### REPORT OF DISTRICT PRISONS.

New York, July 6, 1912.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir-I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at District Prisons for the three months ending June 30, 1912.

At Second District Prison a large number of repairs to boilers, fireplaces and general overhauling of the entire plumbing system in male, female prison and kitchen was done by staff, the material thereto, such as iron pipes and general plumbing supplies, being furnished by the Department. The overhauling and placing in first class condition of the "Huot, Duparquet" kitchen range was successfully completed and the range is now in first class serviceable condition. For the prevention of fire a new 11/2-inch wire-covered rubber hose was installed, also three

At Fourth District Prison repairs to plumbing work done by staff with material supplied by the Department. For the prevention of fire a new 11/2-inch wire-covered

rubber hose with nozzle was installed.

At Fifth District Prison general repairs of plumbing done by staff with material supplied by the Department; one new "Kenny's" flushometer was installed in cell No. 17, male prison. The prison was thoroughly renovated in its interior.

The kitchen range was repaired and new stove supplies necessary furnished and new hot water circulation attached, the same being done by paid labor. For the prevention of fire a new 11/2-inch wire-covered rubber hose was installed and adjusted in the different parts of the prison, also 3 new "Rex" fire extinguishers.

At Seventh District Prison general repairs of plumbing done by staff with material supplied by the Department. Renovation of prison is in course of completion; a new house telephone will be installed under supervision of the Department Electrician, and with the new electric lighting system to be installed this prison will be placed in a first class condition.

The female prisoners transferred from the Workhouse to the various District Prisons to serve their sentences are employed in cleaning, scrubbing and doing some

The male prisoners are employed in cleaning, painting, cooking, plumbing and general utility work.

Attached herewith you will find a statement showing the disposition of prisoners received for the three months ending June 30, 1912, also the amount of money collected from fines and telephone charges from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the respective funds upon the receipt from the City Chamberlain, the Board of Health and the General Bookkeeper and Auditor of the

Engineer's Report. Repaired 30 steam leaks, 25 hot water leaks, 20 Croton water leaks, toilets 25 times, washing machine 30 times, steam mangle 25 times, steam pump 10 times and driving belts 20 times.

Paint Shop. Painted two coats, guard houses, boxes, and pumps on front road, racks and railing in clothes house, 8 coal carts, butcher house, waiting rooms, roof of female hall, extension, roof of male hall toilets, roof of vegetable house, and letters on signs on front road. Cab, five coats.

Grained and painted cabinet for storehouse, closet for central office. Glazed 500 panes of glass.

During the quarter white stone bowls, plates and mugs were installed to replace the old tinware then in use; this is a great improvement, not only in a sanitary, but also in an economical way.

Wire mosquito netting has been placed on the windows of the mess hall and dormitories for the first time, which was very essential.

