

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Nov. 27, 1886.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James F. Cavanagh to construct a stairway from the bottom to the top of the hill in One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, between the first new avenue west of Eighth avenue and St. Nicholas place; such stairway to be not less than twenty-five feet nor more than one hundred feet wide, and to be used by residents of the vicinity and others, as a means of access to and from the Elevated Railway station at Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The Board of Police officially announce to the Department and Force the death of Chester Alan Arthur, ex-President of the United States, at his residence in this city, at an early hour on the morning of Thursday, November 18, 1886, and take this occasion, while offering a tribute of respect to

his memory, to express their admiration of his character as a public officer and his eminent worth as a private citizen. Therefore
Resolved, That in the death of Chester Alan Arthur the State of New York mourns the loss of one of its most distinguished lawyers and worthy citizens; that his valuable services as Quarter-Master General upon the staff of Governor Morgan enabled the State of New York to promptly and properly furnish and equip its quota of volunteers in the civil war at a time when they were most required; that his conspicuous ability and true greatness in affairs of state when unexpectedly called to the position of Chief Magistrate of the Nation during the alarming and trying conditions attending the assassmation of President Garfield gave confidence to the people and entire faith in his patriotism, honesty and fidelity to public trust; that his kindly nature, generous and gentlemanly instincts and benevolent spirit endeared him to the whole people, and has made his loss one of universal sorrow.

Resolved, That the sympathy of this Board be extended to the grief stricken family of the deceased; that the usual symbols of mourning be displayed upon the buildings of the Department; and that upon the day of the funeral the offices in the Central Department be closed, excepting so much thereof as may be required to be kept open for necessary transaction of public business.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
