Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 18 (Aldermanic Chamber), City Hall, Thursday, September 26, 1912.

FINANCIAL MATTERS.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—William J. Gaynor, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchel, President, Board of Aldermen; George McAneny, President, Borough of Manhattan; Alfred E. Steers, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Thomas W. Whittle, Acting President, Borough of The Bronx; Maurice E. Connolly, President, Borough of Queens, and William R. Hillyer, Acting President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. William J. Gaynor, presided.

The following communication was presented by the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond:

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, George Cromwell, President of the Borough, Borough Hall, New Brighton, New York City, September 23, 1912.

WILLIAM R. HILLYER, Esq., Assistant Commissioner of Public Works, Borough Hall New Brighton, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—I hereby authorize you to act for me and in my stead should occasion arise, in the absence or absences of Mr. Louis L. Tribus, Acting Commissioner of Public Works, who is regularly charged with the duties of Acting President of the Borough in my own absence. Very truly yours,

The Secretary presented communications relative to the establishment of positions, additional grades of position (section 56 of the Charter) and retirements (chapter 669 of the Laws of 1911, as amended) as follows:

From the Coroners of the Borough of Queens, requesting that the compensation of the Coroners' Physicians be fixed at \$3,000 per annum, to take effect as of September 1, 1912;

From George M. Demm, Stenographer, Part II, Court of Special Sessions, requesting favorable consideration of an increase in salary;

(On April 20, 1911, the request of the Chief Justice of the Court of Special Sessions, for the establishment of various grades of positions, including the position of Court Stenographer (Part II), at \$2,500 per annum, was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

(On July 6, 1911, the report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades, recommending that the request for the establishment of the grade of position of Court Stenographer, at \$2,500 per annum, be referred to the Budget Committee, was presented to the Board and referred accordingly.)

(On May 16, 1912, and again on September 19, 1912, requests for the establishment of various grades of positions in the Court of Special Sessions, both of which included an increase in salary for the above position, were disapproved by the Board.)

From the Fire Commissioner requesting the establishment of the position of Fire Telegraph Expert for one incumbent, with salary at the rate of \$3,000 per annum;

From the Corporation Counsel requesting that the resolution adopted November 9, 1911, recommending the establishment of the grade of position of Title Examiner in the Law Department, with salary at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, for six incumbents, be amended, by increasing the number of incumbents to 30;

From his Honor the Mayor, recommending the retirement, on an annuity of \$450, of Mrs. Elizabeth Stone, Matron at the City Prison, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Correction.

Which were referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, requesting approval of the form of contract, plans, specifications and estimate of cost (as modified), for the completion of The Bronx Court House.

Which was laid over one week—October 3, 1912.

(On June 13, 1912, the report of the Comptroller recommending that approval of the form of contract, plans, specifications and estimate of cost (\$324,000) for the above work be withheld pending the modification of said plans to permit of greater competition, was presented to the Board and a copy of said report ordered sent to the President of The Bronx for his consideration.)

(At the meetings of July 11 and 15, 1912, the above matter was laid over, and was placed on the calendar for the meeting of September 19, 1912, at the request of the President of The Bronx, when it was again laid over.)

The Secretary presented communications, as follows:

From the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, requesting that an appropriation of \$3,600 be made out of the Street Improvement Fund for the purpose of restoring to their original condition sidewalks along Washington and Prospect avenues, Borough of The Bronx, which were taken up for the purpose of planting trees;

From Charles M. Nichols, of 81 New street, New York City, suggesting the acquisition by the City of property on the east side of 2d avenue, between 10th and 11th streets, Manhattan, for the purpose of a school site.

Which were referred to the Comptroller.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx, referring to items in the departmental estimate of corporate stock requirements for the year beginning July 1, 1912, and urging that the item of \$16,050 for the preparation of drainage plans be granted in order that the salaries of the employees engaged on this work may be paid, also requesting prompt action on the remaining items in said estimate.

Which was referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan, for report at the meeting to be held October 3, 1912.

The Secretary presented communications as follows:

From the Commissioner of Public Charities, requesting that the authorization of corporate stock adopted by the Board on July 17, 1911, in the sum of \$200,000, for the erection and equipment of an extension of the East Tuberculosis Infirmary, Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwells Island, be reduced to \$175,000, and that the authorization of \$125,000 for the construction and equipment of a dining hall and kitchen for tuberculosis patients, Metropolitan Hospital, be increased by \$25,000;

From the Board of Health, requesting an additional appropriation of \$25,000 corporate stock for the construction of a gravity water system, including completion of reservoir at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville, N. Y.;

From the Gravesend Board of Trade, Brooklyn, requesting that an appropriation be made for a new fire house in the Gravesend section of Brooklyn.

Which were referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

The Secretary presented communications as follows:

From the Acting District Attorney, Richmond County, submitting memorandum in support of the departmental estimate for said office for the year 1913.

From the 28th Ward Taxpayers' Protective Association, protesting any increase in appropriation for salaries for the Tenement House Department for the year 1913;

From the Secretary, Municipal Civil Service Commission, submitting corrections to departmental estimate for the year 1913.

As it is not possible to secure special revenue bonds at this time and as forage must be procured at once, I would ask a temporary transfer of \$535 from Fund No. 2143 to Fund No. 2132 to meet this situation.

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith for your approval final contract for services of Messrs. McKenzie, Voorhees & Gmelin, as Architects, in connection with the erection of the proposed Municipal Building in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Gentlemen—On August 12, 1912, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn requested approval of the form of final contract for the services of Messrs. McKenzie, Voorhees & Gmelin, as Architects, for the preparation of complete plans, specifications, etc., and the supervision of the construction of the proposed Municipal Building, situated at Court and Joralemon streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The proposed contract provides that the City agrees to pay the Architects the following fees, less the sum of \$10,000 paid or payable, under the terms of the preliminary contract, dated March 29, 1912, as follows:

At the rate of five (5) per cent. of the total cost of the work, improvement, building or structure, together with such electrical, heating and ventilating plants, and all necessary and proper appurtenances as are required to make said work, improvement, building or structure an artistic, architectural and engineering production, and render it fit and complete in every respect.

