

At the time that the extension was made it was believed by the Company that if no unexpected delays arose the work could be completed within the time granted by such extension.

In answer to resolutions passed by your Honorable Board, on the 23d of November, 1911, this Company stated fully the reasons why it would be impossible to complete the work between these points. This statement presented the facts, which are, briefly, as follows:

The delay is wholly within that part of the line extending from 174th street north to Unionport road, and is due to—

1. The delay in the erection of the steel work between Adams street and 174th street.

Although at the time the extension of August 2, 1911, was granted it was expected that the steel work could be erected within the time required by said extension, it now appears that without default upon the part of your petitioner, the American Bridge Company, which has the contract for the steel work, will not be able to commence shipments of the steel for this section until January, and complete shipment cannot be made before the end of March.
