REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES.

The total gross revenue of the Department for the year ending December 31, 1900, amounted to \$2,857,658.50, distributed as follows:

From leased wharves and wharfage, \$2,405,471.64; from ferry rents and franchises, \$369,701.06, and from all other sources, \$82,485.80.

The expenditures from the Dock Fund during the same period were \$3.616,567.50. Of this amount \$1,801,349.58 was expended for the work of construction; \$1,009,822.52 was paid for wharf property; the sum of \$634,339.39 was expended for repairs and maintenance, while the general expenses of the Department amounted to \$81,056.01.

The expenditures during the year from the Wallabout Fund for the Improvement of the Wallabout Basin in the Borough of Brooklyn amounted to \$93,012.50.

REPORT OF THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES PIER "A," FOOT OF BATTERY PLACE, NORTH RIVER,
OFFICE OF THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF,
NEW YORK, February 1, 1901.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under the charge and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief for the year ending December 31, 1900.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION UNDER "NEW PLAN."

NORTH RIVER.

Battery Section—Embracing the boat landing, Pier "A," Pier, new I, North river, and about 80 feet of bulkhead north of Pier, new I.

Completed in 1871, and a temporary breakwater, to protect small boats, built in 1897.

On the 19th of January, 19c0, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a permanent stone breakwater in accordance with lines and plans approved by the Secretary of War and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. The temporary wooden structure has been removed and work on the new breakwater has been in progress.

This breakwater will inclose a basin about 220 feet by 150 feet, the structure itself to be of concrete and granite.

concrete and granite.

Openings are provided for the ready access of small boats from the various merchant ships and launches from the men-of-war and yachts.

Inside of the basin there will be provided a floating pontoon, which, adjusting itself with the tide, will admit of a ready landing place for the various boats after they have entered the basin.

The wooden breakwater which was built about four years ago has proven inadequate for the purpose owing to the large number of boats which land in the vicinity of Battery Park during the

summer.

The City maintains this landing place free of charge, and it is to be used by any small boat desiring to land or take on men or supplies for the boats lying in the harbor off the Battery.

In character of construction the breakwater will form an important feature of water-front improvement, with a massive granite face, and upon lines which will form not only an architectural feature, but also provided with suitable lights, which will be a guidance for any craft entering the

harbor after dark.

Pier "A," North River—It having been found advisable to enlarge the office accommodations on the pier, made necessary by the increase of the office force consequent upon the consolidation of Greater New York, the Board of Docks, on the 30th of March, 1900, authorized the extension of the inner end of the building 50 feet mshore and also certain alterations in the sanitary system.

Foundations for the extension were laid and a contract let for the erection of the building.

Productions for the extension were laid and a contract let for the erection of the building. This work is practically completed.

Property in Vicinity of Piers, old 12 and 14, North River—Looking towards the acquisition of property in the vicinity of Piers, old 12 and 14, North river, for the purpose of improving the water-Iront, the Counsel to Corporation has been requested to institute proceedings for the acquisition of the private interests in that locality, which action has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of December 27, 1900.

Pier, new 29, North River—The extension to the outer end of this pier has been planked.

Desbrosses Street Section—The Pennsylvania Railroad Company, owners of the old bulkhead on the westerly side of West street, between Vestry and Watts streets, began building the bulkhead or river wall in front of their property under the provisions of chapter 397 of the Laws of 1893, and also under a permit and agreement made with the Department of Docks on October 30, 1894, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 18, 1894. About 80 feet northerly of the Laight street section were completed and a shed built upon a part of it, when the work was temporarily suspended. Work was resumed at the upper end of the section on August 4, 1898, and substantial progress in the work has been made. The old ferry structures have been removed and a well-appointed ferry-house, with the necessary racks and bridges, has been constructed at the northerly end of the work. The wall has been rapidly pushed to the south, and as soon as completed the new ferry-house will be extended to cover the same.

Pier, new 31, North River—A shed has been erected on the pier and the bulkhead north thereof by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit from the

Board of Docks.

