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that strict orders have been given to

Warden to be as economical as possible in the use of lights. Statement as to use of "50 c. p. Lamps" must be a mistake. Copy of Electrician Schroeder's report, showing that conditions complained of are not chargeable to the Department of Correction, sent to Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Also asking that Department as to what is required of the Edison Company under agreement.

From Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Chief Engineer of Light and Power—Enclosing copy of letter from Finance Department in matter of contracts of John T. 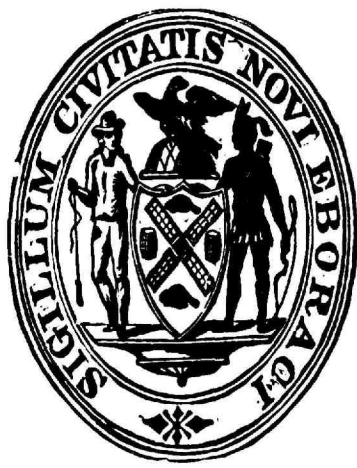