As an additional and cumulative compensation for the reimbursement to the aforesaid the Architects, for the expense of employing an engineering specialist, who shall be approved by the President, two and one-half (2 1/2) per cent. of the total cost of the heating and ventilating work, plumbing, electrical and refrigerating work, power plants and apparatus, specially designed lighting fixtures and specially designed movable and fixed furniture for which said specialist shall have been specifically employed.

The total fees to be subject, however, to a deduction of fifty-eight thousand dollars (\$58,000), provided the total Architects' fees, as herein provided, exclusive of any deduction, shall amount to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) or more. In case said Architects' fees, as herein provided, exclusive of any deduction, are less than one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000), the total deduction shall amount to fifty-eight thousand dollars (\$58,000), less the amount the said fees, exclusive of any deduction, are less than one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000). Proper and reasonable additional compensation for the alterations of all drawings and specifications, provided for in Clauses 3, 4, 5 and 8 hereof, when requested in writing after the same have been once duly adopted and approved by the President.

The cost of the transportation and living of the Architects or their representatives in visiting works, mills, quarries and the like, when such expenses are incurred by the direction of the President, made in writing.

The compensation as computed above, with the proper deductions and additions as herein provided, shall be considered the total fees that may be paid the said Architects, pursuant to the provisions of this agreement, except that if the sum paid and the sum hereafter to be adjudged finally by the Courts to be paid by the City shall aggregate less than fifty-eight thousand dollars (\$58,000), for the preparation of preliminary studies, plans, etc., heretofore prepared by other parties than the Architects, in connection with the construction of said Municipal Building, then in that event within a reasonable time after the final decree of the Courts, and after the final payment, as herein provided, the City agrees to pay to the Architects an additional payment, equal to the amount that the total sum paid, together with the sum hereafter adjudged, as above, to be paid, for the preparation of the above preliminary studies, etc., is less than fifty-eight thousand dollars (\$58,000).

Payments to the Architects are to be made at successive stages of the work, provided that they have complied with the terms of the proposed contract by the preparation of plans and specifications for the erection and completion of the proposed structure, which can be built at a cost, including the compensation and fees for architectural services, for an amount not to exceed \$3,500,000. The payments are to be made as follows:

Upon the completion and delivery of the drawings and specifications called for in Clauses 3, 6 and 8 hereof, one-fourth (1/4) of the estimated total fees of the Architects' services, estimated or computed, in accordance with the provisions of Clause 12 hereof, upon an accurate estimated cost of said work, building or structure, exclusive of Architects' fees, based upon prevailing market prices, less the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) paid or to be paid the Architects under the provisions of the preliminary contract heretofore referred to, duly executed by and between the parties hereto aforesaid; upon the execution and closing of the construction contract or contracts for the work by the City, an amount, which, together with the amount already paid, shall be equal to one-half (1/2) of the total fees and compensation for the Architects' services, estimated or computed in accordance with the provisions of Clause 12 hereof, on the total amount of the contract price of said construction contract or contracts; or, if the letting of the contract or contracts for the said work be delayed for more than ninety (90) calendar days after the completion and presentation of the said drawings and specifications as required by Clauses 3, 5, 6 and 8 hereof, then and in that event payment of such amount, which, together with the amount already paid, shall be equal to one-half (1/2) of the total fees for the Architects' services, shall be computed upon the lowest bid received for said work; and, in the absence of such bid, then upon an accurate estimated cost of said work, building or structure, exclusive of Architects' fees, based upon prevailing market prices at the termination of said ninety (90) calendar days.

The remaining one-half or balance of the total fees and compensation provided for in Clause 12 hereof, except the final payment to the Architects, shall be paid in progressive payments computed in accordance with the value and character of the work certified for payment to the contractor by the Architects and the President, pursuant to the terms of the construction contract or contracts; said progressive payments shall bear the same ratio to one-half of the total Architects' fees as provided for in Clause 12 hereof, as the amount earned and certified for payment to the contractor by the Architects and the President, pursuant to the terms of the construction contract or contracts, bears to the total cost of the herein described structure, improvement, work or building; provided, that in computing the progressive payments to be so made to the Architects, no deduction shall be made therein for or on account of the retained percentages provided for in said construction contract or contracts, and provided, also, that the total aggregate of said partial or progress payments, together with all previous amounts paid or payable, shall not exceed ninety-eight (98) per centum of the total fees and compensation for Architects' services.

Not less than two (2) per centum of the total fees and compensation for the Architects' services shall be retained by the City until the contract shall have been fully performed on their part, and shall not become due or payable until the actual

physical completion of the aforesaid work complete and entire, together with its appurtenances, nor until the complete fulfillment of the requirements of Clause 6 hereof and the presentation by the Architects to the City or its representative of a complete statement in writing of the balance due on account of services, pursuant to the terms of Clause 12 hereof as aforesaid; said final payment shall, with all previous payments, not exceed an amount equal to the total fees provided for in Clause 12 hereof.

Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board, held May 2, 1912, there was referred to the Comptroller for consideration and report, a communication from the Secretary of the Board of Education, transmitting certified copy of a resolution adopted by said Board on April 24, 1912, requesting the acquisition of property on Poplar street, Prospect avenue and Benton place, Borough of Queens, as a site for school purposes.

At a meeting of your Board, held July 17, 1911, corporate stock to the amount of \$695,000 was authorized to provide means for the acquisition of school sites in the different boroughs, which amount provided for a site in the vicinity of Hillside and

Cherry streets, Douglaston, Borough of Queens. This resolution was concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on July 25, 1911.

After a thorough investigation it has been determined that the plot of ground, 200 by 200, on the southerly side of Poplar street, running from Benton place to Prospect avenue, Douglaston, Borough of Queens, would be the most desirable for the purposes mentioned.

After negotiation by the Comptroller these premises may be secured for the sum of \$14,000, or an average price of \$700 per lot of the size, 20 by 100.

The price being reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that your Board approve of the selection of the following described property for use of the Department of Education:

"Sir—I am in receipt of your letter dated July 1, 1912, which reads, as follows:

"The Police Commissioner has requested the establishment in the Police Department, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the following additional grades of positions:

"The Foreman Printer's present salary is \$1,820 per annum. It is proposed to increase it to \$2,000 per annum.

"The Job Compositors are now paid at the rate of \$23 per week each. On October 1, the prevailing rate of wages will entitle them to \$24 per week each.