We have started making shipments of green goods from the farm to the

By Prisoners At Work At Outdoor Labor—15 acres have been cultivated and seed

sown as follows: 2 acres tomatoes, 2½ acres cabbage, 2½ acres corn, 1½ acres butter beans, 1 acre peas, ¼-acre lettuce, ¼-acre onions, ½-acre leek, ¼-acre beets, 1/4-acre parsley, 1/4-acre carrots, 1/8-acre sprouts, 1/4-acre celery, 1/2-acre turnips, 1/4-acre cucumbers, 1/2-acre radishes, 1/8-acre pumpkins, 1/2-acre potatoes, 1/4-acre peppers, ½-acre string beans, ½-acre lima beans, ½-acre rhubarb, and ½-acre spinach; the lawns cared for, the grass cut and 6 tons of hay gathered; a concrete walk, consisting of 1,487 feet, has been laid about the office and Head Keeper House, and a new brick retaining wall was built under front porch of same building. The foundation wall of the following buildings have been pointed up and reset wherever necessary, namely, Dormitories No. 1, No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4, mess hall, Doctors' quarters and hospital, Storehouse, Keepers' quarters, Head Keeper's house and office. A stone drain has been put in at the east end of the island to carry off rain water from the roads; this has been very necessary owing to the large amount of stagnant water which gathers at this point. A manhole has been built at the stable to allow access to all water and sewer connections at this point. Pointed up three chimneys on roof of Head Keepers' house, one on roof of Keepers' quarters and two on roof of mess hall; a concrete step has been set at the entrance to Dormitories No. 1, No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4. The concrete and masonry work reported above has taken 240 days' time. Both sides of the bank running from the office to the dock have been terraced and 100 loads of stone removed from the same; 22 lamp posts have been painted and the lower parts of 30 trees whitewashed along the road; hard pan has been spread over the roads and ashes and screenings over the walks, after which both have been carefully rolled. The words "Department of Correction, Rikers Island," have been removed from their location and relaid in 10-foot letters at the northeast end of the island, adding greatly to the beauty of this place. The beaches around the island have been cleared of all refuse regularly. During the quarter the dock has been repaired by the Department of Docks and Ferries. The materials used in the masonry work were 50 barrels of cement, 150 barrels of sand ending June 30, 1912: received from the beach, and 300 barrels of stone also received from the beach.

Painters-Dormitory No. 1: Painted ceilings, side walls, doors and window frames, two coats; painted outside of building and roof one coat, painted bars on doors and windows and four radiators one coat, painted and grained six benches, painted inside of bathroom between No. 1 and No. 2, two coats, painted and grained wash troughs and wooden partitions in shower baths one coat, painted ceiling and side walls, doors and window frames in prison office of this dormitory one coat. Material used: 350 pounds of white lead, 35 gallons of turpentine, 10 gallons of boiled oil, 5 gallons dryers, 5 gallons of varnish, 10 pounds of yellow ochre, 10 pounds of lamp black, 15 pounds of Venetian red, and 30 gallons of metallic paint. Dormitory No. 2: Painted and trimmed ceiling, side walls, doors and window frames two coats; painted outside of building and roof one coat; painted bars on doors and windows and four radiators one coat. Material used: 300 pounds of white lead, 25 gallons of turpentine, 15 gallons of boiled oil, 5 gallons of dryers, 6 pounds of yellow ochre, 5 pounds of drop black, 5 pounds of Venetian red, and 20 gallons of metallic paint. Dormitory No. 3: Painted and trimmed ceiling, side walls, doors and window frames two coats; painted bars on doors and windows and four radiators one coat; painted outside of building and roof one coat. Material used: 300 pounds of white lead, 20 gallons of turpentine; 5 gallons of dryers, 6 gallons of boiled oil, 5 pounds of drop black, 5 pounds of Venetian red, and 20 gallons of metallic paint. Mess Hall: Painted and trimmed ceiling, side walls, doors and window frames of prisoners' mess hall, prisoners' kitchen, officers' dining room and kitchen two coats; painted legs of tables and benches and bars on doors and windows one coat; painted outside of building and roof one coat. Material used: 350 pounds of white lead, 35 gallons of turpentine, 15 gallons of boiled oil, 8 gallons of dryers, 15 pounds of Venetian red, 15 pounds of drop black, and 30 gallons of metallic paint. Doctors' Quarters and Hospital: Painted outside of building and 100f one coat; white-washed foundation of building, 3 pails of whitewash. Material used: 45 pounds of white lead, 12 gallons of turpentine, 4 gallons of boiled oil, 2 gallons of dryers, 4 pounds of drop black and 15 gallons of metallic paint. Storehouse: Painted outside of building and roof one coat, whitewashed foundation of building, 4 pails of whitewash. Material used: 40 pounds of white lead, 15 gallons of turpentine, 4 gallons of boiled oil, 3 gallons of dryers, 2 pounds of drop black and 13 gallons of metallic paint. Keepers' Quarters: Painted outside of building one coat; painted front and white-washed rear of foundation walls; painted roof one coat. Material used: 60 pounds of white lead, 15 gallons of turpentine, 8 gallons of boiled oil, 2 gallons of dryers, 70,487.