Pier, new 32, North River—A shed has been erected on the pier by the New Jersey Steamboat Company under permit from the Board of Docks.

Gansevoort Section—Extending from the northerly side of Pier, new 46, to the northerly side of the Pier at Gansevoort street, North river, a distance of about 2,133.61 feet.

The improvement upon this section has been done in general accordance with the plan and proposition submitted in the annual report of 1880, and modified in accordance with the needs and requests of the lessees. The wall has been completed from Gansevoort street southerly to Pier, new 46, a distance of 2,054 feet. Filling has been placed behind the wall. There still remains a small portion of the wall to be built under the approach to Pier, new 47. The section is practically completed, thus making a stretch of the bulkhead or river wall of over a mile be tween Watts and Gansevoort streets.

The property will have to be acquired by condemnation proceedings.

Condemnation proceedings are pending for the acquisition of various parcels of property in this vicinity, and Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were appointed February 26,

The work of building the bulkhead or river wall has been authorized by unanimous resolution of the Board December 28, 1900.

New Ouster Basin - The construction of the bulkhead-wall at the Gansevoort section necessary.

New Oyster Basin—The construction of the bulkhead-wall at the Gansevoort section necessitated the removal of the oyster scows from the old basin. The Board, by resolution of August 26, 1898, directed the Engineer-in-Chief to proceed with the removal of Pier, old 57, and with the construction of an extension to Pier, old 56½, North river, and with the construction of a new pier north of Bloomfield street on the new pier-lines and an extension thereto, to form a temporary oyster basin. The work was begun on September 6, 1898, and was completed during 1899, and the oyster boats moved to their berths in the new basin.

Pier, Seventeenth Street, North River—A new pier has been constructed by the force of the Department.

Between Piers, new 56 and 57, at Twenty-sixth and Twenty-seventh Streets—A transfer bridge has been erected in front of the bulkhead between these streets by the Lebigh Valley Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks.

Pier, Thirty-ninth Street, North River—A new pier has been constructed at the foot of this street under Contract No. 600.

Negotiations, which had been pending for a number of years for the acquisition of the private interests in the Pier at the foot of Forty-third street, having been brought to a close by the initiation of condemnation proceedings, work on the section was begun in July, 1899, and is now in progress from time to time.

The wall was completed and put in use in 1891.

West Fifty-second Street Section (north end)—Extending from the northerly side of West Fifty-first street to the northerly line of West Fifty-fifth street, a distance of 1,043 feet 4 inches.

The wall at this section was completed in 1897.

West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Extending from the northerly side of West Fifty-fifth street to the southerly side of West Fifty-eighth street, a distance of 762 feet 6 inches.

The wall at this section was completed in 1893, and the Department yard was extended southerly to Fifty-sixth street upon the filling placed behind it.

The total continuous length of the bulkhead or river wall on West Fifty-second street section (southend) and West Fifty-second street section (north end) and West Fifty-seventh street section is 2,210.46; all of which has been completed and is in use.

It having become necessary to rebuild the Pier at the foot of Fifty-ninth street, occupied by the Union Stock Yard and Market Company, it was thought advisable to construct also the wall in this vicinity. On June 27, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the work to be begun at this section at the foot of Fifty-ninth street.

The lease to the Pier at West Fifty-ninth street was canceled, and work on the wall at

the foot of the street has been in progress.

Pier, West Fifty-ninth Street, North River—Λ new pier is in course of construction under Contract No. 692, and a contract has been prepared for the erection of a freight shed thereon. Pier I, North River—An extension to the outer end of the pier is being constructed by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit from the Board.

EAST RIVER.

Broad Street Section—Extending from the westerly side of Pier, old 4, East river, to the easterly side of Pier, new 7, a distance of about 736 feet.

The Board, on December 22, 1899, authorized the building of the wall at this section, and the construction of two new piers, Nos. 4 and 5.

Excellent progress on the construction of this section has been made during the year. Piers, old 4, 5 and 6, have been removed, and the wall completed on the "E" course of granite for a distance of about 317 feet. This section includes Piers, new 6 and 7, which were built some years ago, as well as Piers, new 4 and 5, which were authorized by the present resolution, and as well as extensions to the outer end of Piers, new 6 and 7.