"The Pressman is receiving compensation at \$4.00 per day, and the feeder is paid at the rate of \$2.66 2-3 per day.

"The Compositors, Pressman and Feeder state that they are frequently employed overtime, and receive no compensation for the extra work. According to their statements they were employed 118 hours overtime during 1911, and received no pay for the service.

"The Police Commissioner states that if the employees of the Printing Bureau are paid the annual salaries requested by him, he could command their services on Sundays, holidays and after 5 p. m., week days, whenever emergencies required their services. It is also stated that the said employees are willing to work overtime whenever called upon, if their compensation is fixed at the annual rates requested.

"Kindly advise me whether the Job Compositors, Pressman and Feeder employed in the Police Department would be entitled to receive annual compensation at a higher rate than they are now paid, if such increase should be based on an implied and voluntary understanding that they would work overtime whenever an emergency required it."

"Whatever the consideration which would induce the Police Commissioner to increase the annual compensation of the employees in his Department, the Labor Law contains an express inhibition against the employment of all classes of employees in excess of eight hours a day. This law will prevent the Police Commissioner from calling on these employees to work overtime, notwithstanding the implied and voluntary understanding that they would work overtime whenever an emergency required it." Dear Sir—I hereby respectfully request that your Honorable Board establish the grade of the position of Court Stenographer in and for the City Magistrates' Courts of the Second Division, for 18 incumbents, at \$3,000 per annum.

I enclose herewith a communication received from the stenographers of the City Magistrates' Courts, Second Division, by the Board of City Magistrates at its last monthly meeting. By a unanimous vote of the Magistrates it was decided to recommend to your Honorable Board that the increase in salary asked for be granted. The argument in justification of this demand is so fully and forcibly stated in the enclosed letter that it is hardly necessary to submit any additional plea. I only desire to add that the Magistrates of our division, without exception, firmly believe that the demand of the stenographers is well founded, and should receive the favorable consideration of your Board. In the matter of the application of the stenographers attached to the City Magistrates' Courts in the Second Division of the City of New York for an increase in salary.

To the Board of City Magistrates of the Second Division:

The technical construction given to section 221 of the Code of Criminal Procedure by the District Attorney of Kings County, and the order of the Chief City Magistrate dated January 19, 1912, based thereon, has entailed an enormous amount of extra work upon your petitioners. As your Honors well know, since the middle of January of this year, in every case where a defendant is held to await the action of the Grand Jury, or for trial at Special Sessions, the stenographer is obliged to write out in full the testimony taken upon the examination and file the transcript for the use of the District Attorney within five days after the date upon which the defendant was held. To comply with this order literally involves an amount of grinding, nerve-racking labor that is simply appalling. Some of your petitioners have been able to obey the order literally, while others have found it impossible to write out all the cases. As a result there has been some friction between the District Attorney and some of your Honors.

It is needless to remind you, who daily preside in the Magistrates' Courts, that what is termed an "examination" is frequently more lengthy than a trial, especially in cases where the issues are sharply drawn, where each side is represented by counsel, and where a host of witnesses is necessary to give either side the advantage. While you know that examinations frequently consume considerable time in the actual hearing, we beg leave to remind you that the time consumed in transcription is five times as great; in other words, an examination which takes an hour to hear requires five hours to transcribe. The greater portion of the evidence taken in a Magistrate's Court is evidence given upon examinations, and in more than one-half of such cases the defendant is held for disposition before a higher tribunal.

Typewriting, while mechanical work, is wearing upon the nerves when taken in allopathic doses, and it takes a great deal more out of the stenographer than the task of actual note-taking. Very few of your petitioners, if the present practice of transcribing cases continues, expect to serve the City long enough to enjoy a pension, for few of us could stand the strain long enough.

Considering the nature of the work and the qualifications for the office, the stenographer in the City Magistrate's Courts is paid less compensation for his services than any other City official. The examinations in a Magistrate's Court do not proceed with the same degree of smoothness and deliberation that prevail upon trials in courts of record. The litigants and their witnesses, as a rule, are people of the lower class, illiterate, often violating all the rules of English grammar in a single sentence, rapid talkers, frequently speaking in pigeon English. The recollection of their wrongs makes them excited and irritable, and it often requires the highest degree of skill on the part of the stenographer to get an intelligent record. Most of your petitioners are men who have grown gray in the service, and who can do it with greater ease than our better paid conferees in the higher courts.

For about ten years we have been receiving the same salary, while almost every other public official has had his salary raised. As your Honors well know, the cost of living has increased enormously during the past decade, and yet we are obliged to get along—struggle along as best we can—on the same compensation. And now our burdens have again been added to, for we must now not only meet this increased cost of living, but some of us must needs pay out a large slice of our salary for typewriting if we are to keep up with the work. The Page Investigating Committee in its report to the Legislature recommended that the stenographers in the Magistrate's Courts in the City of New York have an increase in their salary, considering the work required of them, but no action has been taken on such recommendation.

Ours are the only courts in which a stenographer is obliged to write out a single folio without compensation. True, occasionally a lawyer orders a copy of minutes from us, but those cases are rare, as the lawyers and litigants now have access to the evidence filed with the District Attorney, and our revenue from this source has fallen off.

It seems to your petitioners that in view of the enormous increase in work, to say nothing of the greatly enhanced cost of living, our salaries should be increased to three thousand dollars per annum. And we can truthfully say that many of us would be obliged to pay out at least one-half of this extra compensation to typewriter operators. It may be argued that to do this would be putting the Magistrate's Court stenographer on a plane with the Supreme and County Court stenographer. As against this view, we beg leave to remind your Honors that every line the stenographer in the Supreme and County Courts, and even the Municipal Courts, writes out he is paid for, even when the minutes are ordered by the judge for his perusal. In the Supreme Court in this department no stenographer receives less than six thousand dollars per annum for his transcript; many of them make as much as ten thousand.

For years in the First Division of the City of New York the stenographers have been paid by the District Attorney of New York County for whatever transcript he orders, and this pays them so well that they would not care to accept a thousand dollars' increase in salary in lieu thereof. We sought to accomplish the same thing by legislation during the past winter, but our proposed legislation was so bitterly opposed by the District Attorney of Kings County in the Assembly that the bill failed of passage there, on the ground that he is unalterably opposed to a curtailment of the amount of work called for by the Code, although he has expressed himself as being in favor of the stenographers receiving proper compensation for such work.