pounds of drop black, 15 gallons of metallic paint and 5 pails of whitewash. Head Keepers' House and Office: Painted and trimmed outside, two coats; painted roof two coats; painted screens and shutters one coat. Material used: 100 pounds of white lead, 45 gallons of turpentine, 15 gallons of boiled oil, 5 gallons of raw oil, 15 pounds of drop black, 30 pounds of emerald green, and 25 gallons of metallic paint. Bath House: Painted outside and roof one coat. Material used: 15 pounds of white lead, 4 gallons of turpentine, 1 pint of boiled oil. Miscellaneous: Painted received and varnished 20 runway at float landing, painted two rowboats, painted, grained and varnished 20 chairs, 4 benches and 5 tables, painted 3 bread boxes and two ice boxes. Material used; 35 pounds of white lead, 5 gallons of boiled oil, 2 pounds of chrome yellow, 2 gallons of dryers and 1½ gallons of varnish.

Plumbers-Dormitory No. 1: Put six new hoppers in bath and repaired tanks of same; put in 3 new faucets and repaired 4 old ones. Dormitory No. 3: Put in six new hoppers and repaired tanks and lead feed pipes of same. Mess hall, Cleaned sewer connection and put new lead trap under sink in Keepers' kitchen, put in 6 feet of lead under sink of prisoners' kitchen, repaired 4 faucets, putting washers on same. Doctors' Quarters: Put new trap under sink and repaired toilet in bathroom put 20 feet 1½ in. lead pipe in cellar. Keepers' Quarters: Repaired rear section of small boiler in cellar; repaired tank in toilet and put 3 new faucets in

Tinsmiths—Dormitory No. 1: Repaired roof and gutter, put two new lengths in leader pipe material used, 24 sheets of roofing tin, 9 bars solder and ½ sheet of galvanized iron, 1 pound rivets. Dormitory No. 2: Repaired roof and gutter, put up new leader pipe 12 feet long; material used, 18 sheets roofing tin, 8 bars solder, 2 sheets galvanized iron, 3 pounds rivets and 1 pound solder. Dormitory No. 3: Repaired roof; material used, 3 sheets roofing tin and 34 pound solder. Doctors' Quarters and Hospitals: Put wire mosquito netting on 18 windows, making 10 new frames; put up new screen door at entrance, made new ice box, rehung door in medicine closet, repaired one table and 3 chairs, put up new stoop at entrance to hospital. Mess hall: Made and put up two window frames, repaired door in Keepers' dining-room, made frames and put wire mosquito netting on 36 windows, made one screen door for rear and two for front, made two knife boxes, 3 new tray boxes 12 feet long and 5 bread boxes, put in 8 lights of glass and 6 sash cords. Keepers' Quarters: Put new stoop at rear of building, repaired stoop at front of same, repaired and rehung both front and back doors, put wire mosquito netting on 20 windows, making 5 new frames; repaired screen door for front of building, put in 3 lights of glass and 2 sash cords. Head Keeper's House and Office: Put wire mosquito netting on 36 windows, making new frames for 8; made and put up 16 new mosquito netting frames for around porch, repaired and rehung 21 blinds, put up new stoop at front of house, put in 8 lights of glass and 4 sash cords, repaired stoop at office, put in new cellar door. Stable: Repaired front, putting in 5 12-foot pine boards; repaired 7 stalls and 3 small doors in loft, put new tackle block over entrance, repaired and rehung rear door. Miscelaneous: Removed old oil house and put up new one at end of Dormitory No. 4, put carpenter's bench, tinsmith's bench and plumber's bench in shop; made and set up tool lockers in same place, repaired 25 chairs, 11 tables and two desks; put new rungs in 5 ladders, put handles in 7 axes, 18 sledges, 40 small hammers and 9 screwdrivers, sharpened 39 saws, 40 axes and 110 chisels. Laundry: Washed 1,500 undershirts, 900 outside shirts, 1,000 pairs pants, 2,500 pairs socks, 300 cot bottoms, 2,500 towels.

