## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, held on Tuesday, March 28, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Present: President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Keogh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Exempt Class, under the heading "Mayor's Office," by striking therefrom the title "Executive Stenographer," and substituting therefor the following: 2 Executive Stenographers. There were no appearances.

After the Commission had gone into regular session the minutes of the meeting held March 23 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of exempt positions, under the heading "Mayor's Office," be and the same hereby is amended by changing the line "Executive Stenographer," to read: 2 Executive Stenographers.

Mr. James M. Vincent, Attorney, appeared in opposition to application of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, for approval of the appointment of Mr. S. R. Chenoweth as Auditor under the provisions of paragraph 5 of Rule XII, which had been considered at a previous meeting.

Commissioner Welling moved the adoption of the following resolution offered by him at the meeting of March 23:

Resolved, That in future public notice be given for three days in the CITY RECORD of all requests for exceptions from competitive examination under the provisions of paragraph 5 of Rule XII.

The resolution failed of adoption.

Thomas Dunne, of 500 W. 32d street, Manhattan, an applicant for Clerk, First Grade, appeared before the Commission, as directed, relative to an arrest mentioned in his application. The Commission directed that the disqualification appearing against his name on the eligible list of Clerk, First Grade, be removed.

John J. Dempsey, of 1341 Amsterdam avenue, Manhattan, appeared before the Commission, as directed, relative to an arrest mentioned in his application for Clerk, First Grade. The Commission directed that the disqualification appearing against Mr. Dempsey's name on the eligible list be removed.

Thomas Shely, of 639 Humboldt street, Borough of Brooklyn, appeared before the Commission, as directed, relative to statements made in his application for Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption and in the experience sheet of the examination. After consideration of the matter it was ordered that the disqualification appearing against Mr. Shely's name on the eligible list be removed.

Edward M. Cassidy, of 161 E. 49th street, Borough of Manhattan, appeared before the Commission, as directed, to explain the nature of the charges which had led up to his dismissal from the position of Patrolman in the Police Department. The explanation of the candidate being satisfactory to the Commission, it was ordered that his name be removed from the "blacklist," and his application for the position of Patrolman-on-Aqueduct was accepted.

Zeno J. Stankevich, of 242 Monroe street, Borough of Manhattan, appeared before the Commission, as directed, in connection with his request for permission to amend his application for Patrolman by setting forth the circumstances of an arrest. The statements of the candidate being satisfactory to the Commission his request was granted.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved:

Frank J. Purcell, from the position of Clerk, Second Grade, at a salary of \$600 per annum, in the office of the Commissioners of Accounts to that of Clerk, Second Grade, at a salary of \$900 per annum in the office of the President of the Board of Aldermen.

Renee Plummer, from the position of Stenographer and Typewriter, at \$600 per annum, in the Department of Health, to that of Stenographer and Typewriter at \$750 per annum in the Law Department.

Edward W. Nugent, from the position of Tenement House Inspector, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, in the Tenement House Department, to the position of Sanitary Inspector, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum in the Department of Health.

Katherine R. Barry, from the position of Stenographer and Typewriter, at \$1,050 per annum in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, to that of Stenographer and Typewriter at \$1,050 per annum in the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan.

Emanuel Salinger, from the position of Clerk in the Tenement House Department at a salary of \$750 per annum to that of Clerk at \$900 per annum in the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Gilbert J. Sutton, from the position of Clerk at \$900 per annum in the Department of Street Cleaning, to that of Clerk at \$1,000 per annum in the office of the Chief Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated March 22, with reference to a letter from Miss Elizabeth M. McGrath, of 23 Thames street, a candidate in the examination for Clerk with Knowledge of Card Indexing, in which she stated that on the day of the examination she had not received a sheet of questions to be answered on her experience and had filled out the paper without them. The report stated that the candidate's papers could not be identified until the examination was completed, and recommended, if the facts should then appear as stated, that she be given a special examination in Experience. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated March 27, relative to the request of the Secretary of the Department of Taxes and Assessments that a promotion examination be held for Clerks in his Department, and recommending that the Department be informed that application



for examinations for promotion in the clerical service should be made during the month of September. The recommendation was adopted.