For the foregoing reasons, your petitioners respectfully pray your Honorable Board to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York that the salaries of the stenographers in the City Magistrate's Courts of the Second Division be increased to three thousand dollars per annum.

Gentlemen—On May 8, 1912, the Chief City Magistrate of the Board of City Magistrates, Second Division, requested the establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the grade of position of Court Stenographer, at \$3,000 per annum, for 18 incumbents.

The request involves an increase of \$1,000 in the compensation of 12 Stenographers, and of \$1,200 in the compensation of 6 Stenographers, or a total yearly increase of \$19,200.

There are no funds available in the Budget appropriation for 1912 to provide for the proposed increases and the request, therefore, does not conform to the policy of your Board.

Sir—In two communications dated July 29, 1912, you approved forms of contract, plans and specifications for laying a strip of granite pavement 50 feet in width in lieu of the existing asphalt paving between Barclay street and Clarkson street, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

One communication covered Contract No. 1337, for paving between Barclay street and Laight street at an estimate of \$62,010; the other communication covered Contract No. 1338, for paving between Laight street and Clarkson street, at an estimate of \$62,205.

Both contracts were based upon an estimate of \$3.90 per square yard.

Both contracts were advertised and at the opening of the bids the lowest figure was found to be \$4.09 per square yard.

On the 20th ult. we requested that you approve the awarding of Contract No. 1337, for the laying of the pavement between Barclay street and Laight street, North River, at the lowest bid received, aggregating \$65,031. This matter is now before you for your action.

The awarding of Contract No. 1337 at the said figure of \$65,031 will leave a balance of \$59,669 in the fund C. D. D.—33 to meet the expense of paving north of Laight street. For lack of funds the bids received August 14, 1912, on Contract No. 1338 were rejected on August 20th.

Contract No. 1338 has been revised by reducing the extent of the paving so as to cover the area aggregating 14,425 square yards between Laight street and a

point 75 feet north of the northerly line of West Houston street. This modified stretch of pavement can be done within the available balance at a figure of \$4.09 per square yard, the lowest figure received at the opening of bids on the 14th ult.

You will find herewith copy of the form of contract and specifications as modified.

Pursuant to the provisions of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 11, 1912, I request that you approve the form of contract and specifications as modified at an estimate of \$58,998.25 or \$4.09 per square yard. The plans are the same as those approved by you on July 29, with the exception of the reduction of the area by making the northerly line of the pavement 75 feet north of the northerly line of West Houston street.

Contract No. 1338, for removing a strip of the present asphalt pavement and laying a new granite pavement on the Marginal street from Laight to Clarkson street, North River, Manhattan, at an estimated cost, based on 15,950 square yards at \$3.90 per square yard, \$62,205.

Bids were opened for the work on August 14, 1912. The lowest bid was \$4.09 per square yard for both contracts.

The amount authorized for the entire work was \$125,000. At the low bid the cost of both contracts would have been \$130,266.50, or \$5,266.50 in excess of the amount provided.

On September 3, 1912, a new estimate of cost in the sum of \$65,031, based on the low bid of \$4.09 per square yard, was approved by me for contract No. 1337. All of the bids on contract No. 1338 were rejected by the Commissioner of Docks on account of lack of funds. The balance available in the fund after the approval of contract No. 1337 was \$59,969.

On September 3, 1912, the Acting Commissioner of Docks requested approval of the form of contract, No. 1338, plans and specifications as amended, and estimate of cost in the sum of \$58,998.25 for repaving with granite blocks the Marginal street along the North River from Clarkson street to a point 75 feet north of the northerly line of West Houston street. The amendment to the contract, etc., consists in the elimination of that part of the work included in the former proposed contract, between the point 75 feet north of the north line of West Houston street and Clarkson street, thereby reducing the area to be repaved and bring the cost within the amount remaining in the fund.

The contract provides for the repaving of 14,425 square yards. At the estimated price of \$4.09 per square yard, this would cost \$58,998.25.

The cost is to be paid from a corporate stock fund of \$125,000 authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 11, 1912, and entitled, "C. D. D. 33 Department of Docks and Ferries, Granite Paving of Marginal street along the North River between Barclay and Clarkson street." There has been no expenditures from the fund.

The form of contract, plans and specifications are satisfactory and the estimate of cost is reasonable.

These two new additional boilers will be needed in this district the coming winter because since last winter new buildings have been opened, and as the bids are within the appropriation, although not within our estimate, I would respectfully request that you approve of the awarding of these contracts to the respective lowest bidders in order that the work of installing these boilers may proceed at once. There was appropriated for the pay of the members of this Commission for the current year the sum of \$7,920, and at the same time the number of sessions to be held by the Commission during the year was limited to 198.

Under the law this Commission only meets as directed by the Fire Commissioner, but because of the great amount of business before it, it has thus far been in session every week day of the year.

The Commissioners are paid at the rate of ten dollars for each Commissioner for each session. A quorum of three is necessary to transact business, but it frequently happens that one of the four paid Commissioners is absent, with the result

that it is impossible to estimate with accuracy a year ahead as to the number of meetings which may be paid for by any sum appropriated.

Because of all the Commissioners not being present at each of the 198 sessions authorized, it has resulted that on the 23d day of August, 1912, this Commission held its 198th session, but of the amount appropriated for the pay of the Commissioners there then remained unexpended the sum of \$1,260. Because of being limited to 198 sessions, however, we are informed by your office that this sum is not available now for the further pay of the Commission.

In view of the above facts, we request that you modify Schedule No. 1392 so as to make said funds immediately available for the pay of the Commission since the 23d day of August, 1912, and for the future sessions of the Commission.

