Painters—Painted halls, corridors, windows, and skylights of old prison; walls, ceiling, windows and woodwork of hospital; walls, corridors and 72 cells in new prison; woodwork of search room and counsel rooms, storm-houses at entrance to old prison, new prison and boys' prison; iron gates and wooden doors of bread-room, carpenters' shop, dining-room and kitchen; 2 iron gates in laundry and 1 iron gate in hospital; iron railings on bridge at court-room, hand railings at cellars of new prison and female prison; iron railings on arches in hall at entrance to old prison; woodwork in water-closet, in office and wainscoting along stairs from fourth tier to door of first tier; woodwork at scales in prison yard and 2 windows in female prison; calcimined ceiling of new prison, ceiling and walls of search room, counsel room, laundry, rooms in Magdalen, water-closets in office and in old prison.

Plumbers—Repaired tanks in old prison with 1½-inch ball-cocks, 3 1-inch stop-cocks, 6 feet 1½ inch water-pipe, 4 elbows, 1 T and 2 unions in water-pipe; repaired pump in female prison with 3 1-inch stop-cocks in water-pipe; repaired 9 water-closets in female prison, old prison and new prison; repaired water-pipes in old prison and new prison with 10 feet water-pipe, 2 feet 34-inch lead pipe, 2 unions, 4 T's, 3 2-inch iron elbows and 8 iron hooks; placed 12 faucets in water-pipes in cells; placed wash-tubs in laundry with 25 feet 34-inch iron water-pipe; 18 ½-inch elbows, 2 unions, 6 T's, 10 feet 2¼-inch lead waste-pipe, 2 1-inch stop-cocks, 2 ½-inch brass faucets, and 12 iron pipe hooks, 40 feet 6-inch stove-pipe, 6 elbows, 2 T's and 3 sheets galvanized iron for stoves in laundry.

Carpenters—Fitted up a room for hospital; built 5 skylights, with ventilators, on old prison, each 10 feet long, 5 feet wide and 4½ feet high; repaired floor at entrance to bridge; built partitions in female prison and male prison, and doors for rooms in female prison.

Masons—Cut a doorway in wall of counsel room from office and placed a sash-door, 8 feet high

Masons—Cut a doorway in wall of counsel room from office and placed a sash-door, 8 feet high by 3 feet wide in the same; cut a doorway in room in female prison and placed a door and casing in it 7 feet 2 inches high by 2 feet 8 inches wide; cut 2 windows in wall of church-room and 2 windows in Magdalen and 1 in Warden's office, and placed casing and sashes and iron bars in the windows; pointed up, with cement, prison wall; placed a brick floor, 8 feet long by 3½ feet wide, in water-closet in prison yard.

Tinsmiths—Repaired roof of old prison at skylights with 136 sheets tin (14 by 20 inches each), 20 pound solder, 4 pounds nails and barrel charcoal; built 10 ventilation pipes, each 10 inches in diameter, on roof of old prison; also, 3 galvanized-iron pipes for ventilation to roof of Magdalen, each 15½ feet high by 12 inches in diameter; placed new bottoms in 10 tin boilers and handles, in 5 tin boilers for kitchen.

Blacksmiths—Placed 18 iron bars, asphall for the common frame of the common framework.

Blacksmiths—Placed 18 iron bars, each 4½ feet long, in railing in Leonard street; 7 iron bars in hospital windows; wire screen in window and door in office; 3 iron cot frames for cells, fourth tier; iron bars and boilers in cellar and repaired boilers; wire screen on 4 cell doors, first tier old