Reports were presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated March 21, recommending that the following-named candidates for the position of Clerk, First Grade, be marked qualified on the eligible list: Claude R. Link, 136 W. 62d street, Manhattan; James G. B. Ryan, 319 W. 21st street, Manhattan; Angelo J. Schiaffino, 87 Oliver street, Manhattan. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated March 21, relative to Lewis Protass, of 640 3d avenue, Brooklyn, an applicant for Clerk, First Grade, recommending that he be summoned before the Commission to show cause why his application should not be rejected by reason of his failure to furnish information relative to an arrest. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. Leonhard F. Fuld, Examiner, dated March 20, relative to the previous record of John Fuchs, Jr., whose name appeared on the eligible list of Inspector of Taxicabs. The Secretary was directed to send a copy of the report to the Appointing Officer when Mr. Fuchs' name was reached for certification.

On the recommendation of Commissioner Welling, to whom the matter had been referred at a previous meeting, the application for Inspector of Weights and Measures of Samuel A. Shapiro, of 444 E. 82d street, Borough of Manhattan, was rejected.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the action of the Commission on March 22 in rejecting the application of Mr. Edward J. Kelly for the position of Probation Officer be and the same hereby is rescinded.

On motion, the application of James E. McDermott, of 101 Waverly avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for the position of Process Server was rejected under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

On motion, Louis J. Kane, of 324 Stuyvesant avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and John A. Jager, of 155 Harman street, Brooklyn, applicants for the position of Process Server, were directed to appear before the Commission on Wednesday, April 5, to explain the charges which had led up to their dismissal from positions in the City service.

The action of the Secretary in permitting Henry A. Micha, a candidate for Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving to amend his statement as to the date of birth to conform to the proof submitted, was approved.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the salaries of the following-named employes of the Commission be fixed at the amounts set opposite their names: Frances Eckstein, Stenographer and Typewriter, \$1,500 per annum; Edward Murray, Clerk, \$750 per annum.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, dated March 21, stating that Miss Amy McDonald had been promoted from Trained Nurse at \$600 per annum to Supervising Nurse at \$750 per annum, as of March 15, and requesting that she be given a non-competitive examination to qualify her for such promotion pending the establishment of an eligible list. The appointment of Miss McDonald was approved for a period of fifteen days, under the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII, but the Secretary was directed to certify from the appropriate eligible list of Nurse for permanent appointment.

A communication was presented from Mr. Daniel Moynahan, Collector of Assessments and Arrears, Department of Finance, dated March 21, requesting approval of the employment of Mr. Joseph Lloyd, of 136 Clermont avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, as a Notice Server, from December 1, 1910. The Secretary was authorized to certify the vouchers in payment of Mr. Lloyd, when presented, under the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII.

A communication was presented from the Comptroller, dated March 30, requesting that the examination taken by Mr. Thomas J. Hogan, Jr., a Second Grade Clerk, be construed as having qualified him for promotion to the Third Grade. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, dated March 23, stating that it was desired to appoint Dr. George O'Hanlon, Assistant Medical Superintendent, to the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. Winford H. Smith, General Medical Superintendent, to take effect June 1, 1911. The Secretary was directed to state that it would be necessary under the rules for Dr. O'Hanlon to qualify in a promotion examination, but that he would not be eligible for such examination until June 17, 1911.

(\$750), be and the same hereby is waived in so far as it applies to the Lederle Laboratories, which were excepted from examination on February 8, 1911, to render expert service in the Department of Docks and Ferries, in making chemical analyses of various supplies, including paints, oils, coal, etc., during the year 1911; and the compensation is hereby fixed at an amount not to exceed \$1,500.

A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works, dated March 25, stating that John Hanna, an Inspector of Complaints, had been reassigned to duty. The Secretary was directed to note the reassignment on the records.