Three additional Inspectors of Regulating, Grading and Paving at \$1,200 are to be substituted, an Axeman at \$1,050 and one at \$900 are to be added. This reduces the number of such Inspectors from 63 to 62. The Secretary presented the following communication from the New York State Barge Canal Terminal Conference and report of Committee, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, Comptroller and the President of the Borough of Manhattan, relative to the application by the State Canal Board for the fixing of pierhead and bulkhead lines between the northerly line of Dyckman street and the Harlem Ship Canal pending before the United States Harbor Line Board, and recommending that the Secretary be instructed to request the United States Harbor Line Board that no action be taken on the application, etc., that the Committee on Terminal Improvements be instructed to consult with the State Canal Board for the purpose of securing a change in the proposed location of the Port of Call of the State Barge Canal either to a point south of Dyckman street or to some point in the Hudson River not connected with the water-front, and further recommending that application be made to the United States Harbor Line Board to draw in the pierhead and bulkhead lines on the Hudson River between the northerly line of Dyckman street and the Harlem Ship Canal in order to protect the Inwood Hill from disfigurement through the creation of a commercial development at this point:

(On July 15, 1912, a communication from the New York State Barge Canal Terminal Conference relative to the acquisition of lands and location of terminals was referred to the above committee.)

New York State Barge Canal Terminal Conference, 203 Brodway, New York, July 12, 1912.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On behalf of the Executive Committee of the New York State Barge Canal Terminal Conference, I would request that your Honorable Board take such steps as may be necessary to bring to the attention of your Board officially the provisions of Chapter 746 of the laws of 1911, which provide for the construction in the City of New York of Barge Canal traffic terminals and imposes upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment certain powers and duties with reference to the selection of the locations of such terminals and the co-ordination of such improvements with the plans of the City of New York for the improvement of New York harbor.

The Act provides under certain conditions, and precedent to the location of terminals and the acquiring of lands by the State for such terminals that when the lands to be acquired are owned in whole or in part by the City of New York such lands shall be acquired by an agreement and not otherwise between the Canal Board acting for the State, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment acting for the City of New York.

The Canal Board has already by formal resolution approved locations for a canal terminal at Gowanus Bay; and for one at Newtown Creek, Brooklyn, and one at Dyckman street, Manhattan. The City of New York, we understand, owns some of the lands which have been taken. If the City has such interests in such properties they have been illegally taken and in disregard of the provisions of chapter 746 of the laws of 1911, and the rights of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have been ignored, unless your Board has entered into an agreement with the Canal Board with respect to them.

It is of the highest importance to the commerce of this City and State that the construction of the proposed terminals by the State shall proceed as rapidly as possible, and above all that the proceedings taken to locate terminals and acquire land shall be legal, binding and final; also that the State improvements shall co-ordinate with those to be made by the City.

I would venture to suggest, therefore, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment communicate with the Canal Board and request full information as to all Barge Canal terminals that may be at any time under consideration or heretofore acted upon, showing the lands under water and uplands privately owned, and those owned by the City of New York which would be required to the end that the interests of the City may be protected, the provisions of the law complied with and construction of these canal terminals expedited.

It is important that these terminals shall be completed if possible by the time that the Barge Canal enlargement shall have been completed, which will be in 1915.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The State Canal Board has established the port of call for the State Barge Canal along the Manhattan water-front between the northerly line of Dyckman street and the Harlem Ship Canal. There are two serious objections to this location.

1. It will create an unsightly nuisance on the water-front directly below the beautiful Inwood Hill section, a large part of which is a part of the City park system.

2. There is no necessity for placing the port of call in the location proposed. It will be possible to combine the barge canal terminal with the proposed freight yard of the New York Central Railroad Company to be established south of Dyckman street.

It has been suggested, too, that it may be possible to establish the port of call near the centre of the river by the use of mooring posts, thus relieving the shore front entirely of the encumbrance.

The State Canal Board has a pending application before the United States Harbor Line Board requesting the alteration of the pierhead and bulkhead line between Dyckman street and the ship canal to permit of the establishment of the port of call as proposed.

During the recess of this Board, the President of the Board of Aldermen, as Chairman of the Committee on Terminal Improvements, requested the Harbor Line Board to take no action on this matter until it could be brought officially to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for such action in the premises as it might deem wise to take. It is recommended that a resolution be passed requesting the Harbor Line Board to deny the application of the State Canal Board for the alteration of the pierhead and bulkhead lines, and that your Committee be instructed to communicate with the State Canal Board with a view to establishing the port of call either in connection with the proposed terminal of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company south of Dyckman street, or at some point in the Hudson River not directly connected with the water-front.

It is further suggested that formal application be made to the United States Harbor Line Board requesting that the pierhead and bulkhead lines in the Borough of Manhattan, from the northerly line of Dyckman street to the Harlem Ship Canal, be drawn in so as to prevent the commercial development of this point, thus protecting the important park which is already created at Inwood Hill.

Resolved, That the Committee on Terminal Improvements be instructed to confer with the State Canal Board for the purpose of securing the location of said port of call at a point south of Dyckman street, or at a point in the Hudson River not connected with the shore front; and be it further

Resolved, That the said Committee be authorized to make application to the United States Harbor Line Board requesting the drawing in of the pierhead and bulkhead lines along the Manhattan water-front between the northerly line of Dyckman street and the Harlem Ship Canal in order to prevent the use of that portion of the water-front for commercial purposes.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Commissioner of Docks relative to plans for proposed terminal facilities and equipment thereof, and therefore, at the North River waterfront, between Dey and West 60th streets, Borough of Manhattan, and recommending that the Board, pursuant to Section 3 of Chapter 776 of the Laws of 1911, authorize the Commissioner of Docks to adopt the plan now submitted.

(On June 27, July 11, July 15 and September 19, 1912, the above report was presented to the Board and laid over.)

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, April 24, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Sir—Pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommend to the Board of Aldermen the establishment in this Office of the position of Chief Clerk, General Administration, at three thousand dollars (\$3,000) per annum for one (1) incumbent.

It is my desire to have this position established, for the purpose of increasing the salary of the present incumbent, Mr. David W. Murphy, from \$2,500 to \$3,000 per annum, who has been in the service for twelve (12) years, and has, by the faithful discharge of his duties, earned the approbation of his former and present superiors.

This position is one of peculiar responsibilities, the incumbent, by long service, acquiring a general knowledge of all the functions of this office and the several divisions thereof, and whose duties are of such a nature as to render him a valuable aide to the Heads of Departments, and who has on several occasions acted as Secretary of the Borough for long periods.