Shoemakers: Repaired 350 pairs of shoes. During the quarter the daily average census was 111 male prisoners, and they were employed as follows:

Stablemen and Drivers, 7; Carpenters, 3; Tinsmiths and Plumbers, 2; Shoemakers, 2; Painters, 4; Fireman, 1; kitchen and mess-hall men, 10; utility men, 5;

cleaning buildings and outdoor labor, 77. Total, 111.

Tailoring Industry-The inmates of this department have been employed in making new suits, shirts, etc., for their own use, also on old work, repairing and

Shoe Repairing Department-Inmates have been employed at repairing only. Plumbing Industry—The work of the plumbing class has been confined to repairs in the different buildings of the Reformatory and practice work, and also new work wherever necessary.

Painting Industry-The inmates of this Department have been occupied in practice work for beginners, and at same time receiving elementary instruction, and as advanced put on work such as painting the interior of the school building,

dining rooms, kitchens, pantries and steamboats.

Tinsmith Industry—The inmates of this department have been occupied at their usual work, under their Instructor's care, also making new articles for this and other institutions of the department and repair work. Electrical Department-Instructions in the elementary theory of magnetism,

calculations of units, volts, amperes, etc., and first lessons in practice work given daily also all work wherever necessary. Carpentry and Manual Training-In this department the boys are taught the

use of tools and begin practice work. As advanced they are put on the general work of the institution, which comprises new and repair work, required in the different buildings of the Reformatory.

Bricklaying and Cement Industry-In our bricklaying class we are now giving instruction, on an average to 50 boys, and in every case show daily improvements strate's Court, \$14; Third District Magistrate's Court, none; Fourth District Magisin their practice work.

Printing Industry—Our printing department does all the printing matter for the Reformatory, also for the other branches in the Department of Correction.

Gardening Class-Instructing the boys as follows: Trimming trees, shrubs, hedges, cutting grass, edging lawns, sowing grass, flower and vegetable seeds. Transplanting flowers and planting flowers in beds and boxes.

Health of Inmates-The general health of the inmates has been good and no serious case of acute disease has occurred in the last three months. The following are the number of cases treated: Colds, tonsilitis, influenza, 45; skin diseases, 2; adenitis, 2; scabies, 4; sprains, contusions, abscesses, 6; rheumatism, 7; pneumonia, 7; bubo, 1; tuberculosis, 2; epilepsy, 3; fever, 12; constipation, 2; traumatism, 5; cld scar tissue, 1; boils, 1; chancroid, 4; fractured femur, 1; chorea, 2; acne, 2;

drug habit, 2; ulcerated leg, 2; ulcerated tooth, 4, etc.

The iron railing on street side of Administration Building, the southwest driveway doors, the main entrance doors and all window guards, screens, frames, sashes, etc., in men's prison building have been painted. A new set of halyards have been installed on flag pole. The furnaces of the two boilers have been relined, including bridge walls, solid jams and arches for furnace doors.

The female prisoners, under sentence here, are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the female prison and in the Administration Building.

The male prisoners, under sentence here, are employed in cleaning about the male prison, kitchen and stable and in repairing and painting about the institution. Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners commencement of quarter, the number received, transferred and discharged, the amount of fines received from the County Court, the Court of Special Sessions and ten City Magistrate's Courts, all of which have been paid over to the City Chamberlain as section 1550 of the Greater New York Charter requires.

### CITY PRISON, BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Long Island City, N. Y., July 8, 1912.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner: Dear Sir—I most respectfully transmit herewith quarterly report of the City Prison of Queens, ending June 30, 1912, showing the work done by paid or prison labor; a statement of prisoners received and disposed of; also the amount of fines collected from prisoners committed from the Magistrates' Courts and Court of Special Sessions of the Borough of Queens, respectively.

Statement Showing Work Done By Paid or Prison Labor.