Pier, new 4, East River—A new pier has been constructed at the foot of Broad street under Contract No. 680.

This pier has been leased to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and an extensive freight shed is being constructed thereon under Contract No. 688.

Pier, new 5, East River—A new pier has been constructed near the foot of Coenties slip under Contract No. 678. Contract No. 680.

Pier, new 6, East River—The resolution of the Board having authorized the extension of this pier out to the pierhead-line of 1890, test piles have been driven over the area of the proposed extension to ascertain the nature of the river bottom preparatory to the commencement of work on the extension.

Between Whitehail and Montgomery Streets - The Board of Docks having amended the original plans for the improvement of the water-front between these streets, proceedings looking original plans for the improvement of the water-front between these streets, proceedings looking towards the acquisition of private interests in various parcels have been taken. This stretch is divided into three parts; the first extending from Whitehall to Wall street, the amended plan for which was approved by the Board of Docks November 3, 1899, and by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund December 6, 1899; the second extending from Wall to Catharine street. The amended plan for this portion was adopted by the Board of Docks October 26, 1900, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 14, 1900; the third extending from Catharine to Montgomery street. The amended plan for this portion was adopted by the Board of Docks December 30, 1898, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund February 3, 1800.

1899.

Catharine Section—Extending easterly from the easterly side of Catharine street a distance of about 177 feet. Work on this section was begun and pushed ahead rapidly, the wall being completed as far as possible until the acquisition of further property. About 107 feet have been completed on the "E" or top course of granite.

Market Section—Extending from about 177 feet easterly from the easterly line of Catharine street to the easterly side of Pier, new 31, a distance of about 801 feet, under a resolution of the Board of February 23, 1900. Work on this section was begun in the latter part of the year and is in progress.

Length of wall completed on the "E" course, 13.41 feet.

Piers, new 29 and 30, East River—The old piers in the vicinity of the sites to be occupied by the new piers are being removed, and a contract has been prepared and submitted for the construction of two piers 70 feet wide, to be known as Piers, new 29 and 30. This contract will be let early in the new year.

Deer way 21—A new pier west of Pike slip is being constructed under Contract No. 686, and

Pier, new 31—A new pier west of Pike slip is being constructed under Contract No. 686, and is approaching completion.

Rutgers Section—Extending from the easterly side of Pier, new 31, easterly to the easterly line of Rutgers slip, a distance of about 868 feet, under unanimous resolution of the Board

February 3, 1899.

Work on this section was begun during the year 1899, and has been in operation at both ends of the section. Rapid progress has been made. The length of wall completed to date on the "E" course is about 672 feet.

Pier, new 32, East River-A new pier has been built east of Pike slip under Contract No. Pier, new 33. East River-A new pier has been built west of Rutgers slip under Contract

No. 667.

Floating Church—The floating church of the Protestant Episcopal Society for Seamen has been removed to Pier, new 33, and is moored thereat awaiting the completion of the

Stanton Street Section-Extending from the south side of Rivington street to the north side of Stanton street, a distance of 557.21 feet, under unanimous resolution of the Board March 1,

1893.

East Twenty-third Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Seventeenth street to the southerly side of East Twenty-fourth street, a distance of about 2,454.86 feet.

Under a unanimous resolution of the Board, passed January 27, 1899, work on this section was begun and is still in progress. The section includes the two ferries at and near the foot of Twenty-third street. The type of the wall has been somewhat changed from that used at other sections other sections.

The type of bulkhead-wall designed for this section is what is known as the modified wall of 1899, it being a modification of the Watts street type of bulkhead-wall. This type of wall will prevail over the entire section, with the exception of about 180 feet along that portion of the bulkhead-wall on the northerly side of East Twenty-third street, with a return of about 25 feet northerly and southerly thereof. The section designed for this, about 180 feet in length of the bulkhead-wall, is a further modification of the modified wall of 1899, in that the relieving platform in the rear of the wall will be omitted, and in its stead three rows of piles on three-foot transverse centres will be driven in the rear of the lower base block and cut off at 15.62 feet below mean low water, or at the level of the foundation piles. Concrete en masse deposited around the heads of these piles.