This has been recognized by my predecessor, who endeavored in the last two budget requisitions to have this position established at \$3,000 per annum, the request being denied in consequence of the general resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment prohibiting any raises in salaries in the budgets for the years 1911 and 1912. Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, May 27, 1912.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Gentlemen—On April 24, 1912, the President of the Borough of Queens requested the establishment in his office of the position of Chief Clerk, General Administration, at \$3,000 per annum, for one incumbent. In connection therewith I report as follows:

It is proposed to increase David W. Murphy, Chief Clerk of the Bureau of Audit and Accounts. Mr. Murphy now receives a salary of \$2,500 per annum.

One reason urged by the Borough President in favor of his request is that on several occasions Mr. Murphy has acted as Secretary of the Borough for long periods.

There is no longer any reason why Mr. Murphy should act as the Secretary of the Borough of Queens. The Budget provides for a Secretary of the Borough at \$4,000, a Clerk to the President at \$3,000 and in addition to this Budget provision there is a special revenue bond provision for a Secretary to the President. Mr. Joseph Flanagan is Secretary to the Borough at \$4,000 a year. Mr. Hugh Hall is Secretary to the President at \$3,000. Mr. Thomas McGraw is Clerk to the President at \$3,000 per year. This means that the President of the Borough of Queens has \$10,000 for Secretaries in his office.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan has \$9,000 for Secretaries in his office.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn has \$7,500 for Secretaries in his office.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx has \$6,500 for Secretaries in his office.

The President of the Borough of Richmond has \$5,500 for a Secretary of the Borough and an Executive Clerk.

The above figures show that the President of the Borough of Queens already has a greater provision for Secretaries than any other Borough President has.

The position of Secretary to the President at \$3,000 a year was provided for on April 18, 1912, when the Board of Estimate and Apportionment concurred in a resolution of the Board of Aldermen authorizing the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds for the purpose of providing means to pay the salary of a Secretary to the Borough President at the rate of \$3,000 per annum. At the time this provision was made it was recognized that the Borough President was already well supplied with secretarial help, but owing to the fact that the Clerk to the President had been dismissed at one time and reinstated by the courts and could not be regarded as holding confidential relation to the Borough President, the Board of Estimate made provision for the additional Secretary.

The appointment of a Secretary to the President has relieved Mr. Murphy of his larger responsibilities. There was a time when the office of the Secretary to the Borough was vacant and when there was no Secretary to the President that some of the secretarial duties were performed by Mr. Murphy. His duties now are simply clerical. In view of the fact that his work and responsibility have both been largely reduced your Committee does not believe that there should be any increase of salary.

We recommend that the request of the Borough President be denied.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx, and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—15.

Negative—The President of the Borough of Queens—1.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the report of the above Committee to the President of the Borough of Queens.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller certifying, pursuant to section 246 of the Charter, claim of Fiss, Doerr and Carroll Horse Company in the sum of \$249.25, without interest, representing the difference in price of a horse supplied to the Bureau of Engineering Construction, Borough of Richmond, and one given in exchange:

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, September 16, 1912.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under and pursuant to the provisions of section 246 of the Charter, I hereby certify that the Fiss, Doerr and Carroll Horse Company has presented a claim for \$265.00, alleged to be the difference between the price of a brown horse supplied to the Bureau of Engineering Construction in the Borough of Richmond, and the price of a sorrel horse given in exchange; that the President of the Borough of Richmond was without authority to make such exchange and the claim for the difference in price is, therefore, illegal and invalid; that, notwithstanding, in my judgment it is equitable and proper for the City to pay the difference between the value of the horse delivered to the claimant company and the cost to the claimant of the horse delivered by it in exchange; that such difference is the sum of \$249.25, and the City has received a benefit to that extent; that the bill of the claimant company was filed prior to the adoption of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 28th of March, 1912, and may therefore be the subject of adjustment by your Board; that the said sum of \$249.25 should be paid to the claimant company in full satisfaction of its claim upon the execution by it of a full release from all claims against the City arising out of the said transaction, and that the said sum should be paid out of the account "General Administration, contingencies, Borough of Richmond," No. 1430, of 1909. The City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, May 22, 1912.

In the Matter of the Voucher prepared in favor of Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company, for \$265, being the difference between the cost price of a brown horse supplied to the Bureau of Engineering Construction, in the Borough of Richmond, and the price of a sorrel horse given in exchange.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller:

Sir—On the 4th of June, 1909, a voucher was received in this Department, for payment to the Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company, of the sum of \$265, being the difference in value between horse valued at \$325 supplied to the Bureau of Engineering Construction, Borough of Richmond, and a sorrel horse taken in exchange, valued at the sum of \$60.

In a communication, dated the 25th of August, 1910, addressed to you by Louis L. Tribus, Acting President of the Borough of Richmond, he stated: "We had in one of our stables, early in 1909, a horse no longer useful in our service. It could not do the work required, yet was costing as much to keep as would a good horse, which could render efficient service. Your auditing bureau was called upon by telephone, and we were advised by the official then in authority that he could see nothing standing in the way of turning in the old horse as part payment in the purchase of a new animal. Acting on that advice, and in accordance with what we believed to be proper policy and good business, we purchased a new horse from Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company, on April 27, for the sum of \$325, said company agreeing to allow the city \$60 for the old animal, a price that we were advised at the time by our own horse experts to be a good figure for the animal. In due time a voucher was made out for the balance due to the said company for the sum of \$265. Some time late in the year 1909, we learned at the Department of Finance that the voucher had not been paid, on the score that the transaction was 'probably' an 'illegal' one. We are not in position to advise your department on the proposition of legality, but we certainly believe that in justice, propriety, and commonsense the transaction was a wise one, and that the voucher should have been paid on presentation. This morning a representative of the Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company called us by telephone to state that they could not secure payment, though the city has been satisfactorily using the horse purchased, for a year and a half, and presumably the horse taken in exchange has long since passed out of the horse company's ownership."

Isidor Mehrbach was examined under oath, and testified that he was one of the directors of the claimant company, and had personal knowledge of the facts stated. On the 27th of April, 1907, the Bureau of Engineers, Borough of Richmond, purchased a brown horse for \$325, and the company allowed the City \$60 for an old horse, making a difference of \$265 due the company. The horse taken in exchange was an old one, no longer of any use to the Department—played out. It was in very poor condition, and the company allowed every dollar it was worth—\$60. In exchange was given a first-class young horse, sound, and under six years of age. The company received 5 per cent. profit on all horses which it sold. This testimony is transmitted herewith.

