

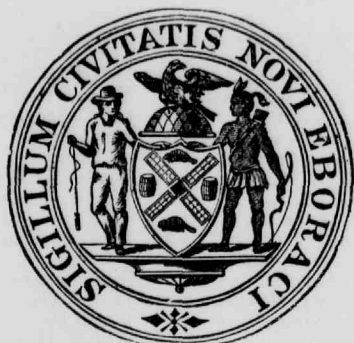

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer the sum of \$1,526.17 from appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1879, account entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Doormen," which is in excess of the amount required, to appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1880, account entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Captains," which is insufficient, to enable the Board of Police to pay Captain Jacob Siebert salary from the 26th day of March to the 31st day of December, 1880, inclusive, which is in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel rendered June 24, 1880.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 11, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,477, as follows, viz.: 612 tenement-houses, 82 private dwellings, 84 other dwellings, 4 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 36 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 pond, 1 public drain, 45 sunken and vacant lots, 50 yards, courts and areas, 69 cellars and basements, 89 waste-pipes and drains, 175 privies and water-closets, 19 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 17 other nuisances, together with 66 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 480.

During the past week 136 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were granted to the consignees of 104 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

134 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 65 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 65 houses, 65 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of contagious disease was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,811 privies, 297 yards, 257 cellars, 278 garbage boxes, and 75 6-10 miles of street gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 486 births, 48 still-births, 195 marriages, and 569 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 11, 1880; this shows a decrease of 154 births and 4 still-births, and an increase of 42 marriages and 40 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was a decrease of 57 births and 8 still-births, and an increase of 45 marriages and 26 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 2; erysipelas, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; inanition, 3; rheumatism and gout, 4; bronchitis, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 10; apoplexy, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; suicide, 2; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 8; croup, 2; whooping cough, 5; typhoid fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; alcoholism, 3; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 14; pneumonia, 12; heart diseases, 10; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; convulsions, 8; direct effect of solar heat, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; premature and preterm births, 1; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, diarrhoeal diseases, and all diseases of the brain and nervous system, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 101 were in institutions, 317 in tenement houses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 101 on the first, 149 on the second, 128 on the third, 58 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 562 were stated to be residents of New York City and 7 non-residents; 66 were stated to be single, 120 married, 56 widowed, and the condition of 327 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week was as follows, viz.: City deaths, 569; still-births, 48; bodies in transitu, 25; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 486 births, 195 marriages, 48 still-births, 25 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 78 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 26 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 11, 1880, was 67.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.901, the mean humidity was 82, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,145, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.26 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 534 deaths and still-births, or 86.55 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 8; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 229; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 72; Greenwood (undenominational), 39; Lutheran (undenominational), 98; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 28; Woodlawn (undenominational), 12; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending September 4, 1880, was 531; this is 9 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 60.8 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.71 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,216,090.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act heretofore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