In the wake of the ferry structures a top concrete block has been substituted for the granite, making a concrete block construction for the entire height of the wall proper. Work has been in progress at both ends of the section, and about 900 feet of wall completed on the "E" course of granite and upper course of concrete blocks. Preparations for placing sewers through the wall at this section have been made.

Earth-filling is now being placed in the rear of the wall. The Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York are constructing new and extensive ferry structures at the foot of East Twenty-third

street.

Pier Nineteenth Street, East River—The work of removal of the old pier at the foot of the

Pier Twenty-second Street, East River—A new wooden pier has been constructed at the foot of this street by the force of the Department under unanimous resolution of the Board of July 10, 1800.

Pier Thirty-sixth Street, East River—A new wooden pier has been constructed by the force of the Department under unanimous resolution of the Board of October 20, 1899.

East Thirty-eighth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Thirty-seventh street to the northerly side of East Thirty-ninth street, a distance of about 609 feet.

The New York Gas, Electric Light, Heat and Power Company, the occupants of the upland between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, having in course of erection an extensive plant at this locality, and desiring to extend their intake and outlet pipes through the bulkhead out to the pierhead-line, it was thought advisable to construct a section of the bulkhead-wall in this vicinity. The Board on the 4th of May, 1900, passed a resolution authorizing this work, and the work has been in progress from time to time.

East Seventy-fourth Street Section, East River—Extending from the southerly side of East Seventy-fourth street to the northerly side of East Seventy-fifth street, a distance of about 326 feet.

326 feet

At this locality the Manhattan Railway Company, the occupants of the upland, are erecting a power house and extensive coaling plant. Early in the year that company made application to the Department of Docks and Ferries to have a section of the bulkhead-wall constructed in front of these premises, with the privilege of leasing the wall when completed. The Board on

the 11th of May authorized the work, and the same is now in progress. This wall is built upon rock bottom, and will have a depth of 20 feet of water in tront of the same when completed. The wall is being built with openings through it, one 14 feet by 14 feet, and the other 5 feet by 14 feet, to accommodate the intake and outlet pipes of the Manhattan Railway Company. The blasting of the rock necessary for the construction of these pipes is being done at the cost and expense of the railway company.

East Eighty-second Street, East River—A crib-bulkhead and platform were erected in front of the property at the north side of the street by the Yorkville Independent Ice Company.

East Ninety-first Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-first street to the northerly side of East Ninety-second street, a distance of about 376 feet.

Length of "E" course of granite to date 260.54 feet.

Work was begun upon this section in 1894, under resolution of the Board of May 25, 1893, and the wall was built across the foot of East Ninety-first street, when it was suspended on account of chapter 478 of the Laws of 1800.

Work was resumed in July, 1895, under resolution of the Board June 20, 1895.

The wall is now built to the southerly of the Astoria Ferry at East Ninety-second street, and the filling behind it has been completed.

East Ninety-fourth Street Section — Extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-fourth street to the northerly side of East Ninety-fifth street, a distance of 373.08 feet.

This section and the piers at East Ninety-fourth and East Ninety-fifth streets have been in commercial use.

East Ninety-sixth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-sixth street to the middle of the block between East Ninety-sixth and East Ninety-seventh streets, a

street to the middle of the block between East Ninety-sixth and East Ninety-seventh streets, a distance of about 200.92 feet.

This section and the pier at East Ninety-sixth street are in commercial use.

East Ninety-ninth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Ninety-ninth street to the northerly side of East One Hundredth street, a distance of about 365 feet.

Length of "E" course of granite to date 316.97 feet.

This section was begun in 1893 at the northerly side of East One Hundredth street, and the wall was built far enough to the southward to permit filling and the building of a pier at the foot of East One Hundredth street in 1894. The filling also was put in as far as possible.