Herewith transmitted is a report made by Examiner William P. Riggs, of the Division of Law and Adjustment of this Department, in which he stated that the actual price paid by the company for the horse, delivered to the Bureau of Engineering Construction was \$285, and \$60 allowed as the value of the horse taken by the company in exchange. The latter horse, however, was sold for \$50.

It is evident that the City is under no legal obligation to pay this claim. It may, however, be adjusted under the provisions of section 246 of the Charter.

This bill was filed prior to the adoption of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 28th of March, 1912, in which it was provided that the recommendation of the Comptroller, as contained in his report dated the 4th of December, 1911, on this class of claims should not apply to claims thereafter filed. The resolution of the said Board, adopted on the 7th of March, 1912, approved of the recommendations of the Comptroller as to this class of claims, the recommendation being as follows: That in cases where property had been purchased by the City, and old property, such as an automobile, taken in exchange as part payment, "it would seem equitable to pay the claimant in full, without interest."

It appears, therefore, that the claimant company should be paid the value of the horse, without interest. As the horse was bought for the sum of \$285, and Mr. Mehrbach testified that a reasonable profit was 5 per cent., the value of the horse was, approximately, \$299.25. As the company received the sum of \$50 for the horse delivered by the Bureau of Engineering Construction, it would be only fair to allow the company the difference between the amount received for the latter horse and the value of the horse delivered, viz., the sum of \$249.25. The reasonable and just amount to be paid to the company in the adjustment of this claim would, therefore, be the sum of \$249.25.

It is respectfully recommended that the certificate prescribed in section 246 of the charter as a requisite for the consideration of this claim, be issued in favor of the Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company, in settlement of this claim, in the sum of \$249.25, and that that amount be paid to the claimant company upon the execution by it of a release in favor of the City of all claims by reason of the above-mentioned transaction. Resolved, That, pursuant to section 246 of the charter, being chapter 601 of the Laws of 1907 of the State of New York, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby determines that the City has received a benefit from the Fiss, Doerr & Carroll Horse Company, and is justly and equitably obligated to pay to it the sum of two hundred and forty-nine dollars and twenty-five cents (\$249.25) without interest, the difference between the cost of a horse supplied to the Bureau of Engineering Construction, office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, and the price of a horse given in exchange; that the said sum shall be paid to the said company in full satisfaction of the claim which has been presented by that company for the alleged difference in value, and shall be paid only upon the execution of a full release by the said company in favor of the City from all claims arising out of the said transaction in such form as may be approved by the Corporation Counsel; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized to pay the said amount out of the account "General Administration, Contingencies, Borough of Richmond," No. 1430 of 1909.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens, and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

The Secretary presented a report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending that the request of the President of the Borough of Queens for the establishment of the grades of the positions of Engineer in Charge at \$6,000, Messenger at \$1,500, \$1,350 and \$1,200 per annum, be disapproved.

The President of the Borough of Queens announced the withdrawal of the request referred to in the report of the Committee.

(On July 11, 1912, the request of the President of the Borough of Queens for the establishment of these grades was referred to said Committee.)

The following matters, not upon the Calendar for this day, were considered by unanimous consent:

The President of the Borough of Queens presented a communication requesting the transfer of \$20,000 within appropriations made to his office for the year 1912.

Which was referred to the Comptroller for report at the next meeting—October 3, 1912.

The President of the Borough of Queens moved that the motion adopted June 6, 1912, requesting the Mayor to appoint a Commission, consisting of one lawyer and two engineers of experience in the appraisal of water works, to report upon the private water companies in the Borough of Queens, pursuant to a suggestion contained in the report of the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer under date of May 17, 1912, be amended by eliminating therefrom the restrictions as to one lawyer and two engineers and the limitation to the Borough of Queens, thereby requesting the Mayor to appoint a Commission of Three to report upon the private water companies in the Boroughs comprising the City of New York.

Which motion was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, the Acting President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens, and the Acting President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

Ninth—On December 31, 1909, the liability of petitioner for land in process of acquisition for use in connection with such activities amounted to the sum of \$6,798,728.51, of which the sum of \$2,200,416.01 was paid from the proceeds of the sale of corporate stock issued during the years 1910 and 1911. Subdivision 3 of Part II of Exhibit "A," hereto annexed, under the caption "Land Liability," is a schedule showing in detail such indebtedness.

Tenth—Of the corporate stock issued during the years 1910 and 1911 the sum of \$8,406,097.96 was used for such activities, of which corporate stock in the sum of \$2,449,661.93 was issued to discharge contract liability incurred prior to the first day of January, 1910, and corporate stock in the sum of \$2,180,505.68 was issued to defray land liability incurred prior to the first day of January, 1910.

indebtedness incurred for such activities is the sum of \$2,749,756.69, and if the interest upon the corporate stock issued in 1899 for the improvement of Wallabout Basin is included, the amount of such interest will be the sum of \$2,752,756.69.

Fifteenth—The annual installments necessary for the amortization of the bonded obligations for which the petitioner is liable, amounting to said sum of \$72,975,008.58, is the sum of \$1,057,779.67. If the \$100,000 of corporate stock issued in 1899 for the improvement of Wallabout Basin is included, the amount required for annual amortization purposes will be the sum of \$1,059,881.59.

The annual installments necessary for the amortization of the corporate stock issued in the years 1910 and 1911 to discharge contract liability amounting to the sum of \$2,472,029.94, incurred prior to the first day of January, 1910, is the sum of \$2,073.95.

The annual installments necessary for the amortization of the corporate stock issued in the years 1910 and 1911 to discharge contract liability amounting to the sum of \$2,200,416.01, incurred prior to the first day of January, 1910, is the sum of \$19,648.58, making a total of \$1,099,502.20.

From this should be deducted the annual installments necessary for the amortization of the bonded obligations issued for such activities redeemed during the years 1910 and 1911, amounting to the sum of \$1,206,542.88, which annual installments were the sum of \$23,179.49.

Therefore, the annual amortization requirements for the redemption of bonded indebtedness incurred for such activities is the sum of \$1,074,322.71; and if the annual installment necessary for the amortization of the corporate stock issued in 1899 for the improvement of Wallabout Basin is included, the amount of such annual installments will be the sum of \$1,076,424.63.