I most respectfully report that since June 1, 1912, on which date you assumed authority and control over the City Prison of Queens (formerly the Queens County Jail), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 456, Laws of 1912, the prisoners convicted and sentenced to this institution have been required to work at a daily average of eight hour in either cooking, cleaning the jail, or making any changes or alterations in the jail, not included in a present contract. The prison was thoroughly cleaned and disinfected and is kept in as sanitary a condition as it possibly can, under the present conditions.

I have closed up the entrance to the jail on the first floor with brick, by prison labor received from the Workhouse. This entrance was hardly ever used, and, in fact, in a very inconvenient place for jail purposes, but in a very convenient place for any inmate desiring escape.

The large iron gate on the main driveway from the jail yard on the south side

has been secured against almost possible escape.

A new telephone has been installed by the Department for official business and in order to comply with the provisions of section 112, chapter 659 of the Laws of

The jail buildings have been inspected by the Departmental Inspector on divers occasions, who has noted numerous defects in the layout and construction of the buildings, recommending immediate alterations in a good many instances, which in

some cases have been remedied. Under a contract awarded by the Sheriff of the County of Queens prior to June 1, 1912, to Messrs. McDermott and Robinson, the plumbing system in the entire jail has been thoroughly overhauled; entrance to the jail on the south side has been closed, substituting an iron barred window; alterations are in progress on first floor of Administration Building, making same suitable for living apartments for the Warden; alterations are also in progress on second floor, making same suitable for male and female hospital wards, Matrons' quarters, and the entire northwest part of this floor has been partitioned off and set aside for the exclusive use of the Sheriff of Queens County for a civil jail, which quarters he at present occupies.

The removal of numerous violations placed upon the buildings of this institution prior to June 1, 1912, by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, is well under way.

The Grand Jury of the County of Queens, before closing its duties for the term, made an official inspection of the jail building, and from information received,

I am informed that they made no unfavorable report.

Fines collected from prisoners committed from the Magistrates' Courts and Court of Special Sessions of the Borough of Queens, respectively, for the quarter ending June 30, 1912: First District Magistrate's Court, \$112; Second District Mag-I trate's Court, none; Court of Special Sessions, \$10-total amount, \$136.

#### Department of Health.

At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held July 16, 1912, the following order was made:

Whereas, Many dogs are at large and unmuzzled in the Borough of Richmond and cases of rabies have been and are of frequent occurrence and a number of persons in said Borough have been bitten by dogs; and

Whereas, The Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York has taken and filed among its records what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that these conditions constitute a nuisance dangerous to life and detrimental to health, the said Board, under its general authority to preserve the public health and abate nuisances, does hereby enter in its records that the being or running loose or at large of dogs in the streets, avenues, highways or other public places in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, is dan-gerous to life and detrimental to health and a public nuisance, and the said Board hereby orders the abatement of the aforesaid nuisance. It is hereby further

Ordered, That any and all dogs loose or at large in any of the public streets, avenues, highways or other public places in the said Lorough of Richmond, City of New York, unless held by a leash or chain or muzzled in such manner as to protect persons from being bitten, shall be destroyed as directed by the Commissioner of Health. It is further

Ordered, That this order and regula tion shall take effect on the 1st day of August, 1912, and remain in force and effect until the 1st day of November, 1912 and that this order be printed in the CITY RECORD for five days in succession beginning July 22, 1912. A true copy.

the time when the case is first seen:
A-Communicable: Typhoid fever, influenza, lobar pneumonia, broncho-pneumonia, infectious diseases of the gastro-intestinal canal (dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, summer

diarrhoeas of infants).

B—Parasitic diseases of the skin: Scabies, tinea tonsurans, impetigo (contagious), favus.

Note—In this list of diseases reporting is required by the Department of Health in order that data may be obtained for general and spe-cial investigation of the modes and sources of infection and as to the prevalence and distribu-tion of these diseases. The Department of Health does not purpose to exercise a sanitary surveillance in these cases, but desires information with a view to the ultimate removal or improvement in the conditions which now foster them. Notification is required in certain of these diseases because of the happing the children in schools.