Communications were presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated March 24, nominating Lena Alper for provisional appointment to the position of Laboratory Assistant in the Department of Health, with salary at the rate of \$600 per annum. The appointment was approved for a period of fifteen days, pursuant to paragraph 4 of Rule XII., and the Secretary was directed to arrange the necessary non-competitive examination to qualify the said person for provisional appointment.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of the Tenement House Department, dated March 23, stating that he had rescinded his action of January 21, 1911, in dismissing Joseph H. O'Connor from the position of Inspector of Tenements. The Secretary was directed to amend the records accordingly.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated March 20, stating that the titles of the following named employees of the Department had been changed from Draftsman to Topographical Draftsman, as of March 1, 1911: Ernst J. Plassman, Henry Mihm, Herman Crueger, Carl L. von Logau, Alphonse Bolce, Bernard Wendowsky. The changes of title were approved in accordance with paragraph 5 of Rule VI.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated March 23, requesting approval of the change of title of the following named employees from Chainman to Chainman and Rodman: Frederick Blum, Adam C. Huebner, Thomas A. Dorey, Martin J. Norz, John Schuh. The changes of title were approved in accordance with paragraph 5 of Rule VI.

On motion, the emergency appointment of Patrick Downey as Statistical Clerk in the Armory Board from March 6 to 22, 1911, was approved pursuant to paragraph 4 of Rule XII.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Correction, dated March 21, making requisition for an eligible list from which to appoint one Marine Engineer at a salary of \$1,350 per annum. It appearing that there was no eligible list in existence for the position, the Secretary was directed to state that a person might be nominated for non-competitive examination to qualify him for provisional appointment, pursuant to paragraph 3 of Rule XII.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Marine Engineer.

On motion, it was Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII., Dr. Henry C. McBrair, of Middletown, N. Y., be and he hereby is excepted from examination to be employed as dentist to the patients at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville, N. Y. (Department of Health), from September 1, 1910, to December 31, 1910, at a total compensation of \$80.

On motion, it was Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII., Dr. Henry C. McBrair be and he hereby is excepted from examination to be employed as dentist to the patients at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville, N. Y. (Department of Health), from time to time during the year 1911; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$300.

Communications were presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated March 24, requesting approval of the appointment of Archibald McNeil, M.D., 477 1st avenue, as Bacteriologist, with salary at the rate of \$1,200 per annum. The appointment was approved for a period of fifteen days under Rule XII., clause 4, and the Secretary was instructed to summon Dr. McNeil for the necessary non-competitive examination to qualify him for provisional appointment.

### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

#### Synopsis of Minutes.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, March 21, 1911.

Present: Dr. Brannan, the President, in the Chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keefe, Paulding, Robbins and Sachs, Trustees. Excused—Messrs. Drummond and Stern.

The minutes of the meeting of February 7, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved.

Bills, amounting to \$55,952.94, were presented for approval, and, having been duly examined by the Finance Committee, were forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

As the question of laying out the grounds on the river front will soon be taken up, it is recommended for your consideration that the 28th and 29th st. piers be covered with soil, sowed to grass, and a hedge planted as a border, with a six-foot wire fence on the outside. This would practically be so much extra ground, would increase the amount of lawn frontage, and would be a very attractive spot for convalescent patients.

In compliance with the resolution of the Board, a letter was sent to the firm submitting the only bid for building a tennis court for Bellevue Hospital, requesting them to mention where tennis courts built by them could be seen. No reply has been received, and it is understood that they now have withdrawn the estimate.

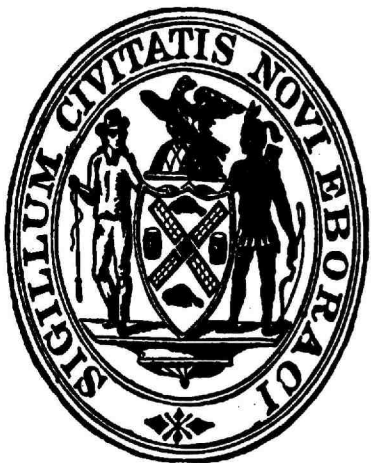

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