The New York and College Point Ferry Company having removed their ferry structures, the work on this section which had been suspended was resumed on November 16, 1898, and was carried on during that year. Filling was received and graded in the rear of the wall, and the section is nearly completed. A new ferry-house, bridges, etc., have been constructed by the said company. company.

HARLEM RIVER.

East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East Hundred and First street to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Fourth street, a distance of 848.65 feet; south end, 154.70 feet in length; north end, 703.95 feet.

This section has been in commercial use.

East One Hundred and Tenth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of East One Hundred and Seventh street to the northerly side of East One Hundred and Tenth street, a distance of 85x 86 feet.

Length of "E" course of granite to date 750.85 feet.

The wall on this section was substantially completed in 1892.

Under unanimous resolution of the Board passed May 29, 1896, 108.88 feet of the wall has been built and completed on this section, which extends across the foot of the street.

This section includes a pier at the foot of East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, the pier and bulkhead being built for the use of the Manhattan State Hospital.

East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section—Extending from the southerly side of

East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street to a point 25 feet northerly of the northerly line of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and westerly to the angle of the bulkhead-line northerly of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, a distance of 367.27 feet.

The section was substantially completed in 1893, and has been in commercial use since that

SHERMAN'S CREEK.

On the westerly or Manhattan side of the Harlem river, at about Two Hundredth street, there is a creek making into the island about 1,500 feet from the westerly channel line of the Harlem river, as determined by the United States authorities.

A new plan for the improvement of this section of the water-front was determined by the

Department of Docks on March 29, 1894, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on November 20, 1895. This plan provides for a basin 345 feet wide and 1,400 feet long, with bulkhead and piers, having 7,271 feet of wharfage room, and having a capacity as a basin for 250 canai boats. A stretch of 1,467 feet of the cribwork has been built in former years, and is now in commercial use.

NORTH RIVER.

Between Eightieth and Eighty-first Streets, North River-A new bulkhead platform was built along the bulkhead.

EAST RIVER.

Between Eightueth and Eighty-first Streets, East River—A new crib-bulkhead was constructed between these streets under Contract No. 653 for the use of the Street Cleaning Depart-

HARLEM RIVER.

Pier, Fordham Road, Harlem River-A new pier in this vicinity has been constructed under Contract No. 661. Railroad Avenue, Harlem River-A platform was built in this vicinity under Contract

No. 670.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street and Park Avenue, Harlem River—The water-front in this vicinity is being filled in by Frank Bulkley under a permit from the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, West of Gerard Avenue, Harlem River—The water-front in this vicinity is being filled in from time to time by Jordan L. Mott under permit from the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-jourth Street, East Side, Harlem River—The water-front in this vicinity is being filled in by John Cromwell under permit from the Board.

One Hunared and Forty-seventh Street, Lenox Avenue, Harlem River—Filling is being deposited to a grade of 5 feet above high water extending from One Hundred and Forty-seventh to One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, and from Lenox to Seventh avenue, by John D. Crimmins, under nermit of the Board. under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Harlem River—A pile platform was erected about 200 feet south of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street on the easterly or Westchester side of the Harlem river by Willson, Adams & Co. under permit from the Board of Docks.

KINGSBRIDGE.

A small pier has been erected at Janson avenue by the estate of Hugh N. Camp under permit

from the Board.

A crib-bulkhead is being erected at Tibbett street by T. & W. Thorn & Co. under permit from the Board.

Filling is being deposited in the vicinity of Broadway, Spuyten Duyvil creek, by J. C. Rodgers under permit. BRONX RIVER.

Filling is being deposited in the vicinity of Westchester Creek by John S. Bush. At Willow avenue a retaining structure is being erected by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, and filling placed behind the same.

The East Bay Land and Improvement Company are depositing filling, and making other improvements in this vicinity, under a permit from the Board of Docks. This work was begun in 1891, and has been carried on from time to time.

CLASSON'S POINT. The salt meadows in the vicinity of Classon's Point are being filled in by Clinton Stephens.