Therefore, the total annual interest and amortization charges on such indebtedness amount to the sum of \$3,824,079.40; and if the annual interest and amortization charges upon the corporate stock issued in 1899 for the improvement of Wallabout Basin are included, such amount will be the sum of \$3,829,181.32.

Sixteenth—The current net revenue which the petitioner is receiving from such activities is the sum of \$3,675,352.77, arrived at by deducting from the yearly gross revenue as stated in paragraph thirteenth of this petition, viz., \$4,563,459.65, the expenses of operation and maintenance and depreciation in the value of the floating plant used in connection therewith to the sum of \$888,106.88.

Seventeenth—The following statement is submitted for the information of the Court, to the end that the Court may be fully apprised of the character of the revenues received by the petitioner from such activities, more particularly as to their stability and permanency, and as to the constant annual increase thereof.

Second—Ferry Franchises: Appended to and made a part of this report is a schedule (marked B), showing ferry franchises and leases (other than municipal ferries and the Roosevelt street-Broadway ferry), under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, with the location and description of premises, names of leases, conditions of leases and yearly rental revenue therefrom as indicated December 31, 1909, December 31, 1910, and December 31, 1911.

Third—Temporary Permits for Use of Wharf Property: In addition to the leases and ferry franchises granted by the Commissioner of Docks with the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the occupation of uplands, land under water and wharf property under the jurisdiction of the Department, there are also issued by the Commissioner permits for periods not exceeding one year, without reference to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. These permits are issued pursuant to the provisions of section 825 of the Greater New York Charter which says: "Unless said leases are sold at public auction and duly advertised in the City Record and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days, said Commissioner shall make no lease authorized by this section unless the terms of said lease are approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; but temporary permits for a period not exceeding one year may be granted to use and occupy said wharf property, said permits to be terminable at the will of the Commissioner." Appended to and made a part of this statement is a schedule (marked C) showing in detail all temporary permits authorized by the Commissioner of Docks in force December 31, 1911.

Fourth—Wharfage and Dockage Rates: The charges for wharfage and dockage are fixed and regulated under the provisions of section 825 and 859 of the Greater New York Charter, which empower the Commissioner of Docks to regulate the charges for wharfage, craneage and dockage and to "alter such charges from time to time as the public trade may authorize and the said Commissioner of Docks deems proper; provided that the rates of wharfage on boats navigating the canals of the State shall not be increased beyond the rates in force on April 18, 1871, except as hereinafter specifically provided, and no restriction of the amount of wharf and slip room occupied by them shall be made."

Acting under the authority vested in him by the sections of the City Charter referred to, the Commissioner of Docks has formulated a schedule of wharfage rates, a copy of which (marked Schedule D) is appended to and made a part of this statement.

5. Gross Revenues Received by the City. The yearly gross revenue, as of December 31, 1911, of the City of New York from dock properties under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, other than recreation buildings, municipal ferries and the Roosevelt street-Broadway ferry, which revenues for the purpose of this statement include only those which are, in accordance with law, credited to the sinking funds of the City, is shown in the following tabulation:

6. Interest Paid and to be Paid on Bonded Indebtedness. The annual interest paid and to be paid by the City on \$83,647,617.27, the total amount of dock bonds and corporate stock issued and used for dock purposes remaining unredeemed and outstanding December 31, 1909, was \$2,997,460.37. If the \$100,000 of corporate stock issued in 1899 for the Wallabout improvement is to be included in the total amount of bonded indebtedness, the amount would be \$3,000,460.37.

The annual installments necessary for the amortization of the \$72,975,008.58 of bonded indebtedness outstanding December 31, 1909, represented by investment account in payments for property and construction, amounts to \$1,057,779.67. Adding \$2,101.92 necessary for the amortization of the \$100,000 corporate stock issued for the Wallabout improvement, the amount would be \$1,214,582.06.

The annual installments necessary for the amortization of the \$90,670,715.23, the total of bonds and corporate stock issued by the City for dock purposes remaining unredeemed and outstanding December 31, 1911, was \$1,259,345.84. With \$2,101.92 added for the \$100,000 corporate stock issued for the Wallabout improvement, the total would be \$1,359,881.59.

The annual installments necessary for the amortization of the \$8,406,097.96 corporate stock issued for dock purposes during the years 1910 and 1911 amounts to \$75,727.70, and the installments necessary for the amortization of the \$1,383,000 bonds redeemed during 1910 and 1911 was \$28,862.

The annual installments necessary for the amortization of \$90,670,715.23, the total of bonds and corporate stock issued by the City for dock purposes remaining unredeemed and outstanding December 31, 1911, was \$1,259,345.84. With \$2,101.92 added for the \$100,000 corporate stock issued for the Wallabout improvement, the total would be \$1,359,881.59.

1. BONDED INDEBTEDNESS.

The dock bonds and corporate stock of The City of New York outstanding December 31, 1909, the proceeds whereof were expended for the construction, maintenance and operation of the recreation building upon piers, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Docks and Ferries, amounted to \$2,558,429.45. Of this amount \$812,418.14 was represented by disbursements for investment in the construction of the buildings on City piers used for recreation purposes.

The amount of bonded indebtedness for recreation buildings outstanding December 31, 1911, the proceeds whereof were used for construction and maintenance and operation, was \$2,558,634.11.

PART IV.
MUNICIPAL FERRY PURPOSES.
1. BONDED INDEBTEDNESS.

The corporate stock of The City of New York outstanding December 31, 1909, the proceeds whereof were expended for all purposes of the municipal ferries, amounted to \$15,341,923.80. Of this amount \$9,357,191.06 was represented in expenditures for property and construction or investment account. The corporate stock outstanding December 31, 1911, the proceeds whereof were used for all purposes of the municipal ferries, amounted to \$16,101,419.63. Of this amount \$10,116,686.89 was represented by disbursements on investment account. The outstanding liabilities for contracts on account of municipal ferries, chargeable to corporate stock funds on December 31, 1909 amounted to \$344,656.25. Following is a schedule showing the details of this amount, also the amounts paid thereon from the proceeds of corporate stock during 1910 and 1911, viz., \$305,766.53, and the amount thereof undischarged December 31, 1911, viz., \$38,889.72.