PORT MORRIS. A crib-bulkhead was erected between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and

Piers, new 3 and 4, Wallabout Basin—These two piers have been constructed during the year under Contract No. 669.

Pier, new 5, Wallabout Basin—This pier has been constructed during the year under Contract No. 687.

Ot these piers, Pier, new 2, has been leased to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and has had a shed built on it and on the bulkhead adjaining.

GENERAL REPAIRS.

Extensive repairs have been made to piers, bulkheads, etc., during the year covered by this report. A detailed statement of them is given in the appendix.

RECREATION BUILDINGS.

The recreation buildings on the North, East and Harlem rivers were all cared for and

maintained.

Work has been in progress on the completion of the recreation building at North Second street, Brooklyn, under Contract No. 631, and has been completed.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

A full list of the floating property will be found in the appendix. Plans, specifications and form of contract having been prepared for the construction of a new steel propeller, a contract was let, and a new tug constructed, to be known as "Richard Croker." Seven new skiffs and a deck scow have been built. A new steam launch is in course of construction.

SURVEYING FORCE.

During the year the routine work of the surveying party has been attended to, which consisted in the giving of lines, grades, etc., for the construction of the bulkhead or river wall at the various sections on the North and East rivers, tor the construction of new piers and crib bulkheads, the laying of asphalt and belgian-block pavement, and for all work of general repairs done by the Department, either by contract or by the force of the Department.

Lines and grades have also been given for the construction of new piers in the Wallabout basin, in the Borough of Brooklyn. In connection with the above work it was necessory to frequently verify the base line and bench marks, and also establish new ones.

The quantities of sand, broken stone, rip-rap, cobble, etc., used in work of construction has been measured and calculated.

The quantities of sand, broken stone, rip-rap, cobble, etc., used in work of construction has been measured and calculated.

All dredging done by lessees, private parties and others, under order or permit from the Board of Docks, has been supervised, and a record kept of the depth of water made. A detailed report of such dredging will be found in the appendix.

Soundings have also been taken for the purpose of estimating the amount of dredging required, and rod soundings have frequently been taken in connection with same.

I submit herewith a tabulated statement showing the number of soundings taken over the water-front of The City of New York, in order to ascertain the depth of water existing thereat; also for the purpose of maintaining the Department's records.

Surveys, soundings and estimates have been made, and base lines established for the proposed improvement between Gansevoort and West Twenty-third streets, on the North river, and between Wall and Catherine streets on the East river.

Surveys have been made for the purpose of construction, particularly for the work of extending the City's piers out to the new pierhead-line; and revisions and corrections necessary to keep the Department's maps and records up to date, owing to new building repairs, changes, etc., along the water-front.

In the Borough of Manhattan—165,551 linear feet of water-front have been surveyed;
23,832 linear feet of base line established; and 122,926 linear feet of transit or secondary base

line have been run.

In the Borough of The Bronx—17,320 linear feet of water-front have been surveyed; 1,233 linear feet of base line established, and 17,000 linear feet of secondary or transit line have been

A new survey of the westerly shore of the Bronx from Port Morris to West Farms, for the

A new survey of the westerly shore of the Broix from Fort Morris to West Farms, for the purpose of defining the line of mean high water, is in progress. In connection with this survey, there has been surveyed about 12½ miles of water-front; 5¼ miles of base line established, and 14 miles of transit or secondary base line have been run.

In the Borough of Brooklyn—41.2 miles of water-front were surveyed, and 8.3 miles of base line established, and 30 miles of secondary base and transit lines have been run. This makes a total since the commencement of the survey of 129.2 miles of water-front surveyed, 41.3 miles of base line established, and 141 miles of secondary base and transit line run.

In the Borough of Ouern—12, miles of water-front have been surveyed. 1.6 miles of base

In the Borough of Queens—1.3 miles of water-front have been surveyed, 1.6 miles of base line established, and 1.1 miles of secondary base and transit lines have been run. This makes a total since the commencement of this survey of 32.3 miles of water-front surveyed, 17.6 miles of base lines established and 47.1 miles of transit and secondary lines run.

In the Borough of Richmond—3.4 miles of water-front have been surveyed, 2.5 miles of base line established, and 9.8 miles of secondary and transit lines have been run. This makes a total since the commencement of the survey of 20.4 miles of water-front surveyed, 14.5 miles of base line established and 40.8 miles of secondary base and transit lines run.

Twenty-one continuous automatic tide gauges have been maintained during the year. During

During the year it was found expedient to locate some of these tide gauges at places different from where they were in the previous year, for the reason that the information required with reference to establishing a range of mean high and mean low water has been obtained at the former points. NEW BULKHEAD AND PIERHEAD LINES.

NEW BULKHEAD AND PIERHEAD LINES.

By Act of Congress of August 11, 1888 (section 12) the Secretary of War is authorized to cause bulkhead and pierhead lines to be established in harbors of the United States. Under this law a Board of United States Engineers was organized to fix the lines in the harbor of New York and adjacent waters. The actions of this Board regarding the bulkhead and pierhead lines in New York City are fully recorded in the annual report for 1898.

During the year 1899, the following changes were made:

On March 10, 1899, the Board of Docks made application for a modification of the pierhead-line between East Twenty-third and East Twenty-fourth streets, East river. The report and the map accompanying it were approved by the Honorable Secretary of War on April 17, 1899.

On the application of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, a modification in the pierhead-line between Truslow and Cabot streets, in the Borough of The Bronx, was approved by the Honorable Secretary of War, April 19, 1899.

On April 28, 1899, this Board submitted a proposed change in the pierhead-line and bulkhead lines at Riker's Island, East river. These plans were approved by the Honorable Secretary of War May 15, 1899.

On November 4, 1898, this Board submitted a modified plan of the pierhead-line between

On November 4, 1898, this Board submitted a modified plan of the pierhead-line between East Thirty-second and East Fifty-fourth streets, East river. This plan has not been approved as yet by the Secretary of War on account of the Man-of-war rock in the East river.

No change in the bulkhead and pierhead lines has been made during the year 1900.

CHANGES IN PIER LINES AND IN NEW PLAN.

On the North River—The lines of Piers, new 10 and 11, at the foot of Albany and Cedar streets, were changed by the Board of Docks, December 7, 1900, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, December 27, 1900.

The New Plan, from West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth to West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, was established by the Board of Docks November 3, 1899, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 21, 1900.

On the East River—The lines of Piers, new 29, new 30 and new 31, were changed by the Board of Docks March 2, 1900, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 21, 1900.

The New Plan, from East Thirty-fourth street to East Forty-second street, was established by the Board of Docks March 23, 1900, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 20, 1900.

The New Plan, between Wall and Catharine streets, was made by the Board of Docks October 26, 1900, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 14,

Of this amount 723 linear feet have been built by private parties.

One new pier has been built on the North river, and five piers have been extended, and the inner end of one pier has been restored inshore by the City, at the cost and expense of private

parties.

On the East river, eight new piers and two platforms have been built.

In the Wallabout Basin, three new piers have been built.

The total new wharfage room made during the year by the City and private parties, is about 27,322 linear feet, with a net increase of wharfage room of about 16,021 linear feet, and the superficial area of the City's piers has been increased by about 344,500 square feet.

In connection with the above, I beg to submit herewith, plans showing sections of the waterfront on the North, east and Harlem rivers, improved by the City under the "New Plan" adopted by the Board of Docks at various times, and in this same connection, call attention to the following facts: That, in ten years previous to December 31, 1897, there was 11, 107 linear feet of bulkhead-wall built and 1,405.838 square feet of increase in the area of the City's piers, and in the three years beginning with January 1, 1898, and ending December 31, 1909, the City has built the bulkhead-wall to the extent of 5,663 feet, and increased the area of the City's piers in the same period to 1,337.728 square feet. In other words, the area of the City's piers has been increased in the last three years as much as it had been increased in the previous ten years, and a length of bulkhead-wall has been built in the last three years more than one-half the extent of wall built in the previous ten years. wall built in the previous ten years.
